THE Indian word "Toronto" means "the place of meeting." It was so named on account of its being a favorite gathering-place for the Huron Indians. For a number of years past it has fairly earned the name, as it has witnessed many notable conventions and assemblies, some of them larger than the International Sunday School Convention of this year, but none more representative or convened for a more important object.

Governor Simcoe selected it, in 1793, as the site for the capital of the new Province of Upper Canada, in place of Niagara, which was its first capital. He named it York, and the new town was often irreverently called "Muddy York" until 1832, when it was made a city and its Indian name restored.

Toronto as a City.

Toronto is essentially a city of homes. An unusual proportion of even the smaller houses have their well-kept plots of grass. The residential streets are lined with fine shade trees.

It is also a city of churches, and has the reputation of being the best church-going city of its size in the world, Edinburgh being generally considered its chief rival in this respect.

In the decennial census taken by the Dominion Government the people are classified according to their religion. The last census was taken in 1901, the population of the city (not including the adjoining suburbs) being then 208,040. The numbers belonging to the different denominations were as follows: Church of England, 62,406; Methodists, 47,718; Presbyterians, 41,639; Roman Catholics, 28,994; Baptists, 11,898; Congregationalists, 3,658; Jews, 3,083; Lutherans, 972; Brethren, 682; Salvation Army, 625; Christian Scientists, 595; Disciples, 524; Plymouth Brethren,



326; Unitarians, 262; Spiritualists, 256; Swedenborgians, 225; Friends, 221; Mormons, 173; no religion, 130; Mennonites, 105; Theists, 49; Buddhists, 23. The remainder were distributed among nearly fifty "isms."

Street Cars.

Toronto has an excellent street car service. Most lines lead to and from the Union Station, and near the Convention Buildings. Transfer tickets are given to another line without charge if asked for when paying fare. Yonge Street and Avenue Road cars run from the station and wharves to corner of Shuter Street for Massey Hall, and Church Street cars to the Metropolitan Church.

Time-tables for all lines given to each delegate on registering, and to each visitor on purchasing Hand-book. To be had also at Information Bureau.

Cars stop BEFORE crossing intersecting streets; not AFTER.

ORDINARY FARE, 5 cents; 6 tickets (blue), for 25 cents; 25 tickets (yellow), for \$1.00.

From 6 to 8 a.m., and from 5 to 6.30 p.m., 8 tickets (red) for 25 cents.

NORMAL SCHOOL.

The Convention of 1881.

The only previous International S. S. Convention held in Canada was that of 1881, which met in this city. The President was the Hon. S. H. Blake, K.C., then and still a leader of the Bar, and the Senior Secretary was the Rev. W. H. Withrow, D.D., then and still the editor of the S. S. periodicals of the Methodist Church.

The Convention of 1905.

Many of the delegates of 1881 are coming to the present Convention. What a wonderful change they will find in the city and in the magnitude of the work which the Convention represents! Toronto was then a city of 85,000 inhabitants; to-day it has 250,000. That Convention was attended by 537 delegates; at least three times that number are expected at the approaching one, besides thousands of alternates, friends and visitors. Then the old Pavilion in the Horticultural Gardens, seating less than 2,000 (and recently burnt down), sufficed for the meetings, except on two evenings, when there was an overflow. This time simultaneous evening meetings will be held in Massey Music Hall, seating 4,000, and in the Metropolitan Church, seating over 2,000. For the Children's Rally on Saturday afternoon, Massey Hall and four large churches will be required, namely, St. Paul's Church, Bloor Street East (Church of England); Walmer Road Baptist Church; Dunn Avenue Presbyterian Church, Parkdale; and Woodgreen Methodist Church, Queen Street East. The Grand S. S. Exposition of Art, Publications, Appliances, etc., in the lower Massey Hall and in St. James' School House, will be introduced for the first time as a feature of an International Convention.



METROPOLITAN CHURCH

The Convention Buildings.

The meetings of the Convention will be held in a group of buildings adjacent to each other, within four hundred yards of the central business portion of the city, and easily reached by street cars from the Union Station and the wharves, as well as from all parts of the city. On the map of the central part of the city, on page 4, they are marked in red.

Metropolitan Methodist Church

This will be the Convention headquarters. Here will be held, in the forenoon and afternoon, the regular meetings of the Convention. The official delegates will have allotted to them special seats, grouped by States and Provinces, and they alone will have the right to speak or vote.

Visitors will be admitted to the portions of the church not assigned to the official delegates.

The whole of the school-rooms, parlors and class rooms of the church will be used for the purposes of the Convention. The International Executive Committee, the Nominating Committee, and other committees, will have special rooms assigned to them. The large school-room, on the ground floor, will be used as a general parlor, while the parlor above will be reserved for ladies. On the Ground Floor will be a Branch Post-Office, information bureau, parcel room, rooms for the Secretaries, press, etc.


This church is in the centre of Metropolitan Square, bounded by Queen, Church, Shuter and Bond Streets, and is about one hundred yards east of Massey Music Hall. It seats over 2,000, and evening meetings will be held in it, concurrent with those in Massey Hall. Dr. Torrington, the organist of the church, will give a recital on the magnificent new organ for thirty minutes before each of the evening meetings.


Massey Music Hall.

The largest of the convention buildings is Massey Music Hall, on Shuter Street, close to Yonge Street. Here delegates will register and be assigned to homes. Visitors also will here be directed to such hotels or boarding-houses as they may desire.

The large hall, seating 4,000, will be used for one of the meetings each evening, and for one of the children's mass meetings on Saturday afternoon. In this hall will also be held, on Sunday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, a Gospel Temperance Mass Meeting, under the auspices of the Canadian Temperance League, of Toronto, to be addressed by Rev. M. B. C. Mason, D.D., Cincinnati, Cor. Sec. Freedmen's Aid Society, and Rev. Ernest Bourner Allen, Toledo: the music to be under the direction of Professor Jacobs and Mr. Fletcher, assisted by the Convention choir.

In the lower hall there will be a portion of the grand Sunday School Exposition, projected by and under the charge of Rev. Dr. Blackall, of Philadelphia, assisted by Dr. C. A. Risk and a local committee. (See page 74.)





PARTIAL VIEW INTERIOR MASSEY MUSIC HALL.




ST. JAMES CATHEDRAL, CHURCH OF ENGLAND.


Other Convention Buildings.

The central group of convention buildings includes Cooke's Church (Presbyterian), on Queen Street, east of the Metropolitan, and seats about 2,000, in which the Temperance Conference will be held ; Bond Street Church (Congregational), corner of Wilton Avenue, north of the Metropolitan Church, in which the International Sunday School Institute and the Junior and Primary Conference, and other meetings, will be held ; Knox Church, on Queen Street West, near Yonge Street, where Field Workers will meet, and the Chinese Conference will be held ; and St. James' Cathedral School-house, where a portion of the Grand Sunday School Exposition will be located. Jarvis Street Baptist Church, corner of Gerrard Street, will also be utilized, as will other churches, for the rally of Sunday School children on Saturday afternoon.


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COOKE'S CHURCH, PRESBYTERIAN.



Some Facts About Toronto.

Toronto has 167 churches—37 Church of England, 37 Methodist, 28 Presbyterian, 17 Baptist, 13 Roman Catholic, 9 Congregational, and 26 of smaller bodies.

Toronto has 4 Universities, 20 Colleges, 3 Collegiate Institutes, a technical High School, and a number of private institutions of higher education. There are about 5,000 students in these. There are also 53 Public Schools, with 708 teachers and 35,000 pupils, and 17 Roman Catholic Separate Schools, with 105 teachers and 5,000 pupils, besides a large number of elementary private schools.

Toronto has 15 parks, covering 1,300 acres.

Toronto has 9 railroad lines entering it, 3 radial electric railways, and 100 miles of electric street railway.

St. James' Cathedral is said to have the highest church spire in America.

The clock in the City Hall tower is the largest winding clock on the continent.

The floor space of the City Hall is 5½ acres.

The Public Library contains 175,000 volumes.

In 1904, 3,398 vessels arrived at the port of Toronto.


Toronto has restricted the trade in liquors more than most cities of its size. They are sold only in 150 hotels, and in 50 liquor stores, where no other goods are sold. No sales can be made between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. on any day, or from 7 Saturday evening to 6 on Monday morning, or on any election day. No liquor is sold in restaurants.

Pointers for Delegates and Visitors.

1. Register at the Massey Hall and receive a copy of the Program and Souvenir Hand-book, and a ticket for a reserved seat.

2. Do not put a United States stamp on your letters or papers. They will not be forwarded. Canadian stamps can be had at the Convention Post Office.

3. If your mail is addressed to you at the Convention, call at the Branch Post Office there. If not so addressed, call at the General Post Office at the head of Toronto Street, south of the Metropolitan Church.

4. The rooms for the Post Office, Information Bureau, Parcel Office, Local Committees, Mr. Lawrance, Speakers, Secretaries, Press, and General Parlor are on the Ground Floor of the Metropolitan School Room. Those for the International Executive Committee, and the Nominations Committee, and the Ladies' Parlor are on the next Floor Above.

5. Delegates' tickets secure for them their proper seats in the Metropolitan Church throughout the forenoon and afternoon sessions of the Convention.

6. Delegates' tickets and other Reserved Seat Tickets secure for holders reserved seats on the floor of the Metropolitan Church or of Massey Hall for the evening meetings up to 7.40 o'clock. Entrance by the side doors. After that time, all seats are free.

7. Do not miss Dr. Torrington's organ recitals in the Metropolitan Church before the evening meeting.

8. Get your tickets stamped for return at the Union Station. If you desire an extension, deposit your tickets there before June 30th.

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

Province of Ontario.


The Province of Ontario extends from the River St. Lawrence, the Great Lakes and the State of Minnesota on the south, to Hudson Bay on the north. On the east it is bounded by the River Ottawa and the Province of Quebec, and on the west by the Lake of the Woods and the Province of Manitoba. It has an area of 260,862 square miles, being greater in extent than the six New England States, with New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Maryland added. At the last Dominion census in 1901 its population was 2,182,947. Almost the entire population is as yet in the south-eastern portion, in the neighborhood of the Great Lakes and the River St. Lawrence. A new trans-continental railway, the Grand Trunk Pacific, is being built by the Dominion Government, which will cross the northern portion of Ontario, north of the height of land which separates the valley of the Great Lakes from that of Hudson Bay. The new road will be about 400 miles north of Toronto, and will open up for settlement and development an immense area of valuable land, rich in timber and minerals, and possessing unlimited water power.

The census of 1901 showed the population to be divided among the denominations as follows :—Methodists, 666,388 ; Presbyterians, 477,386 ; Roman Catholics, 390,304 ; Church of England, 367,937 ; Baptists, 116,320 ; Lutherans, 48,052 ; Congregationalists, 15,289 ; Mennonites, 12,208 ; Disciples, 10,154 ; Salvation Army, 6,479 ; Brethren, 6,416 ; Jews, 5,321 ; Friends, 3,648. The remainder were distributed among the smaller bodies.

Ontario Sunday School Association.

The first Canadian Convention was held at Kingston in 1857 ; the next at Hamilton in 1865, when the Association for the old Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada was formed. Conventions have been held annually since, except in 1880 and in 1881, the International Convention of the latter year taking their place. The 40th Convention will be held at London, October 24-26, 1905.



Author of many leaflets used in practical church work and evangelism. (Portrait, p. 77).

ATKINS, REV. JAMES, of Nashville, is S. S. Editor of M. E. Church South. Born at Knoxville, Tenn., 1850. Educated at Emory and Henry College (A.M.); received D.D. from Trinity College, North Carolina. Was President of Missionary Board of Western North Carolina Conference for fifteen years. Is Vice-President of General Board of Missions of M. E. Church South. Author of "Help or Hinder," and "The Kingdom in the Cradle." (Portrait, p. 77).

BAILEY, GEORGE W., wholesale coal dealer, Philadelphia, has been treasurer of the International S. S. Association since 1896. Born in Gloucester Co., N.J., 1840. Educated at University of Pennsylvania (M.D. 1868). Formerly member International Executive Committee for N. J., and chairman Executive Committee, N. J.; chairman Executive Committee World's Fifth S. S. Convention; member Board of Trustees and Board of Education of General Assembly Presbyterian Church; Trustee Presbyterian Hospital, Philadelphia. (Portrait, p. 38).

BARNES, MRS. J. WOODBRIDGE, of Newark, N.J., is International Primary and Junior Secretary. She was born in New Jersey and educated in New York State. BLACKALL, D.D., REV. C. R., of Philadelphia, is editor of periodicals of the American Baptist Publication Society. Born at Albany, N. Y. Studied medicine and spent fifteen years in medical practice. Is a member of the Executive Committee of Philadelphia Council, and of the State S. S. Association. Was originator and director of the Pennsylvania S. S. Exhibit at Pittsburg, and is director of the International S. S. Exposition at the present convention. (Portrait, p. 47).

BROCK, IVOR E., Chairman of the Local Committee on Decorations, is a native of Wales, and was educated in Canada. He is assistant superintendent of the Parkdale Methodist S. S. BRUMBAUGH, M. G., of Philadelphia, is Professor of Pedagogy in the University of Pennsylvania. Born in Huntingdon Co., Pa., 1862. Educated at Harvard and University of Pennsylvania (A.M. 1893, Ph.D. 1894, LL.D. 1902). Has been a contributor to *S. S. Times* and a lecturer for S. S. Institutes and Conventions. Active in church work and a lecturer on various phases of religious work. President of Juniata College, 1895. Commissioner of Education to Porto Rico, 1900-02. Has been lecturer

to teachers in twelve States. Author of series of Standard Readers ; Juniata Bible Lectures ; Editor Lippincott Educational Series.

BRYAN, REV. BERNARD, rector of Church of the Epiphany, Toronto, for eighteen years, is Chairman of Local Committee on Pulpit and S. S. Supply. Born at London, Ont. Educated at Hellmuth College (London), Wycliffe College and Toronto University. For many years a member of the Diocesan S. S. Committee, Vice President of Toronto S. S. Association, Honorary Clerical Secretary Upper Canada Bible Society, Member of Board of Church Missionary Society, etc. (Portrait, p. 29).

BRYNER, MRS. MARY FOSTER, Peoria, Ill., has been International S. S. Field Worker for three years. Born at Peoria, 1859. Primary S.S. teacher for twenty-five years; General Field Worker for six years; was special worker for Congregational S. S. and Publication Society for two years. A Christian at nine, a church member at sixteen, a teacher soon after, a worker in S. S. ever since. Has worked in forty States, six Provinces, and in Mexico. Has attended three International and two World's S. S. Conventions, including Jerusalem. Writer on International S. S. Lessons for Primary Teachers for three years in *S. S. Times*. CHIVERS, REV. E. E., New York City, is Field Secretary of the American Baptist Home Mission Society. Born at South Wales, 1850. Educated at Baptist College, South Wales, and at Regent's Park College (London), (D.D.) from Colgate University. Was District Secretary, American Baptist Missionary Union two years; General Secretary Baptist Young People's Union four years. Pastor twenty-six years. (Portrait, p. 77).

CLARK, HON. WM. MORTIMER, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario since 1903, is Honorary Chairman of the Local Committee for the Convention. Born at Aberdeen, Scotland, 1836. Educated at Marischal College, Aberdeen, and at Edinburgh University, (LL.D.) Toronto University, 1902. Writer to the Signet, Scotland. Came to Canada, 1859; barrister, 1861; Queen's Counsel, 1887. President and Director of several financial companies. Chairman of Board of Knox College; elder of Knox Church. Has always taken an active interest in religious, educational and philanthropic work. Has been President of St. Andrew's Society. Has travelled extensively in both hemispheres. (Portrait, p. 29).

CLINGAN, F. W., Merchant, Virden, Man., has been member of International Executive Committee for Manitoba since 1902. Born at Orangeville, Ont., 1866. Has been President of Virden Convention S. S. Association, and of Manitoba S. S. Association, and a member of its Executive (Portrait, p. 40).

COATSWORTH, ALD. EMERSON, Toronto, Barrister and Solicitor, is Chairman of Local Committee on S. S. Rally. Born at Toronto 1854. Educated at Law Society of Upper Canada and Toronto University, (LL.B. 1886.) He has been connected with Berkeley Street Methodist S. S. since he was three years old, as scholar, teacher, Bible Class teacher, Assistant Superintendent, and Superintendent for the last 14 years. Has been President of Toronto Methodist S. S. Union. DESOVAN, ALLAN M., barrister, Toronto, is secretary of the local committee for the convention. Born at Glasgow, Scotland, 1861. Educated at University College and Osgoode Hall, Toronto, (B.A.) Toronto University, 1883. For twenty-five years has been actively engaged in S. S. work; the last five as General Secretary of Bloor Street Baptist S. S.; is Sec.-Treasurer of the Toronto S. S. Association; Director of the Upper Canada Bible Society, etc. (Portrait, p. 29).

DIKE, REV. SAMUEL W., Anburndale, Mass., has been Secretary of the National League for the Protection of the Family since 1881. Born at Thompson, Conn., 1839. Educated at Williams College, (A.B. 1863, LL.D. 1888.) Advocated the adoption of a Home Department of the Sunday School in 1885, and had one established in that year in Vermont, in co-operation with Dr. Dunning, of the Congregational S. S. Society. Read a paper on the subject before the New England S. S. Convention, November, 1885. Has written largely in support of the objects of the League.

DUNCAN, W. A., of Syracuse, N.Y., is Field Secretary of the Congregational S. S. Society. Member of International Executive Committee for New York since 1884; Chairman of Home Department Committee. Born at Oswego, N.Y., 1837. (Ph. D.) Mount Union College, 1887. Has been a superintendent thirty years; Chairman of State Executive Committee for fifteen years. In 1880 he originated the Home Class work. Presented Home Classes and Home Department Work at International Convention of 1887, at subsequent International and World's Conventions, and at State, County and Local Conventions. Visited Europe in same interest. Author of "Home Classes, or the Home Department of the S. S." (Portrait, p. 40).

FALCONER, REV. R. A., is Principal of Presbyterian Theological College, Halifax, N. S. Born at Charlottetown, P. E. I., 1867. Educated at University of London (B.A. 1888); at University of Edinburgh (M.A. 1889, D.Litt. 1902), LL.D.) University of New Brunswick, 1900. Member S. S. The Great Sunday School Exposition.

In accordance with action of the Executive Committee of the International Sunday School Convention, a unique and comprehensive Exposition of Sunday School material and appliances will form one important feature of the Convention. It will be similar in kind to the great exhibit of the Pennsylvania State Sunday School Association at Pittsburgh in October last, a large portion of which was shown in Baltimore, at the Maryland State Sunday School Convention.

Dr. C. R. Blackall, of Philadelphia, Pa., the Originator and Director of the Pennsylvania Exhibit, has been appointed Director of this larger and more complete Exposition. He will be aided by an efficient Local Committee, under the direction of Dr. C. A. Risk, as Chairman. It will be a rare opportunity for those who desire to become up-to-date in Sunday School work, by utilizing what will be displayed at this time under the most favorable conditions. The housing of the exhibits has been carefully considered, and the results will doubtless prove satisfactory. Attractiveness and utility have entered into every plan adopted. The two places chosen are admirably suited to the purposes of the Exposition, and both are near to the Metropolitan Methodist Church.

Massey Hall.

The great lower hall of this immense building will be used for the general exhibits. It will be brilliantly lighted by electricity for this occasion. Here will be found :

I. HISTORICAL EXHIBIT.—An exceedingly fine collection of old-time Sunday School material, arranged by the Rev. E. W. Rice, D.D., Secretary of the American Sunday School Union. It includes specimens of the earliest Sunday School issues in this country, rare and precious works beyond price, and not usually accessible to the present generation. The extent and value of such an exhibit cannot be appreciated without a personal view. It formed one of the most interesting and attractive exhibits at Pittsburgh.

II. BIBLES.—A marvellous display, including some rare old versions, and Bibles in many languages. The leading publishers will contribute to this Section to make it complete.

III. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOOK HELPS FOR TEACHERS AND OTHER WORKERS.—Full working libraries of this character will be shown, gathered from every available source whence the books can be readily obtained. These will be subdivided into smaller and classified sets of best books for Primary Class workers, older class teachers, superintendents, pastors, etc.

IV. MUSIC.—All departments of Sunday School music will be represented in such manner as will be of real advantage to Sunday School workers.

V. RECORDS AND OTHER PRACTICAL HELPS.—The several publishing houses will group this class of material with other showings. It will include various aids prepared for "the business end" of the Sunday School, such as Class Books, Roll Books, Class Cards, etc. One feature will be the newly devised "Sunday School Post Office."

VI. ART.—Several large and very choice oil paintings from the private galleries of the Hon. John Wanamaker will, by his kind courtesy, be placed on exhibition. The subjects chosen will probably be as follows: "Jesus Healing the Blind Man," "Jesus at Bethany," "St. Veronica," "John Huss at the Council of Constance." It is hoped also that others will be available from other sources, so far as desirable.

The Providence Lithograph Company will make a large and beautiful display of original oil paintings.
