Good Crowd at Wardsville in the In-terest of West Middlesex Reformers.

WARDSVILLE, May 12.—A public meeting was held in the Town Hall, Wardsville, on Friday evening in the interest of the Hon. G. W. Ross. Notwithstanding the unpropitious state of the weather the hall was comfortably filled. A number of ladies graced the meeting by their attendance. Mr. E. T. Dufton was called to the chair. The two speakers were Messrs. Geo. C. Gibbons and E. R. Cameron, of London.

Mr. Cameron opened by referring in a general way to the importance of the questions agitating the public in this election. The two subjects about which the most ado was being made were the French schools and the separate schools, and to these alone he devoted his attention. He gave a short historical account of the policy adopted in the treatment of French schools from 1851, when the question for the first time was brought prominently defore the Council of Public Instruction in this Province, down to the present time, and showed clearly that during the regime of Dr. Ryerson the council positively refused to interfere in any way with the wishes of the French people either in the matter of French teachers or French text-books, not even when the latter taught in the most open way dogmas peculiar to the Romish Church, that since 1883 a new departure has been made, and now owing to the energetic action of the Government English is taught in every public school in the Province. He further pointed out that the two political parties were agreed with regard to the object to be kept in view, namely, the unification of the people; but they differed widely as to the means to be adopted to obtain that end. While Mr. Meredith and his party were advocates of coercion and violence the Government policyl was to treat the French as fellow citizens, not as aliens; they preferred to convince them by gentle and patient treat.



TREATMENT OF INEBRIATES. FIFTY-ONE LIVES LOST. Disastrous Wreck on the Reefs in the New Hebrides.

New Hebrides.

San Francisco, Cal., May 12.—News was received last night by the steamer Zealandia that in a great storm on March 4 the schooner Eliza Mary was driven on the reefs at Mallico in the New Hebrides. It was impossible to see anything through the blinding rain till just before the ship struck. There were on board a crew of 18, 2 passengers, 44 recruits and 15 returning laborers, making a total of 79. The first boat which was lowered was manned by four white men and several of the black crew. The boat was dashed to pieces while going on shore and the four white men were drowned. Those who remained on board the ship were saved.

Several of the recruits swam for the shore, and were either drowned or killed after landing. One boy had to fight his way from the shore to the mission is tation, distant ten miles. He, with his companions, went with some natives to a village near the coast. They were given food, but while eating it the savages set upon them and began tomahawking the castsaways. The boy ran and escaped. In all four white men and 47 blacks were lost.

A Well-Known Resident's Doath.

One of the largest congregations seen at St. Peter's Cathedral in a long time was that of Sunday morning at high mass, when Archbishop Walsh, of Toronto, preached for the first time since his removal from this city to the Diocese of Toronto. The Archbishop took as the basis of his remarks part of the discourse delivered by Jesus to his disciples prior to his crucifixion on the comforts which they were to enjoy when he would be taken from them and the Holy Ghost would descend from the Father. "Jesus, in telling his disciples of the comforts that would come to them," said the speaker, "spoke the grandest truth in the speaker, "spoke the grandest truth in the Bible, a truth which was to be a comfort in Bible, a truth which was to be a comfort in life and a stay in death, and though the path would be thorny and the way dreary, still they had Christ's blessed promise, 'It is expedient that I should go away, but I will send the comforter, and he will abide with you forever.' Did they receive the Holy Ghost.' They did. While the apostles were in an upper room in Jerusalem, we read, the Holy Spirit descended upon them, and on the church and in the hearts of God's children it has abided ever since." The preacher raferred to the mission of the church and the work being done by it, and exhorted his hearers as members of the true church on earth to continue to live after the life of the Holy Ghost—lives of purity and with charity to all men.
