## THE SOLAR SYSTEM.

The Solar System consists of the Sun in the centre, the planet Mercury next, then Venus, the Earth and Moon, Mars, four small planets sometimes called Asteroids, Jupiter and his four moons, Saturn with seven, and most distant of all, Herschel with six. Each of these planets, obtains a succession of seasons, completing its year, by revolving around the Sun, and alternate night and day, by revolving on its own axis something like a top. Beyond these, is the region of the stars, which, in treating of the Solar System, may be considered as a vast hollow sphere, with the Sun and planets in its centre. Let it be remembered that the Sun is firmly stationed in the centre of a vast circle, called the earth's orbit. The earth continues to whirl along in this orbit, going entirely round the Sun once every year. It is kept in motion very much as a boy whirls an apple tied to a string around his head ; as the apple cannot fly away from the boy on account of the string, so the Earth cannot fly away from the Sun on account of the attraction between the two, which operates as a string to tie the Earth to the Sun and keep it in its orbit. Well ! now imagine the Earth moving around the Sun once every year. But you must recollect that the Earth is also whirling around every 24 hours upon its own axis, and this axis runs north and south. One end of the axis is called the north pole, and points always to the north; the other is called the south pole, and always points to the south. But it so happens, that at one time, this axis inclines more to the Sun than it does at another. When the north pole is inclined towards the Sun, the rays will fall directly on the nothern portions of the Earth. This will cause summer at the north, and winter at the south. And when the south pole is inclined towards the Sun, it is summer at the south, and winter at the north. Thus the rotation of the Sun on its own axis every 24 hours, produces day and night ; and the annual movement of the Earth around the Sun, with the different inclinations of its axis to the Sun, produces the wonderful changes of the seasons.

The Moon, by performing a revolution about the Earth, in a period of little more than 29 days, exhibits to us those appearances from *change* to *full*, and from *full* to *change*, denominated phases. She is said to change when she passes between the Earth and the Sun. When in about a

week after, she is so far from the Sun as to arrive south as the Sun sets, that is, has  $90^{\circ}$  or one quarter of the heavens between her and the Sun, she is said to be in quadrature; when  $180^{\circ}$  distant from the Sun, or in opposition to him, she is said to *full*, and rises as the Sun sets. When she rises at midnight, she is again in quadrature; it is her last quarter. In about a week from her last quarter she will again change, having completed an entire revolution about the Earth. Instead of something in the regular course of nature, eclipses were once considered as supernatural phenomena, and of ominous import, portending calamity to mankind in some shape or other, but generally, that of pestilence or famine; while war, rapine and violence, were generally charged to the baneful influence of some malicious comet, whose unwelcome appearance was generally sufficient to shroud whole nations in terror and dismay.

These notions, the consequences of the superstitious ignorance of barbarous or less enlightened ages, are rapidly disappearing before the light of science, and are now nearly obsolete.

When it is considered that the Moon shines only by being illuminated by the Sun, a little reflection will enable any one to understand the cause and nature of eclipses; and it only remains for the Astronomer, by calculations depending on the motions of the Earth and Moon, to predict the times on which they will happen—which he can do with as much certainty and precision as he can foretell the recurrence of day and night.

It is still, to some extent, a prevalent belief, that the change, full, and quarterings of the Moon have an influence on the coming state of the weather. If this be the case, which is very possible, and may, perhaps, be accounted for on rational principles; yet the subject is at present too little understood, or the necessary elements not sufficiently known, to enable us to calculate with any degree of certainty, what may be the state of the weather for any period of a future year.

In order to afford some facilities for viewing the planets, their times of rising, &c. are occasionally laid down in the Calendar pages of this Almanack. Those who take an interest in these matters will derive much advantage from the use of maps of the Stars; as with their assistance,

the names and places of all the principal ones, may be learned by a few evenings observations.

The Earth is ninety-five millions of miles from the Sun, and goes round him in 365 days, 5 hours, and 49 minutes, from any equinox or solstice to the same again; but from any fixed Star to the same again, as seen from the Sun, in 365 days, 6 hours, and 9 minutes; the former being the length of the tropical year, and the latter the length of the sidereal. It travels at the rate of 58,000 miles every hour; which motion, though 120 times swifter than that of a cannon ball, is little more than half as swift as Mercury's motion in his orbit. The Earth's diameter is 7970 miles; and by turning round its axis every 24 hours from west to east, it causes an apparent diurnal motion of all the heavenly bodies from east to west. By this rapid motion of the Earth on its axis, the inhabitants about the equator are carried 1042 miles every hour, whilst those on the parallel of London, are carried only about 580, besides the 58,000 miles by the annual motion above mentioned, which is common to all places whatever.

The Earth is round like a globe; as appears—1. By its shadow in eclipses of the Moon; which shadow is always bounded by a circular line.—2. By our seeing the masts of a ship whilst the hull is hid by the convexity of the water.—3. By its having been sailed round by many navigators.

#### EXPLANATION OF TERMS.

**APHELION**—Is that part of a planet's orbit farthest from the Sun.

**APOGEE**.—The Moon is said to be in Apogee when farthest from the Earth.

**ECLIPSTIC**.—Is the plane of the Earth's orbit extended to the starry sphere.

**PERIHELION**.—Is that part of a planets' orbit nearest the Sun.

**PERIGEE**.—The Moon is said to be in Perigee when nearest the Earth.

**DECLINATION**.—Is the distance of a heavenly body from the equinoctial line

#### ECLIPSES OF THE SUN AND MOON.

In the year 1837, there will be THREE Eclipses of the SUN, and Two of the MOON.

1837.

I. The *first* will be of the Sun, at the time of New Moon in April, a very small eclipse, and visible only in a small part of the Southern Ocean about 1000 miles South of the Island of Van Diemen's Land.

II. The *second* will be of the Moon, at the time of the full in April, a total eclipse, but invisible in the Provinces, as the Moon will be below the horizon--Visible throughout the Eastern Continent.

III. The *third* will be of the Sun, at the time of New Moon in May, invisible ; the penumbra passing by to the North. The greatest eclipse (about 7 digits,) will be in the Russian Possessions, near the North West Coast of North America, a little north and east of Mount St. Elias, in the Country of the Kolinsches Indians : the penumbra coming from the Pacific Ocean on the south west will pass over the northern part of North America into the Atlantic Ocean to the Shetland Islands, where it will leave the earth at the going down of the Sun.

IV. The *fourth* will be of the Moon, on Friday October 13th, visible and total. The Earth's penumbra coming on, may be perceived at the Moon's rising.

V. The *fifth* and last will be of the Sun at the time of New Moon in October, a very small eclipse, and visible in no part of the civilized world, but in the Antarctic and Southern Atlantic Oceans, and at the New South Shetland and Sandwich Islands, Cape Horn, Terra del-Fuego, and a small part of Patagonia, it will be seen from one to two digits.

#### ORIENTAL AND OCCIDENTAL STARS.

The Planet VENUS will be *Morning Star*, till May 18th, when she will be in superior conjunction with the Sun ; the remainder of the year she will be *Evening Star*.

JUPITER will be *Morning Star* till 1st February, when he will be in opposition to the Sun ; thence *Evening Star* till Aug. 22d, when he will be in conjunction with the Sun ; after that he will be *Morning Star* through the year.

MARS will be *Morning Star* till 5th February, when he will be in opposition to the Sun ; thence he will be *Evening Star*, to the end of the year.

SATURN will be *Morning Star* till May 4th, when he will be in opposition to the Sun ; thence *Evening Star* till his conjunction with the Sun, Nov. 12th ; and then again *Morning Star*.

#### EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

First column contains the days of the month—second, days of the week—third, Holy-days, Weather, &c.—fourth, Rising of the Sun—fifth, Setting of the Sun—sixth, Sun's declination in hours and minutes—seventh, Rising and Setting of the Sun—eighth, Moon's Southing, and time of high water at Windsor, Parrsboro', Horton, Cornwallis, &c.—ninth, Moon's place in the signs—tenth, the time of high water at Halifax, of that tide which arrives when the moon is nearest to the Meridian—the time of the tide which happens when the Moon is farthest from the Meridian may be easily ascertained by the addition of half the difference of the times of high water on the preceding and following days.

The top of the columns shows the Moon's phases, or the times of new and full Moon, and of the first and last quarter, or two quadratures with the Sun.

To find the length of the day, add 12 hours to the time of the Sun's setting, and from the sun subtract the time of rising.

When the moon comes to the meridian of any place, or twelve o'clock hour-line, she is then due south with respect to that place, and this is termed the moon's southing. The time of New Moon's southing is 12 at noon; and from the new to the full moon, the southing is after noon, or sometime between noon and midnight, but every day about 49 minutes later than the former.—The time of the full moon's southing is 12 at midnight ; and from the full to the new moon, the southing is in the morning, or some time between midnight and the noon next following ; but every day about 49m. later than before.

The Sun's Declination, at mean noon, is taken from the Nautical Almanack. It denotes the *apparent* position of the true Sun with reference to the Equator, and the true Equinox, at the instant the Greenwich mean time clock, or chronometer, indicates Ch. 0m. 0s. or when the hour angle of the true Sun is equal to the equation of time.







#### FOR JANUARY.

## • FARMER'S CALENDAR.

## FOR MARCH.

During this month it is a good time to cut your wood down and get it home. If it is good sledding so much the better. The sap is down now, and the wood cut at this season is much better. Beside, the roots in this case will sprout and soon cover the field again.

Cut, split and pile, a supply of wood so that you may have at least one year's stock before hand. You may use a quantity of green wood in winter for back logs and foresticks, unless you have stone or iron substitutes for those articles. But to use green wood in summer for cooking, is as foolish as were the attempts of Dean Swift's projector who undertook to soften marble for making pin-cushions, and to extract sunbeams from cucumbers. Farmers during March should be very attentive to their milch cows, and see that they are neither stinted nor overfed. One that is well fed will keep her flesh and give twice as much milk as two that are put on a short allowance.

## FOR APRIL.

Industry and economy combined form the true philosopher's stone, which turns all into gold. They generally exist together; and are both so indispensably necessary to success in any pursuit of life, that where one is wanting, the other, for all practical purposes, may be absent. You may harrow your winter grain, having previously sown grass seed upon the land, and given it a top dressing of lime or ashes, or a mixture of both, put on not less than two bushels of the mixture to the acre. You may also sow clover and other grass seeds with spring wheat. The grass seed is best to be ploughed and harrowed in with the seed wheat. Attend to your garden and raise vegetables of all kinds, for the time in the month you must be guided partly by the season, and partly by directions to be found in the New American Gardener, which will also tell you the manner of preparing the soil, &c. It is well worth while for every farmer to buy "Fessenden's Complete Farmer".

#### FARMER'S CALENDAR.

##### FOR MAY.

A poor farmer is in the strict sense of the word, a poor creature: he is a poor husband and a poor citizen; reverse the picture, and look at the farm of the man who is diligent in his business, and prudent in his concerns; what can be presented more agreeable; what can be accompanied with more pleasing ideas? His own spirit is infused into every thing around him—every thing is in repair, everything is in its place—every thing is in its season—every thing evinces that the master's eye has seen and directed all his concerns. His fields are well arranged and productive; his crops clean and of the best quality, and secured in season from the weather: his cattle well fed, in good condition, and often better sheltered than the family of the slothful. Enter his dwelling it is the habitation of plenty. His wife in her department, uses the same economy that he practices in his.

##### FOR JUNE.

You may, by this time, form a pretty correct estimate whether hay will be scarce next winter, and if you apprehend that such is the case, you will do well to plant or sow Indian corn for fodder. It may be put into the ground for that purpose, either broad cast or in drills. The former is the least trouble, the latter will give the greatest produce and leave the soil in the best order. If the land on which you propose to raise your corn, be mowing land or pasture, fresh ploughed for that purpose, broad cast sowing will be best, as the sod after being turned over should not be disturbed. If you sow broad cast, from 3 to  $\frac{3}{4}$  bushels are recommended, though some say that a larger quantity will be still better. If in drills, run light furrows about 3 feet asunder 3 or 4 inches deep, and drop the seed corn in the furrows, about as thick as peas are sown for field cultivation. Keep your crops clean by hoeing and hand weeding.

### FARMER'S CALENDAR.

#### FOR JULY.

Take time by the fore lock while engaged in hay making. We are told by Almanack makers, and other would be wizards, who are eminent for guessing, that more rain, on an average, falls in the latter part of summer, or after the 15th July, than before. If your hay is not quite so dry as it should be when you house it, apply from 4 to 8 quarts of salt to the ton. Or you may save green wet hay by mixing layers of dry straw in the mow or stack. Cut your grain in due season. It is quite time to reap it when the straw begins to shrink, and becomes white about half an inch below the ear. If, however, a blight, or rust has struck wheat or rye, it is best to cut it immediately, even if the grain is in the milky state. Barley, however, should stand till perfectly ripe. Let not weeds get the start of your crops during harvest, and remember that frequently hoeing corn, potatoes, &c. answers the purpose both of rain and manure.

#### FOR AUGUST.

If there be any thing among the temporals to make life pleasant, it is within the walls of a well ordered house, where all is adjusted to please—not by its finery or costliness, but by its fitness, its air of neatness and content;—which invite all who enter to taste its comforts. The woman who does not make this a grand item in all her routine of duties, has not yet learned the true dignity of her station—has not yet acquired the *alpha* of that long alphabet which is set before her; and she who despises this noble attainment despises her best worldly good, and indirectly despises her family, her neighbours, and the word of God. "She looketh well to the ways of her household" was spoken by the wisest man that ever lived, and will be told as a memorial of all those who have been eminent for this noble, this heaven-born attainment. Put on a good stout pair of leather gloves, and declare a war of extermination against the thistles in and about your premises.

SEPTEMBER.	OCTOBER.
<p>Sow winter rye as early this month as possible, so that its roots may obtain firm hold of the soil before winter, and not be thrown out and killed by frost. Winter wheat should also be sown early this month. See that your barn yard is well adapted to saving manure, defending cattle from storms &amp;c. Let the size be proportioned to the stock which is kept in it, and well defended by tight fences, sheds, &amp;c. Gather and boil for your swine with a little Indian meal, potatoes, or other nutrition substances, the fruit which falls prematurely, in order to destroy the worms which they contain. See also that your swine are supplied with charcoal, which will be at once food and physic for them; and that they are made to labour for a livelihood by throwing into their inclosures abundance of materials for manure, such as weeds, brakes, potatoe-tops, loam, turf, swamp mud, &amp;c. which they will manufacture gratis.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Do not be in too great a hurry to dig your potatoes, the roots often grow bigger and better after the tops are considerably decayed. Stiff, hard, cloggy land intended to be tilled, should be ploughed in Autumn. Fall ploughing saves time and labour in the spring when cattle are weak, and the hurry of work, peculiar to that season press on the farmer. If the husks and bottoms of corn, when stowed away for winter, are sprinkled with a strong solution of salt in water, and when dealt out cut fine with a straw-cutter, they will make excellent fodder. If you have any leisure, don't go to a tavern, for of all places on earth, the worst is a tavern bar room. Stay at home and put your garden and farming tools in order. Mend the fastenings of your doors; see that your doors shut well. If they creak on their hinges, grease them. popping of the question, a purchase of a certain number of yards of white satin, & ring, a clergyman, a stage or two in a hired carriage, a night in a country inn, and the whole matter is over. #### FARMER'S CALENDAR.

##### NOVEMBER.

Do not undertake to winter more cattle than you have abundant means of providing for. It is recommended not to begin to fodder with the poorest materials. Cold weather will increase the appetites of your cattle, and they will eat food in mid-winter which they would reject at the commencement. They will, likewise, at any time eat materials when cut with a straw cutter, which they would refuse if at full length. You may now carry out and spread soot, ashes, compost, &c. on such of your mowing lands as may need manure. Though it is asserted by some that the best time for dressing mowing land, is immediately after haying, others contend that late in autumn is quite as well. See that your house is tight, don't leave cracks and holes about the doors and windows, so that Jack Frost may steel in while you are asleep and cut capers in your cellars and pantry.

##### DECEMBER.

It is quite time to barricade your premises against a certain blue-nosed belligerent, called Brigadier Boreas, who is marshalling his airy forces, and has issued his orders for a general attack on these Northern Provinces. Your cellars, and other repositories of provisions under ground, or on a ground floor, should now be made frost-proof by banks, more useful as well as more stable than some other things with the same name, but which farmers should deal with as little as possible. Treat your cattle in such a manner that they may be convinced that you are their friends, otherwise they will be wild and ferocious, and will not thrive nor fatten so kindly. Settle your accounts, and make your books *square* at the end of the year, least by and by you find yourself debtor to such *round* sums that you will be obliged to turn a sharp corner in order to take yourself off in a *right line* from the Sheriff.



The Pictou Coach will start at 6 o'clock, on the mornings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and arrive in Halifax the following day at 2 o'clock, p. m.

The Halifax Coach will start on the mornings of Monday and Friday at 6 o'clock, and arrive in Pictou next day, at 2 o'clock, p. m. On Wednesday the Coach will leave at 3 o'clock, p. m. and stop all night at Hill's Inn.

The above is the Summer arrangement—some alteration usually takes place in the times of leaving, &c. during the Autumn and Winter, as the state of the roads at those periods will not generally allow of the Summer arrangements being continued.


A Stage Coach also runs between Amherst and St. John, N. B. once in the week.

A Stage also runs daily between Miramichi and Bathurst, and another which leaves Miramichi with the Mails for Richibucto, Petitcodiac and Dorchester every Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, and returns with the Mails to Miramichi on the morning of Saturday, this Stage meets at Dorchester the Couriers for Halifax and St. John.

Another Stage starts from Miramichi for Richibucto and Bathurst, every Saturday morning, immediately after the arrival of the Steamer Cape-Breton from Pictou and Prince Edward Island, returning in time to enable persons to take passage in that Boat on her return on Monday morning.

The Parrsboro' Packet sails regularly to Windsor and Horton every week, from the 1st of April till Christmas; leaves Parrsboro' for Windsor, on Monday, (wind and weather permitting) and will sail from thence for Parrsboro' on Tuesday, immediately after the arrival of the Mail by the Royal Western Mail Coach, if practicable—leaves Parrsboro' on Thursday, for Horton, and will sail from thence for Parrsboro' the first high water at or after 8 o'clock in the morning. *Passengers who wish to cross from Parrsboro'* should be at PARTRIDGE ISLAND the evening previous to the Packet's sailing, as she often leaves the wharf at the River before daylight. The Packet frequently makes extra trips both to Windsor and Horton.
