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



Paris, Feb. 24.—The war office announces that a French detachment penetrated the German lines in the Vosges north of Senenes last night. The announcement follows:

"In the Vosges late yesterday one of our detachments penetrated the enemy's lines north of Senenes. In the morning, after a violent bombardment, the Germans attempted, without success, a surprise attack on our trenches at Wisembach. On the remainder of the front, the night was calm.

"One of our dirigibles last night dropped bombs on factories in the region of Briey and returned without incident to the station to which it is attached. Four hundred kilograms of projectiles were thrown by our aviators on the German bivouacs in the forest of Spincourt."

Importance of Small Oil Holes in Mechanism of a Car

There are a great number of owners and drivers who overlook the im-portance of the small oil holes in the nechanism of a car. These places should be gone over once a week, and before oiling should be cleansed of the dirt and dust.

The crank case, every 1000 miles, should be completely drained and flushed out with kerosene to remove accumulated particles, and fresh strained oil put in to the proper

The transmission and differential cases should be thoroughly cleaned every 3,000 miles, and be given a good flushing with kerosene. New, fresh lubricant should then be put in, enough so that the largest gear will have its teeth on the larger half completely covered. Cases should be inspected every 500 miles to see if

they contain sufficient lubricant.

The clutch thrust ball race and drive shaft universal should be well illed with a good cup of grease every

The steering gear should be kept ull of medium fluid oil. The wheels should be removed every 3,000 miles, the bearings removed and washed in gasoline or kerosene, and should be examined to see if they are wearing properly, and in good shape. Before replacing they

should be greased well with a medi-um thick grease. The internal and external brake hould be oiled every time the car general is oiled. The grease cups on the spring shackles, hangers and connecting

rods should, before being filled, be thoroughly cleansed and then be urned down two full turns every 50 miles of travel. Several times a year the springs

hould be lubricated. The magneto or electric generator hould be oiled with a very thin oil at least every 1,000 miles.

But tens of thousands of cars have been shipped into the conquered country from Germany and the entire countryside is over-run by them, day and night. One of the most popular pas

times of German officers is to form "joy-riding" parties, and to reck-lessly tour through the villages that lie mangled and shattered in every part of this once prosperous and peaceful land. 
