

Milking on Either Side.

Here on our place we train the cov from calfhood to be approached and handled from the left side the same as from the right, and by the time she drops her first calf there is no "right side" for her-we milk her from just whichever side is handiest.

Let us consider the numerous advantages we gain by milking the cow from either side. First, a cow is not so apt to be a confirmed kicker if milked from either side. It is a fact that the mere touch of the hand, extended too far over on the left side, causes the cow to kick. If she were milked from either side at will, anything of this sort would not excite her. # NEW FRENCH ARMY HELMET.

Remakable Decrease in Deaths Since Its Adoption.

Sixty-four operations are necesseary in making one of the steel helmets that the French soldiers wear. The first step, says Pearson's Magazine, is stamping out disks from great sheets of steel. A machine that exerts a pressure of one hundred and fifty tons, and can cut out five thousand disks a day, does that work. Each disk is placed under a shaping machine, which presses the disk into the form of a helmet with a broad rim. Polishing and cutting machines remove all irregularities in the helmet, after which holes are punched in the crown—some for ventilation purposes, others for fastening on the regimental crest.

Each helmet is cleaned and dipped in a special mixture that makes it a dull, inconspicuous bluish gray. A kining and leather chin straps are then fastened on, and the helmet is complete. Since the French troops have begun to wear helmets the number of deaths from wounds in the head has decreased to a remarkable extent.



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
