Trade Simpler With Gold Basis

The return to the gold standard in Britain will not mean wholesale hipments of gold from Great Britsin to other countries, it was conarmed by leading bankers recently.

It does mean, in plain language, that a man in England owing money someone in the United States will be at liberty to send him a bar of hat Englishmen will be likely to make a practice of paying their debts that way.

But it will stabilize the rate of exchange on English money, because no one will pay for a draft on New fork or any other place, than it rould cost him to send a quantity f gold of the same value.

Under the former conditions, when he exportation of gold was forbiden, all accounts had to be settled by ankers' drafts, private drafts, bills of exchange and other paper values. When merchants wished to pay bills n a foreign country, they went into the market for that country's paper alues, and bid against each other or it, so that the price went up when many people wanted it, and went down when it was little in demand. Thus, when a British merchant wantd American money to pay a bill in pay \$1.10 or more for each dollar.

Under the gold standard, however, he can send a parcel of gold coins r a lump of gold cheaper than he can buy American paper, he will send the gold. In actual practice, not a great deal of metal will be shipped, but when the demand for paper becomes too keen, a few shipments of gold will reduce the demand and keep the cost of paper money down.

Means Stability.

The great benefit which will be derived from this, and a benefit which will be enjoyed to a large extent by the people with which Great Britain is dealing as well as by the merchants in Britain, is that of stability. The British merchant buying in another country will know when he buys, within a comparatively slight fraction, how much of that country's noney his British five pound note be worth, not only when he gets the goods but also when he has to pay for them. He will not have to figure speculative variations in the rate of exchange.

There will be settlements of unfavorable trade balances by gold shipments, which some banking authorities think more satisfactory than settlements by borrowing. Where one country may have shipped more goods to another country than it has bought there, and a third country has shipped less, the second country can set off its unfavorable balance with the one country against his favorable balance with the other, and can close out any difference still outstanding by delivering the necessary quantity of gold, whereas otherwise, they would have to borrow the amount of the balance, until such time as increased export evened things up.

A number of leaders think Britain has set a splendid example by geturning to the gold standard, and that it should be followed by the Dominion Others, however, see no immediate hurry for Canada to follow the e ample of the Old Country.
