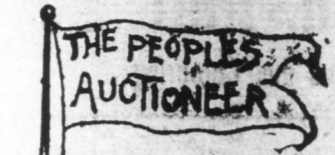

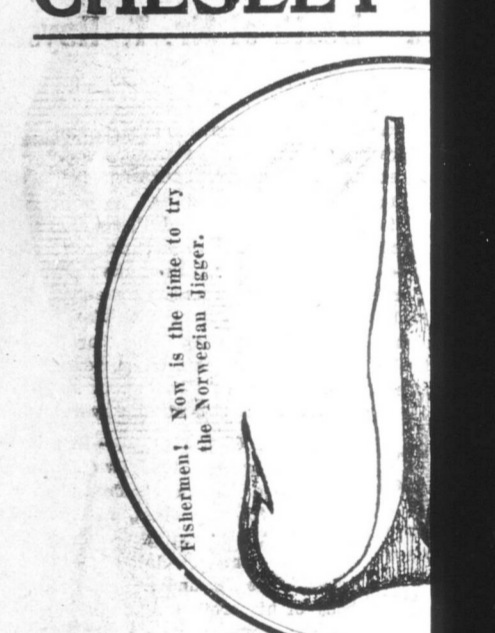

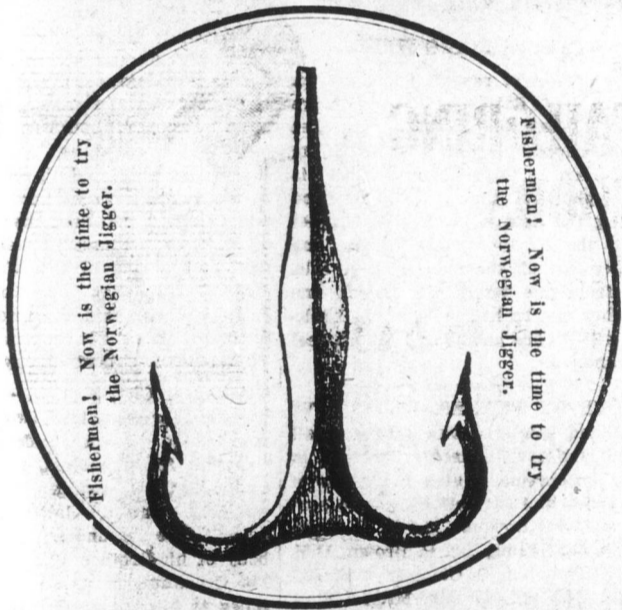

GLEVER SCHEME OF SMUGGLING DISCOVERED.

Man and Woman Arrested at New York and Gems Valued at \$50,000 Seized.

New York, Sept. 25.—A rubber stocking and a petticoat with twenty-five pockets in it are the means by which Rudolph Newman, a Chicago jeweler, and his wife are alleged to have tried to smuggle diamonds and other precious stones and jewellery into this country to-day. The couple arrived on the steamer New Amsterdam of the Holland-American Line accompanied by two small children. Newman when arraigned furnished \$2,000 bail, while Mrs. Newman was paroled on her own recognizance on account of her two children, who needed her care.

There has not been such a flagrant case of alleged smuggling reported at the Custom House in months past, in fact, since the rigid system adopted by Collector Loeb went into effect. In the rubber stocking which Newman wore tied about the lower portion of his body, the customs officials found a quantity of uncut diamonds valued at \$1,500, while the pockets of his wife's petticoat contained numerous packages of small jewellery, including a number of garnets and other stones said to be worth about \$50,000.

All the jewels were seized. Had it not been for the fact that Newman was under suspicion because of his frequent trips to Europe, the jewels would have probably remained undetected, the officials said, so artfully were they concealed.

A Curious Contrast.

The state of affairs in Tripoli today appears to afford a curious contrast to what took place some thirty years ago in Egypt. Egypt and Tripoli are the two Turkish possessions in Africa. They adjoin and both border the Mediterranean Sea. In the early eighties Britain determined to intervene in Egypt. Admiral Seymour bombarded Alexandria. Lord Beresford bounded into fame by his daring, and the signal "Well done, Condon!" is remembered to Beresford's credit to-day. The forts at Alexandria were destroyed and Arabi Pasha smashed at Tel el Kebir by Lord Wolsey. In this manner was begun the British occupation of the Turkish possession, Egypt, and has lasted some thirty years. The demolition of forts, the crushing of an army with the attendant bloodshed of the combatants and the resultant occupation of the territory did no constitute war. At least so the British Premier, Mr. Gladstone, the Grand Old Man of those days, assured the House of Commons while these naval and military manoeuvres were going on, in his famous declaration that a state of war did not exist. What a remarkable contrast is afforded by the intervention of Italy in Tripoli, the other Turkish possession in Africa. War was declared by Italy on Friday afternoon, and to the time of writing we have heard of no bombardment, no landing of troops, no battles, no bloodshed, and it is said that Turkey will offer no forcible resistance to the occupation of Tripoli by Italy, and yet a state of war does exist, while thirty years ago, under the circumstances we have related it did not exist in Egypt. Truly war affords strange contrasts. Sometimes we have all the violence of war without the state of war; sometimes we have an act of violence, like the sinking of Russian warships by the Japanese, preceding any formal declaration of war, and now we have a declaration followed by a war in an apparent state of suspended animation. Of course there is reason for this remarkable state of affairs, if we can only find it, and about it we venture to offer a suggestion. Italy has commanded the sea. Turkey cannot strike Italy. Italy desires political and commercial predominance in Tripoli, just as Britain has it in Egypt, but she wants to gain it if possible by a landless war, and she has settled her plan of campaign to attain this end. Cutting short diplomatic negotiations, she declared war so that she could prevent Turkey landing any army corps to defend Tripoli, which is now at her mercy, and will remain at her mercy so long as she retains command of the sea, which Turkey has not the force to wrest from her. Turkey with her powerful army and powerless fleet is helpless, and so she can rely only on the goodwill of the Powers; but Italy is virtually in possession of what she wants without striking a blow in Tripoli, and it is unlikely she will consent to be dislodged from the disadvantages of her position without attaining her end. The intelligence which has come to

hand since writing the two paragraphs which precede this, does not affect the trend of the suggested explanation of the cause of seeming inactivity at Tripoli. Whether the Turkish fleet is destroyed or bottled up in the Dardanelles, it leaves the command of the sea to Italy, and maintains Italy on top.

Fast Express Crashed Into Merry-makers.

Neenah, Wis., Sept. 24.—Thirteen persons are dead, three others are dying, and five are seriously hurt as the result of a fast train on the Chicago and North Western Railway to-day crashing into a hay rack on which a party of thirty-one merry-makers were returning from a celebration.

A big bill board beside the railway tracks obscured the view from the locomotive as well as from the wagon. Dust and fog were contributory causes of the tragedy. Nine members of the party escaped without a scratch. Nobody on the train suffered except from a severe jar.

The collision occurred at 3.40 a.m. at the Commercial Street crossing here. Train No. 121 North bound whirled through the wagon load of singing and happy unfortunates who were returning from the Peter Hansen farm where they had gone to attend the celebration of a wedding anniversary.

Of the dead ten men and three are women, all but two of the dead and injured were residents of Menasha, Wis.

Armless, joggles and headless bodies covered the right-of-way as the train nine coaches in length was brought to a stop eighteen feet from the scene of the crash. Several of the bodies were so badly mutilated that identification was possible only by fragments of clothing.

Peter Hanson, driver and owner of the horses attached to the ill-fated rig managed to hang to the reins and was the only person aboard, who was not temporarily stunned by the collision. He declares he did not observe the onrushing train until his team had reached the track. He whipped the horses, but managed to get the wagon only half way across.

The train is said to have been nearly a half hour behind schedule, and was running approximately sixty miles an hour.

A Railway Laborer's Grudge.

The most expensive act of damage ever committed by a railway worker was that of an Italian navy employed on the construction of a tunnel through one of the mountains in the Black Forest. Having a grudge against his foreman, he succeeded one night in altering the position of the stakes which marked the course of the work. The excavators were working on the tunnel in two sections, one from the north and one from the south. Owing to the shifting of the stakes the sections involved, instead of being directed to the same point, were found to be twenty-six feet apart when they reached the middle of the mountain. The northern half of the tunnel had therefore to be entirely reconstructed at a cost of £175,000.

Colonel Rees Leaving.

Lieut.-Col. Rees of the S. A. will resign his position as chief of the Army here in November to take promotion in Canada. He has been in charge of the forces here the past four years, and the Army has made marked progress under his direction. The public in general, among whom he is a great favorite, will regret his departure. He will preside at some farewells in the city and outposts before leaving.

Prisoner Brought Here

Saturday night by the shore train Sergt. Byrne arrived here with the young chap Gil of Silver Springs, who attempted with his brother, to wreck the train by putting a coupling pin in the joints of the rails. He is about 19 years old and will serve his sentence of 9 months in the penitentiary.

Philadelphia, Sept. 23.—Braving the perils of the broad Atlantic, G. S. Ruhland, of Philadelphia, will attempt to cross the ocean in a motor boat, the Regal Victor, accompanied by a volunteer crew of six men.

The little craft is being built at St. Michaels, Md. So far two men have been selected to accompany Mr. Ruhland. They are George Olsen and M. D. Bangs, of Camden, N. J., and upon Mr. Bangs will in a large measure depend the fate of the expedition, for he will have control of the two gasolene engines.

The start will be made from Philadelphia early in next June.

"We expect to make the trip in ten days," said Mr. Ruhland. "We will carry food and water to last two weeks, however."

"Of course, this is not a new idea. The ill-fated Roumania was cast away on the coast of Newfoundland only a few weeks ago, but we hope to have better fortune."

PARIS, Oct. 1.

The "Matin" learns from a high official in Italy, that the Turkish Government does not oppose the occupation of Italy, and that Italy is ready to give Turkey the fullest satisfaction, and that both the moral and material suzerainty of the Sultan will be recognized. A large indemnity will be paid, and everything done will be agreeable to Turkey in other ways. Italy will be as liberal as possible, said the official, both in justice to Turkey and out of consideration for the Powers, for "we want, at all costs, to prevent them from being involved in complications."

TRIPOLI, Oct. 1.

Foreigners have taken refuge at the Consulates. The British consulate is crowded to its utmost capacity with women and children. The native conscript reservists have been called out. The Turks are purchasing all available camels and securing all possible supplies. The belief that British war vessels are in the vicinity is tending to calm the anxiety of Europeans. The native population express the hope that the Turkish fleet will soon arrive.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 1.

News has reached here from Tripoli, to the effect that a large Italian cruiser has gone ashore there. The United States has been asked to take charge of the interests of Turkish subjects in Italy during the continuance of the war.

The music of the Mass was Gregorian chant. Miss Gosse had charge of the choir and Miss M. E. White rendered the solo at the offertory, "Ave Sanctissimi." His Grace after Mass preached a most appropriate sermon and referred particularly to the origin of "Cove Sunday" and the many associations connected with the anniversary since the days of Father Troy, who founded the mission over 70 years ago. At the conclusion of the interesting discourse the Archbishop administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to fifty children and five grown candidates. At 1.30 luncheon was served at the Presbytery at which the following guests were entertained hospitably by the pastor: His Grace the Archbishop, Rt. Rev. Monsignor Roche, Rev. J. J. St. John, Rev. Dr. Greene, Rev. J. F. Pippy, Mayor Ellis, Messrs. W. R. Howley, J. M. Kent, John Dwyer, V. P. Burke. The celebration was a grand success.

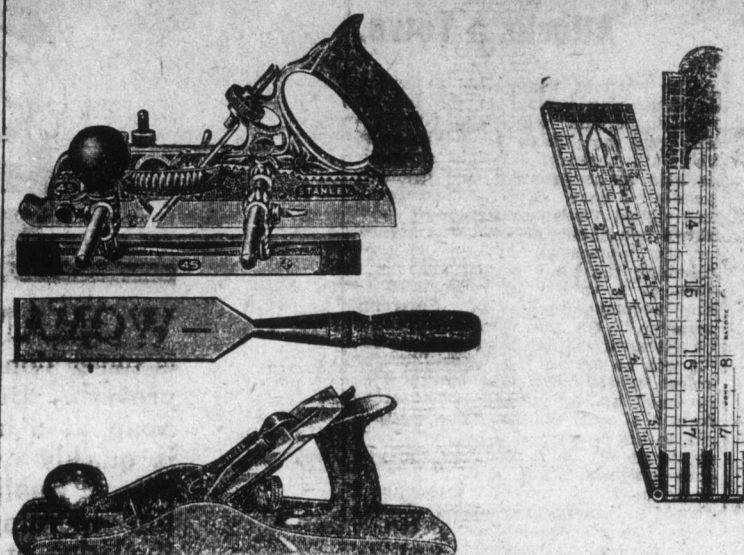

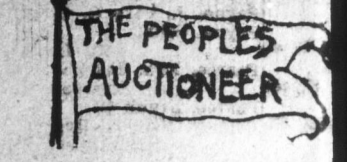
