New Tariffs Are Practically Same As Pre-War

MONTREAL, Aug. 12.—Freight rates on livestock will be reduced practically to pre-war levels when the new tariffs of the Canadian Pacific Railway go into effect on Monday next, it was stated by the transportation bureau of the board of trade today. Last January five per cent was cut off the 40 per cent increase granted a year ago and the new rates will wipe out the other 35 per cent, it was said. It was also stated that the reduction was part of the general policy of the railways to reduce freight rates wherever possible and it is anticipated that before long there will be similar reductions in other products. It was pointed out that these reductions will be a great help to farmers shipping stock into Montreal, and that it might have some effect in slightly lowering market prices.

The Soviet Government has reported that there are 27,000 cases of cholera, and this may be regarded as a conservative estimate of the number of victims of the dreadful malady. The country's position is one of the utmost danger, the partial failure of the crops in the middle and lower basins of the Volga River being the immediate cause of the wave of disaster that now threatens to engulf this unhappy land, and to send its poisoned spindrift far beyond.

Lord Anthony McDonnell, who has had vast experience of plague and famine conditions in India, declared that no government in the world was capable of coping with the calamity that was threatening Eastern Europe, and expressed the opinion that the most important provision was to secure a pure water supply. There is no doubt that pure water is one of the first essentials in safeguarding health, and we in this country have reason to be thankful for the abundant supply which is always available; but other measures must be taken besides insuring that sound all right to the people of Austria, 1837. there is plenty of good water, if the spread of the disease is to be prevented, and it is the form which these measures shall take which is agitating the minds of the governments of Europe.

#### CENTRALIZED FINANCIAL CONTROL.

In an open letter issued by the Citizens' Research Institute of Canada, through its local advisory committee, the institute once again points out the necessity for centralized financial control, in order that knowledge as to how his money has been spent during the past year, the present financial condition, an election of a new council takes place. Firstly, through a conference between heads of departments and commissioner of finance. Secondly, through prompt preparation and timely presentation, the budget for the coming year becomes a live issue in the election of representatives for the coming year, and the citizens are fully informed of the financial program ahead.

Thirdly, the incoming council is thus able to pass the budget and strike the tax rate early in its administration, so that the treasury department can commence collection of taxes two or three months earlier than heretofore, this, of course, resulting in a large interest saving to the citizens.

Downturns in the price of wheat took place chiefly during the last hour of trading, the market earlier having been steadied by commission house demand based to a large extent on the assumption that sooner or later export business would develop in sufficient volume to absorb all the wheat surplus in this country and Canada. Confidence in this view, however, received an unexpected jolt from a statement by the French minister of agriculture putting the yield of wheat this season in France at 40,000,000 bushels above current trade figures and asserting that foreign purchases had exceeded the country's requirements by 28,000,000 bushels. The Canadian crop was officially estimated at 288,000,000 bushels as against 263,000,000 bushels harvested last year. Late reports from New York that England had bought 800,000 bushels failed to rally the market and so, too, did announcement that exporters had taken 300,000 bushels here.






