



### **LONDON SURE** OF BALKAN WAR

### Various Repotrs Indicate That a Great Struggle Is Imminent.

London, Friday, Nov. 27 .- This has been a day of uneasiness and even alarm. Various reports, all seeming to harmonize with each other, created a belief that the Balkan trouble had come to a head and that war was very near. The general interpretation of the withdrawal of Marquis Pallavicinni, the Rustrian ambassador at Constantinople, as a disguised ultimatum to Turkey, Russia's unfavorable reply to the Austrian note concerning a conference, the reported definite conclusion of an alliance between Turkey, Montenegro and Servia, the alleged clash of an Austrian column with a Servian guerilla band, the rumored increase of troops in Bosnia, and a fresh concentration at Semlin, opposite Belgrade, where it was asserted a plot to murder an Austrian minister had been discovered, were the principal causes of the excitement. These, added to the universal exasperation caused by the Purkish boycott, causes declines at the bourses of Vienna and Budapest, which were partly checked by a hasty official announcement denying some of the rumors, especially the fight between

Austrians and Servians. The position was in no wise bettered when it was learned that the Government had confiscated four Vienna newspapers for reporting the movements of troops, particularly at Sem-

#### THE CATTLE DISEASE OUTBREAK The Dominion Government has done

well in promptly declaring a quarantine against all cattle and cattle products and horses from Pennsylvania, quence of the appearance of the foot and mouth disease in those states. The authorities at Washington are working in accord with the Canadian department of agriculture, having also established quarantines against the same states. This means that cattle cannot be driven across the borders of these states in either direction. Cattle in cars from points where normal conditions exist may be brought in, but they must not be unloaded except at certain pens specially disinfected and designated by the federal authorities.

The British Government is also alive to the gravity of the situation, and has decreed that no cattle shall be imported from Pennsylvania and New York until further notice. As several lines of steamships sailing from Philadelphia carry cattle in considerable numbers, the shipping interests of that port will

If the disease is not promptly stamped out, there is danger of the ers, and Conservatives are the party of has been, too, sometimes. infection spreading over a wide territory. There is but one way to handle it. The moment it is discovered on a farm the quarantine of that farm must be absolute so far as its live stock is concerned. Cattle suffering from the disease, which attacks the mouth and the hoofs, should be killed at once, and there should be thorough disinfection. This will entail hardship upon the farmer, but he will do well to submit to the letter to the rules and regulations laid down for his guidance by the authorities. He should also observe the utmost caution, for the prompter he is in noting any suspicious circumstance or symptom and in segregating the possible victim, the greater the safeguards he will throw about himself. With proper precautions the disease may be confined to localities and kept from becoming anything like general.

The matter is one of extreme importance to the Dominion. At considerable cost to the Government and the breeders, the health of Canadian herds has for years been vigilantly guarded and with success. There is reason to hope that the agricultural department will prevent an invasion of disease in the present emergency.







### LOCAL LABOR MEN HELD A MEETING

To Discover Some Plan by Which Social Reformers Here May Be United.

A very interesting discussion took place last evening at the headquarters of the Independent Labor Party when the question, "On What Grounds Can Social Reformers Unite?" was discussed. There was a large representation of the members of the party present, and many visitors.

Mr. Jos. T. Marks, in explaining the objects of the meeting, declared that it was held for the purpose of discovering whether there was not some basis on which the social reformers could unite. He pointed out that after the election of 1907, little was done towards organizing the party and keeping its propaganda before the people. The fight was not renewed until about two weeks before the last election, and as a result of the lack of organization and enthusiasm, their candidate was badly defeated. It was said that there were a number of social organizations working against the Labor party. Success could only come when all social parties united and fought for the same end.

To Workingmen.

It was also pointed out by Mr. Marks that the majority of voters in London were workingmen, but they were so divided that combined action for the betterment of their condition seemed almost impossible. He thought the platform of the Labor party should be considered by all workingmen and discussed. There should be in it some things upon which they could unite and form a strong Labor party. He favored the initative and referendum, which meant the reference of every important question back to the people. It was the keystone of the Labor party's platform, and one upon which all could unite.

Organization Urged.

Mr. Marks also advocated organizing for the next election campaign. The time to prepare for an election was not a few days before voting but many months, in fact, years before. A campaign of education would prove highly beneficial, he considered. Rev. J. G. Inkster, pastor of the

First Presbyterian Church, was present and spoke briefly. He voiced his sympathy with the workingmen, and thought they were working along the right lines. He reviewed the Labor movement in the old land, and declared that the presence of Labor members in the House of Commons had worked well.
