The United States probably knows its own business better than we do. It is not for Canada to request the United States to revoke its infriendly alien labor law, but we will be wanting in our duty if we do not pass retaliatory legislation in regard to American labor. There are several ways by which we can retaliate and bring the Americans to their senses. British Columbia and New Ontario are full of Americans, who enjoy exactly Canada in the acquisition of mining locations. The town of Bothwell at the present time is overrun with Americans, who are grabbing hundreds of acres of the best oil-producing land in the neighborhood. Many American workingmen have come and are now ting into this country with outfits for drilling wells in the new Bothwell oil fields. Such an influx of Canadian workingmen into the United States would not be tolerated. Why should the Canadian Government not treat the Americans just as they treat us? Let Canada threaten to withdraw the privilege enjoyed by the Americans of aking up mining locations in this country, let them threaten to deport the American oil men now at work in the Bothwell territory, and we think such howl will be raised as will compel the American Government to abolish its alien labor law. No other country in the world is treated so niggardly by the United States as is its neighbor to the north. We should acquaint the Yankees with the fact that two can play at this game.

cil met yesterday afternoon and discussed cil met yesterday afternoon and discussed the questions of abolishing the personalty tax assessment and substituting therefor a business tax. The chairman strongly advocated the business tax idea, and gave illustrations of how it would work out in practice. He quoted the case of the Coffee House, which is assessed at \$45,000 for realty and \$4000 personalty. The tax on personalty now paid by the institution, which gives its shareholders a good dividend, is about \$65. By the business tax of 7½ per cent. upon the rental value of the premises occupied, on the basis of 7 per cent., the institution would pay \$225. The Queen's Hotel on the same basis would pay \$840, instead of \$400, as at present. Such were the statements of Ald. Spence, who admitted that with a business tax based upon the percentage given above, which is that adopted in Montreal, the total amount raised would probably not be equal to the annual revenue now derived from the personalty*tax, but he suggested that legislation be obtained to increase the percentage.





To do the work themselves costs them nothing but their own labor. If the city does it for them they have to pay the cold cash, which they neither have the inclination nor the ability to do. On the other hand, if there are any who want the city to do this clearing for them regularly, there is no obstacle to their entering into an agreement with the Commissioner whereby they waive their right to the 24 hours' grace.
