SPLENDID BRITISH VICTORY AT TRIN-

THE REBEL LOSS ONE THOUSAND KILLED AND WOUNDED-BRITISH LOSS LIGHT. LONDON, MARCH 1. Despatches state that a battle was fought at Trankitat on Friday last,

resulting in a brilliant victory for the British under General Graham and the rout of the rebels under Osman Digma with frightful slaughter. The opinion is freely expressed that the Government should reconquer the whole of the Soudan before making terms with the rehels. Dynamite plots terms with the rebels. Dynamite plots have ceased to be the topic of conver-sation, and notwithstanding the fact that the police have found an infernal machine in Ludgate Hill Railway Station, very little attention was paid to it, the public being wholly engrossed with the brilliant victory of the forces of General Graham.

Nineteen officers received wounds, including Baker Pasha and Col. Burnaby, in cluding Baker Pasha and Col. Burnaby, in Friday's battle.

As the British advanced, firing, the rebels rose within two hundred yards of them and rushed headlong, with their spears, upon the British line. They fell dead right and left. None of them bolted, but fell back sullenly. Having clear ground in front, the British attacked Fort Baker and carried it after a desperate fight. The British then entered a brick building and at one o'clock the rebels bolted, the gatling guns and martini rifles creating great havoc among them. The English forces advanced to the fresh water well at Teb where the rebels made the last stand. After four hours arduous

the last stand. After four hours arduous lighting, the British gained possession of the rebel camp. SUAKIM, March 2.

The British troops entered Tokar on the afternoon of Saturday. A few shots were exchanged with the enemy, when 4,000 rebels holding the town fied. Osman Digma is encamped eight miles distant from Suakim. A battle with him is expected when the British troops return to Suakim from Tokar.

The march to Tokar was accomplished in Layers, Loose Muscatel and Valencia


