

## THE TRADES PARLIAMENT.

Many subjects of interest discussed by the Representatives of Organized Labor.

The Trades and Labor Council met last evening, Mr. Robert Gockingman in the chair. The Legislative Committee, in their report, referred to the attack on the Barnardo Home Boys' question. Correspondence was submitted from residents in the Muskoka district, stating that the boys are farmed out to the poorer farmers of the district who receive 45 cents per month for their board. In addition to receiving the benefit of their services, many of the farmers keep three, four and even six boys at their farms. Consequently the schools are over crowded. The report also stated that agents refuse to give boys for adoption in this district. It was recommended that the bonus of \$2 per head now paid to the houses by the Dominion Government be withdrawn, and the saving applied to meet the cost of maintaining Government inspectors in each of the homes.

The Municipal Committee agreed with the proposal of Mr. Burns in reference to relief work, that money should not be spent except for the most necessary purposes. The resolution was offered to Ald. Preston's committee that all the dead ends of water mains be connected; also that sewers be put down on street not now sewered, and that the water outfall be renewed, even if the property owners do not petition for it. The construction of these works would go a long way to solve the problem of work for the unemployed. The proposal to do street cleaning by contract was denounced.

The payment of Mr. Johnston's costs in the Co. suit by the City Council was endorsed and regret expressed that the city had left it to private citizens to carry on this fight against a great monopoly. The refusal of the council to be influenced by the D. J. Telephone Co. in reference to the renewal of their agreement was commended.

The Toronto Ferry Co. was advised to accept the hint given by the Mayor and the Council to the effect that before the city was driven to provide other means of reaching the island. The proposal to establish a swimming bath was concurred in and St. Andrew's Market was suggested as a suitable site for this purpose.

The committee feared that the assessment policy of the Mayor will be the cause of the disadvantage of the commercial and industrial classes. His policy is by the upbuilding of the manufacturing industries of the city, were quoted, and the fact remarked that on this policy he received the vote.

The death of Hugh Hutchinson. In the issue of the 10th of Dec. 23 last was published under the heading "Hugh Hutchinson's death," a communication reflecting somewhat severely upon three respected citizens of the town of old Niagara, Messrs. James Aikens and W. H. J. Evans, who hold the office of justice of the peace, and Mr. James McMillan, hotel proprietor, residing there. The World has investigated the facts in connection with the unfortunate event commented upon in the communication, and regrets to state that a communication, which has since been done these gentlemen by the publication referred to.

It appears that during the deer shooting season last autumn, a couple of deer were sent by express to Mr. McMillan, who supposed they were a present from some kind friend. When a day or two had passed, the real motive of his generous friend appeared, when he discovered that the deer had been clandestinely removed during the night, and taken, as is supposed, across the river to Toronto. Some persons inimical to Mr. McMillan, at once jumped to the conclusion that he was a party to a scheme of attempting to evade the statutes prohibiting the export of deer from Ontario, and began circulating reports to that effect, but no one was found to come forward and prove the charge. Mr. McMillan, being entirely innocent of any complicity in the job whatever, resented the fullest investigation in the matter and called upon his accusers to lay an information against him before the proper authorities, whereby the facts could be fully brought to light. This they did not do, but chose rather to continue to repeat their malicious statements concerning him behind his back. Thereupon a friend of the accused, through the communication spoken of in the communication in question, laid an information against Mr. McMillan, and Mr. Evans and Mr. Aikens, J.P.s, heard the evidence and dismissed the charges. Mr. McMillan being shown to be entirely innocent of any connection with the affair, every opportunity was afforded at the trial to any parties to prove the charge laid, but no evidence was offered to connect Mr. McMillan with it in any way.

Having thus entirely failed to injure Mr. McMillan, and being annoyed at exposing Hutchinson for having been the means of exposing the same, the accusers proceeded to discuss, apparently very seriously, the motion of prosecuting him for compounding a felony. He had not been strong for some weeks, and the anxiety and worry occasioned by over-hearing this conversation is believed to have preyed upon him that he took his own life before learning that he had been the victim of a heartless practical joke.

The statements in the communication reflecting upon the magistrates who heard the case and who are all highly esteemed residents of Niagara, were printed innocently by The World, and we cheerfully express our regrets at having been imposed on by the communication, and at having done any injustice to the gentlemen in question.

## ON THE BIG LAKES.

Delays of Vessels—Corona's Launch on May 25—Big Grain Shipments—General Marine News.

Steamer Cuba will unload a cargo of flour from Toledo and clear for Montreal. The Albatross cleared last night for the port of Oswego to load coal. Steamer St. Joseph brought a cargo of coal and a quantity of machinery to load coal for a Toronto firm.

Steamer Ocean will arrive to-day from Hamilton and at 4 p.m. will clear with passengers and freight for Montreal. The schooner Vienna arrived in port yesterday and cleared for Oswego to load coal for a Toronto firm.

The first accident of the season at the Island occurred yesterday. Robert McKinley, 218 Manning-avenue, was crushed between a ferry steamer and the Point wharf, sustaining a severe injury to his hip.

Buffalo vessels are holding out for an advance in coal rates. There is still a good demand in Buffalo for Lake Michigan tonnage. The steamer Morley, which went ashore at Clayton, Ontario, on examination, was found badly damaged.

While running for shelter on Tuesday the steamer Ontario struck a reef of Devil Island and sprung a bad leak. She is in Washburn harbor. There is no doubt that the vessel was undertaken by the City Commissioner, whose man at that port, the plating between the tracks at the foot of Yonge-street.

Chicago grain carriers have agreed to accept nothing less than 1-2 cents on corn to Buffalo. On Wednesday there was a serious riot between union and non-union longshoremen at the Toledo, O. docks. The steamer had on board a party of builders, owners and newspaper men. She left on her first trip to Buffalo last evening with about 200 invited guests on board, and will arrive at that port about 10 a.m. to-day. The City of Buffalo reached the City of Alpena coming down, and beat her easily, showing 21 miles an hour.

Limnith Crossing still proves the bete noir of the mariner in the Detroit River. The steamer Westmore, with a tow struck yesterday, but was released. Enormous Grain Shipments. Some idea of the extent of grain shipments this season may be gathered from the fact that shipments from the head of Lake Superior have already reached the amount of 9,000,000 bushels, and there are in store about 12,000,000 bushels. The shipments include 4,500,000 bushels of wheat, 2,500,000 bushels of barley, 1,500,000 bushels of corn, 1,000,000 bushels of oats, 500,000 bushels of flax and 500,000 bushels of rye. There are also 10,000,000 bushels of wheat in store, 2,000,000 bushels of flax, 400,000 bushels of barley, 200,000 bushels of oats, 100,000 bushels of rye. In spite of the heavy shipping, there is still a large surplus in store than there was a year ago at this time and 2,000,000 bushels of oats.

Dean Richmond's Wreck Found. The wreck of the fastest steamer Dean Richmond, which, on Oct. 14, 1882, foundered with all on board, is believed to have been discovered Tuesday the fishing tug Seabird discovered, about four miles northwest of the mouth of the Detroit river, in water a hundred feet deep. The spar was held down by a wire rope, only two feet showing above the water. The find is in the supposed track of the Dean Richmond.

The Ferry Fleet. The big steamer Thistle of the Toronto Ferry Company's service will be placed on the island route today should the weather prove favorable. On Monday the whole fleet of the Ferry Company will be in the harbor, as the remaining boats, the Primrose, Mayflower and Gertrude, will then arrive from Oakville. On Saturday, May 23, every boat in the fleet will be in commission and from that day on a full service between Yonge and Brock-streets and the Point and Park will be given.

Date Fixed at Last. After many delays, it is at last announced that the new Niagara River Line, Corona will be launched at the Bertram ship yard on Saturday, May 23 at 4 p.m. Messrs. Bertram explain that the boat might have been launched sooner, but that certain work now being in progress could not be pushed forward rapidly by delaying the launch. Every effort will be made to get the boat in condition to run before the middle of the season. The woodwork, which is being constructed by the Niagara Navigation Company, is nearly in readiness, and there will be little further delay.

FOR LATE LETTERS. Convenient Scheme Arranged at the New Station. The new regulations now in force at the Union Station prohibiting the public from access to the railway platforms will not deprive the citizens of the privilege of sending late letters away by mail cars. A clause will carry such letters from the general waiting room to the mail cars, and forms below whence they will be released five minutes before the trains go out.
