Whereas His Majesty's forces are and have been for some considerable time in complete possession of the seat of government of both the aforesaid arritories, with their public offices and the whole machinery of administration, as well as of all the principal towns and the whole of the principal towns are the principal to fowns and the whole of the railways;

Whereas a great majority of the burghers of the two late republics to the number of 35,000, exclusive of those who have fallen in the war, are now either prisoners or have submit-ted to His Majesty's government and are living peaceably in towns and camps under control of His Majesty's

forces; and "Whereas the burghers of the late republics still in arms are not only few in number, but have lost almost all their guns and munitions of war and are devoid of regular military organizations, and are, therefore, unable to carry on regular warfare or to offer any organized resistance to His Ma-jesty's forces in any part of the coun-

"Whereas those burghers who are still in arms, the unable to carry on regular warfare, continue to make isolated attacks upon small posts and detachments of His Majesty's forces, to plunder or destroy property and to damage railway and telegraph Mnes;

"Whereas the country is thus kept in a state of disturbance, checking the resumption of agricultural and industrial pursuits; and "Whereas His Majesty's government is determined to put an end to a state of things which is almlessly prolonging bloodshed and destruction and inflicting ruin upon a great majority of the inhabitants, who are anxious to live in peace and earn a livelihood for themselves and their families; and "Whereas it is just to proceed against those still resisting, and especially against those persons who, being in a position of authority, are responsible for the continuance of the present state of lawlessness, and are instigating

their fellow-burghers to continue their hopeless resistance to His Majesty's government."
Therefore Lord Kitchener issues his pro-Proclamation.

"All commandants, field cornets and feaders of armed hands, being burghers of the late republics, and still engaged in resisting His Majesty's forces, whether in the Orange River Colony, the Transvaal or other portion of His Majesty's South African dominions, and all members of the governments of the late Orange Free State and Transvaal shall, unless they surrender Transvaal shall, unless they surrender before Sept. 15, be permanently ban-ished from South Africa. 



Paul Leroy Beaulieu, one of the world's most famous economists, and he predicts that a trade war with America, in which

all Europe will combine, is inevitable. "Americans have no conception of Americans have no conception of the feeling which exists against them in Europe," says M. Beaulieu. "Even you Americans who travel do not get at the real feelings of the people who live on this side of the water. You meet only these rely. meet only those whose business it is to entertain you, to sell goods to you, to extract money from you, to be polifie to you. It is not from them you learn the truth. They conceal their thoughts. But men like myself, who travel about on the Continent as continentals—we know the state of the public mind. We know that every important government on the Continent portant government on the Continent is already under the pressure of manufacturers and tradesmen and producers who want a sharp, drastic policy of retaliation, upon America instituted

"This pressure will make itself felt a time—that is inevitable. With the men who foment it it is a matter of dollars and cents.
