"Although Hon. Mr. Stratton has een the chief electioneering member of the cabinet, we cannot quite know bow far his colleagues are responsible for his methods. But this much is clear, 'the Government was determin ed to hold power at any price and the incriminated Minister must have felt that so long as his proceedings were concealed from the people, and his methods politically successful, he was safe from serious remonstrance It is inconceivable that he would have dared to do this work if he had felt that the atmosphere in which he moved was hostile to his proceedings. We may fairly conclude that it the exposure could have been avoided the whole Liberal organization would have been willing to profit by Stratton's discreditable operations.'

"It is significant to find that some of the men who came into unenviable Vaterloo appear in this transaction. The Government which retains such political instruments in its service cannot hope to be taken seriously when it protests its zeal for honest elections. It is hard to reach any other conclusion than that those men were on the permanent staff of the political department and were special igents of the Ministers in the constiuencies. They must have drawn heir money from a campaign chest and acted under instructions from responsible agents and advisers of the Povernment.
