



Parcel Post for Nfld. Expeditionary Forces!

The attention of the public is drawn to the very urgent necessity of strictly observing the regulations published by this Department from time to time concerning the despatch of parcels to members of the Regiment overseas and the following particulars should be strictly observed:

(1) Parcels must not exceed eleven pounds.

(2) Parcels should be addressed with the Regimental number, rank, name and surname of addressee, followed by the last known address of the Unit with which the individual was serving; for example:

> No. 0978 Cpl. John J. Kent 2nd Battalion The Royal Newfoundland Regt.,

Hazeley Down Camp, Winchester, Hant's Camp, England.

(3) Parcels should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may he delivered or forwarded, if it should prove mpossible to deliver to the first. The Original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the BACK of the parcel.

(4) If second address is not furnished at the time of posting and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribution. (5) Parcels containing articles of personal na-

ture or of special value will be returned if request for their return, in case of non-delivery, is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.

(6) The procedure outlined in (4) and (5) is adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, to prevent the waste of a large quantity of perishable food stuffs which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels sent to

(7) Parcels should be packed securely.

(8) Attention is drawn to the Notice concerning Christmas parcels recently published by the Postmaster General. All Christmas mail for B. E. F. should be posted in time to arrive at the Pay and Record Office, London, not later than the end of November.





The Waters of Damascus.

(From the London Chronicle.) Reading yesterday that delightful book "Eothen" we came across a charming description of Damascus, as seen by Kinglake in 1834. "This holy Damascus," he wrote, "this earthly Paradise of the Prophet, so fair to the eyes that he dared not trust himself to tarry in her blissful shades-she is a city of hidden palaces, of copses and gardens and fountains and bubbling streams. The juice of her life is the gushing and ice-cold torrent that tumbles from the snowy sides of the Anti-Lebannon. Close along on the river's edge through seven sweet miles of rustling boughs and deepest shade, the city spreads out her whole length; as a man falls flat, face forward on the brook, that he may drink and drink again, so Damascus, thirsting for ever lies down with her lips to the stream and clings to its rushing





In and around Neuvilly and extending down the valley near to Le Cateau, was the 5th Cyclist Brigade in the firing line for the first time, and it fought with all the oldtime vigour and tenacity of the original Germany infantry.

While Neuvilly was the scene of bayonet fighting, which extended forward back across the valley, and up to the eastern slopes, other English troops north of the village pushed across the Selle and gained the high ground between Neuvilly and Briastre. They had secured a footing on Friday night, and the advance of the main body in the dawn, partially by bridges, partially by fording, cleared the enemy out of his riverside





The Assassination of Count Tisza.

Amsterdam, Nov. 4.-The Berlin Vossische Zeitung contains a dramatic description of the assasination of Count Tisza, former premier

Hungary, last week. At six o'clock in the evening three soldiers invaded Count Tisza's resi dence and presented themselves into the drawing room. Count Tisza, with his wife and the Countess Almassy advanced to meet the intruders, ask ing what they wanted. "What have you in your hand?"

soldier demanded of Tisza. Tisza replied that he held a revolver. The soldier told him to put it away, but Tisza replied: "I shall not, because you have not laid aside your rifles. The soldiers then requested th vomen to leave the room, but they teclined to do so. A soldier then addressed Tisza as follows: "You are responsible for the destruction of millions of soldiers because yo caused the war."

Then raising their rifles the sol diers shouted: "The hour of reckon ing has come." The soldiers fired three shots a

(From the New York Times.) Why is it that the Germans maniest such a wild fear that their country will be invaded? That is, of course, a purely rhetorical questiona question the answer to which every body knows-but one can in the usual fashion pretend inability to understand, without taking careful thought, prevailing in Germany. Invasion is dreaded and hated everywhere, indeed, but in these days invasion by the armies of any nation except Germany or her late allies would not put civilians in much apprehension as to either their lives or their property. and women and children would consider themselves fairly safe even from insult. The expectations of the mans are different from those o other people because the Germans are different from other people-and because they do not know it and cannot believe it. They know what invasion meant when they were the invaders, and to think of it as meaning any thing else for themselves when invaded is for them impossible. Hence their wild rush out of the Rhineland. But how hard it will be for them to select a direction in which to run that will not take them, after not many miles have been passed, among a people whom they have cruelly abused and ruthlessly exploited under the plea of "military necessity!







Mews, B.L.-I was baggage on the express train which was west of Curling on Septemlast. I went right through om St. John's on her. We had no mishaps on the way but we were delayed at Topsail for several hours. This was caused by a run-off west of An express train coming east had some cars off the track but I don't know how many. There was no ther delay that I know of. This accident happened on the afternoon of Tuesday, the 24th of September about two miles west of Petrie's. I was in the baggage car at the time of the accident. Before the cars left the rails I had no warning of the run-off. I felt no bumping or jolting of the train. At the time of the run-off I was sitting down. The first notice I had of anything wrong, I felt a jolting of one of the cars, and I thought it must have been the second class car. I felt sure that something was wrong with the train and I jumped up to pull the emergency cord, but brakeman Rossiter pulled the cord ahead of me.] then opened the upper side door of the baggage car and we were going around the curve to the right. The upper side door is on the left hand side going west. The door was jammed and it took me some little time to open it. When I opened it and looked out I saw the second class car and the dining car had left the road bed and must have gone over the embankment, but I saw the first class car and she was just tipping over and bringing the two sleepers with her. When I was looking out the side door the engine and baggage car were topped. They were west of the dump. do not know where we were when I umped up to pull the cord. Rossiter ooked out the end door. At the time the train was going slow up grade. I was not paying any attention to the speed. As baggageman my duty is to look after all baggage and express parcels in the car. It is not my duty to go through the train. I never go beyond the dining car. I have nothing to do with the railroading business beyond my duty as a baggageman. I hen went to the second class car which was then at the bottom of the dump turned over on its side. I helped to get the passengers up through the wifidows. After we got what we were in the car, I went to the first class car to assist them there, when Brakeman Rossiter called me to the second class car again and we lifted out Mr. Winsor who was an injured passenger in the second class car. We then brought Mr. Winsor to a ouse close by where other passengers were, and we left him there. We then went to the second class car again and opened three or four berths that had been closed up, and we saw if there were any one in them. The berths were all empty except in one or two of them we found coats belonging to soldiers who were passengers. I know nothing about the construction or make up of these berths in the second class car. I found it hard to open the berths in the position the car was then lying down. I went back to the baggage car then and stayed there for a while to watch the contents of the car. I helped the brakeman to bring 'jacks' from the baggage car to the sleeping car to jack up the car;


