Two large schooners have just finished taking in cargoes of pulp wood at Harvey Bank, Graves & Foster shippers.

Hon. Mr. Turner's shipyard will soon be lively again as "Bos" Dow and others are getting the moulds for the new vessel completed. The timber for keel and frame is about ready to come down the A. S. Railway from West River.

Haying is progressing as rapidly as the weather will permit. The crop on the farm is better than it has been for several years.

Elgin Notes.

An occurrence of more than ordinary interest took place here in the mills of Com. E. A. Blackey on Saturday last. Hamilton McManus, who pretends to have a claim on these mills, arising out of a law suit with Joseph Blackey some two or three years ago, broke the lock of the grain mill on Friday night, entered and took possession. During the night he put every thing out of the mill that he considered belonged to E. A. Blackey and on Saturday morning asserted his claim to what was not easily movable.

During Saturday, Blackey was advised by his lawyer to remove McManus either by law or otherwise. He, accordingly, in the evening, mustered his forces, between fifty and one hundred men, entered the mill and quietly laid him down outside. Since then Blackey has held possession. It is said that McManus cut a large bolt that cost over \$60 and destroyed other property belonging to Blackey. It is now supposed that further litigation will follow.

Rev. A. H. Lavers preached his farewell sermon here last Sunday evening. He has made many friends during the year he has been in charge of the Baptist churches in this Parish and his departure is universally regretted.
