Charlie Is Gone

Charles McLaren Chipperfield Black, born April 5, 1899, at Minnedosa, Manitoba, died Saturday, November 8th at King's Memorial Hospital, Berwick, Nova Scotia. He was the third son of the late Charles C. Black, and Katherine Wake.

Charlie came to Middleton in February 1922. He was engaged in taxi work, dry business and the running of the cream route for the Middleton Creamery. Although doing his best in whatever he undertook, hard luck seemed inevitably to be his, and one thing followed another, until his appendicitis operation a few months ago. Recovering nicely from the operation, and was making splendid progress on the linotype in The Outlook. Then the fatal night (Thursday, November 6) came. He was out for a car ride, going east with three others; control of the car was lost and it turned completely over, injuring Charlie, and a Miss Welton. Charlie succumbed to his injuries early Saturday morning.

He lived a short twenty-five years; was a good boy, and his genial mood won for him many warm friends. That the young man was held in high esteem was shown by the beautiful floral offerings, and the many friends who gathered at the funeral service to pay their last respects to one whom they thought well of.

The funeral service held on Sunday, was conducted by the Rev. J. G. Hockin, and interment made in the Pine Grove Cemetery, Middleton. Deceased leaves to mourn his loss, a mother, five sisters and three brothers.

\$350,000 Fire at Windsor

Forty-three families homeless; over \$350,000 worth of property destroyed; four town blocks wiped out, and the entire town threatened with disaster worse than the calamity which temporarily wiped it out of existence in 1897—such were the results of a fire which broke out on the water front of Windsor at 1.15 o'clock Sunday morning, November 9, and ravaged through a large section of the town until subdued about daylight. Helpless in the face of the threatened disaster, a conflagration fanned by a 40 mile northwest gale, carrying sheets of flames from one end of the town to the other; citizens sent out appeals to Halifax, Dartmouth, Wolfville and Kentville. When the fire was under control, Windsorians were the first to acknowledge that had it not been for the assistance which came to them by special train and rushed by motor along every highway, leading to the town, history would have indeed repeated itself, and Windsor on Sunday night would have been acres of smoking ruins. The factor that saved Windsor was good roads, over which motor-fire apparatus could travel at a mile-a-minute clip.

Prayers of fervent thankfulness ascended to Providence from hundreds of citizens, gathered in every church of Windsor Sunday night, that on the Thanksgiving eve there had been spared to them their homes and household treasures, although menaced at times as beyond human power to save them.

Charles Black Succumbs To Injuries

MIDDLETON YOUNG MAN DIES OF INJURIES RECEIVED IN AUTO ACCIDENT.

A gloom has been cast over the entire community and heart-bound sympathy felt for Editor Black and family here, in the death of the former's brother, which occurred at the King's Memorial Hospital in Berwick last Saturday morning, from injuries that he had received in an auto accident on Thursday evening, when the car which he was riding in, in company with Miss Hattie Balsor and Miss Blanche Welton, of Auburn, turned turtle on the road, in front of the Waterville school and pinned Mr. Black beneath the car. The injured young man was rushed to the Berwick Hospital in a critical condition and the best of medical skill was obtained to try to restore him to consciousness, but he never fully recovered from the fracture to the base of his brain, and passed away on Saturday morning.

Mr. Black had left Middleton about 9 o'clock in the evening and in company with the above mentioned parties, were going along the Waterville road, when the car got beyond the control of Miss Balsor, who was driving, and striking a small ditch on the side of the road, turned over.

Miss Welton, who was in the rear seat, is in a serious condition at the Berwick Hospital, and at one time, little hopes were held out for her recovery.

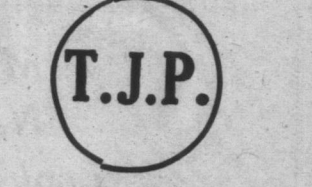
