Ottawa, Oct. 18 .- Hon. A. G. Blair, chairman of the railway commission, has resigned. Today he notified Sir Wilfrid Laurier by wire of the step signation by letter to the Governor-in-Council. At the close of this afteroon's session of the commission, Mr. Blair took his colleagues and the public into his confidence. He made the announcement that he had resigned, and it came as a complete surprise to everybody.
