While t is conceivable that the Japanese

They appear to be taking extra precautions in the case of Ta Tche Kiao on account of their knowledge that General Kur young sons is now visiting friends either in St. John or the neighboring roff, dated July 15, and given out this morning, the wings of General Oku's and Nodsu's armies have joined at Tang Chi, 10 miles southeast of Ta Tche Kiao. Settlement of Sydney Strike Agreed

Sydney, N. S., July 21,—The strike at the Dominion Iron & Steel Company's works is virtually settled, and will be formally declared off to-morrow unless for some untoward circumstances. The basis of settlement was reached tonight after a series of conferences between the company and the men, which began yesterday morning with W. L. McKenzie King, deputy minister of labor, acting as intermediary. The men are consenting to go back on the rate, of wages in force prior to the strike, and the company are recognizing the union as far as employes on the plant are concerned, but not outside of that.

The men will be given their former positions as far as it is possible for the company to do so. There are, however, some men who will not be taken back because of their activity in connection with the strike. The grand sub-council/ of the P. W. A. will meet to-morrow morning to take action upon the report of the conference proings which will be submitted to it by Grand Secretary Moffatt, who, with Grand Guardian Fraser and Eugene Fraser conducted the negotiations on behalf of the men.

In other words, the consumer who thinks he is saving money by buying from catalogue houses finds that he is losing what he saves by having to pay higher prices on the little he buys from the man on whom he depends so much at the corner. Or perhaps the corner convenience disap-

"Of course this is an extreme case,

"Of course this possibility of this yet it is a logical possibility of this system of buying. We think the consumer would do well to remember that he owes something to the merchant in his own town. Maybe the merchant is not there expressly for the convenience of consumers, i. e., maybe the merchant is not thinking so much of the convenience he may be to consumers as of the incidental profit there may be in doing business. But he is a convenience, nevertheless, and the people owe it to themselves as well as to him to enable him to be as much a convenience as possible. In any case, it is a good policy to throw as much as possible in the way of the man nearest one; for it is with his that one's interests are most tied up.

"In one aspect of the case it may be narrow; but in another it is really the broadest to give one's very best patronage to the one nearest his own door. Other Fruits at the World's Fair,

Surprising Display of Apples and

His Last Hope Realized. St, Louis.-Leaving cut California Canada quite holds her own among the states and countries of America in her fruit display at the World's fair. Even with California included, when real domestic value is considered, there is no exhibit in the horticultural pavilion that compares with that of Canada.
