## The Evening Chit-Chat

When a certain kind of white grapes were served at our breakfast table the other day and some one refused them, another member of the family looked at him in astonishment. "Why don't you eat them?" he queried. "Why, those are the best kind of grapes there are." "Do you know, I think that remark was typical of a wrong attitude very many of us hold toward other things besides grapes. What he meant was 'I CONSIDER those grapes the best grapes there are,' or 'Those are the grapes I LIKE the best.' The mistaken attitude toward life is this—we forget to realize how very much personal equation there is in our judgments and definitions. We attempt to make our standards the standards of every one. We try to foist our "best" and "worst" upon other people as their "best" and "worst," and can't understand it when they refuse to accept our point of view. A learned English Judge recently promulgated his idea of the fourteen commonest mistakes in life. Three of them—I believe I have quoted them before, but I think they are worth innumerable quotations—were:

Ruth Cameron

"To try to measure the enjoyment of others by our own."  
"To expect uniformity of opinion in this world."  
"To endeavor to mold the opinions of everybody alike."  
Evidently he had met many people who left out the "I consider."  
There are people who say there is no such thing as absolute good and bad. "Goodness" and "badness," they say, are fluctuating quantities depending entirely upon environment, bringing up, habit, point of view, etc. What is bad in one person, may be good in another person and what is good in one may be merely natural in another.  
I can't quite see it as strongly as that. It seems to me that there are some few things which are always bad and some which are always good. Selfishness and its manifestations, for instance, are always bad.  
But I do think that in all definition, in all judgment there is a tremendous personal equation, and that those who attempt to speak or think without reckoning with it are making one of the most foolish of all the fourteen—being the judge's pardon, seems to me the fourteen hundred times fourteen—common mistakes in life.  
When you have learned to say and think and feel "I consider these the best grapes," instead of "These are the best grapes," then you have learned one of the big lessons of life.

## Household Notes.

When pressing a skirt, it is always advisable to lay a damp cotton cloth over the material so that it is not touched by the iron. This prevents the material from becoming shiny.

If the house is infested with ants, dip a sponge into sweetened water and lay it where they can get at it. They will soon cluster upon it, and the sponge can then be dropped in hot water.

The label on a glass jar will keep clean and will stick much longer if pasted on the inside. Of course, this applies only where dry materials are stored in the jar, such as seeds, rice, tapioca, etc.

Cookies put into an earthen jar, lined with a clean cloth, while they are still hot, and kept covered close, will be much more melting and crumbly than if they are allowed to cool in the air.

If a gas stove is not equipped with a broiler, try heating a pan piping hot. Put the steak into this without greasing and turn as soon as it is seared on the bottom. Keep turning till the meat is done.

A mixture of finely powdered fuller's earth and alum is excellent for cleaning white gloves. It should be rubbed in well, then brushed off, and the gloves sprinkled with dry bran and whitened.

To clean a burned kettle, turn out the burned contents, but do not fill with water. Set it aside to cool, and then place in a handful of washing soda and water and let the solution boil for an hour or more.

Patent leather shoes should be carefully wiped off with a soft cloth when they are removed and then a few drops of olive oil should be rubbed in to them. This will keep the leather soft and prevent them cracking.

When the knob of a teakettle cover, coffee pot or kettle lid falls off, many a burn can be prevented by using as a substitute a medium-sized cork, held in place by a slender screw driven from the under side of the lid.

To remove an iron rust stain, hold the fabric over a teakettle of boiling water and press a cut lemon over the spot. Remove the fabric occasionally to allow evaporation, and the spot will disappear before your eyes.

The most practical use for old corks is to make a low fire burn up. Empty spoons also make good kindling and if these things are saved it will be surprising how many will accumulate in the average household.

An excellent way to work the edges of dollies or centrepieces before hitching them is to tuck the chain stitch in rather coarse cotton. The depth of the scallop is a determining factor as to the size of the thread to use.

Muslin sash curtains are sometimes torn by fastening a rod to their hems. This accident is easily prevented. Put a thimble on one end of the rod and pass it through the hem. With its end thus pointed, it will slide through easily.

To turn the hems of table linen easily and accurately, remove the needle from your sewing machine, adjust the hammer to the desired length, and pass the goods through. They are then ready for hemming by hand.

### FISHERY DISPUTE.

#### Interview With the Premier

As the reference of the Fishery issue to the Hague Tribunal, and its outcome the determination of the compatibility of the Newfoundland fishery laws and regulations with the Convention are now national questions and not party issues, this morning we asked the Premier for an interview on the Washington Conference, from which he returned yesterday. Sir Edward kindly accorded it and explained that the business actually finalized related to the procedure to settle present and future disputes.

It was determined that both present and future difficulties should be settled, if possible, by diplomacy. If this course failed, then a reference should be made to the Permanent Fishery Commission provided under the Award of last September. As regards the objections to the fishery laws and regulations by the United States, and its settlement of this was a matter for the future. Whereas there was only three important issues raised by America against Canadian rules, there were many more raised against those of Newfoundland. There was, however, a disposition shown by America to come to terms. But no settlement as to the American objections had been arranged as yet, though he expected something might be done within the next few months.

The fact that America had given way to Canada on the question of purse seine fishing and Sunday fishing were points that would tell in favour of Newfoundland; but it did not follow that the Americans would be so complaisant with Newfoundland as with Canada. With the latter there was no fishery dispute. With Newfoundland there was, and America may hold out against us on these points for terms.

We thanked the Premier for the interview he had accorded us and withdrew.

#### SOME REFLECTIONS ON THE SITUATION.

Yesterday we expressed an opinion that it would be better to let America take the Hague than to give way on purse, seine, etc. To-day we are more strongly confirmed than ever in the opinion we expressed yesterday. Better still, wait and see if Canada fails in the reciprocity negotiations; and if she does, let these questions be merged in the general and larger question of Free Trade for Free Entry and a general reciprocity scheme.

So said we yesterday. So say we to-day. We have had a hard fight over this Fishery Question. We won a brilliant victory at the Hague. We must see that we get the full fruits of that victory. And we believe we shall.

We believe America is not concerned one bit about our fishery laws and regulations except as grounds on which to raise objections to obtain free bait in summer and herring in winter. These are her objectives. We want to give them to her on terms. If we show a disposition to give them only for a proper consideration, meanwhile holding our own, as the Hague Tribunal has defined it, we shall win out, even though we have

to fight alone and although Canada has come to terms and got out. Newfoundland has shown before to-day she can paddle her own canoe. Newfoundland is not anxious to fight it out; she is wishful to get to business on equitable terms, i.e., on the basis of "her own," as the Hague Tribunal determined it.

### Canada Goes It Alone.

Special Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, Noon. An official statement of the result of the fishery negotiations at Washington was made in the House of Commons, by Aylesworth, the Minister of Justice. It appears that the United States and Newfoundland were so far apart in their contentions that an understanding could not easily be reached, therefore with the consent of Newfoundland, the Conference arranged for a discussion of the differences between Canada and the United States.

The States objected to the Canadian regulations prohibiting the use of a purse seine, the prohibition of Sunday fishing, and to American fishermen being required to take out Canadian licenses, and to Canadian officials boarding American fishing vessels, if infractions of regulations was suspected. Sir Alan said there had been little difficulty in convincing the representatives of the States that there was nothing unduly burdensome in the provision for boarding suspected vessels, or in the prohibition against Sunday fishing, etc. There was more difficulty about the licensing provision.

### Robbery in West End.

A daring robbery was committed in broad daylight opposite Brennan's building, corner of George Street and Prince's Street, this morning. Mr. Thomas Whitten came in from Petty Harbor this morning to buy flour and other groceries. Knowing that the day would turn out wet he brought with him a large boat's sail to cover the groceries on the slide going home to Petty Harbor, and thereby keep his goods from getting spoiled with the rain. He left his horse and slide near Miorone's store (Brennan building) George St., and went down to Water Street to complete his purchases. While he was absent a sneak thief stole the sail of the slide and made off with it. The police have been informed and Whitten has given them a good clue to work on.

### PLATE GLASS DEMOLISHED.

A gust of wind hit the grocery store department of the Royal Stores and blew out a large plate glass window which in splintered on the sidewalk. It was worth about \$60, and had anyone been passing they would have been badly cut by the flying glass.

### NARROWLY ESCAPED DEATH.

While the fire was on this forenoon, just as Chief Treble had left a ladder running to the roof of the Vintcombe building, it was blown down by a fierce gust of wind. As it fell a boy was passing near and had to run to get clear of the falling object. He had such a close call for his life that the top of the ladder hit him in the foot. Had he been a few feet to the rear he would have been brained.

### Royal Bank in Very Strong Position

Annual Statement Shows Large Increases in Amount of Assets in Specie and Dominion Government Notes. Year Showed Record Earnings.

Even at a time when a number of banks are placing their annual statements before the public, that of the Royal Bank of Canada will attract particular attention, because of the large transactions with which the Bank has been identified during the course of the past year. The most important of the latter was perhaps the absorption by the Royal of the Union Bank of Halifax, as this deal contributed, to quite a large extent, to the phenomenal increases shown in the statement as of December 31st, in the aggregate assets, as well as in the total deposits and increases in both paid up capital and reserve fund.

The fact, however, that the consolidation was only effected on November 1st, leaving only two months of the year for the operation of the Joint institution, indicates that practically the whole of the record net profits shown for the year were obtained for the operation of the Royal Bank itself.

The net profits of the year ending December 31st, 1910, reached the total of \$961,286.99, equal to 18.29 p.c. on the average paid up capital for the year of \$5,200,000. These earnings compared with \$338,306.51 show an increase of \$622,980.48. Against \$4,992,532.25 at the end of 1909, showing an increase for the both accounts of approximately \$4,118,000.00.

As indicating the very important position the Royal Bank of Canada now holds among the leading banks of the country, its aggregate assets now stand at \$92,510,346.95 as against \$67,051,102.62 at the end of the previous year. Of this amount \$52,471,208.98 are represented in current loans and discounts against \$33,644,706.10 at the end of the previous year. This big increase in current loans has been rendered possible by the growth of deposits, these now totalling \$72,097,667.27, as against \$50,823,129.31 at the end of the previous year. Of this amount deposits bearing interest amount to \$51,709,181.96 as against \$33,356,828.85 at the end of the previous year, while deposits not bearing interest amount to \$19,757,130.49 against \$17,955,930.07 at the end of 1909. An issue of new stock made during the course of the year was responsible for a big increase both in the paid up capital and in the reserve fund, the capital now standing at \$6,200,000.00 against \$5,000,000 at the end of 1909. The average paid up capital during the year, however, was only \$5,200,000.00. The reserve fund made a big advance from \$5,700,000.00 to \$7,000,000.00, the sum of \$1,300,000.00 of this increase being from premium on new stock, and \$100,000.00 being transferred from profit and loss account.

A pretty wedding was solemnized at St. Patrick's Church, Wednesday evening, when Mr. Joseph Williams, of Bay Bulls, led to the altar Miss Maillanda Swain. Rev. Fr. McDermott tied the nuptial knot. Constable John Nugent, of the West End, brother-in-law of the bride, gave her away, and his daughter, little Annie Nugent, acted as flower girl. After the ceremony a number of the friends of the happy pair drove to the Osborne Hotel where a reception was held and a very pleasant time was spent. Amongst the many valuable presents which the bride received was a purse containing \$80 in gold from Hon. Jas. McLaughlin. The bride and groom leave for their future home at Bay Bulls tomorrow. The Telegram extends its congratulations.

**How We Lose Coal.**  
"Considering the question of coal saving, by-product recovery, and labour saving, it is evident that the only way of obtaining material improvement under these heads is to concentrate the process of transformation of the coal and to carry out this process at the smallest reasonable number of centres.

It is in the process of transformation of coal into work in the form of heat and power that the great loss occurs, as this is always a most difficult process and requires the highest scientific and practical skill to carry out with even very moderate economy. "It has been proposed, with a view to accomplishing the above ends, to treat coal at central stations and turn it into gas and distribute the energy in this form, but this process only goes a small way towards a solution of the problem, as under it combustion—which is such a difficult problem—would be taking place at numerous points over the whole country, all tending to inefficiency, and the conversion of the gas into power is by no means easy, involving running machinery of the reciprocating class, requiring special and skilled attendance.

**Convert Coal into Heat and Power.**  
"It appears that with a problem such as we are discussing it is fundamental that the energy of the coal should be converted at a few centres as possible into a form in which it is most generally applicable to all purposes without exception, and in which it is most easily applied to all our wants, and is, at the same time, in a

form in which it is most difficult to waste or use improperly.

"We are therefore forced to the conclusion that the only complete and final solution of the question is to be obtained by the conversion of the whole of the coal which we use for heat and power into electricity, and the recovery of its by-products at a comparatively small number of great electricity producing stations. All our wants in the way of light, power, heat, and chemical action would then be met by a supply of electricity distributed all over the country.

**Conversation at the Pit's Mouth.**  
"It must, however, be remembered that the distribution of energy in the form of electricity instead of coal can only be effectively carried out when it can be done in such a way that it is available for all purposes for which coal is now used, and this can only be the case when the conversion is effected at such an efficiency as will cause the electric energy delivered to represent a high percentage of the energy in the coal. Failing this no scheme for conversion at the pit's mouth and delivery of energy in the form of electricity is sound. There is also another controlling factor which must be satisfied in order to make this scheme possible. Both the conversion of the coal into electricity and the distribution of the current must be effected at a low capital cost so as not to overburden the undertaking with capital charges.

**To Save 90 Million Tons of Coal.**  
"According to the Report of the Royal Commission of Coal, 167 million tons of coal were being used in the country in 1903. Of this amount 2 million tons went to coasting steamers and 15 million tons were used by the gas companies. In order to simplify matters, and make the figures clear, I have left out of consideration the coal used on these two items, and taken the balance—viz., 150 million tons—as the annual coal consumption of the country. If now, instead of using this coal for doing work as at present, we were to convert it into electricity, we should use, instead of 150 million tons, 60 million tons of coal a year. This coal, turned into electricity, would produce 131,400 million Board Trade units, and the electricity so produced would, after allowing for losses of transmission and conversion into work of different kinds, be sufficient, to supply the whole of our requirements now being satisfied by the use of the 150 million tons of coal which we now burn.

**Cost of the Scheme.**  
"The total cost of the scheme, including all expenses up to the point of delivering the electric supply to the consumer, would be 550 millions sterling. This, of course, is a very large figure, but, considered in relation to other industries and the results to be accomplished, cannot be considered excessive.

"It has been estimated that the capital now invested in this country in electrical undertakings amounts to some 400 millions sterling. Last year the electric supply business had invested in it some 58 millions sterling. The proposed scheme would therefore absorb from eight to nine times the amount of capital now invested in the portion of electric supply undertakings for which figures are available. The units generated upon the all-electric method of working would, however, be some 150 times as great as those generated by the above undertakings, and the cost of production and sale price of current would, of course, be very much lower than at present.
