## Board of Trade Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade was held on Tuesday evening, and was well attended. Interest in this organization was to be seen in the increase, and this year.

After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting President Chambers his annual report. This was a comprehensive and interesting review of the work of the past year was well received. The address appeared in full in our next issue, and should be carefully perused by all our citizens.

The report of the secretary-treasurer was then presented, showing the finances of the Board to be in a healthy state, and that the books of the Board had been carefully and correctly kept.

The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows:— President—J. E. Hales.

Vice-president—R. E. Harris. Sec. Treas.—W. M. Black. Auditors—G. W. Munro, R. Creighton.

Council—R. W. Duncan, W. T. Ford, C. R. H. Starr, Dr. DeWitt, W. T. Stephens, C. H. Borden, J. F. Herbin, F. J. Porter.

Mr. R. W. Starr brought up the matter of the proposed abattoir across the Cornwallis river, and spoke very strongly in favor of this project.

Mr. I. B. Oakes was called upon as chairman of the committee having the matter in charge, and stated what steps had been taken. A survey had been held by a government engineer, whose report would be soon made to the government.

A somewhat animated discussion followed in which a number of members took part, after which the following were appointed a committee to further the interests of the project: F. J. Porter, I. B. Oakes, J. F. Herbin, W. T. Ford, and R. E. Harris.

Mr. Black suggested the need of a young men's club being formed in the town, under the direction of the Board of Trade, and a committee, composed of R. W. Black, R. E. Harris and R. W. Starr was appointed to consider the matter and report at next meeting of the Board.

## Intercollegiate Hockey.

Next Thursday (Jan. 24th) the Mt. Allison hockey team comes to Wolfville to cross sticks with the Acadia boys. This is the second game of the Intercollegiate series and will be the big game of the season for Wolfville. Mt. Allison is reported to have a strong team and they are practising hard in preparation for the coming game. Acadia in turn has the best team she has had for years, and will be in good condition to meet her old rival next Thursday.

The Intercollegiate Hockey League was formed over a year ago. The Hewson Woolen Mills, of Amherst, offered a handsome trophy, which was to be competed for each year by the Maritime Colleges. Last season four colleges composed the League: Mt. Allison, U. N. B., St. Francis Xavier and Dalhousie, and the trophy was won by St. F. X.

This year Acadia entered the League and U. N. B. dropped out. The executive committee, composed of one member from each of the colleges planning to enter the league, met at Truro during the Christmas holidays and drew up the schedule of games. The colleges were divided into two divisions, Mt. Allison and Acadia in one and Dalhousie and St. F. X. in the other. The two colleges in a division play two matches, thus having each one home game and one trip. In case each team wins a game, that team having the greatest number of goals to its credit will be considered the winner. The winners of each division then play off for the Intercollegiate Championship. This league will, no doubt, do a lot for intercollegiate hockey and this year the games promise to be most exciting and closely contested, as the teams will probably be pretty evenly matched.

## Municipal Council.

Continued from first page.

Bill of D. C. Crosby, Esq., with report of convictions, read: Fines collected, \$27.00. Costs paid, 34.45.

Amount claimed, \$7.45. On motion of Coun. Halsey the bill was referred back to Mr. Crosby to be itemized; it was claimed that expenses of prosecutions under Summary Convictions Act were not chargeable to the County.

Mr. L. O. Neely, Overseer of Poor for Aylesford, was heard in reference to the case of a pauper in that township. The father of the young man resides in Annapolis County and is worth several thousand dollars. He refuses to support his son or be responsible for his maintenance. After some discussion it was resolved that the Council take no action, it being considered that any suit should be initiated by the Poor District of Aylesford.

Petition of E. L. Collins was read setting forth that for twenty years he has had free right of way to a dyke lot through lands of J. J. Elderkin (now deceased); that Mr. Elderkin's executor now forbids him the use of said right of way, and asking that Council take action to secure him the necessary access to his property.

On motion of Coun. Halsey it was resolved that Committee on Roads and Bridges be authorized to look into the matter and, if possible, effect an amicable arrangement between the parties, and to report fully at April Term.

Committee on Roads and Bridges reported in favor of a road from point opposite Kingston Station due north to Middle Road, so called. The report was approved and H. J. Neely appointed Commissioner.

Coun. Woodbury presented petition from residents of Polling District No. 21, asking that a polling booth for municipal elections be established at Kingston.

On motion the prayer of petition was granted.

Coun. Parker moved that two polling booths be established in Ward 13, one at Cambridge, Dist. 25, and one at Berwick, Dist. 26, instead of but one at Waterville, as at present.

The motion carried, whereupon Coun. Kinsman moved the establishment of two booths in Ward 3; the representatives of Ward 3 began to urge the claims of their constituents to increased conveniences for polling their votes at municipal elections, and the Council promptly deferred further action in this line to April Term.

A report of Supervisors of Public Grounds in Horton road in Alton—near Chester Road up Ward Mountain—was read; Mr. George Ward was heard in reference to the matter; Coun. Patterson said the road was where it had always been; and the report was adopted.

The report of the Board of Revision and Appeal confirming assessment as made by assessors, was read and adopted.

The matter of joining the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities was then taken up; Councillors Parker and Griffin reported concerning their attendance at the meeting held in Halifax in August, at which this Union was organized, and respectively moved and seconded that this Municipality become a member; paying the fee of ten dollars.

Coun. Morse reported in regard to his attendance at the meeting of the Canadian Municipal Reform Association, out of which the Union grew.

Coun. Covert considered the Union an addition of unnecessary machinery. The representatives of the County in the Legislature are responsible for the protection of the interests of the Municipalities.

The motion carried.

A motion also passed instructing the Clerk to subscribe for one copy of The Canadian Municipal Journal for his office.

## COUNCIL ADJOURNED.

SECOND DAY. Council met at 10 a. m. on Wednesday, January 9th. All present except Coun. Reid.

On motion T. W. Kneeland was granted permission to erect poles along highway from White Rock for the purpose of transmitting electric light and power to the towns of the Valley. Such poles to be erected under the supervision of the Council, and the future operation of the enterprise to be subject to the control of the Council.

It was resolved that the municipal assessment for school purposes be thirty-five cents per head of the population, as last year.

The report of Committee on Public Property in reference to jail was taken up, and it was resolved that a committee be appointed to prepare plans, specifications, etc., for a new jail, select suitable sites, and report at April Term.

Councillors Morse, Anderson and Woodbury were named as the committee.

Moved by Coun. Hamilton, seconded by Coun. Griffin, that no telephone poles shall hereafter be erected within the bounds of the public roads or streets in this Municipality. Lost.

The Warden spoke in reference to the matter of regulation of travel by motor car or automobile, and introduced Mayor Black, of Wolfville, who addressed the Council upon that subject, urging the adoption of a provincial law based on that in operation in New Brunswick.

On motion of Coun. Parker seconded by Coun. Hamilton, it was resolved that this Council make representations to the provincial government, showing the need of laws to regulate automobile travel, and that Mayor Black be asked to make such representations on behalf of this Council.

The question of the adoption of the Halifax Road Act was deferred to April Term.

The appointment of Town Officers was then taken up; Auditors, Standing Committees, Health Officer, Trustees School Lands, Overseers of Poor and their clerks, etc., being reappointed. Mr. D. C. Crosby was named Clerk of License in place of the late Mr. A. F. Chipman.

**APPOINTMENT SESSIONS.**  
Council met at 2 p. m. All present except Coun. Reid.

The usual resolution permitting the treasurer to borrow a sum not to exceed \$5000, if necessary, was passed.

A resolution setting forth that the Registry of Deeds had for some years been filled by a deputy; that a considerable sum might be saved to the county if the office were under the control of the Council, and proposing that the legislature be urged to enact such legislation as will give Council control of Registry Office and the appointment of Registrar, was moved and lost, four Councillors voting in favor.

The report of Finance Committee was read: It recommended that the accounts of Scott Act Inspector be accepted subject to full itemization, correction of mistakes, and approval. Adopted.

On motion of Coun. Campbell Ira L. Cox was reappointed Scott Act Inspector at salary of \$300.

The Finance Committee further reported a presentation of \$18,009.31. Deducting \$809.31, estimated receipts from Wolfville and Kentville on joint revenue account, and \$2000 on account of surplus in treasury and unpaid orders, the assessment asked for this year would be \$14,000.

The report was adopted.

A bill of W. K. Rathbone, \$2.00, was ordered paid.

A bill of Dr. E. P. Bowles for attendance upon a case of diphtheria was received, and after earnest discussion was referred to the Finance Committee and a resolution was passed that if the bill be approved by that committee, it be paid and the amount added to the presentation for this year.

Resolved that the new road around Lockhart Hill be added to Dist. 8, Ward 6.

It was resolved that the offer of \$3000 for old Court house and lot be accepted.

A resolution that the action of Council at January Term, 1906, placing proposed bridge over river between Wolfville and Town Plot under Bridge Act, and in guaranteeing the Provincial Government against any damages that may be claimed by Fred Clark arising from the construction of bridge at Canning, be rescinded, was declared out of order.

A resolution was passed that representatives of county in local legislature be asked to use their influence to prevent the cost of erection of bridge first referred to being a charge upon the road and bridge grant of the county.

Moved by Coun. Kinsman, seconded by Coun. Parker, that W. P. Shaff be appointed Registrar.
