



He was rejected by both Army and Navy in Newfoundland through a defect in eyesight; but in 1916 he went across to England and enlisted in the mercantile marine. He was torpedoed four times while he was over there and also shelled in the open lifeboat on July 2nd, 1917, being wounded in the face and hand. Also on April 24th, 1917, he was in a small steamboat attacked by a German submarine, and fought for four and a half hours, and managed to sink the submarine, for which he was presented with a silver medal and diploma by the owners of the ship. 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

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
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
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
