Egyptian Affairs.

GORDON'S RETREAT CUT OFF.

Cairo, Feb. 25.—News from Khartoum this morning is somewhat alarming and indicates that Gen. Gordon has changed his plans in regard to Sudan. The latest reports say Gordon having become convinced of the danger of attempting to hold Khartoum on account of the rebellion, he has decided to evacuate the place at once. He has destroyed all military stores and the guns which would be liable to encumber the retreat from the town, so as to prevent them falling into the hands of the Mahdi's forces.

At Constantinople it is positively asserted that the Mahdi and King J. H. of Abyssinia, have signed a convention to the effect that the King J. H. shall remain neutral and in return shall receive a part on the Red Sea and a large accession of territory. Great excitement is felt at the report that the powerful Besharah Arabs have revolted. They occupy the territory between Khartoum and Wady and Aden and eastward to Berber. If this is true, Gen. Gordon, with Khartoum and other garrisons, is cut off from the sea.

The Mahdi's emissaries are busy throughout the whole of Egypt. They go from village to village bearing the message, "I am a prophet, and I have been sent to you by God. I am ready to die for you." This passes on from mouth to mouth, and the situation is becoming very serious.

A spy captured in Osman Digma's camp has admitted to inducing and mutilation. The rebels cut off one of his hands and tied it around his neck. Gladstone's confidence in Gen. Gordon continues as firm as ever.

At Suakin a mutiny occurred this morning among the black troops, they dispersed through the bazaar and threatened to join the rebels. Admiral Hewitt will therefore retain a number of marines at Suakin and the blacks were living in the barracks.

General Graham's troops remain encamped between Trinkitat and Cape Mada under the guns of Suakin.

The latest news from the Mahdi's camp is that he has accepted a most welcome addition to Gen. Graham's forces. As they are veterans they will give a good deal of increased confidence to the younger soldiers.

SUKKIM, Feb. 26.—Another refugee from Tokar has arrived. He left Tokar on Thursday. He says that a majority of the garrison wished to surrender, but two hundred insisted upon continuing resistance. It is believed that the majority are now in the hands of the rebels, and that the remainder are being held in the hands of the rebels.
