MACAULAY IS NOMINATED

As Standard Bearer for Citizens' Party, the Original Taxpayers Committee—Unable to Agree in Joint Committee They Returned to Their Own Fold and Formed Ticket.

Saturday night last was a warm one, politically speaking. In fact, the temperature became so torrid in places, particularly in the rooms of the New Party...

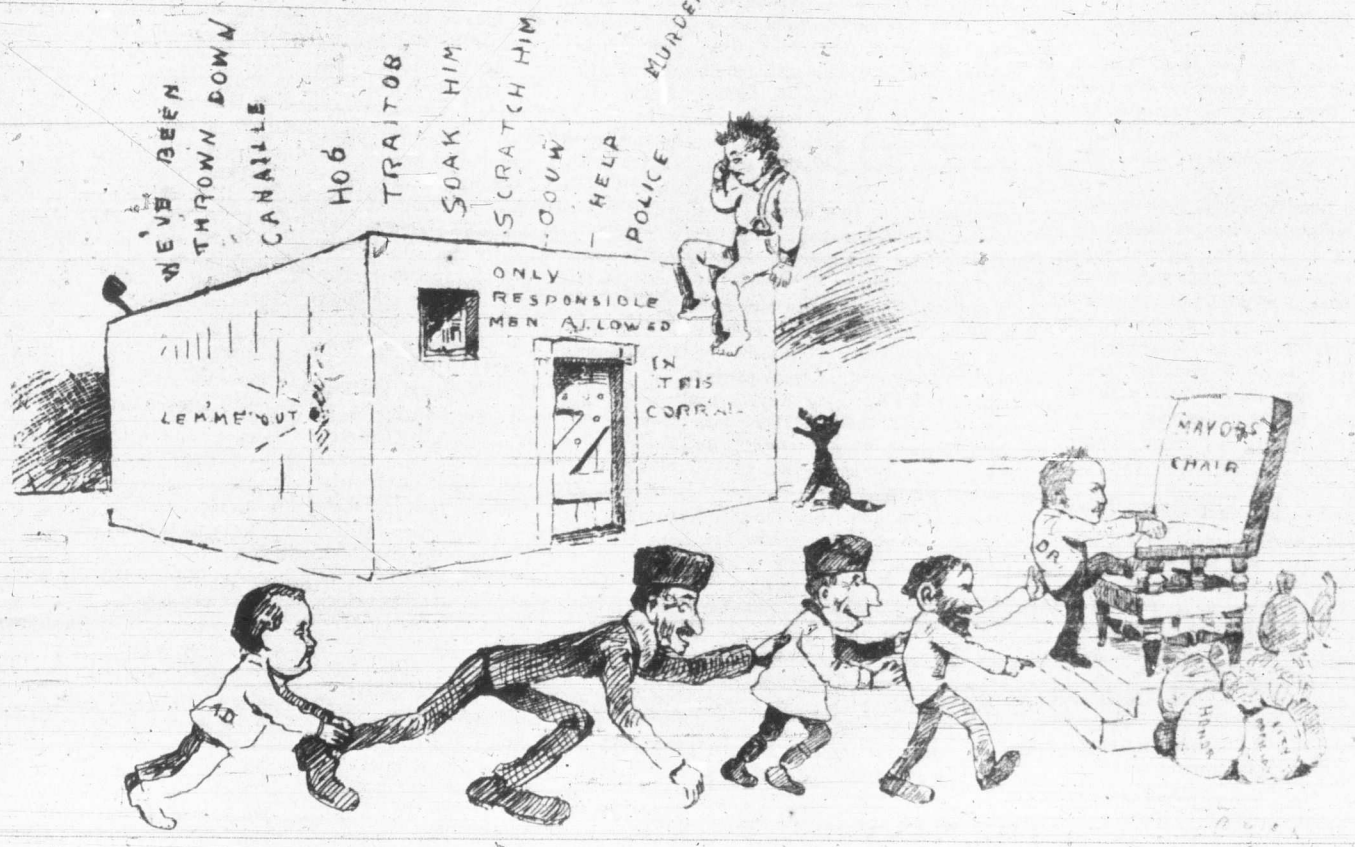
To endeavor to make 21 men think alike when 10 of the number were pledged body and soul to one candidate and would not concede an atom to those who could not agree with them, was continued until after 1 o'clock, and then each side retired carrying the same chip on their shoulder with which they had gone into the convention...

Upon receiving the report of the delegates the meeting then and there resolved to put a ticket of their own in the field. A platform was prepared and unanimously adopted and it was decided the ticket should be known as the Citizens' ticket. The platform is as follows:

- 1. An honest administration; economy consistent with progress. 2. The general improvement of the city streets, lighting, sidewalks, etc., consistent with a reasonable expenditure. 3. No salaries for aldermen. 4. Civic control of saloon licenses. 5. Civic control of franchises of the Telephone Co., Electric Light Co., Water Co., and all similar franchises. 6. The proper carrying out of the health ordinance. 7. Proper regulations regarding taxation, thereby securing the equal distribution of taxes. 8. A complete and thorough system of fire inspection. 9. The appointment of all city officials and the awarding of all contracts in the best interests of Dawson, regardless of political or other influences; and that all contracts be let by tender to the lowest responsible bidder and a bond taken for the due performance of same. 10. Absolute control of all affairs which should properly come under city government. 11. That we will request the Government at Ottawa that the saloon-keepers of Dawson have the same commercial privileges as are accorded other lines of business.

There was but one choice for the office of mayor and that was for Mr. Henry Macaulay, whose nomination was made unanimous. The time being one for action and not fulsome flattery or flowery words of adulation with choice rhetorical bouquets at lib, Mr. Macaulay in his speech of acceptance confined himself to but a few words of thanks for the honor accorded him and the evident confidence had in his ability by the representative citizens and heaviest taxpayers in the city of Dawson. For aldermen the following well-known gentlemen were chosen: F. M. Shepard, J. U. Nicol, Charles Bossuyt, Peter Vachon, Herbert E. A. Robertson and Dr. Parrett.

A MAN KILLED ON HUNKER HIS WILL TO BE CONTESTED

Chas. Eaton Dies From Effect of Injury Received From a Falling Bucket—The Accident Resulted From a Rope Slipping—Victim Was Well and Favorably Known—From Nova Scotia.

An accident occurred at 68 below Discovery on Hunker yesterday which resulted in the death of Chas. Eaton, who was working on the claim at the time. Eaton was working in the bottom of the shaft while a fellow-laborer was at the windlass above. A bucket had been hoisted to the top of the shaft but in some manner the rope and the windlass slipped. Without warning of any kind the heavy bucket was precipitated on the head of the unfortunate man below and he was struck down in an instant.

TREATY APPROVED. SALE OF WEST INDIES

Santiago, de Chile, via Galveston, Jan. 11, via Skagway, Jan. 20.—The extradition treaty between Chili and the United States has been approved by the Chilean congress. MACDONALD THE NOMINEE

Of the People's Party for Mayor of Dawson—Committee on Nominations Strikes Snag and Split—Taxpayers Withdraw in a Body—The Aldermanic Ticket.

As was stated in the Nugget of Saturday evening, the nominating committee appointed at the People's convention which met that afternoon, was in session when the paper went to press, the hour for its report having been fixed at eight o'clock.

Long before the arrival of the hour at which the committee was to report, it was known that the dove of peace and harmony had not spread her pinions over the meeting; that it had been almost a square division; that 10 of the 21 men had stood out for Chas. Macdonald for mayor, while the majority of the remaining 11 had refused to budge from the position that Russell Palmer should be standard bearer.

It was nine o'clock when the Macdonald contingent of the committee filed into the hall and then it was that the poppy-cock, assine matter of excluding the press to pick up garbled reports of the meeting from Tom, Dick and Harry on the street was discussed and not only discussed but carried and so ordered, until one or two men with sufficient foresight to see the suicidal policy proposed got up and so vigorously opposed the idiotic policy that it was finally rescinded and the representatives of the innocent cause of such a display of lamentable narrowmindedness, were requested to remain.

Without any preliminary sparring Chairman Davey, ex-officio member of the committee, reported the following gentlemen as having been decided upon as suitable nominees for aldermen: James F. Macdonald, Dr. H. C. Norquay, Jas. R. Gray, Peter Vachon, George Murphy, and Henry C. Macaulay. The announcement of the aldermanic candidates was received with much applause.

Regarding the placing in nomination a candidate for the office of mayor, Chairman Davey said there had been considerable discussion and it had finally been decided to refer the matter back to the convention. On motion of F. T. Congdon the report was received for consideration and two seconds later a motion to adopt prevailed.

A motion to proceed with the nomination of a candidate for mayor carried and Thos. Chisholm, without multiplicity of words or oratorical display, placed in nomination the name of Charles Macdonald (prolonged cheering).

Attorney Donaghy in a few neat sentences rescinded the nomination and said Mr. Macdonald, Dawson's future and first mayor was unquestionably the most popular man in the city. Calls from the chair for further nominations only resulted in no one had a candidate to name and a motion declaring the nominations closed was followed by the announcement from the chair that Chas. Macdonald was the unanimous choice of the convention for its candidate for mayor (simultaneous applause).

On motion, a committee consisting of F. T. Congdon, O. H. Clark, N. F. Haggi and Jas. F. Macdonald, was appointed to discover and escort Mr. Macdonald before the convention. During the absence of the committee the aldermanic nominees were called upon to address the convention. Peter Vachon thanked the convention for having honored him with its confidence in naming him as one of its standard bearers, and promised, if elected, to endeavor to merit the confidence reposed in him.

A petition has been entered asking for the appointment of A. C. McGillivray as administrator.

RAILWAY ECONOMY

New York, Jan. 13, via Skagway, Jan. 20.—There is a disposition on the part of several leading railways of Great Britain to amend their ways in direction of economy, says the London correspondent of the Tribune. Railway transportation in this country is at present carried on under much the same conditions as those which prevailed in the United States a quarter of a century ago and in England nearly half a century ago. Wagons of 8 to 10 tons capacity are still used and the average mineral train load is under one hundred tons.

Earl Russell's Imprisonment.

Earl Russell delivered an interesting and amusing lecture on 20th inst. at the Pharos Club, London, on his experiences while confined for three months in Holloway Jail. His Lordship said he was weighed on his arrival at Holloway, but this was overlooked on his release. He left the jail later, but he did not think his condition had improved. He was allowed his own furniture for his cell, which was 12ft. by 10ft. His Lordship humorously hit off his doorman, which, he said, was a sort of mystic symbol. It purported to give particulars of the prisoner. The fact that he was an agnostic puzzled the officials, but they went on the principle that if he were not a Roman Catholic he must be a Protestant, and put him down as such. He paid \$6 per week for his room, with sixpence extra for the services of a cleaner, who acted as a sort of valet. He thought the cleaner's services cheap, but he afterwards found the Government claimed fourpence of the sixpence on account of the cleaner's diet. The cleaner was taken from amongst the debtors. His Lordship was allowed a cold-bath every morning, which he enjoyed more than anything else. He went to chapel once or twice, but the sermons were bad, the hymns of the worst, and the chapel had a very clean, carbolic soap smell, and he gave up his visits. Says Colonel Evans of Cavalry Mounts.

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—Col. Evans left at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Halifax. Before leaving he had a telegram from Major Merritt, who denied the story that horses received were not satisfactory. The major said that 220 were in good condition and 33 were suffering colds caught in the cars, which was to be expected.

Montreal, Dec. 17.—Two hundred and forty-five troopers comprising the Western contingent of the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles, reached here from British Columbia, the Northwest Territories and Manitoba at 4 o'clock this morning in command of Sergeant Leckie, of Greenwood, B. C.

Duke's Mission.

Berlin, Dec. 18.—The Kleins Journal says: "President Duke, of the American Tobacco Company, has acquired the Jasmatzi Cigarette Co. of Dresden, and also Kyriaz Bros., of Berlin. Two other Dresden concerns, La Fernez and Sulima, will be amalgamated, and then be absorbed by the American Tobacco Company. Mr. Duke, who has been spending several days in Berlin, has gone to St. Petersburg for the purpose of buying cigarette factories."

The Healthiest Race.

The Swedish death-rate shows the lowest death-rate ever recorded by a civilized nation. During the last decade it has been 18.49 per thousand. Norway comes next, with 16.9; then England, with 18.8. Thus the Scandinavians are now the healthiest race in the world.

DR. WORKMAN ON ANARCHY

Talks Before Ministerial Association of Toronto.

Rev. Dr. Workman, at the last meeting of the Ministerial Association, read a carefully prepared paper on "Anarchy, Moral and Economic." It was an excellent treatise, which covered the subject thoroughly, although briefly, and it was greatly appreciated by the members.

MORAL ANARCHY

With regard to the moral application of the term the speaker said that conscious or deliberate disregard of human or divine law was moral anarchy. This was particularly true in the case of the law of man, but it was also true in the case of the law of God.

THE NAVY OF BRITAIN

In the Main Her Mariners Are Long Tim: Men.

It is curious how little attention has recently been devoted in the public prints to the manning of the navy. The British navy stands almost entirely by itself in the principle of providing personnel. Briefly, the British navy depends entirely on men enlisted for long service, whilst all other navies consist mainly of short-service men, recruited by a relatively small number of men enlisted and trained as lads, and who serve until finally pensioned.

The Airship's Future.

M. Santos-Dumont has arrived in London, and to a party of pressmen gave his opinions of the future of the airship. M. Santos-Dumont, who has by his trip round the Eiffel Tower proved that balloons are really steerable, is preparing for a trip from Monte Carlo or Corsica, the Prince of Monaco, who is greatly interested in aero-mobile progress, having offered to pay the expenses of an experiment in airships larger than any which M. Santos-Dumont has yet made.

ECONOMIC ANARCHY.

Under the heading of "Economic Anarchy" the speaker grouped: (1) Financial, such as the deceiving of an assessor, such as by a property owner, the practice of extortion by money lenders and others, the smuggling of merchandise, and in stock jobbing.

(2) Commercial, as shown in the unscrupulous means employed by many business men to make money rapidly, such as the adulteration of food, the employment of false weights and measures, and the acceptance of illegal commissions, etc.

(3) Municipal, where the ten commandments were set at naught. The traffic in franchises in Philadelphia, the protection of gambling and vice in New York, and the corruption in Chicago were mentioned.

(4) Political, such as the taking of money in the Pacific and McGreevy scandals, the buying of votes, the use of the gerrymander, tampering with voters' lists, and the stuffing of ballot boxes.

(5) Industrial, where the workers were treated as mere machines, and were improperly influenced in many directions. The formation of trusts, monopolies and combines of all kinds was a feature of this sort of anarchy.

Anarchy was occasionally connected with organized labor, when non-union men were compelled to join a union, or were prevented from working, where there was any interference with personal liberty, there was tyranny, which was anarchy.

THE OUTLOOK ALARMING. In concluding his description of anarchy the speaker said: "We are living at a time when wide-spread anarchy is abroad. There seems to be an epidemic of not only criminal anarchy, but of moral and economic also. The two latter are on the increase and the outlook is alarming. A characteristic feature is the unscrupulous means employed by so-called law-abiding citizens to gain money or to obtain power and position."

Collision at Sea.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 17.—The British steamship Isle of Kent, of Newcastle, England, from Savannah for Bremen, put in here today with her bows crushed in and her stem battered. She brought the crew of the Spanish steamer Antesti, bound from Bilbao, Spain, for Philadelphia, the latter vessel having sunk in half an hour after a collision with the Isle of Kent on Saturday last, when about 324 miles east of Cape Cod.

TOO MUCH FOR TAPPENHAM

The Experiment of His Medium Knocked Him Out

And He Retired From Business and Threw Commuted With His His Conscience.

Mr. Aloysius Tappenheim, of Stamford Road, was a dealer in frauds. It must not be understood from this statement that he was either a company-promoter or the manager of a philanthropic undertaking. On the contrary, he was as honest a man of business as you would find in London, and he earned his living by discovering and introducing new attractions in the shape of "Wonders," "Phenomena," and so forth. Mlle. Claire protested that he was too much behind the scenes; but, on being pressed, she consented to try, and asked Mr. Tappenheim to name his spirit.

ANOTHER RICH DISCOVERY

Koyukuk Again to the Front With a Valuable Strike.

Oscar Johnson Pans Out \$150 in a Few Hours From a Hole Two and One Half Feet Deep.

Details of another rich discovery having been made in the Koyukuk late last fall by a man named Oscar Johnson were received on the mail Thursday last. The news came in a letter addressed to Mr. C. L. Peabody, from Robert Colling, who lived in Dawson for nearly two years, the letter being under date of December 10. Johnson panned out \$150 in a few hours from a hole two feet and a half deep and five by six in size, and is highly elated with his discovery. The writer of the letter neglected to give the name of the creek upon which the find was made and that is still to be ascertained. Mr. Colling's letter in substance is as follows:

"As regards this district, it is still being boomed, and got without cause. I have always believed there is lots of gold here, but as I have said before prospecting on account of the difficulty of getting in here and have been getting taken out of all sizes up to over \$600, but the best thing I know of was struck by a man named Oscar Johnson, who took out \$150 after it began to freeze up. He had worked for wages (\$8 per day and board) all summer for Mr. McNamer. After the weather became too cold to do any more sluicing Johnson went out and staked a claim on another creek. He sank a hole two feet and a half and as he struck bedrock at that depth he began panning. In a short time he had panned out over \$100 and as his hands then became so cold he could scarcely hold the pan he took a little stick something like a lead pencil and dug out about \$50 more. This was in size and is not hearsay, for I saw the gold myself and am well acquainted with Johnson and his partners, they having worked alongside of me on the McNamer claim."

Mr. Colling refers in his letter to the departure of Mr. J. F. Powers, who arrived in the city Thursday evening, speaks of him in the highest terms of approbation, saying that his reputation in the Koyukuk for truthfulness and veracity is the very best, and refers Mr. Peabody to Mr. Powers should he desire confirmation of the contents of his letter. He also speaks of Harry Hamburger, who is disposing of the cargo of the Gold Star and says his stock is now at most sold out and he will return soon to Dawson. Continuing Mr. Colling says:

"The benches here have never been prospected at all until this winter and there is but very little of that going on even now. The prospecting in general, however, is more extensive this season than ever before and for two reasons, first, because there has been but very little snow and second on account of the weather having been so mild. The coldest it has been that I know of was 34 below. In conclusion, I do not wish to be the means of exciting you through this letter, for I am one of many who have made a failure this season. If you are doing reasonably well where you are I would not advise you to make a change."

Mr. Colling makes further reference to the building going on in Coldfoot this winter. Several large cabins, one of them 25x50 in size, are being put up for business purposes, and at the time he wrote it was thought one of them would be finished in time to be dedicated by an elaborate Christmas dance. The people of the Koyukuk are anticipating a large influx from Dawson this winter and on the first boats in the spring.

NOT ACCEPTABLE

New York, Dec. 17.—A dispatch to the Herald from Bogota, Colombia, says:

"Senor Herboles, the Chilian minister, has cabled to President Castro, of Venezuela, that he had hoped that once mediation had been accepted and the opportunity arriving, each republic, Venezuela and Colombia, would submit its grievances and claim of right of indemnity, strengthening its demands by documents and proofs and accepting without reserve the decision of the mediator."

"I regret to have to communicate" the Chilian minister adds, "that the Colombian government considers that the conditions submitted by you cannot be accepted by Colombia. I regret in the name of the Chilian government and myself, my inability to re-establish harmony between the sister republics."

A Novel Savings Bank. The local authorities of the town of Mezieres, in the Ardennes (France), as an encouragement to thrift have hit upon the brilliant plan of instituting what they are pleased to call an "automobile savings bank." This vehicle, a new sort of electric motor-car, will travel around the country, making stoppages of an hour or so on pre-arranged days in the different localities of the department. It will be manned by two clerks of the local treasury administration and a cashier carrying a complete set of savings bank books, registers, and forms. The bank is thus to go to the people instead of the people coming to the bank.

Against Anarchy. Washington, Dec. 18.—Chairman Ray, of the house committee on judiciary, today introduced an anti-anarchy measure which probably will be the basis of legislation on that subject in the house. The measure provides that death be the penalty for assaults on the President or other executive officers. It is made a felony to advise or teach the overthrow of the government or any interference with government officials. The death penalty also is provided for conspiracies in this country leading to the killing of a foreign King, Emperor, President or other ruler.

SUDDEN WEALTH

Frequently Acquired Under Some Peculiar Circumstances.

In these days of wild gambling on the stock exchange it is quite common to hear of lucky speculators clearing thousands in a day. But the romance of the stock exchange is a sordid thing compared with the extraordinary accidents which every now and then turn a pauper into a millionaire as if by the wave of a magic wand.

Take, for instance, the case of a Manchester cotton spinner who had worked hard for years for 30s. a week. He had the misfortune one day in 1837 to be accidentally poisoned with acetic acid. He took, it appears, enough to kill three ordinary men, yet did not die, and so remarkably was the case considered that a well-known doctor wrote to a London paper on the subject. The letter was copied into an Australian journal, and there seen by the cotton spinner's brother, who had emigrated when young, made money, and quite lost sight of the rest of his family. He came back to England, looked up his brother, and when he died last year left him £18,000.

Here is another instance of what at first appeared a disaster resulting in money and fame. Henry George, the writer of "Progress and Poverty," was sent to Ireland during the Fenian agitation as special correspondent of a New York paper. At that time George was an unknown man, and his book equally so, although it had been published for several years. Hardly had the correspondent landed before he was arrested at Loughrea as a suspect and lodged in jail.

He was released next day, but not before his name was in all the papers. Without delay he brought out a new cheap edition of "Progress and Poverty" in London. The "Times" gave a whole page to it, and the entire edition went off in twenty-four hours. Its author cleared thousands, and became the most talked of man of the year.

A mouse hunt brought fortune to a Parisian market woman named Jaques. She espied the tiny creature under the grate in her lodgings, but when she tried to catch it it disappeared in a crack of the brickwork. She pulled away a loose brick, when suddenly out tumbled a bundle of dusty papers. They proved to be bank notes to the value of £1,600. By French law she may claim the whole amount in a year's time if no one else can prove a title. Seeing that the notes are many years old it is very improbable that anyone will ever make a claim.

Sometimes it is a dead hand that dowers a pauper with unexpected millions. Henry Hawthorne was in 1854 a boy of eighteen. He was bathing in the sea near a Kentish village when he saw a small sailing boat nearly a mile out suddenly upset. Flung on his clothes, he jumped into his boat which was pulled up on the beach, launched it, and went to the rescue. A woman was still clinging to the capsized craft. He pulled her in and saved her life.

Afterwards he fell in love with her and asked her to marry him. She was a widow, but she refused, saying she had promised her dead husband never to marry again. But she begged Hawthorne to accept a portion of her income, as she said, she had more money than she could spend. Hawthorne refused to marry her, and enlisted in the U. S. Army.

He served in the Civil War in 1864, was mustered out, and has for some years been an inmate of a soldiers' home. A few months ago he received word that the lady he had saved nearly forty-seven years before was dead, and had left him owner of nearly £20,000 a year, including estates in France, the West Indies, England and Australia.

Mines have given many men sudden fortunes, but only as a rule after long years of toil. Few have the luck of George Cormican, an Irish teamster, who went to America some three years ago, and got work on a cattle ranch in Montana. He was coming across the plains with his wagon one day last autumn when he stopped to give his tired mules a few minutes' rest.

Suddenly he noticed a badger disappear into a hollow under a bank near the road. He ran across to try to catch the creature, but it was beyond his reach. Then he noticed some blue stones lying at the mouth of the hole. He picked a few up and took them home. They proved to be blue sapphires, equal to the very finest Oriental stones. Cormican's chance find made him a rich man already, and he will probably be a millionaire within a very few years.

Almost equally startling was the rise of Maximilian Darun, twenty years ago a clerk in the City of Mexico on £150 a year. He saved a little from his salary and went into business as a money lender. Taking over a supposedly worthless mine for a bad debt, he tested the workings, and discovered the great El Promontario silver lode, which now gives him the comfortable income of £120,000 a year.—Tit-Bits.
