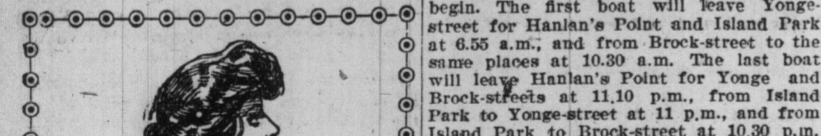

The Ponies scored their first run on Bannan's double and Massey's single. Two bases on balls and Bannan's second two-base hit produced the two in the eighth.

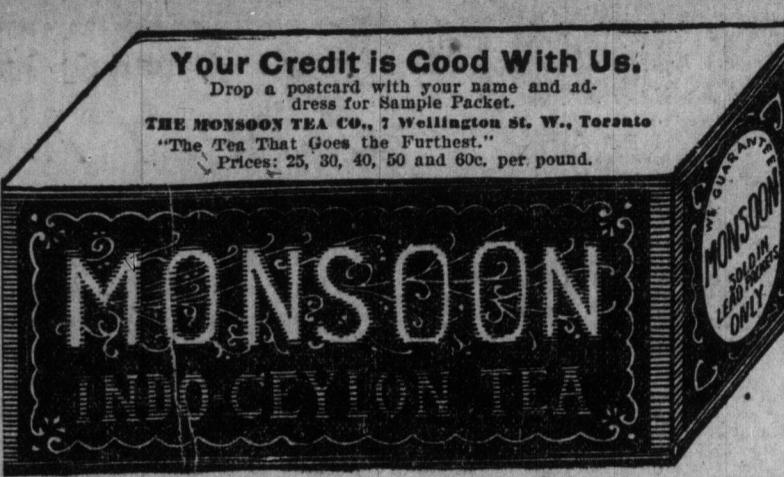

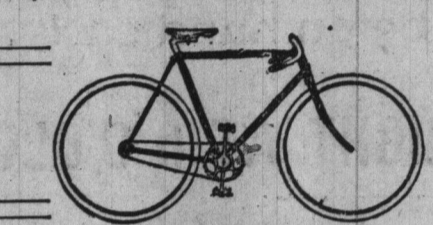

IN MEMORIAM: THE OLD CHIEF-TAIN.

The Toronto Conservative Club, in deciding to inaugurate an annual decoration of Sir John A. Macdonald's monument in the Queen's Park, has undertaken a function which will at once become popular with all loyal Conservatives and with the public generally. The party which Sir John A. so ably led for so many years is to-day not as led or as strong as it used to be. Its chief point of weakness is the lack of men who can command the loyalty of the whole party. Sir John A. Macdonald, when alive, was a chief whom every member of the party esteemed it an honor to serve. Even now, when he is gone, we do not know of anything around which the party can rally with more unanimity than around the monument of the greatest statesman in Canadian history. Although the motto of the Toronto Conservative Club's proposal has been a very short one, we have no doubt it will be largely attended and that the ceremony will be put a precursor of others of increasing popularity.

A RELIGIOUS BEAR GARDEN.

The Presbytery of Toronto have resolved to exclude the press from their convocations. The preachers in attendance are evidently ashamed to let their congregations know how they quarrel with one another at their meetings, and they have reason to be. They preach to their congregations about peace and goodwill and tell them that he that ruleth his spirit is greater than he that taketh a city, yet they apparently make no effort to control their own tempers, but bandy words, charge each other with falsehood and make unkind insinuations.

The disturbance on Thursday was not the first one of the kind. On the 3rd of May last, they had an equally disgraceful wrangle, and one of the elders present charged the ministers with red-tape, wire-pulling and tricky proceedings. The Presbyterians look to the newspapers for true reports of what goes on at the Presbytery. They do not want cooled reports, concealing unseemly quarrels, such as might be given out by representatives of the press were they not present.

Even the public at large has some right to know what goes on at these meetings. The churches are exempt from taxation, so that every taxpayer has to contribute toward their support, and the taxpayer has a right to know whether they are deserving of such consideration. The ministers should set an example to their congregations by showing as much kindness, good temper and good manners in their assemblies as would characterize the meetings of a body of scientists who make no professions of Christianity. Instead of avoiding public the Presbytery ought to court it. Publicity will improve their mental and moral qualities. This proposal to bury their heads in the sand, ostrich-like, will not cure, but will only aggravate the evil. When the press is ostracized the Presbytery Fair will come out in all its original colors. No ministers, a public expect more of you than this. A policy of concealment is a policy of hypocrisy. If you cannot control your tempers you had better let the light of publicity flood your debating chamber, and you will be surprised how rapidly you will improve. Be men. Face the evil. Don't run away from it.

THE UNITED STATES.

It is painful to know that such things can take place in Canada as are revealed in the report of the Royal Commission appointed to enquire into the treatment of workmen on the Crow's Nest Railway. Prompt measures should be taken by the Government, not only to prevent the recurrence of such outrages in the future, but to punish the guilty contractors, and force them to compensate the defrauded and abused workmen for their sufferings. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company received a check for three million dollars from the Dominion Government for this Crow's Nest Railway, and Sir William Van Horne has no right to engage contractors as slave drivers in its construction. All the workmen who have survived should be provided for, and the families of those who died from the effects of ill-treatment should be compensated. This is not a matter that can be shelved like most reports of Royal Commissions. It demands the earnest attention of the Government. These men were engaged under false pretences and deliberately defrauded. They were underpaid for their work, overworked for their board, and made to pay for things they never received and for services that were never rendered. They were regarded as beasts rather than as men, and a man who treated his beasts as badly as these poor workmen were treated by Canadian Pacific Railway contractors would be liable to prosecution by the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

THE SENATE AND THE FRANCHISE.

The Liberals will not be able to make much political capital out of the action of the Senate in amending the Franchise bill, providing for judicial appeal from the decision of a revising officer who is not a judge. The change will not affect Ontario. It merely gives to the voters of Manitoba, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia a privilege that the voters of the other provinces already possess. If it were proposed to even things up by taking away this privilege from the voters of Ontario, Quebec, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia, there would be good ground for a popular agitation against the Senate, but the voters of the provinces who already have the privilege will not object to the other provinces getting it, while the electors of Manitoba, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will be glad to see this remedy against the partisan unfairness shown by many revising officers in those provinces.

The idea that the Franchise bill is too sacred to be touched by the Senate, because the Liberals, while in opposition, proposed that the Federal Parliament should surrender its control over the franchise, is absurd. The Liberals have no ground for saying that they have a special mantle from the people to give the provincial legislatures complete control over the federal franchises. They said very little about the franchise during the last general election campaign, except to refer to the expenseiveness of the present system. It is true that this was one of the planks of the platform laid down at the Ottawa Liberal convention several years before, but "free trade" and "free press" in England was another one of the planks in the same platform, which was carefully kept out of sight during the campaign of 1886, and the Liberals will not now pretend that they have a mandate from the people to give the country free trade.

The new Franchise bill is wholly bad in principle, but the Senators have acted wisely in not making themselves responsible for a deadlock by throwing out the measure. The Government will now be responsible for any deadlock that may occur, if it refuses to accept the simple and just amendment of the Senate.

SANITATION OF THE SCHOOLS.

Editor World: Your editorial on the sanitary condition of the schools as set forth in Dr. Bryce's report, condemning the sanitary condition of Toronto Public Schools. You are entirely in error in this view. Dr. Bryce's report dealt only with the rented or temporary accommodation in connection with the schools. The Public School board itself has condemned the temporary accommodation quite as strongly as Dr. Bryce did, but the City Council have not followed it in England. The Public Schools themselves are quite as well lighted and ventilated as the best modern schools in England or the United States.

THE LATE MAJOR URBURAH.

"Go On, Lads; Don't Mind Me!" Said the Gallant Officer, After Receiving the Fatal Bullet.

### ESTIMATES NOW PASS

Sanctioned by Council Yesterday  
After Much Discussion.

Numerous Deputations Wait on the  
Council—Morning Session of Board  
of Works—Reports of City En-  
gineer Passed—Nubs of City Hall  
News.

It was a long, dreary day at the City  
Hall yesterday. The Council met, by special  
appointment, and struck the rate of 17  
mills. They finished their deliberations at  
1:30 and dined at Webb's.

The Board of Works met yesterday morning  
at 10 o'clock. The Hon. G. W. Ross, writing  
that the Government would not provide for the  
Victoria-street sidewalk beside the Normal  
School grounds. It was resolved to take up  
the sidewalk and sod the ground. The propo-  
sition to build a cedar path on the south  
side of the sidewalk, from Balmora-avenue to  
Victoria Park, was not entertained, be-  
cause the locality is outside of the city  
limits.

**Track Allowance and Pavements.**  
Ald. Lamb's resolution in Council, asking  
that the contracts for repaving track allow-  
ance pavements be advertised for bids, was  
approved. It was resolved to let the work  
by advertised contract, was, after discus-  
sion, sent to the City Engineer and the  
Solicitor to report upon.

A deputation of Clinton-street property  
owners asked the committee to have the  
Engineer withdraw his recommendation for a  
brick pavement on the street and to re-  
commend a cedar block upon the present  
foundation. Another section of the depu-  
tation favored brick. The matter was dis-  
posed of by Ald. Lamb's motion that the  
Board of Control be instructed to report  
to the Council on the brick pavement.

The Strath claim report led to a discus-  
sion upon holes left by contractors in the  
streets. Ald. Gowanlock inquired into the  
position of three huge holes on King-street,  
between Bay and Simcoe. The secretary noted  
the location for a report to the Engineer.

The Engineer was requested to report up-  
on the cost of grinding bowboards on  
both sides of King-street, from Bathurst  
to the subway, for the convenience of  
bikes.

**Woods' motion to pay the employees  
of the scavenging department the wages  
kept back from them on the Queen's Bir-  
ch, though Mr. Hubbard eloquently  
pointed out its illegality.**  
Ald. Lamb's motion, that the question of  
deferring a sum from Mr. Bromley's salary  
while he is away in England on a trip  
was referred, on motion, to the Engineer.

In his supplementary report to the Board  
of Works, the City Engineer requests the  
City Solicitor to prepare a by-law, insur-  
ing the surplus money at the credit of  
the railway pavements, to provide  
repairs of pavements upon the street rail-  
way track allowance on the following  
streets:  
King, Bathurst to Strachan, \$ 452 24  
Parliament, Gerrard to Carlton, 4 80  
Bathurst, Queen to Bloor, 4 80  
Front, Church to Frederick, 20 00  
The Rosedale loop line, 25,000 00  
Recreation Ground, 25,000 00  
Ditto on Dundas-avenue, 1,071 30  
\$30,000 51

**He also asks the Solicitor to prepare a  
by-law for the issue of new street railway  
debentures to the Board of Control, and  
to pay for repairs to pavements on various  
parts of Yonge, Queen, King, College, Car-  
leton and Lake-streets, and suggest to the  
Board of Control to advertise for tenders  
on one.**

**Council and Controllers' Report.**  
The Council met yesterday afternoon, and  
took up the report of the Board of Con-  
trol. Ald. Frankland wanted everything re-  
lating to elevators struck out. He declared  
that the Board had no authority to do so.  
The matter of tenders for Cattle Mar-  
ket site brought Ald. Frankland again to  
his feet, but, in the language of Ald. How-  
land, "It was too late!"

Ald. Lynd discussed the beauties of Man-  
sion brick and Canadian brick, claiming  
that the former was superior to the latter,  
and that some of the latter should be used  
in the Queen-street subway. It would make  
the street look like a patched quilt, was  
the alderman's opinion.

The matter of the Allen Manufacturing  
Company's bridge over a lane to Pearl-  
street aroused no little discussion, but, after  
Ald. Saunders, Lambert and Leslie  
had delivered addresses upon the meaning  
of a certain phrase, the clause passed.  
The Queen-street extension to High  
Park brought Ald. Gowanlock to his feet,  
who claimed that \$30 was not enough for  
the site. He also declared that the alderman  
advised him that the supposed arbitrators  
were merely valuers, with no power to take  
evidence, and the clause was through.

The class in the waterworks section,  
stating that the Board of Control could  
not concur in the recommendation of an  
extension of the water main on King-street  
west was struck out.

Ald. Lynd moved that the clause referring  
to the grant of \$30 to the Brotherhood of  
Locomotive Firemen be referred back.  
It was.

The grant to Mr. Lang, the heroic  
gentleman who went to the rescue of de-  
ceased Fireman Denoon, found an enthusiastic  
champion in Ald. Woods. The alderman  
wanted the sum of \$75 raised to \$150. His  
motion was lost.

Ald. Gowanlock directed his attention to  
the City Hall, when he moved that no e-  
levators be put in all the city got opera-  
tion. The motion failed.

Ald. Gowanlock's motion that the recom-  
mendations relating to the sidewalks on  
Lisgar, Northcote, Roscoe-avenue, Abell, Be-  
consfield, Gladstone and Sherbrooke-  
streets, be referred back to the committee, was  
carried.

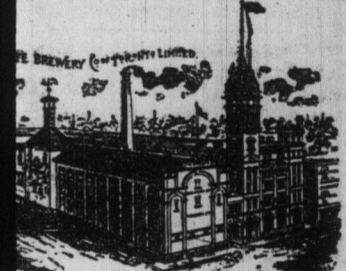

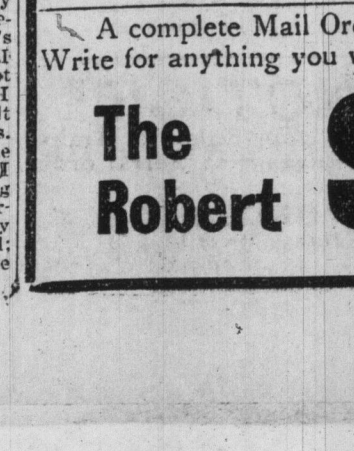
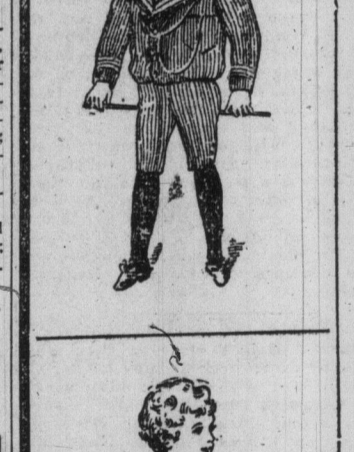

U.S. MINERAL WEALTH IN 1897

Totalled Nearly Three-Quarter Billion Dollars. About All the Nickel Treated in the United States Came from Sudbury, Ont.—Much Lead, Gold, Silver and Copper Ore Was Also Shipped from Canadian Mines.

The Engineering and Mining Journal publishes the statistics of mineral and metal production in the United States in 1897, volume VI. These show that the total value of production was \$778,968,614, which compares with a similar total of \$676,767,884 for 1896. The small increase shown is almost entirely to the lower values prevailing in 1897 for some of the most important items of production.

The most important item in quantity, value and the number of persons employed in producing it was coal. The total output of which in 1897 was 200,257,218 tons, showing an increase of about 12,000,000 tons over 1896. The gain in value, however, was only \$4,250,000, the average value of bituminous coal at the mine last year having been only 51c per short ton.

CHICAGO FUTURES HIGHER

But Ontario Wheat Declined Further Yesterday.

Large Argentine Shipments-Liberal American Clearances-Reported Damage to Crops in Kansas and Europe-Corn Weak and Provisions Higher-Markets and Cossip.

Friday Evening, June 3.

The regulation wheat crop scares have begun to come in. As if to offset the general promise of unusually profitable harvests, two of these bull runners got abroad yesterday. One was the effect that had weather is injuring some European crops, and the other that was in appearance in Kansas.

Provisions ruled higher at Chicago, partly on a comparatively small increase in the world's land stocks for the month of May.

Corn is 1/4 lower in Liverpool. Flour declined another shilling to-day at Liverpool.

September wheat puts at Chicago to-day 75c, calls 80c. Potatoes, good all next week, 72c, calls 80c.

July corn puts at Chicago to-day 52c, calls 55c. The Chicago express, leaving Toronto at 7:30 a.m. daily except Sunday, will run daily.

The Chicago express, leaving Toronto at 4 p.m., heretofore running through to Detroit and Chicago, will run only as far as London, while the London express will leave Toronto at 8:10 p.m., instead of 6:50 p.m., and will run through to Detroit and Chicago.

The Toronto to Chicago express will be attached first-class sleeper to Detroit, leaving there at 8:15 a.m. Passengers will be allowed to remain in sleeper until 8 a.m., a first-class sleeper and second-class coach attached to this train will run through to Chicago, without change, arriving in Chicago at 10:05 a.m.

Argentine wheat shipments for the past week have been: To United Kingdom, 61,000 quarters; to Continent, 44,000 quarters; to other ports, 12,000 quarters; total, 117,000 quarters.

The Modern Miller says: There is no apparent change in the demand for wheat crop and the outlook for a phenomenal yield still continues. Harvesting in the United States and southern Missouri will be in line the coming week.

Live stock receipts at Chicago to-day: Cattle 2,000, sheep 2,000, hogs 2,000. Market generally firm, sheep excepted. Twenty-four cars of export cattle left here to-day.

Allured Wheat Famine in Spain. Some very exaggerated statements are being published as to the destitution of Spain in respect of wheat.

The Liverpool Corn Trade, Dec. 28, 1897, reported that the Customs Department estimate of wheat for 1897 at 84 million bushels, equal to 88,100,000 bushels of 60 lbs. This compares with 70 million bushels in crop of 1898. During 1898 Spain and Portugal together only imported 11,200,000 bushels of wheat. Hence, the wheat crop for 1898, 1897 was larger than its crop of 1898, with the imports into Spain and Portugal added.

The editor of the "Wheat News," in dealing with the official report of Spain's wheat crop for 1897, estimates that this estimate was 12 million bushels too low. During the next eight months, up to May 31, of the current crop year, exports of wheat and flour slightly exceeded the imports.

On May 5 Spain abolished its Customs duties on wheat and flour.

The Corn Trade News gives the imports of wheat into Spain, Aug. 1 to May 31, 1898, 4,000,000 bushels, as compared with 4,100,000 bushels in the same time last year. This shortage makes no mention of the large exports of wheat which some sensational papers report as having been made to Belgium and France. It is possible that Belgian, French and Spanish speculators bought large quantities of Spanish wheat. If so, this wheat is still in the country, and the present state of exchange has made this cost very small when valued in Spanish currency. With exports prohibited with the exception of a small quantity of wheat for the Peninsula very promisingly. It is even reported, except that of the currency, which should be lower than that of any of the importing countries of Europe. There may be plenty of wheat to supply the country, but the high prices are due to speculative requirements, and not to a shortage of supplies until the harvest crop comes in.
