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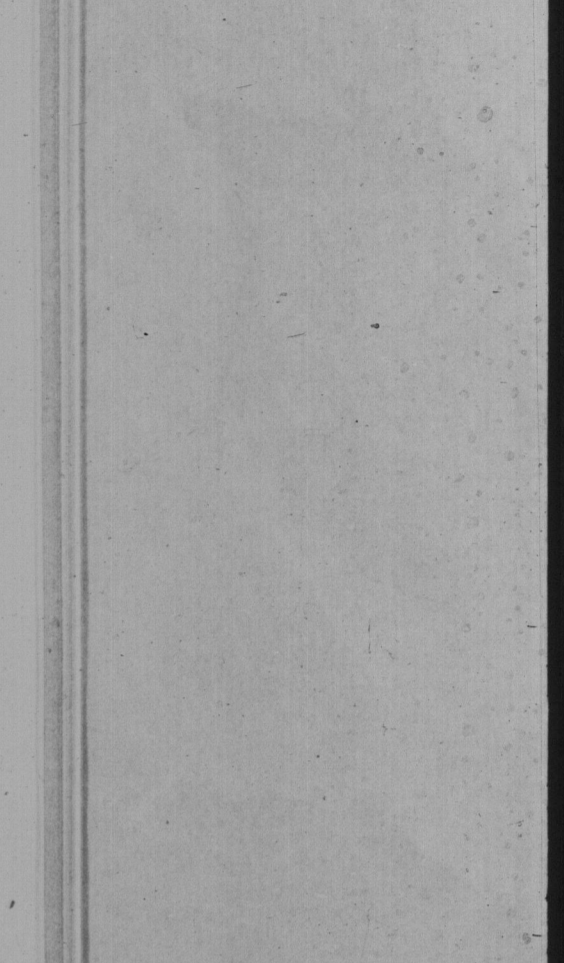

GAVE DYING FATHER POISON

Continued From Page 1.

day following and carefully examined the room in which Joseph Sifton was said to have been taken to death by his son. He found no blood inside the room. He passed into the barn thru the trapdoor in which the old man stood when his brains were knocked out by the first blow of the ax. There were no blood stains there, Herbert's confession mentions that the blood from the dying man's battered head scattered over the hay in the loft, and that the son threw this blood-stained hay into the noose of the barn after the killing. At that time Sifton was already dead and already decomposed, and the witness was examining the interior of the barn for evidence of a death struggle and blood. This witness had passed along the road near the barn about the hour the killing occurred. He said he heard hammering in the top of the barn at that time. This corroborates the theory of the defence that the son was knocking off these planks at the time when he fell thru to his death.

It developed that the victim wore a pair of new tan boots the morning of his death. The point to this feature is that he was more likely to slip and fall as the defence claims, with new shoes. Edmund Meredith, K.C., was called upon to identify an old will made by Joseph Sifton, in which his property was to be inherited, in the event of his death, by his son, the prisoner. The defence objected to the admission of the will because it had not been shown to have been known by the accused at the time of the murder, there being no evidence that the witness, Susie Bathurst, a vivacious young woman, entered the box. She admitted, with a blush, that she was near the "Pshaw, I don't believe it, sure you don't mean 17?" observed Mr. Johnson, facetiously. She lives near the Sifton home, and was there the day of the death. She heard the hammering in the barn just before the victim is supposed to have met his death.

Jacob Burgess gave damning evidence against the prisoner. He had been jailed for drunkenness, and had talked with Sifton. He said the accused had told him that he was dying after a fight with Walter Herbert, and then he had equaled on him. The cross-examination brought out the fact that the prisoner has frequently been in jail for libelling too freely. The witness was badly confused.

Ghostly Exhibit. David G. McNeill, the coroner and the physician who attended the victim during the few hours he lingered the day of the tragedy, produced a human skull to indicate the location of the wounds on the dying man's head. He had found several wounds which might have been made by the ax. The physician was dressing the wounds, Gerald Sifton came into the room. "My poor father, my poor father, how I hate to see you suffer!" observed the doctor. "Have you got anything to stop him suffering?" asked McNeill. "I had, meaning that I had some morphine. Finally he broke out again: "My poor father, how I hate to see you suffer! If you have nothing to put him out of his misery, I have. I have some strychnine."

"I held up my hands to stop the man talking in such a strain. Then he continued: "If money is any object to you, Doctor, to put him out of his misery—I'll then stop him from talking to me by turning away."

During the recital of this fatal story, the prisoner manifested little interest and not the slightest emotion. As the doctor told of his cold-blooded proposition, all eyes turned toward the accused, but the man continued oblivious of the disagreeable situation in which he was placed, and alike indifferent to the dangerous nature of the evidence. But, if the prisoner failed to realize that the noose was tightening around his neck, his counsel were alert to the importance of the situation, and began a most vigorous cross-examination. The witness further said that the accused

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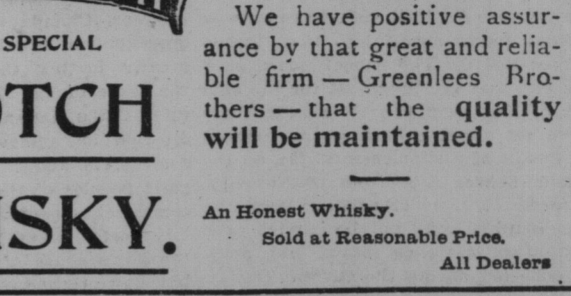

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### THE ECONOMIC CONFERENCE

**Hon. Mr. Fielding Issues an Official Statement Giving the Canadian Side of It.**

**BRITAIN ON QUESTION OF DEFENCE.**

**It is Said That Mr. Chamberlain Opposed Exemption Canada Asked For.**

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—An official statement on the colonial conference was issued here to-day. Hon. Mr. Fielding says it is as follows:

The Blue Book issued in London contains several speeches by members of the Imperial Cabinet, introducing subjects to the conference, but the debates which followed were treated as confidential, and therefore are not included in the published report. All the resolutions adopted by the conference are published. In several matters of special importance, documents were submitted by members of the conference, and these are included in the published report.

"On the subject of preferential trade we were inclined to minimize the influence of the preference given by Canada. The British Board of Trade submitted elaborate statistical statements on the trade between the United Kingdom and the colonies, and also a special memorandum on the effects of the Canadian preferential tariff on trade between the United Kingdom and Canada.

In this it was argued that, notwithstanding the preference, the Canadian tariff was still high, and that the preference did not materially benefit the colonies. It was also pointed out that the increase in trade between Canada and the Mother Country was not as great as was claimed. The matter was also considered by the committee. In the course of the negotiations, it was suggested that further advantages might be given to Great Britain in return for a preference in the British market.

**What the Colonies Could Give.**

"The President of the Board of Trade, Mr. R. H. Balfour, submitted a memorandum on the subject of the substance of what the colonies were disposed to grant in return for the preference given to them.

### Advantage to the British Manufacturer

and thus turn over to him a volume of business which would otherwise go to foreign countries. This adjustment might be brought about in any one of the following ways:

(1) In some cases by the reduction of duties now imposed on British goods from the free list to the dutiable list at such rates as would give substantial preference to the British manufacturer, instead of leaving him, as at present, on even terms with the foreign competitor in respect to such articles.

(2) By imposing a small duty as respects foreign goods on some articles which are on the free list, while allowing them to continue free as respects British imports.

(3) In some cases, possibly by an increase in the duty on foreign articles, thus increasing the amount of the preference to the British manufacturer. Such an increase of duties on foreign articles could, however, only be justified where the duties now imposed are not supplied by the British manufacturer at the preferential rates of duty.

The Canadian ministers stated that if they could be assured that the Imperial government would accept the principle of the preferential trade grant to the food products of Canada in the United States, the Canadian government would be prepared to carry on the same principle with respect to the United Kingdom and to give to the British manufacturer an increased advantage in the competition in the markets of Canada.

"Meanwhile the Canadian ministers were insisting that the preferential trade grant should be given to the colonies in the markets of the Mother Country, and also expressing the opinion of the Prime Ministers of the United Kingdom that the government should reciprocate by granting preferential terms to the products of the colonies in the markets of the Mother Country."

"In taking this course the ministers desired to have it understood that they did not wish to see the principle of preferential trade would be more widely accepted in the United Kingdom and that the Mother Country would not at distant day see the wisdom of adopting the same principle with respect to the products of the colonies from duties at present levied."

"If after using every effort to bring about such a readjustment of the fiscal policy of the Empire, the Canadian government should find that the principle of preferential trade is not acceptable to the colonies generally, or to the Mother Country, then Canada should be free to take such action as might be deemed necessary in the presence of such conditions."

The total amount of receipts stands at \$2,201,821.17, and the total amount of disbursements at \$2,151,821.17. The surplus is \$50,000.00.

The report shows that the City of Toronto has a surplus of \$50,000.00 at the end of the year. This surplus is the result of the increase in the rate of the City Tax, and the decrease in the rate of the City Loan.
