Washington, D. C., Feb. 27 .- The decree under which the group of packing houses operate in the United States known as the "big five" are forever enjoined from doing any other line of business than handling meat and meat produce was filed today in the District of Columbia supreme court. It was submitted by Attorney-General

"All their interest in market news-It was submitted by Attorney-General Palmer, who said it "removes the menace of control of unrelated industries by the 'big five,' and confines their activities in future to the business of distributing meat and its by-products."

The decree involves reorganization of an industry with assets of more than \$1,000,000,000 and affects 87 corporations and 49 individuals. Attorney-General Palmer, in a statement commenting on the effect of the decree, said: "Under the decree entered today the chief packing companies, their subsidiaries and principal stockholders are compelled to sell preferably to live stock producers and the public:

"They are barred forever from dealing in 'unrelated lines' of groceries and products,

"Moreover, the decree provides that jurisdiction is perpetually retained by the court for the purpose of taking such further action or relief as may be necessary in the circumstances to carry out or enforce the decree."

Last year the maximum wage was 55 cents an hour. The men asked 44 cents, and went on strike to obtain that amount. The company claimed it could not meet the demand unless higher fares were allowed. The city council passed a bylaw increasing the fares, and the men were given the higher wage.

Wrong, professor of history in the University of Toronto, in which Canada's position in regard to the League of Nations is clearly set forth and forceful argument is presented in support of the contention that the Dominion cannot yield her place to satisfy any demands of the United States Senate. Senate.

Professor Wrong, after stating that public opinion in Canada is keenly aroused in respect to the objections at Washington to Canada's vote as a separate nation in the League of Nations, remarks that the world at large has but slight grasp of the relations of Canada with Great Britain.

The letter reviews the political growth of the Dominion toward a full national life, which culminated in the experience of the great war and the latest step toward the organization of a Canadian diplomatic system.

"When this is achieved," says the professor, "the representatives of Canada will negotiate directly at foreign capitals with foreign governments and Canada's national life complete, too, as respects other nations."

SUICIDES FOLLOWING ATTACK OF INFLUENZA

Montreal Groceryman Took! Life While Mentally Deranged.

Noticeable improvement of the influenza situation was reported by Dr. W. S. Downham, medical officer of health, today. He thinks this is general throughout all the district affected by the epidemic. Ban on the schools and churches of Westminster is being removed next week, and other places where the epidemic was experienced report that the disease is dying out.

A special meeting of the board of health will be held Tuesday. This is for the purpose of considering estimates and is not called for further measures in regard to the influenza situation. Montreal, Feb. 27 .- An attack of influenza was shown to have been the cause of the death of Thomas Dugal, aged 29 years, whose body was found hanging from a beam in the barn. COMMISSION PROPOSED TO STUDY FORMATION OF SOVIET REPUBLIC

Blackburn, England, Feb. 27.—Returning from an investigation of the possibilities of Mesopotamia and the Sudan, made on behalf of the British Cotton Growing Association, Fred Hodkinson says that when those countries are opened up by canals and railways the growing of cotton for commerce under a system of irrigation offers excellent prospects. He expressed the belief that America would use all the cotton she grows, and therefore it was urgent that Great Britain should develop cotton-growing within the Empire.

There are 118 in all, and of that number 69 of the applicants are from Toronto. In fact, with the exception of ten from Montreal and other parts of Quebec, the applications are entirely confined to Ontario One of the reasons for this is the fact that the western provinces now have their own divorce courts. In the matter of sex, the applicants are pretty well divided.

Geneva, Feb. 27.—The embalmed heart of Thaddeus Kosciuszko, the Polish patriot, which has reposed in a bronze urn in the little chapel of Chateau Rapperswill, near Zurich, since 1887, is to be returned to Polish is to be returned to Poland. It will be kept at Warsaw.

When Kosciuszko died at Zugwill in the Swiss canton of Solo-thurn, in 1817, his heart was re-moved and retained there, while the patriot's body was taken to Cracow for burial. The heart remained at Zugwil until 1887, when it was taken to Rapperswil, where it was given a special place of honor in the Polish museum. It has been the shrine of countless Polish pilgrims since that time

FRENCH RAILWAY STRIKE SPREADS: PREMIER URGES ARBITRATION

French Cabinet Considering Bill To Requisition Motor Cars.

LEADERS ARE DISMISSED

Executive of Union Issues Appeals To Men To Stick To Posts.

Paris, Feb. 27.-Railroad men at the eastern station in this city ceased work at 7 o'clock this morning, and the strike situation became worse at the northern station. Railway service to suburban points was still further diminished with the exception of the line on the right bank of the Seine to Versailles. Railroad workers at Nice have struck, according to reports. Decision was reached by the French cabinet this morning that the minister of public works would ask the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon to discuss a bill authorizing the requisition of automobiles if railroad traffic is interrupted by the strike.

Governmental intervention in disclaplinary measures taken by the Paris Lyons and Mediterranean Railway Company toward its employees is op-posed by Premier Millerand, who ar-rived here yesterday and at once plung. ed into consideration of the strike situa

Urges Arbitration. Delegates of railway workmen's unions conferred with the premier yesterday afternoon relative to some action which would bring about a reconsideration of the dismissal of a workman named Campanaud, which caused the big walkout, but the best Premier Millerand could do was to advise the men to submit their case to arbitration.

In the meantime the railway com-pany has dismissed 250 strike leaders in addition to Companaud. any has dismissed an addition to Companaud.

Border City Has Not the Attraction of Yester Year, in the Opinion of Mrs. Ida Harrison-Better Jobs At Home.

Detroit and the border cities no longer have the same attraction for young girls between the ages of 15 and 18 years, as they have in the past, according to Mrs. Ida Harrison of the W. C. T. U., who constantly comes in contact with young girls of the city who are often of the roving nature and "want to see life." 

Opposed To Bolshevism and. All Other Extreme Movements.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: Some few days ago a paragraph appeared in your paper headed "J. F. Thomson a Red."

As this term has many meanings, and has evidently disturbed some of my friends, may I be permitted, in order to clear the matter up, to offer Dr. Hill, Formerly of London, order to clear the matter up, to offer a word or two of explanation?

First let me say I have no sympathy with "Bolshevism," the "One Big Union," or any of the extreme schools of thought. As a matter of fact, I consider these things more dangerous to the labor party than its most bitter opponents, and as such I have taken every concertuits. cer in Minneapolis, and formerly health opponents, and as such I have taken every opportunity to say so. Sane, evolutionary socialism I believe to be the only solution for the ills from which the common people suffer, but I am against other than constitutional means to bring these principles into being. As a matter of fact, the leaders of the British labor movement, such as Clynes, Hodge, Henderson, Smillie, and the movement generally, are committed to this method of solution for the general labor unrest so prevalent everywhere.

Bolshevism has been repudiated by both sections of the labor movement, i.e., by the trades union and political parties, by the first at the Paris conference and by the second taken. the plan or if the results are disap-

the plan or if the results are disappointing we can go back to the old method next spring. The argument is this: The hands are easily soiled with all sorts of bacteria from all sorts of sources. "The surgeons have demonstrated the readiness with which the hands pick up bacteria. For a surgeon with hands scrubbed up for an operation to shake hands with anyone would be an unpardonable sin. Were he to do so he would be quite apt to infect the next patient operated, on.

"Nurses in contagious disease hospitals know that frequent washing of the hands is a fundamental necessity. Any nurse who fails to wash her hands after touching a patient sick with contagion may infect the next patient she touches. Many cross-infections are known to have originated in that way. Of course, the danger from casual handshaking is not great enough to be in the same class with these. But there is some danger, and it may not be inconsiderable.

"Hill suggests that the military salute be substituted for handshaking. It is safe, it gives us an attractive, not displeasing, form of salutation."

AMENDMENT WILL BE ASKED FOR B. N. A. ACT

To Be Asked Involves Status of Parliament.

Ottawa, Feb. 27. - (By Canadian Press) .-- An important amendment to the British North America Act, involving the status of the Dominion Parliament, will be laid before the House of Commons in a few days. It asks that the British North America act be so amended that "any enactment of the Parliament of Canada, otherwise than within the legislative authority of the Parliament of Canada, shall so operate extra-territorially to the same extent as if enacted by the Parliament of the United Kinvdom."

At the present time, there is doubt whether a Canadian, outside of Canada, can be punished for breach of a Canadian law, a particular case being that of aviation. If an offence against the regulations were committed while an airmen was not over Canadian territory, there is doubt if he could be punished.





LIBERALISM'S HOUR.

An excellent pamphlet, No. 1 of a series, has been put forth by the National Liberal Committee at Ottawa. It is entitled "A Message of Liberalism, Including the Resolutions Adopted at the National Liberal Convention of August, 1919." Included also is a trenchant article on "The Citizen's Part in Government" by Mr. John Lewis. As must always be expected from Mr. Lewis' pen, this article is thoughtful, energetic,

stimulating, fair and good-tempered. He indicates the opportunity now presenting itself to Canadian Liberalism. People are thinking for themselves as never before. They are disgusted with professional politics and partyism. They will have nothing to do with the old machinery and its oily tricks. How has true Liberalism already met this situation? Last August a vast convention of Canadian men and women doing their own thinking assembled in Ottawa and drew up a platform for the better government of Canada. This convention was angrify denounced by the machine Conservative press as "unauthorized," "irregular," even indecent. It was, however, its spontaneous, democratic, self-governing character that made it traiy Liberal. It elected the Liberal leader, and its platform is undeniably Liberal, calcuisted to secure a government in Canada by the people and for the people.

The outery against this popular convention rather recalls the rage of the Teutons against "Ritchener's mob." The professional militarist The machine politician, hates the Liberal, the man who does as he judges fit, not simply does as he is told. Every Canadian in this hour who has resolved to be bound by no prejudices, but to steer his course by principle and the nation's needs is a Liberal and should ponder the resolutions adopted by the convention of Angust, 1919. No other political convention, either machine-made or self-made, has yet been heard of. Every patriotic Canadian should be proud of that convention and consider the call sent forth by Mr. Lewis for independent thinking and helpful suggestions. "Try to imagine that we are all present at a great convention. We do not know from what city, village or township in Canada, from what man or women may emanate some idea that will enrich Liberalism and promote the welfare of Canada and its people. Where democracy has failed, or failed in part, it has been for lack of this general interest in public affairs. The people cannot rule unless the people think." The whole nation should be a convention, of which the convention of last August was a specially articulate committee.

A good many who have actiowed his career will probably remark that this confession of Mr. Rogers is old news. and the more unkind ones may add that it was characteristic deception. That it was a useful system Mr. Rogers' political triumphs attest, but while it may be good politics, of a kind, it is bad ethics. This lack of frankness and straightforwardness has too often been the method adopted by politicians in Canada to secure and retain power and influence. It is immoral and debasing and when exposed, as sooner or later it always is, has the effect of bringing the contrel and administration of public affairs into disrepute. It is this that has made the average elector always take the well-known pre-election promise as mere wind, always to season the candidate's engagements with a heavy dose of

What this country and every other country needs today is men who aspire to public office for purposes beneficial to the public, not from selfish motives. Then there will be no necessity for suppression and secrecy, and we will have a healthier political atmosphere. Frankness should help, not retard, those who have political aspirations.

THE PLANET MARS.

The recent discussion as to whether the mysterious wireless messages which have lately been received, are from the planet Mars or not, is drawing attention from every side. The lat-New England States. No one denies that to

establish communication with Mars is a stu pendous task, but there are many eminent thinkers who believe it possible.

For many years astronomers have been seeking for information concerning the planets of our solar system. Considerable headway has been made in the study of Mars. Mars, when seen by the naked eye, is in color a reddish ochre and its brilliancy varies.

All the planets move around the sun in the same direction as the earth. Their orbits are all eccentric to some degree, the eccentricity of Mars being one-eleventh. Mars' synodic period, or the time between two conjunctions of Mars and Earth, is seven hundred and eighty days, and its sidereal period, or the length of time it takes to revolve around the sun, is six hundred and eighty-seven days.

Mars is often supposed to be the planet nearest the earth, but Venus is nearer. Owing to the eccentricity of the orbit of Mars, it is during a favorable opposition within thirty-five million miles of us. When farthest from Earth Mars is more than seven times that distance

Mars is one of the smaller planets. Its diameter is approximately four thousand two hundred miles. Its mass is much smaller than that of Earth, and it is one-quarter less dense. The length of a day in Mars is twenty-four hours, thirty-seven minutes. Mars has two satellites, which were discovered by Hall in 1877. They are visible only through large telescopes. This planet undoubtedly possesses a

Huygens, in 1659, made the first surface sketch of Mars and in 1840 Beer and Maedler drew the first chart of the planet. Land appears to predominate over water. From photographs which have been taken, the surface seems to be comparatively flat. In 1666, Cassini discovered polar caps and a century later, Sir William Herschel made out variations in the When the polar can begin to melt strange markings or lines begin to appear on the surface of the planet. These canals as they are 1877. At intersections of the canals, oases appear. To many these canals and oases have an appearance of artificiality. Acceptance of this naturally means that Mars is or has been inhabited by intelligent beings, but nothing definite is known. It is only by continued study and observation that we on the earth can hope to solve the question of life on another planet.

preservation, characterizes the epochs of life." TOLERATING THE THIRD DEGREE.

[New York Globe.] Last fall a truck driver walked into a police station and announced that certain goods had been stolen from his truck. He was himself taken into custody, accused of having stolen the goods, and given the third degree in its most brutal form. But no evidence or confession was forthcoming, and he was set free, whereupon he accused Detective Thomas J. Rowan of beating him with a rope in the back room of the station house in an attempt to elicit information. Detective Rowan was found "The court cannot condemn too strongly rough methods by the police," said Justice Murphy, "and the time has come when such methods no longer will be tolerated." However, because of his previous good record, and because the serving of a sentence on the charge of assault would probably result in his dismissal, the judge thought best to heed his plea for leniency.

It is such incidents as these that destroy the city's faith in its police force and in the administration of justice. Doubtless most instances in the use of the third degree never come to light, and this obvious opportunity for rebuking an officer guilty of such conduct is passed by as if he had done little or nothing out of the way. There is no place in a domocracy for the torture chamber either to punish or to get at the evidence. Wherever the ancient tradition of cruelty to suspects and prisoners shows its head it should be dealt with ruthlessly. Looking on at this mild treatment of so great an evil, there is no escaping the suspicion that inquisitory methods are usual, winked at, and perhaps encouraged. There was only one proper course of conduct for the authorities in an affair such as this of Mr. Rowan. He should have been sentenced; and, est suggestion, that of signalling from Earth to in any event, he should be dropped from the force. being caught. And first offenders among civilians are not so considerately treated.

President Wilson "knows that he is now quite up to his fighting weight. As to his mental vigor, it is simply prodigious. 





The joint memorandum of December 9 subscribed to by France, Great Britain and the United States provides in substance the following: Istria was to have a frontier, which, while "widely overstepping" the recognized ethnical line between Italy and Jugóslavia, would have given Italy more than 300,000 Jugo-Slavs, and further extended eastward to give Italy terriatory on the region of Albania, also in-

"Economic consideration being equally excluded there remains nothing but a desite for further territory. The territories coveted are admittedly inhabited by the Jugo-Slavs. They contain practically no Italian elements."

Rundle and Professor C. R. Sissons. Following the conference a letter which Hon. Mr. Grant had sent to Vincent Massey, stating that "it did not seem to him that an inquiry by the Massey Foundation should be sanctioned by the Government," was made public; also a statement from the premier as to the Government's position on the question.

Letter to Massey.

Hon. Mr. Grant's letter to Mr. Massey pointed out that the schools of Ontario were supported by people of different views and religious opinions, and stated that the Government could not afford to run the risk of being charged with evading its obligations by committing itseif to an independent organization, as proposed by the Massey Foundation, however well-meaning and public-spirited the organization might be. "A large part of the actual information which a survey would secure is already available for my coll-agues and myself, and more is being sought." Mr. Grant wrote, and added: "In a short time I expect to have adequate knowledge of all phases of the educational system."





"It becomes more and more apparent that it was a mighty good thing that a few of us took the initiative a few months ago and demanded that the Labor group should convene separately, and that all our measures should be based on the collective judgment of those elected to represent the people, A perusal of the Labor legislation to be introduced will show conclusively that introduced will show conclusively that we are now getting down to a basis where results may be expected, and any little abuse to which I was subjected is more than compensated for in

any little abuse to which I was subjected is more than compensated for in the fact that our program is now practically ready for the opening of the Legislature. We have had three conferences, and it is results that count.

Absolutely Ridiculous.

"It would be absolutely ridiculous to ask the municipalities to pay any part of the expenses for any of our proposed legislation. The municipalities already have more than they can handle, when it is remembered that the only means of raising revenue is by a tax on the property of the people, and most of this is the property of the workers. Surely the province of Ontario, with its great natural resources and its many strong and profitable financial institutions can find ways and means of raising all the revenue needed for a few measures of humanitarian legislation.

Agrees With Drury.

"I am not often accused of agreeing with Premier Drury, but we might as well realize now that he is absolutely right in his gauge of the financial situation. Nationally and internationally, we are at the mercy of certain financial conditions which we will not be able to overcome for a year or two at least; after that, there is no reason why we should not be optimistic as to our future. Just for the present, however, everybody should help to put on the brakes."
