The report shows that the growth during the period of eleven months. from Jan. 1 to Nov. 30, 1912, is very striking, while the number of customers and the volume of business is still only a small fraction of the field available at present, and the field itself is continually growing. It also predicts a saving during the year of 1913, owng to the reduced rates from the procial commission.

Altho the report on the city audits findings should remove some serious misconceptions which have been circulated as to the state of the undertaking, and altho its financial posttion should give a high degree of satsfaction, the auditors are not prepared to endorse the whole organization which they say, "the commissioners took over in a far form satisfactory condition." The firm of Mackay & Co. think that satisfactory conditions have not yet been established. "We think, however," said the auditors, "that the commissioners should disregard all considerations but those of the wellbeing of the enterprise and the main tenance of just and honorable standards in their dealings and relations with all parties and interests, in their insistence upon a capable, high-grade and enterprising administration."

Particulars of London Loan Were Given to Treasury Board - Always Open to Public Inspection — Credit of Toronto Stands High in London, Says Treasurer.

The city saved money by sending ex-Mayor Geary and City Treasurer Coady to London last summer in search of a loan, according to the report submitted to the treasury board late last night by Mr. Coady. These particulars have always been opened to public inspection, he says, and the reason why he hesitated to give further information is that he wanted the consent of the London bankers, as well as the treasury board. He also affirms that the credit of the city stands high in Lon-

His latest report reads:

"Referring to Report No. 2 of the reasury board, reporting to council inormation respecting the negotiations by the mayor and the treasurer in conction with the floating of £1,200,000 sterling 12 months' treasury bills of the City of Toronto, bearing interest 4 1-2 per cent, maturing Aug. 1, 1913, I beg to report for the further nformation of the council, that the cost of floating the loan was merely the usual charges incidental to any similar transaction, namely: Bankers' and brokers' commission, 1-16th per cent. respectively, making 1-8 of 1 per cent., or £1500 sterling; English stamp duties, one shilling per £100, or £600: net loss on exchange, \$222.43, or say £45; mayor's and treasurer's expenses, as already reported to council, £345. 

'Fruit-a-tives' Makes Wonderful

N. W. Rowell Says Existing Conditions Must Be Altered So That Ontario Will Become the Best Possible Home For the Workingman and His Family.

In the following address, delivered efore the Men's Union of the Earlscurt Methodist Church last night, N

ccurt Methodist Church last night, N. W. Rowell refers to the social problem as the one upon the solution of which, the people of Ontario should work most diligently.

"One of the most encouraging and significant facts in modern life is the new and almost worldwide interest taken in social problems. In the past the emphasis has been laid upon the rights of property. Now the emphasis is being laid upon the rights of humanity. Our problems of the future will be largely social.

"In this new country with its great natural resources and its rapidly in-Glencoe, Ont., Aug. 15, 1911.







GERMANY'S BAD YEAR HER PRIDE WOUNDED

Feeling That in Case of War Conditions of 1870 Would be Reversed, Leaves Unpleasant Taste.

KRUPP GUNS INFERIOR

India's and Canada's Proposed Contributions Put End to Ambition to Equal Britain.

BERLIN, Dec 20 .- The year of 1912, now ending, has indeed been one of ill-omen to Germany. In spite of all official efforts to minimize the effects of the reports spread abroad, that Krupp guns had proved hopelessly inferior to those turned out by the French Creuzot works, there remains even in military circles a very unpleasant feeling that, in case of a war with France, the conditions of 1870 would be reversed; and that this time it would be the German soldiers who would have to go into battle heavily handicapped by inferior arms. The blunder of a French postmaster a few weeks ago, resulting in a trial mobilization of the reserves of a whole French district, showed not only that France is ready at a moment's notice; but also that the men are not only willing, but eager.

This Hurt Some. But the last and heaviest blow to German ambitions fell, when it was announced that the princes of India had resolved to present England with a whole squadron of modern warships, and that Canada would contribute three Dreadnoughts, for it at once put an end to Germany's ambitions to become at least the equal of Great Britain on the sea. At first everybody was dumbfounded, but German resourcefulness soon asserted itself, and, while nothing has so far been decided officially, it may be taken for granted that, should England decide to accept the gift, no attempt will be made even by the German Navy League to raise the necessary money to go England one better, but Germany will concentrate all her energies towards becoming the absolute ruler of the air, by the construction of an enormous aerial navy of dirigible Zeppelins and Parsevals. Already, a few days after the first expressed. the first announcement of the proposed Indian gift to England, certain very influential papers, like The National Zeitung and others in close touch with

G. N. W. Announces Its New Schedule Which Becomes Effective on January First.

The Great North-Western Company announces that, beginning Jan. 1, 1913, the rate on deferred cable messages between Canada and Great Britain and Ireland will be reduced to nine cents, in place of twelve and one-half cents, per word as at present. The conditions governing this service remain unchanged, messages being subject to delivery within 24 hours of the time

Effective the same date the G. N. W Telegraph Co. will also reduce the rate for cable letters to 75 cents for twelve words and five cents for each additional word, from the present rate of \$1.50 for 20 words; and the rate on week-end letters will be made \$1.15 for 24 words and five cents for each additional word, in place of \$1.50 for 30 words, as heretofore. From the same date delivery of cable letters will be made the following day and week-end letters on Monday, instead of Tuesday, delivery in each case being 24 hours earlier than at present.

Transmission to Montreal.

In addition to the material reduction in cost, the charges named above include telegraphic transmission to the cable terminal at Montreal, and cable and week-end letters may also be written in plain language of the country of destination, as well as the country of origin. If addressed to points in Great Britain or Ireland, other than London and Liverpool, an extra charge of one cent per word will be made, or if to Holland and Belgium an additional charge of two cents per word will be made. These messages may also be sent to other countries subject to mail delivery from London, or telegraphic delivery on payment of the regular charges beyond London.

The trade ignored it for a time, but when a private authority was rumored The trade ignored it for a time, but when a private authority was rumored—and the rumor lacked confirmation or denial—to have estimated the Canadian crop at 50,000,000 bushels less than the government, wheat suddenly became well worth having. Speculators who have been negatively bullish suddenly became active and shorts got from under. All this occurred despite the sluggish cash market and a heavy movement to primary points, today's receipts being almost treble the quantity of the corresponding day a year ago.

To date the movement aggregated 28,000 hushels more than for the entire crop year of 1911 and 1,000,000 bushels greater than 1900.

Strength in Corn.

A poor cash market and excellent weather for shelling, conditioning and shipping, influenced the corn market early, but strength developed with the later advance in wheat and closing prices were close to the top. Cash grades were steady.

The ratio of net earnings per ton of steel sold in 1902 was \$16,25; in 1911; \$11; and in 1912, estimated, \$8.78 a ton.

The failure of the Steel Corporation to increase its earnings in proportion to output is due to various causes, among them advanced wages, increased taxes, profit sharing and pension systems and lower steel prices.

If the Steel Corporation paid the same average wage today as it did a decade ago there would be a saving of between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000. Then again the corporation is paying in taxes close to \$10,000,000 a year, compared with \$2,391,465 in 1902. Welfare work is costing close to \$5,000,000 a year. MERCHANTS' BANK OF CANADA

Proceedings at the Forty-ninth Annual Meeting of Shareholders.

The forty-ninth annual meeting of shareholders of the Merchants' Bank of Canada took place at the head offices of the Bank on Wednesday, December 18th. Among those present were the following: Sir H. Montagu Alian, Messas, K. W. Biackwell, Thomas Long, A. Barnet, C. C. Ballantyne, A. J. Dawes, F. Howard Wilson, J. Patterson, E. Fiske, J. Piddington, D. A. Lewis, R. Campbell-Nelles, W. A. Fillion, C. R. Black, T. E. Merrett, A. D. Fraser, R. Shaw, H. B. Loucks, D. C. Macarow, W. R. Miller, J. M. Kilbourn and A. Dingwall.

The President of the Bank, Sir H. Montagu Alian, was asked to take the chair, and Mr. J. M. Kilbourn was appointed secretary to the meeting. The notice calling the meeting was read.

The minutes of the last meeting were presented and taken as read.

THE DIRECTORS' REPORT.

The President then read the annual report of the Directors, as follows:

"I beg to submit the Annual Report of the Directors and the Profit and Loss and General Statement of the Bank covering operations for the past twelve months.

"On an average Paid-up Capital of \$6,495,232, there has been earned the sum of \$1,235,344.52. Adding the balance brought forward from last year, there is \$1,397,722.36 to be disposed of. This has been dealt with as follows: Dividend of 10 per cent. on the Paid-up Capital, \$643,004; written off Bank Premises, \$100,000; contributed to the Officers' Pension Fund, \$150,000, and added to Reserve Fund, \$450,000, enabling us to carry forward \$145,713.27 in the Profit and Loss Account. Your Directors consider this a favorable showing.

"Our Reserve Fund this year has been further augmented by the premium on new stock (lasued at 175), amounting to \$550,760, bringing it up to \$5,410,760, or a fraction over \$5\$ per cent. of the Paid-up Capital.

"During the past year we have opened offices at the following points, viz:

"In Alberta: Delburne, Alberta Avenue (Edmonton), Hanna, Hughenden, Redelliff and Walsh; in Saskatchewan; Battleford; in Ontario: Bradford, Guelph and Walskerville; in Quebec' Centre Street (Montreal), and St. Jovite.

"We have not closed any agencies. All the offices of the Bank have been inspected during the year.

"During the year we have lost two of our esteemed Directors, one by death and one by retirement: Mr. Charles M. Hays, whose death we greatly deplored and whose loss was national, and, later on in the year, our valued colleague, Mr. Hays, whose death we greatly deplored and whose loss was national, and, later on in the year, our valued colleague, Mr. Hodgson resigned, on account of advanced age. Mr. Hodgson has served on the Board of this Bank for over Inity, five years, and his advice at the Board's councils was very highly esteemed. During the last ten years he was our Vice-President. We hope Mr. Hodgson, in refirement, may enjoy many years yet of health and happin

out the country. We were impressed with the fact that the Bank is well represented at all points, and capably handled.

"We have much pleasure in testifying to the continued excellent work of the staff, in recognition of of the satisfactory results of the business for the past year and the strong representations of the Gen Board have decided to depart from the policy hitherto followed and have granted a bonus to the staff.

It was then moved by the President, Sir H. Montagu Ailan, and seconded by the Vice-President, Mr. K. W. Blackwell, that the report of the Directors, as submitted, be and is hereby adopted, and ordered to be printed for distribution amongst the shareholders.

In making the motion, the President said:

"I think you will all agree with me that this is a very satisfactory report. This statement of the result of the Bank's business for the year is better than at any time during the history of the Bank. You all know that no matter who the Board of Directors may be, or how clever they may be, there is very little that can be done by them except through the assistance of the Staff, and I may say that our General Manager has proved himself, not only on this occasion, but on various other occasions one of the best, and one who has devoted himself entirely to your interests. I have great pleasure in testify—

"We traveled through the west this summer, the Vice-President, Mr. Long and myself. We had an enjoyable trip, with beautiful weather. We traveled as comfortably as we could, but we had hard work to do, all the same. We stopped at twenty-one places in twenty-six days, and we went over the business of the Bank in these places and discussed matters with the Managers. We found everywhere that the enthusiasm was tremendous, and that all were entirely devoted to the interests of the Bank, which was a very satisfactory state of affairs, indeed."

The General Manager, Mr. E. F. Hebden, made a few remarks in regard to the report and the business of the Bank. The following bylaws were then taken up and considered and the amendments passed unanimously:

Bylaw No. 1.—That the Annual General Meeting should be held on the third Wednesday in the month of May in every year.

Bylaw No. III.—Increasing the number of directors to twelve.

Bylaw No. VI.—Providing for the remuneration of the directors.

In reply to a question by Mr. Patterson as to the period to be covered by the next statement, the Vice-President said that it would cover five months and then the regular annual statements.

Messrs. A. Piddington and J. Patterson were appointed scrutineers, and one ballot was cast electing the following directors: Sir H. Montagu Allan, K. W. Blackwell, Thomas Long, Alex, Barnet, F. Orr Lewis, Andrew A. Allan, C. C. Ballantyne, Andrew J. Dawes, F. Howard Wilson, Farquhar Robertson, George L. Cains, A. B. Evans.

On motion of Mr. C. R. Black, seconded by Mr. A. Piddington, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to the President, Vice-President and Board of Directors.

It was also moved and seconded by the same gentlemen that an expression of warm appreciation of their services be tendered the General Manager and the Staff. Passed unanimously.

The President then declared the meeting closed.
