THE PUBLISHER'S NOTES.

Reader, wilt thou take our Notes? Happily they may be of as much advantage as better men's paper—mistake us not; ours are no Nova-Scotia, or Halifax Bank Notes—would that they were, both for our own sake and thine! Nor are they even those *blue things*, issued from the Provincial Treasury, for which, turn up our noses at them as we may, or deery them as we will, we must honestly confess, we feel nevertheless an *itching palm* for them. No! our notes are but those of praise, and thanks, and rejoicing. Our production, we hope will be found to possess somewhat more merit than magnitude, and in that hope we have the honor to present to the public “*The Farmer's Almanack*,” for 1834. As the greater part of an Almanack must, of necessity, consist of repetitions, dull as a Greek Lexicon, and as stale as a seed cucumber, we have endeavoured to make it as generally interesting as its limited extent would allow, by introducing such information, as has been heretofore given.

The various communications received, we should have had much pleasure in publishing, few of them are fitted for the Almanack, almost all being too long. Of poetry all that is wanted is something suitable for the columns of each month, which we have heretofore selected. Should any of our friends favour us with some for that purpose, we shall feel highly indebted to them.

The following letter received in the fall of 1832, and which came too late for publishing in the Almanack for 1833, we cannot refrain from giving here. It is copied *verbatim* from the original, and we shall be happy to hear again from the writer:

GUT OF CANSO, Sept. 22, 1832.

Dear Sir,—I feel it a duty incumbent on me to return you my sincere thanks for the many useful and entertaining informations in your Almanack, and as I am a poor man, and cannot pay for a newspaper, and indeed this present year I got none of the Almanacks but I hope if I am alive I will have one for the ensuing year, I therefore earnestly hope you will, instead of giving the poor farmer any directions, as the poor man is always doing his best, that you will now direct the women how to teach their children how to take care of there crockery, knives and forks, and spoons and how to keep every thing in its proper place. I feel confident if such directions were given by you that my own wife would take better care and most likely shew some good examples in the neighbourhood, as the poor woman places great confidence in your Almanack; perhaps there are plenty houses as unruly as mine, but I hope if I live till this time next year, that I will be able to give you a fair account of my own. I feel concerned I am rather late for your calculations; if I am, please give some of your neighbouring printers a hint of this kind, although it would not be half so useful in my own house as the Almanack would be, perhaps it would have some effect on our neighbours, and that the example would be followed some way or other—had you known perfectly what the poor people suffers here from the neglect of there wives and house-keepers, I am sure you would not hesitate in giving them some useful directions, which would be of great service. There are many bad bridges and some rivers and creeks, having none at all in this place, if you were to see it, you would almost think that the last inhabitants arrived last year, I need not put you in mind of the expenditure of our provincial revenues, you well know it; if I see that you take any notice of this, I will hereafter explain myself to you more, and give any useful information required from this place.

Cometary Astronomy.

Within the last few years greater light has been thrown on the nature of Comets, as to their physical structure, and laws of motion, than could possibly be anticipated by the astronomers of antiquity. Comets seem in all ages to have made peculiar impression on every class of society, the learned as well as the unlearned; they were a terror to princes, a mystery to philosophers, gloomy presages of calamity to those countries from whence they were visible, and powerful agents for the crafty to excite the fears of the superstitious and credulous. The German and French philosophers predicted that the comet of Biela would, in the year 1832, breathe desolation on the human race, and by its snock, reduce this beautiful world to its original chaos. Notices appeared relative to a comet, said to be visible, and those who possessed telescopes were directed to the place in the heavens where the monster was to be found; every one, who saw it, wondered that it remained stationary; it would, indeed, have been a wonderful phenomenon if it had moved, for this fancied comet proved to be the nebula in the girdle of Andromeda, the position of which, in the heavens, was as permanent as that of any of the fixed stars! At length the expected comet did appear, but only dimly seen with the telescope: it passed the earth's orbit, crossed the paths of Venus and Mercury, mingled its mysterious cloud-like form with the solar rays, and disappeared.

The periods of comets vary from $3\frac{1}{2}$ years, (that of the comet of Encke,) to 75 years, the period of the Halley comet; 575 years the comet of 1680; 3363 years that of 1811; and 7334 years, which is the period of the comet of 1743.

The mind contemplates with astonishment the very lengthened periods assigned to some of these erratic bodies; the imagination travels back to those epochs, when they were seen by our ancestors with superstitious awe, or devout religious feeling. The comet of Halley;—this may, it is probable, be seen in 1835, by the Octogenarian who witnessed it in 1759 with childish curiosity and terror. What a contrast is at once presented to the mind, the beauty and simplicity of infancy, and the querulousness and decrepitude of age. A flourishing, populous, extensive empire witnesses one of these splendid bodies shaking its tresses as it passes onwards to the realms of space; it completes its revolution of centuries, it returns,—the empire has decayed, the name scarcely remembered, it exists only on the page of history. A comet proceeds on its awful course of thousands of years, and glancing by a bright and beautiful world, visits realms beyond the reach of thought; it wheels its car homewards, and misses this bright and beautiful world from the system, or meets only with its chaotic and scattered fragments! Though vast to

the finite mind—these numbers, periods, and distances, what are they, but a drop in the ocean of infinity! a point in the abyss of eternal duration! On the vast scale of eternity and the broad region of interminable extent what are thousands of years, and millions of wandering bodies—but the duration of the splendour of a dew-drop before it is exhaled! There is *time*, and there is *space* for all these revolutions in the ample dominions of the universe of GOD.

Eclipses in the Year 1834.

"Who marshals this bright host! enrolls their names,
Appoints their post, their marches, and returns,
Punctual at stated periods? who disbands
These veteran troops, their final duty done,
If e'er disbanded?—He, whose potent word,
Like the loud trumpet, levied first their powers
In Night's inglorious empire, where they slept
In beds of darkness; armed them with fierce flames;
Arranged, and disciplined, and clothed in gold,
And called them out of Chaos."

There will be five eclipses this year, three of the Sun and two of the Moon, as follows, viz:—I. The first will be of the Sun, on *Thursday* January 9th at 6h. 56m. evening, invisible. It would also have been invisible in the Provinces, had it happened before sunset, on account of the moon's south latitude; but in the Antarctic ocean and the greater part of the south frigid zone, it will be visible and very great.

II. The second will also be of the SUN, on *Saturday* June 7th at 5h. 43m. morning, invisible by reason of the moon's south latitude: but visible and total in a great part of the south polar regions.

III. The third will be of the MOON on the morning of *Saturday*, June 21st, total and mostly visible. Should the air be clear at the time this eclipse will exhibit a rare and most grand and beautiful spectacle: the Moon during the time of her total immersion in the earth's shadow will appear of a variable blood red, or brown or copper color, and her light will be weak and pale for some time before and after immersion. Its phases at Halifax will be as follows, viz.

IV. The fourth will be of the SUN, on *Sunday*, Nov. 30, in the afternoon, a great and visible eclipse; total at Charleston, S. C. and at other places in that state, and Georgia, the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean. Its phases at Halifax, will be as follows, viz.

Two thirds of the moon's diameter will be obscured on her southern limb in the north side of the earth's shadow.

The Asteroids.

Several strange opinions have been entertained respecting these beautiful bodies arising from the remarkable peculiarities of their motions and physical phenomena. Some have supposed that the immense atmospheres of two of them are derived from the "lost comet of 1770." Others have considered them as the fragments of an exploded planet, and that meteorolites, which occasionally fall to the earth, are some of the smaller masses. On this subject it has been suggested that, as the component parts of meteorolites are similar to terrestrial substances, there does not seem any necessity for tracing them to so distant a source as a planet that once moved between Mars and Jupiter. But these small planets are neither the wreck of a ruined world, nor are they wrapped in the newly acquired train of a comet wandering from its course. In the whole of creation, wherever the power of the Divine Being is evinced, there is also displayed harmony, and an arrangement for the general preservation; a beautiful connection may be traced, uniting bodies apparently opposite in their natures, gliding through the various links which ascend from the minute to the stupendous—from the grain of sand that fetters the proud ocean, to the rolling world, and all the vast orbs that move through immensity.

Morning and Evening Stars.

Venus (♀) will be Morning Star until March 7th, then Evening Star, until December 21st and thence Morning Star through the year.

Jupiter (♃) will be Evening Star till May 9th, and then Morning Star to the end of the year.

Astronomical Phenomena.

The Moon will run highest this year about the 12th degree of Cancer (♋) and lowest about the degree of Capricorn (♐).

Latitude of Herschell (♄) about 44 minutes South this year.

Longitude of Moon's (♌) ascending node in the middle of this year, 2 signs, 26 degrees.

Mean obliquity of the Ecliptic in the middle of this year $23^{\circ} 27' 40, 7''$. True obliquity $23^{\circ} 27' 41, 4''$.

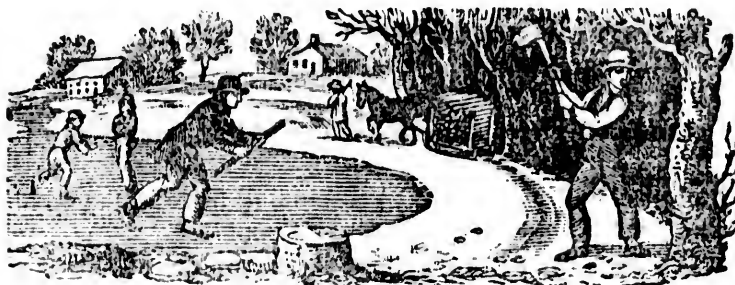
RIGHT HAND PAGE.—*First column*, contains the days of the month. *Second*, Holidays, Weather, &c. *Third*, Farmer's Calendar.

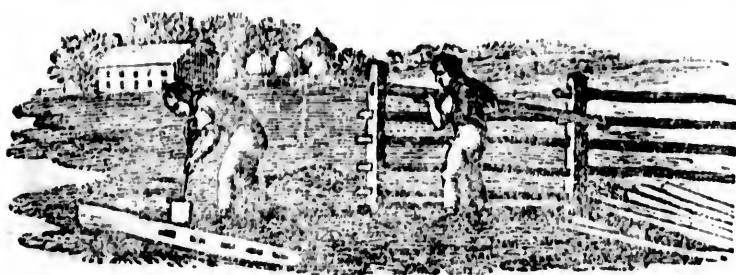

sipping and gambling, turn it

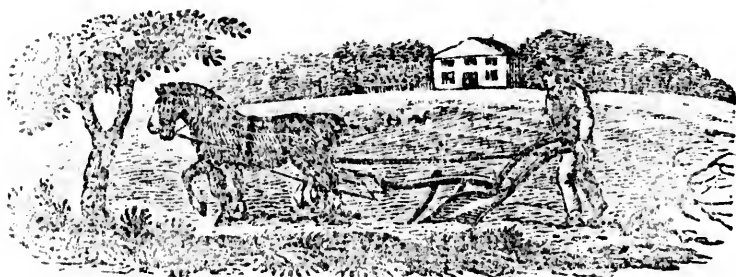

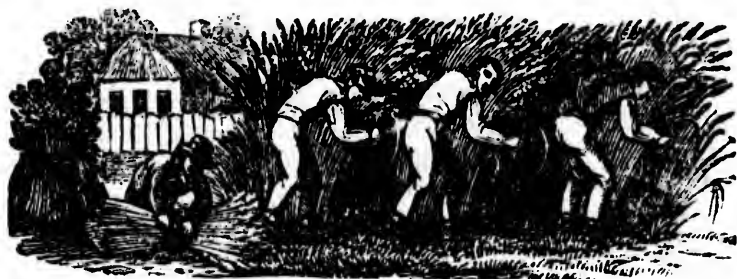

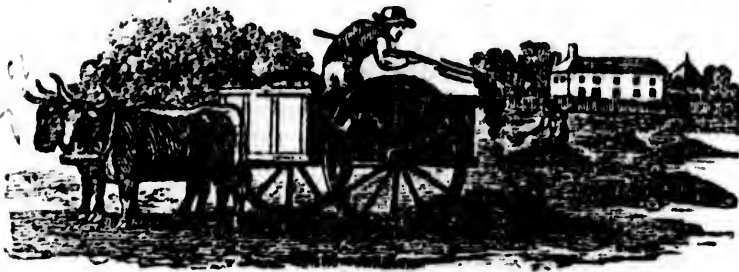
