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Bridge of Living Men.
 thought of the soldiers of the Old Army who died so gloriously in that sacred place.
 The bridge of living men helped to carry the British 3rd Army of General Sir Julian Byng across the difficult and strongly defended valley of the Selle. Here it attacked about 5 o'clock yesterday morning between Le Cateau and Solesmes simultaneously with General Hornes' 1st Army on the left, which continued to push the enemy towards the Selle between Solesmes and Denain generally in the direction of Valenciennes.
Third Army's Stiff Task.
 Very hard fighting was experienced, particularly by the troops of the 3rd Army. The result of the day's battle was to throw back the German 2nd and 17th Armies, their combined front hanging on positions just east of Le Cateau. They lost the line of the Selle Valley for a considerable distance north of Le Cateau, and the remaining fragments in the vicinity of Denain, where the Selle empties into the Scheldt, seemed untenable in view of the continued pressure north of Cambrai.
 The Selle, as I have explained, is a

wandering river from 4 to 10 feet deep, flanked by steep slopes. Every bridge was destroyed by the retreating enemy, the trees on the eastern bank were cut down, trenches dug along the railway embankment, and a great deal of wire stretched by reserve troops. The valley villages of Montay, Neuville, and Briastre, between Le Cateau and Solesmes, could not be put in state of complete defense, but they were heavily garrisoned with machine guns.
 The Divisions of General Byng's Army, marching steadily after the vanishing German rear-guard, reached the valley without much trouble. On his right the 6th and 25th Divisions had reached Le Cateau, crossing the river which runs west of the town after some fighting, and experiencing more in the eastern quarter, which was liberally fed by the Germans from the high ground behind. Between Le Cateau and the hamlet of Montay on the north, English and Scottish troops gained the river by passing through Clary. They had taken Clary at 9 o'clock on the morning of the 9th after hard fighting, capturing a field battery, and stopping the drivers just as they were about to gallop away.
 The priest of Clary had just time to cut the wires which connected the band of a shell around the base of his church and prevent its destruction by German Pioneers.
Scottish Troops Push Ahead.
 The Scottish troops and the Surreys received the acclamations of the villagers, and went on to Bertry, which they occupied at one o'clock in the afternoon. Other troops passed through them, and took Troisville at 5 in the evening. At dusk the "Jocks," who marched 16 miles and fought 12, pushed to the outskirts of Neuville, on the Selle, where they found a strong German garrison. On October 10 there was constant scrapping between British and German infantry opposite the banks of the river.
 In the evening our troops managed to secure a footing on the east. Some got over by crawling on trees which had fallen across the stream but the majority waded up to the waist, even to the neck in the water.
 They met a severe fire from the Germans, but stuck to their little posts till Friday, when preparations were made to get the remainder of the force over. During Friday night bridges were thrown over the Selle between Montay and Neuville, covered by the Worcesters. At daybreak yesterday the Highlanders near Montay and the Riflemen by Neuville forced the river, and, after desperate fighting on the railway line, succeeded in getting through the wire entanglements, and overcame the determined garrison. They gained the

heights towards Amerval, were forced back by counter-attacks, continued to fight along the railway during the greater part of the day, and subsequently regained the ground.
"In You Go."
 On the left these troops at Neuville proved a costly obstacle in the path of other English battalions, who had greater trouble in getting over the river. Prior to yesterday morning's attack some East Yorks rushed the stream under fire, led by a gallant sergeant, who said, "You, boys, in you go." And they went, some of them nearly submerged in the current. They floundered through the best that a single lot of cut trees, gained the eastern bank and a well-camouflaged trench, killed the occupants, went on up the steep bank through a maze of wire to the railway, killed 30 Germans, and reached the trench beyond it, where they secured 41 prisoners, and left 40 others dead.
A Race to the River Bank.
 Early yesterday morning the Manchesterers were told that they must get across as best they could. The river in front of them was 16 to 20 feet wide. Some of the Manchesterers picked up bits of planks to serve as rafts, and carrying these they followed the sappers, who bore the light bridges already constructed. When the covering bombardment began, answered promptly by a barrage of 4 1/2" from the German lines, the sappers plunged into the river with their bridges, which were not quite long enough to reach the opposite bank. Standing closely together, they raised the planks on their shoulders, and the Manchesterers stepped across in single file. Many others forded the river in their heavy kit.
 It was a race to the river bank, said a staff officer, who described the attack to me at their headquarters while the fighting was in progress. They were told they had to do the best they could, and they never hesitated a second, until the infantry got across without delay.
 Neuville lay in about the centre of their front. The river describes the form of a "U" through the village, and the cottages close to the banks were full of machine guns firing from the windows. Instead of fighting on both sides of the village, as has been the recent custom of the retreating Hun, his infantry was massed in it, and the struggle in the streets was fierce and sanguinary as any of the war. Not only every house, but every street and by-path, was protected by machine guns, and the troops had to push from cottage to cottage.
 During the greater part of the day they held only the southern half of Neuville, and were unable to take the church, which seemed to be the core of the German defenses.
 Our guns tried to spare the village as far as possible, but the resistance of the enemy made its bombardment necessary. In and around Neuville and extending down the valley near to Le Cateau, was the 8th Cyclist Brigade in the firing line for the first time, and it fought with all the old-time vigour and tenacity of the original German infantry.
 While Neuville was the scene of bayonet fighting, which extended forward back across the valley, and up to the eastern slopes, other English troops north of the village pushed across the Selle and gained the high ground between Neuville and Briastre. They had secured a footing on Friday night, and the advance of the main body in the dawn, partially by bridges, partially by fording, cleared the enemy out of his river-side trenches.—The Scotsman, Oct. 14.

Military Headgear.
 From the beginning, the human warrior has always been distinguished by some sort of uniform. At first it is quite likely that a feathered headgear and a tawdry body were the distinguishing features both being for the purpose of making the fighter more formidable in appearance. Lavr came forms of dress that were a real defence of armor in various forms. The Greek soldier wore a very ornate headgear with overlapping plumes, while the Roman military dress was simplicity itself. But it was within quite recent times that the head dress of the soldier reached the climax of exaggeration and that, perhaps, in the British army. The Life Guards wore feather-trimmed felt hats, while the Foot Guards carried upon their heads the huge, costly, hot and clumsy bearskin bushies or shakos, while the Hussar regiments wore broad rimmed hats with black cockade and silver lace. In Crimean days several regiments were supplied with wicker baskets resembling inverted plum, paper baskets. Their successors were made ridiculous by caps shaped exactly like pill boxes, caps which caused the small boy no end of amusement. Change has followed until at the present time the soldier wears a cap of the most conventional pattern in the British and Canadian armies. It is not a beautiful thing, but it is serviceable, keeping out the rain, and is not too hot. The American soldier wears a hat which originated with the famous Rough-Riders of the Spanish-American war, and was intended for use in a warm climate. It is picturesque,

Railway Enquiry.

(Continued.)

Arthur Taylor sworn and examined by Mr. News, B.L.—I was baggage man on the express train which was wrecked west of Curlew on September 24th last. I went right through from St. John's on her. We had no mishaps on the way but we were delayed at Topsail for several hours. This was caused by a run-off west of Topsail. An express train coming east had some cars off the track but I don't know how many. There was no other delay that I know of. This accident happened on the afternoon of Tuesday, the 24th of September about two miles west of Petrie's. I was in the baggage car at the time of the accident. Before the cars left the rails I had no warning of the run-off. I felt no bumping or jolting of the train. At the time of the run-off I was sitting down. The first notice I had of anything wrong, I felt a lurching of the cars, and I thought it must have been the second class car. I felt sure that something was wrong with the train and I jumped up to pull the emergency cord, but brakeman Rossiter pulled the cord ahead of me. I then opened the upper side door of the baggage car and we were going around the curve to the right. The upper side door is on the left hand side going west. The door was jammed and it took me some little time to open it. When I opened it and looked out I saw the second class car and the dining car had left the embankment, but I saw the first class car and she was just tipping over and bringing the two sleepers with her. When I was looking out the side door the engine and baggage car were stopped. They were where we were when I jumped up to pull the cord. Rossiter looked out the end door. At the time the train was going slow up grade. I was not paying any attention to the speed. As baggageman my duty is to look after all baggage and express parcels in the car. It is not my duty to go through the train. I never go beyond the dining car. I have nothing to do with the railroading business beyond my duty as a baggageman. I then went to the second class car which was then at the bottom of the dump turned over on its side. I helped to get the passengers up through the windows. After we got what we thought was all the passengers that were in the car, I went to the first class car to assist them there, when Brakeman Rossiter called me to the second class car again and we lifted out Mr. Winsor who was an injured passenger in the second class car. We then brought Mr. Winsor to a house close by where other passengers were, and we left him there. We then went to the second class car again and opened three or four berths that had been closed up, and we saw if there were any one in them. The berths were all empty except in one or two of them we found coats belonging to soldiers who were passengers. I know nothing about the destruction or make up of these berths in the second class car. I found it hard to open the berths in the position the car was then lying down. I went back to the baggage car then and stayed there for a while to watch the contents of the car. I helped the brakeman to bring 'jacks' from the baggage car to the sleeping car to jack up the car; we got the body of Miss O'Neil from under it. I then went back to the baggage car and remained there all night. I made no examination of the track to ascertain the cause of the accident. I never heard since the cause. I don't know now which car left the rails first. I have been baggageman for three years but I have no knowledge of railroad work beyond that. That is the first run-off happened me this year. I was working with the Reid all this year on the train. Mr. Higgins did not cross-examine.

The Beverley Enquiry.

The enquiry in connection with the loss of the Beverley was continued yesterday afternoon, Deputy Minister of Justice Summers presiding. The first witness called was Mr. John Duff, who gave evidence as to the purchase by him of the upper houses of the ship which he had had removed to his property near Waterford Bridge.

Mr. John Angel, dock foreman with the Reid Nfld. Co. testified as to the repairs which had been done to the Beverley while she was in dock.

Mr. McLachlan, Government Boiler Inspector gave evidence that he had examined the boilers of the ship on several occasions, that the repairs he had considered necessary had been carried out and that he had found both boilers and engine in first class condition when she was ready to leave for Harbor Grace after coming off dock.

In reply to a question by Mr. Hunt he stated he had received no remuneration or gifts from any person.

Hon. R. K. Bishop, testified that he was President of the Beverley Steamship Co. but that he had taken no personal part in the purchase or sale of the steamer.

Torturing Belgians.

A horrible case was that of a Belgian named De La Place and his three companions condemned to be shot after half an hour's trial. At dawn they were led out to the courtyard of the Lancer's Barracks, where the execution took place, and were fastened to posts opposite which a firing squad was ready.

Just as the last knot was being tied an officer entered the courtyard, crying: "Admiral's orders. Your appeal has been heard." And all four were taken back to prison.

Incredible as it may seem, this hideous farce was repeated a week later, with a similar repite at the last moment. Then, after another fortnight's imprisonment, during which the Belgians continued protesting their innocence of all charges against them, they faced a firing squad for the third time, and the death sentence was carried out.

One of them named Gloovers had become a raving maniac, since the second application of torture, but the Germans knew no mercy. Soldiers bore him out and fastened him to the execution post with the others.

The court made no attempt to discriminate in espionage cases. An ex-merchant skipper who was arrested with four others made full confession of his own guilt in the hope of saving the lives of his comrades who were in no wise implicated and wholly innoc-

ent. The sacrifice was in vain. All were pitilessly shot.

The skipper's turn came last. He refused to be bound or to have his eyes bandaged. Standing with folded arms, he looked the firing squad in the face and cried, "You have killed innocent men. I alone am—a volley cut short his words."

The inhabitants state that they always knew when executions took place because it was the invariable custom to have a band playing in the square outside the barracks to drown the sound of the shots.

As throughout the invaded territory, minor punishments were literally rained on the people. One English woman, Mrs. Grant Dalton, was actually fined 300 marks or a week's imprisonment for "wearing an anti-German expression in the official business," the very words of the condemnation notice, which her husband showed me, although she had not uttered a single word or made the slightest gesture.

The corruptions of the Germans surpassed their cruelty, especially during the last six months.

"We all know there'll be no jobs in Germany after the war, so we will make hay while the sun shines," said one Sergeant in impudent explanation of his share in a big smuggling operation.

Nearly all the frontier guards, officers and privates alike, made fortunes, among which a hundred thousand marks was the lowest figure.

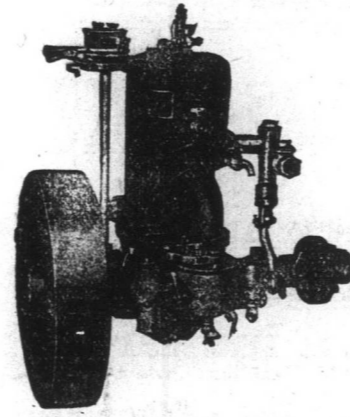

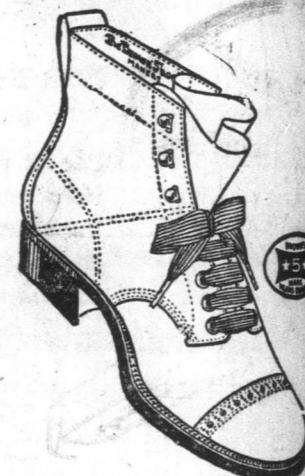
