Mukden, June 6.—Troops of the governor of Mukden have reached Shanhaikwan, on the railway 150 miles northeast of Tien-Tsin. Forces from Anhui, Shantung and Huchowfu are encamped at Machang, in the vicinity of Tien-Tsin. The military governors declare they will not support the restoration of the monarchy.

The leaders are willing to mediate on the terms of a dissolution of the Parliament of the republic, but with the retention of the president.


