## TIMBER AND LANDS.

Motion in Favor of a Fair

System Voted Down.

Continuance of the Rykertian Policy Indorsed by a Majority of Nineteen.

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—In the House to-day Mr. Costigan introduced a bill to amend the Petroleum Inspection Act. He explained that it was to give the Governor-General in Council power to exempt from inspection wholly or in part petroleum oils which are not of sufficient quality for illuminating numbers. purposes.

Detroit, Aug. 5.—Yesterday was a day never to be forgotten in this city. Miles on miles of the heroes who saved the Union formed a column which took six hours to pass the reviewing stand. It was the finest parade that the Grand Army ever had, and fully 200,000 spectators enjoyed the grand spectacle. While there were many maimed and feeble men who marched in yesterday's parade, men whose locks have been silvered by the frosts of time, or whose bodies have been maimed by miniballs and bayonet thrusts, and whose limbs have been shattered by exploding shells. Yet one who carefully scanned their ranks could not but be convinced that three-fourths of them are still in warlike trim, fit to respond to another call to arms, should one be now sent forth.

THE MILLERS' MEETING.

Varieties of Wheat Recommended for

Cultivation.

Toronto, Aug. 5.—The Dominion Millers' Association met here yesterday. There was a large attendance. Vice-President W. H. Heldrum, of Peterboro, presided in the absence of President J. C. Hay, of Listowel. Secretary David Plewes presented the annual report, which estimated the wheat crop for the Dominion at 55,160,000 bushels, of which Ontario is to contribute the annual report, which estimated the wheat crop for the Dominion at 55,160,000 bushels, of which Ontario is to contribute 29,460,000; Manitoba, 20,000,000, and the Northwest Provinces 5,000,000. This would allow 22,180,000 for export. The election of officers resulted as follows: Thomas Goldie, Guelph, president; Peplow, Peterboro, vice-president; David. Plewes, Brantford, secretary; Thomas Galbraith, Torento, treasurer, all being elected by acclamation. The report of Treasurer Galbraith showed receipts during the year of \$1,214, and expenditures of \$1,176. The new president, Thomas Goldie, delivered an address on the subject of selling flour on time and giving up bills of lading without payments of drafts, a business which he strongly objected to. "The 'Canadian Velvet Chaff' is also a fine wheat in color with apparently good strength. But your committee has no data on which to form an opinion regarding its milling qualities, as it has been but lately introduced.

"'Garfield,' which has been grown largely on the Paris plains, is said to yield well, and is well suited to that district. It is a white wheat, good in color, but deficient in strength.

"'Ramsay' is a bearded wheat introduced in the Brantford district by the local

association, and so far has proved a suchead, and from appearance will make a good milling wheat and a desirable ad-dition to the list of fall wheat.

SCANDAL DEVELOPMENTS, THE PREACHERS, AND ENGLISH PRECEDENT.

The Hamilton Herald, which supported the Conservative leaders at the last general election, reaches the conclusion, from the evidence adduced, that if Sir Hector Lan. Plewes, of the Millers' Association, will not gevin is not a knave he is a fool, and his blunders are worse than crimes. In the same paper we find this declaration :

"An Ottawa clergyman has been preaching on the scandals which affect the Government at Ottawa. As long as the Government has a majority of 26 behing it a few sermons will not worry it much.

In the division this morning, the Gov erament majority was only 22, but the suggestive remark of our contemporary is worthy of consideration. To the writer minent citizen the other day said: When the ADVERTISER calls upon the preachers to aid in educating their hearers to take a strong stand in favor of national morality it is barking up the wrong tree. There is no morality in Canada—from the parsons down." We dissent from this sweeping assertion, as unjust and unwarranted. But at the same time we would not be doing our duty as interpreters of public feeling if we did not state that there is a widespread impression abroad that the religious leaders—the conservators of public morals-take too little interest in these matters. The only object been raised to the clergy taking a strong stand in regard to the rascalities laid bare at Ottawa, and which undoubtedly affect men high in authority, who have either wilfully or by criminal neglect betrayed their trust, lies in the excuse that to do so would render them liable to the charge of partisanship. "We would be talking politics!" exclaim these pastors of the flock. Surely the preservation of the national honor in not party politics. Surely no conscientious citizen can object to his spiritual adviser taking the ground that rascality in high places-that the robbery of the people by those intrusted with the management of their affairs—must be condoned, glossed over, or never referred r mind, should not act as a deterrent to the fearless exponent of the gospel message. He can have no lot or common standing ground with men who are dishonest, whether they are in Parliament or out of tt, and he can have no fear to speak out strongly against wrongdoing, wherever found, and with all the more vigor if the rascality is shown to exist among or to be condoned by the representatives of the

In the present crisis Canadian preachers may well follow the example set them by the ministers of the gospel in Great Britain, who in matters of morals never fail to make their influence felt when princes, governments or their adherents lapse from the path of rectitude. The fearless denunciation of the preachers more than anything else drove Sir Charles Dilke into political exile for more than ten years; the attitude of the religious bodies of all denominations was enough in itself, to render Parnell's fall from virtue an effectual bar to his future leadership of the Irish people. And so it has been even in matters affecting the Royal Family. If the Prince of Wales continues to gamble, to live as if life were to be frittered away in mere frivolity, and thus imperils his succession to the throne, It will not be because of the silent indorsa-tion of his conduct by the clergymen of the

cheating in gambling, by those who occupy high positions in society, and from whom, therefore, a high example of virtue should proceed. But it is most concerned that his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales should have been so prominently and intimately involved in these disreputable proceedings. The conference feels that such encouragement of vice and immorality by one from whom the nation has a right to expect impulse and encouragement to its higher life, is fraught with greater danger to its future well-being. It earnestly hopes that all such practices by one who aspires to be the king of a Christian people will herceforth cease. The Conference rejoices to observe, in the discussion arising out of these proceedings, that the moral sense of the country demands that those who occupy positions of trust and authority should be men whose character and conduct entitle them to public confidence."

This strong protest was against the gambling habits of the Prince of Wales nly. How much stronger would it have been if members of the Government had been its subject, and the crime laid to their charge malversation, corruption and robbery of the public treasury for the benefit of Ministers, contractors and unfaithful civil servants? What would such a body have said if it had been compelled to raise its protest against a Minister who with one hand has accepted large sums of money and other testimonials from contractors and with the other has awarded these contractors large sums in extras, notwithstanding that such pay-ments were reported against by responsible expert engineers? What would have been said of a Minister who finds employment in his department for a favorite woman, and permits her to draw large sums of money which she has never earned? What would it say of the Minister who takes subordinate public servants away from the duties for which they are paid, and employs them for his own profit? What would it say of an English Minister who would get up in his place and call these and kindred peculations, all proved in evidence, "mere trifles?"

The stand that British preachers have taken in regard to the moral lapses of their public men supplies an answer to these queries, which should have a tendency to offuence Canadian brethren of the cloth to take full advantage of their privilege to be in reality as well as in name conservators of the morals of the people, ready at all times to frown upon wrong-doing whereso-



RRITISH PARLIAMENT PROROGUED.

To Meet Again in October—Summary of the Queen's Speech.

London, Aug. 6.—Parliament was prorogued yesterday to Oct. 24. The Queen's speech, closing the session, after alluding to the amicable relations existing between Great Britain and the other powers, made a brief reference to the treatles that had been concluded with Portugal and Italy, regarding territory in Africa, and said:

"Thave made proposals to the President of the United States, looking to the submission to arbitration of the differences between Great Britain and the United States, in regard to the seal fisheries in gening Sea. The negotiations are far advanced, but have not yet been concluded."

The French Chambers have not yet approved the agreement between myself and the French Republic with reference to the arbitration of certain differences which have arisen concerning Newfoundland, which agreement was signed during the present year. I am glad that you have been able to devote a considerable sum of money to the mitigation of the burden which the law of compulsory education has imposed upon the poorer portion of my people. The various measures which you have adopted in recent years to secure the observance of the law in Ireland, and to improve the general condition of that country, have resulted in a marked abatement of agrarian offenses and in a considerable advance in prosperity. The steps taken to cope with the distress threatened in Ireland have been effectual in averting a famine. You have also passed a beneficient measure, dealing permanently with the congested districts of Ireland, which, it is hoped, will, by fostering agriculture and stimulating the fishery industry, contribute largely to the prevention of similar dangers in the future. The measures which you have passed for the improvement of laws with respect to factories, workshops and savings banks, and for the preservation of the public health will, I am convinced, conduce to the comfort and well-being of my people.


