Fire, which might have resulted disastrously to the Nurses' Home at Victoria Hospital swept the upper part of the building shortly after 10 o'clock this morning, and was only prevented from gaining serious headway by the quick action of the fire department and the manner in which internes at the hospital kept the blaze in check until firemen arrived. Considerable damage was done

Considerable damage was done through water and smoke. The loss was estimated by Fire Chief John Aitken to be about \$5,000.

Fifteen nurses, who had done night duty at the hospital, were sleeping in the third story of the building when the fire broke out. All of them escaped to the ground floor in their picts atting after passing the section.

Patients at Victoria Hospital were kept ignorant of the fire, the firemen kept ignorant orders to go about

their work as noiselessly as possible. The greater part of the damage was caused through water which saturated the nurses' clothing in each room on the third floor.

### When Premiers Write.

If Premier Ramsay MacDonald should have nothing else to his credit, he has made a big score by his plain writing to Premier Poincare, which drew from the French

premier an equally candid answer There was nothing of the secret diplomacy type about MacDonald's letter. It was just such a message as one man might write to another in setting forth all the facts of any case where an adjustment was desired rather than a prolonged discussion.

The British premier pointed out that there were many of his countrymen who viewed with disapproval the French occupation of the Ruhr, by which "France is endeavoring to create a situation which gains for it what it failed to get during the allied peace negotiations. . . . That policy can only perpetuate uncertainty and dangers of a condition, not of peace, but of war, and that in the end it will destroy whatever temporary security France may gain."

Ramsay MacDonald also reviews the manner in which United States participated in and influenced the closing of the terms that ended the var and refers with equal candor to their unqualified abandonment of the field immediately after.






