T. S. Cole swore to receiving a copy of The Daily Ontario, containing the alleged libel.

John R. Bremner, editor of The North Hastings Reporter of Bancroft, swore he supported Byrom Lott on four occasions on which he has been a candidate. Bremner said he received a case on Oct. 28 or 29, but did not know what it contained. He received the case from D. H. Ross, carter. The box was put in the store room of Samuel Harryett, the Police Magistrate, because Harryett told him a week before that a box was coming. The Police Magistrate was present when the box arrived at Bremner's.

Bremner's.

Brammer said he noticed the case there the day after the election, when he had read of the bogus boxes is the paper. The fact that the box was shipped to the Police Magistrate than the paper. through Bremner then aroused his suspicions. On Saturday previous to nomination Byron Lott asked if the box had come for him. Lott stayed over Sunday. Bremner thought the Police Magistrate and Bryon Lott were trying to conceal the matter from him. Lott said he would give Bremner some of the printing, but no mention was made of ballots.

Wanted to Conceal Them. On Nov. 4 the Police Magistrate went to Bremner and wanted to know what he would do about the bogus ballot boxes, or conceal them. "He had violated your friendship by unloading the boxes on you?" "That's about right."

"And he wanted you to get mixed up further in the matter?

'Yes." Bremner and Harryett talked half an hour. The Magistrate suggested that Bremner conceal the boxes in his

that Bremner conceal the boxes in his house. Then he suggested Patrick Moore as a good person. He could trust him. Moore was deputy returning officer at No. 3 Faraday.

Byron Lott had not told him that he had gone up to Toronto, and that he had been promised protection. He did not say he had telephoned to Jim Varce

Asked to Concest Facts.

Byron Lott asked Bremner to conceal the facts. This was after the cat was out. On Sunday last Byron came down from the north. He contended that some person had put up a trick on him. On Thursday last Bremner met Sam Harryett and Byron Lott in Toronto at the Liberal Convention. Lott again asked him to conceal what he knew. The three met at the Somerset House for dinner. After dinner they had a talk in a private room, which was interputed once or twice he takes

In a private room, which was interrupted once or twice by the entrance of the bartender. George Weese, hotelkeeper at Bancroft, was also present. Either Lott or Weese instructed him to kiss his thumb and only tell what he had to.

"They told me to say I didn't know anything. They wanted me to perjure myself for friendship. Lott said he had an appointment with E. F. B. Johnston, who was going to defend him. Harryett and Weese did not expect to be in it. Lott seemed to think he could clear himself."

to think he could clear himself.

Bremner's excuse for not finding out where the boxes went was that he was too busy, but if he went to look he would go to Police Magis-trate Harryett of Patrick Moore. He kept what he knew until the present time, because he knew the matter would come out. He had written ar-ticles in his papers suggesting that the whole thing was a Toty plot.

Byron O. Lott, Sam Harryett, George Weese and Bremner were all in Toronto for the Liberal convention. Bremner knew Kelly, having seen him several times in the Crown Lands Department. Kelly was present during the interview in the Somerset House. They were all there when Bremner arrived about 7 or 8 o'clock. At the interview they pressed Bremner not to disclose what he knew. He did not remember what

knew. He did not remember what part Kelly took in the conversation. Kelly did not advise. He is in the sales and free grants office.

Bremner told them he could not conceal anything. On the following day Bremner saw Kelly in the Crown Lands Department. He did not refer to the matter.

Kelly asked Bremner not to say anything about it, as the clerks might tell Mr. White about his being out drinking. Bremner thought Kelly knew what the subjects of the interview of the night before were.

William Sproule, merchant of Harrowsmith, swore he was Shibley's agent at Ardoch en election day. This was 60 miles from Harrowsmith. Sproule went cut two days before election. On the train he saw Carl Taylor. He went out, on the same train with Hawkeye, who took out the ballot box. They were there the night before election and the night after. Hawkeye also had a valise. He had never met Hawkeye until the time they stayed toa valise. He had never met Hawa-eye until the time they stayed to-gether at the hotel. On the morning of election Hawkeye sent witness out

Mr. Hawkeye, Mr. Taylor and wit-Mr. Hawkeye, Mr. Taylor and wit-ness went upstairs to have a drink. They took the ballot box up. The room was engaged by Sproule "to change his colar." He was not sure whether the hotelkeeper charged him for the room.

Alone With the Boxes.

The witness and Taylor left Hawkeye in the room with the valises. He did not know whether Hawkeye changed his collar, but he remained there alone for some time. Taylor and Sproule went out for a walk to talk about the hunting. They did not go hunting, because Mr. Brickwood, the game inspector, was at the hotel, and hemight suspect they the hotel, and he might suspect they were after deer. Sproule said he saw Hawkeye was

Sproule said he saw Hawkeye was in the vicinity two days ago. Reverting to the subject of the hunt, Sproule said he had never been hunting before and did not possess a sum. He had acted as agent at an election at Harrowsmith, but had never gone so far from home as Ardoch. When he reported the state of the poll to Shibley on his return to Harrowsmith he did not remember that Shibley said anything. Recommended By Lett.

John Williams, returning officer or West Hastings, asserted that Arfor West Hastings, asserted that Arthur Reid, the election clerk, was recommended by Byron O. Lott. Lott also recommended the deputy returning officers in Rawdon and Huntingdon. George Weese and William Gloster were recommended. don. George Weese and William Gloster were recommended by Police Magistrate Harryett. The returning officer had no special reason to lock up the ballots except for the instructions he received in the regular way. No improper suggestion was made to him by anybody. He swore in all 10 deputies except two. A few days before the election he was away nearly, all the time. No one suggested that he leave the extra ballots behind. There were 330 of these ballots, and he took them with him in case he should need them. Mr. Williams said notwithstanding Byron O. Lott recommended Reid, he took precautions

"You've been badly misled?"
"I don't know that I have."

L. Guess, a Kingston liveryman, testified that on the afternoon of Oct. 28 Shibley and Ed. Ruttan called on him and engaged to have a rigcall at the Albion Hotel in the evening for some literature. Ruttan was to accompany Guess out to Harrowsmith. Mr. Guess drove to the hotel about 7 o'clock, and Ruttan helped to carry the boxes out to the rig. When they arrived at Harrowsmith about 9.30 they met Shibley and Ruttan, and assisted in carrying the boxes into Shibley's house.

Lott referred to some of the details of his interview with Reilly. Reilly said the ballot box was a winner, and that God Almighty could not beat the Ontario Government with these boxes. This remark has been

For the first time during the day W. J. McCamon took a hand in the investigation. Phil denied that he brought a sample box to Belleville before election day. He, was sworn in, and in the face of his oath he was determined to go on and catch the men who intended to commit wrongful acts.

Migh Muck-a-Mack.

Witness said he had secured signed statements when he was in Watertown, N.Y. He read them, as follows:

Watertown, N.Y., Nov. 26, 1904.

To A. F. Wood, P.M.:

Dear Sir, The box brought over here has been used in Frontenac. It was brought over here with No. 14 on it. Bogus boxes has been made in Ogdenwing. For some years and drowned every time after being used. They were ordered made by the High Muck-a-Muck in Toronto, and have been used a long time, the kind with a spring. So I was told by one of the men who made the dear with me for the boxes.

Phil Lott said Roof was willing to C. L. Roof. come over here and testify in the case if given protection. Lott took Roof before a notary, and he was Roof before a notary, and ne was ready to make an affidavit, but the lawyer advised him not to, as it might incriminate him, being connight incriminate him, being con-nected with the conspiracy. Clayton Cronk, foreman in The Duily Ontario office, told of the pub-lication of the document complained of by E. Gus Porter.

Trick Box Maker's Evidence.

A witness from Watertown, N.Y., was introduced just at 6 o'clock. He was Patrick Carter, employed by E. B. Irwin, hardware merchant. Two B. Irwin, hardware merchant. Two months ago, he said, he was working for C. L. Roof & Co., and Mr. Roof put him to making bogus ballot boxes. He saw Reilly over there a week or so after he commented to make the boxes. He did not hear what was going on, as the boss sent him out of the shop when he and Reilly talked over the matter. He was told afterwards that the boxes were to be used to cheat the people was told alterwards that the boxes were to be used to cheat the people out of their votes over here. One was to be used to Brockville, he thought, and one was to be left in Prescott. They finished 20, and five were not finished. The boxes were packed in they goods boxes and sent to Ordensburg. Chauda and Lean to Ogdensburg. Chaude and Leon Roof also worked on the job. They had a model box like the one pro-duced.

Fremier Ross on Byron O. Lott

"He was glad to come on behalf of Byron O. Lott, whose aggressiveness he knew thoroughly. He had, in addition to his other duties, acted as Commissioner of Crown Lands in 1897, when Mr Gibson was

in the Old Country, and during that time was thrown into contact with Mr. Lott fa quently. "He is a curious fellow this man Lott! He seems to make up his mind that what he wants he must have.

"He came to us with bridges that must be built, and roads that needed money, and we began to wonder if it were possible that there existed so many rivers and bogs and mountains that had to be crossed.
So persistent was he that, if he had had his way the thing I had to fear was that our beloved surplus would disappear.

"It may be that the Government has not done its whole duty by the constituency; and it is certainly the wise course to have a man of Mr. Lott's energy in the House to tell the Government what you need, and to add lustre to the great party of Baldwin, Blake, and Mowat,"--Hon. G. W. Ross at Madoc Dec. 21, 1899.

THE BALLOT BOX REVELATIONS.

The connection with the plot of Byron O. Lott, and his visit to Watertown—where, after an inspection of the box, he asked that the secret receptacle for bogus ballots be enlarged, because of the large adverse majority he had to overcome in West Hastings-were also related by Mr. Reilly. He admitted that when he realized that the apparently innocent project undertaken at first as a personal favor to an old friend was leading him into what was becoming a serious position he endeavored to protect bimself from the consequence which would follow exposure. He resisted the financial inducements offered him by Byron O. Lott and W. J. Shibley to leave the country, and declined to exile himself as they desired.—Toronto Globe, Nov. 26, 1904.

THE SITUATION IN WEST KENT

It is announced that the Liberal executive of West Kent are to hold a convention for "the purpose of considering the nomination of a candidate" and other business. The character and conduct of this convention will be watched with interest.

There are three courses which appear to present themselves to the Liberals of West Kent and, if the convention is not a cut-and-dried affair dictated by the local party managers, its choice will be fraught with much meaning. In the ordinary political convention outsiders have, perhaps, not much interest, but at the present crisis in Provincial affairs-with the contest between the platform of purity, honesty and morality and the further ambitions of the Sullivan-Ross-Stratton combination-the action of the party representatives means much to every elector, no matter what his party affiliations or his political inclina-

The three courses which confront the coming convention are as follows:

Blind allegiance to Ross, condoning and excusing his party past and enlisting with his colleagues, Sullivan, Stratton, Vance, et al, in their effort to continue in power at any price, and the selection of a candidate to champion his unfortunate and unclean cause.

2. Sturdy repudiation of Ross and his camp followers with adherence to the old, clean and honorable platform of Liberal policy and fulfilment of pledges and promises, with the selection of an independent Liberal candidate to energetically oppose the Ross program and vindicate the policy and honor of old Liberalism.

Endorsation of and support James Clancy, the nominee of the friends of clean elections, purity in politics and the promotion of healthy morality in governmental dealings and deliberations. Fortunately no matter of policy to-day separates the Liberals of the old school and the platform of Mr. Clancy. There is only a great issue of higher things, honesty, integrity, cleanliness and morality-and Liberals as well as Conservatives are heartily and confidently invited to enlist in this splen-

WHAT CHOICE WILL THE CONVENTION MAKE?

Let the thinking men of the Liberal party study the situation for themselves. The present is not a time when they can safely accept the party dictation of their leaders and central executives.

It will be a surprise and source of regret to all right thinking men if the convention adopts the first-mentioned course. It is hard to imagine any reputable man, worthy the esteem and confidence of the community, consenting for a moment to champion a cause of endorsation of Ross and his disreputable record and surroundings. To defend and endorse these things-let alone to champion them-would be keenly offensive to a man of honor and integrity-and we do not believe such an one can be found to become standard-bearer for a convention which has applauded or excused the Ross-Sullivan-Stratton regime.

With the second course, that of nominating an independent Liberal candidate allied to the traditions of true Liberalism and opposed to the Ross combination, no right-thinking elector can quarrel. Such a course would be at least honorable and straight-forward. Yet the value of such a representative to his constituency is, perhaps, questionable, unless we are assured of such a general course being adopted throughout the Province as to insure a vigorous and effective phalanx of strong,

clean independent men in the new Parliament. The third proposition to unitedly endorse the candidature of James Clancy and return him without opposition, may not at first glance prove popular with the strong Liberal party man. But an honest, careful study of the situation will show that course steadily growing in the judgment of the electorate of both parties. Mr. Clancy's platform is not a party platform. It is a platform of honesty and common sense. He stands for a thorough and effective house-cleaning, for the removal of the uncleanness and rubbish and for a reaffirming of the competent and the right. He believes in stamping out honestly and effectively in both parties all impurities and immoralities and safely guarding against their reoccurrence. He believes in inaugurating and maintaining a cleaner and better atmosphere in Provincial politics. He is earnestly and emphatically opposed to the dangerous and improper spoils system and no Liberal who has performed his duties honestly, competently and conscientiously will receive ought but commendation and endorsation at his hands. Mr. Clancy stands for an end to electoral corruption; for clean and honest government of the people, for the people and by the people; for broadening the scope of the Ontario agricultural interests; for encouragement and assistance in the improvement of municipal drainage schemes; for a license regulation that will be honestly enforced; for sympathy with all measures of moral reform; for the general welfare and prosperity of the people of our Province.

This is not a party platform as such. It is a platform upon which both Liberals and Conservatives can stand-and be proud to stand. It is a platform that is not controversial. It is worth considering, worth en-

As a Minister of the Crown, in complete and influential contact with the Cabinet deliberations, Mr. Clancy will be able to bring results to his constituents. Jap Army Ordered to Renew Its Attack On the Fortress.

St. Petersburg Expects the Assault- Japanese Sappers Have Reached the Centre Ditches, and Russians Are Now Only ia Possession of the Parapets of Defence Works On Rihlung and Sungshu Mountains.

Washington, Nov. 26.-The Associated Press learns on excellent authority that the Japanese army has been ordered to renew its attack on Port Arthur at once and to take the main fortifications at any cost. Reaches Centre Ditches.

Tokio, Nov. 26.—It is reported that the Japanese sappers directed against Rihlung Mountain, Sungshu Mountain and East Keekwan Mountain have reached the base of the centre ditches. The defensive works outside the parapets of Rihlung Mountain and Sungshu Mountain have been captured, leaving the Russians in possession of the parapets only. The Japanese guns are shelling the parapets and inflicting heavy damage. The occupation of the forts is expected shortly. If the forts are taken, the capture of Port Arthur seems to be assured within a short

St. Petersburg Expects It. St. Petersburg, Nov. 26.—The report that the Japanese are concentrating their energies for a desperate

assault on Port Arthur in view the approach of the second Pacific squadron is quite generally credited in official quarters Kuroki Dead Again.

Berlin, Nov. 26.-The Loka Anzeiger's Mukden correspondent telegraphs as follows: "According to a report brought by Chinese to Rus-sian headquarters, the corpse of Gen. Kuroki has arrived at Yinkow." All Port Arthur Coal Lost.

Tokio, Nov. 26 .- The usual daily bulletins were received yesterday from the third army headquarters before Port Arthur, and the news indicates that the conflagration caused on Sunday by the naval gun fire from Chungshoo destroyed not only the magazines of the army buildings, but the only coal supply that remained in the fortress. After it was seen that the army buildings were ablaze, shells were constantly dropped upon the scene, so as to make powerless any effort to extinguish the fire. The buildings continued to burn until 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon, and it is practically certain that all the coal stores were destroyed.

Japs Hold Permanent Forts. Telegraphing in a second bulletin from army headquarters, General Nogi's chief of staff says: "All the permanent forts are now in our possession. We hold all the advance works on Rulin Mountain and on the entrenched hills farther south, including old Fort Kuropatkin, Kobu Hill, Petou Mountain, Antsze Mountain, Chungshoo fort, all the galleries and moats of the fort on Kehwan Mountain, the two main forts on Rulin Mountain, Sachitaklyama, and 174 Metre Hill. The enemy is now attempting to defend the city from the redoubts on Kwang Hill, Golden Hill and the forts on White Wolf Hill, which are being bombard-Telegraphing in a second bulletin

Wolf Hill, which are being bombarded by our fleet off the harbor.

Bleckade Perfect. "An attempt at midnight on Mon-

day to rush our entrenchments be-tween Quail Hill and Orlung fort was repulsed after 40 minutes of fighting, the Russians leaving 39 dead. The blockade of the city from the outer harbor, owing to mild weather in the last week, has been unusually successful. Two ships carrying 25,000 tins of meat and three junks with provisions have been seen tured. No Russian soldiers remain in Port Arthur proper, except in the westerly entrenchments. Our bombardment yesterday was continuous, and the Russian warships were repeatedly hit by shells. An explosion took place on one of the second-class cruisers. Eleven deserters came in from the Russian line before dawn. They say food, ammunition and water are lacking.

North Sea Convention Signed,
St. Petersburg, Nov. 26.—The
North Sea Convention was signed at
the Foreign Office yesterday afternoon by Foreign Minister Lamsdorff and Ambassador Hardinge.

Cleveland, O., Nov. 26.—There were fifteen people injured, three, and possibly more of whom will die, as a result of a collision between a fast southbound train on the Cleveland & Pittsburg Road, and a trolley car on the Northern Ohio Traction Line yesterday, near Bedford, a few miles east of this city. The trolley car was struck by the passenger train while the latter was running fifty miles an hour. The electric car was cut completely in two and the wreckage thrown 60 or 70 feet to one side. The passenger train was not derailed. Trolley Cut in Two.

Mrs. Banwell Killed By Engine

Windsor, Nov. 26.—While driving into town Friday morning, Mrs. Edward Banwell, who lives on the Huron line, in Sandwich West, about six miles from Sandwich, was struck by a passing train on the M.C.R., and received injuries from which she died at Hotel Dieu in the afternoon. Mrs Banwell was accompanied only by her grandson, who escaped with ser-ious injuries.

Missing Fer a Week.

Windsor, Nov. 26.—William Carley, express messenger for the Canadian and American express companies, has been missing since the 19th inst.

No one can account for his disappearance; he gave no intimation of his departure. His accounts are straight. Carley was a drummer in the 21st Fusilier bugle band. Detective Mahoney is investigating the case.

Sir Edward Grey, M. P., speaking at Hastings, said he dreaded a preference more than protection. After we had taxed our food in the interests of the Empire we should never cease pressing colonies to admit Brit-ish good free to their markets, yet we were plainly told by the colonies were plainly told by the colonies that they intended to go on imposing duties on British manufactures so that Mr. Chamberlain's proposals, instead of being a bond of union, would be a cause of constant friction. Let there be a conference with the colonies on such questions as Imperial defence, foreign policy and the general interests of the Empire, by all means but a conference or all means, but a conference on the fiscal question was bound to lead to heart-burning and disappointment. Right Hon. George Wyndham, Irish

secretary, speaking at the United Club, said the most important me-thod of bringing the colonies into a closer bond of Imperial unity was that the Mother Country should re gularly take counsel with all parts of the Empire.



Another Fort Blown Up.

- Another Fort Blown Up.

 London, Nov. 28.—A news agency despatch from Tokio says that the sapping operations against the powerful fort crowning Eriung Mountain, two miles north of Port Arthur, have culminated in the blowing up of the whole north side of the fort.
- The explosion was tremendous The garrison was practically wiped dut, several hundred Russian sold-iers being killed. The twenty big guns in the fort were demolished.
- Following the explosion according to the same news agency despatch, the Japanese concentrated the fire of 300 big guns on Erlung Mountain, the bombardment beginning early yes-
- the bombardment beginning early yesterday morning.

 The Japanese undoubtedly are concentrating their energies for a final assault on the Russian stronghold.

 They have 450 siege guns in place, and these are reinforced by 132 powerful field guns. There are a large number of six and eight inch naval guns, capable of throwing an enormous weight of steel against the fortresses surrounding Port Arthur. fortresses surrounding Port Arthur. Negi's Fighting Strength.
- General Nogi, according to the latest figures obtainable, has three divisions of infantry, two brigades of reserves, and a large number of sappers and engineers. The total sappers and engineers. The total lapanese force, according to these figures, is approximately 80,000 men. Recent scraps of information gathered from Russian prisoners, indicate that Stoessel's actual fighting force, originally 40,000 men, has dwindled to less than 8,000 effective men. This being the case, Stoessel will soon he reduced to the point where he will not have men enough to hold his






