BUILD FOR THE FUTURE

Campbellton certainly has a great industrial future in store for her and citizens. Instead of building for the present needs should build for the future.

A few years ago a small wharf with a single track was sufficient to care for all the shipping, now the fine long wharf with double tracks and sidings is necessary to accommodate the shipping. Today there is in the river a large vessel to load lumber for the Australian market. She will be obliged to wait two weeks to get a berth before loading can commence.

Besides the crowding of foreign vessels the passenger boats are having considerable trouble in unloading. Of course, this accommodation will be improved when the new addition now under construction is completed, but if the increase of the past two years is to continue provision should be made at once for additional berths.

The Board of Trade at its meeting Monday evening took this matter up and a committee was instructed to look after this needed work. It was suggested that the old ferry wharf could be extended to deep water at a very small cost, and another cribber berth to lengthen it thus providing a berth for one of the passenger boats.

NON RESIDENT LICENSES

The matter of the non-resident fishing license levied by the Quebec government on owners and lessees of Quebec fishing waters is again receiving the attention of our citizens, who feel deeply in this matter.

Many Campbellton citizens own fishing waters or privileges in the province of Quebec, and these are obliged to pay a fee of \$25 for salmon fishing and \$10 for trout fishing in their own fishing waters.

With the average citizen this is a prohibitive rate and this year, owing to the closing of the season, have been unable to enjoy the fishing rights they own.

Besides being a hardship to our citizens, it is also detrimental to the town as New Brunswick citizens who would like to enjoy a day's fishing at a reasonable cost will not pay the exorbitant fee charged, and are thus kept from visiting Campbellton and many tourists are kept away on this account.

Retaliatory measures are now being talked of and if the Quebec government will not listen to reason it is proposed to interview the New Brunswick government and endeavor to have a license fee charged on all non-resident fishermen, canoeists and guides fishing in waters on the New Brunswick side of the line.

It is also said that an effort will be made to impose a license fee on the vendors of country produce from the Quebec side.

If these courses are followed it will be a great hardship to the Quebec farmers, guides, etc., and such will no doubt make a great outcry to the injudicious done there, but Campbellton citizens are determined to fight the matter to a finish.

CHEAP POWER

Early last spring the announcement was made that the town of Campbellton would this summer make an examination of the different streams and rivers in the vicinity of Campbellton to ascertain their power generating capacity and if it was possible to get sufficient power from a stream to at a future date install a plant for the generation of electricity for light and power purposes.

So far no move has been made, and it has been made, and we think it is a mistake that the summer should be allowed to pass without some move being made in this matter. The season has been unusually favorable for making tests as the streams, on account of the scarcity of rain, are very low, and an accurate estimate could be made of the amount of power they would generate in a dry season.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13—Immigration figures for the month of June, and for the three months—April, May, and June—of the current fiscal year, have just been completed. The total immigration to Canada for the month of June was 26,869 as compared with 15,000 for the same month of last year, a 79 per cent. increase. Arrivals via ocean ports for the month was 11,661, as against 10,762 for the corresponding month of last year. An increase of 8 per cent.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has been a resident of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
