CORTON LIGHTSHIP SUNK BY A MINE: 5 OF CREW DROWNED

London, June 21 (4.35 p. m.)—
The Corton Lightship, situated several miles off the English east coast, has been sunk, with the loss of five members of its crew, drowned or killed, says a Central News despatch today from Great Yarmouth. Whether the sinking was due to a mine or submarine is unknown.

The survivors of the disaster, badly injured, have been landed.

Yarmouth, June 22.—The Corton Lightship was sunk by a mine, according to the survivors, two in number. They say that Captain Rudd, at the bow, sighted a mine and gave warning. The explosion came an instant later, and the force was so terrific that the vessel was raised out of the water and completely broken up. She sank immediately.

The survivors were picked up by a flahing boat after ten minutes in the water. There was no sign of the captain or the other members of the crew. This is the first lightship sunk during the war.

He believed the wounds were due to some blunt instrument and heavy blows had been administered.

The chief witness for the defence was the prisoner bimself. He testified that he had got along with his wife and family of ten children, but admitted that some times he would have a slight disagreement with his wife. He then repeated the story, as told at the inquest, of his wife falling backward down the steep stairs. He admitted having three drinks of liquor that day, then falling asleep and afterwards going to the barn. When he came in his wife was lying with a bloody face on the floor.

He explained the absence of blood marks at the foot of the stairs and the presence of blood on the ground by saying that he mopped up the blood at the former place. He denied having used an axe handle or anything else on his wife.

Several witnesses testified that the prisoner had borne a good reputation in the neighborhood. One cross-examination some admitted that when drunk he did not use his wife well and that once she left him and stayed away for over a year, returning home on the advice of a magistrate.

# JAPAN IS PROVING HERSELF A VERY VALUABLE ALLY TO RUSSIA JUST NOW

New York, June 21—Japan is not only proving to be a valuable ally of Russia in the war, but her business interests are reaching out and making every effort to get and control Russian trade that formerly went to Germany, according to P. A. Labrie of Methuen, Mass., foreign representative of an American manufacturing company, who arrived here on the steamer Oscar II. from Copenhagen. 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


