# Victoria Has Endorsed Dr. Jackson's Attitude Dr. Carman Acquiesces

## All is Harmony Again in Methodism — College Faculty in Statement Declare for Perfect Honesty and Candor in Scientific Treatment of Scriptures.

Blest be the tie that binds  
Our hearts in Christian love;  
The fellowship of kindred minds  
Is like to that above.

And with the singing of this stirring old hymn, the breach in Methodism threatened by the Carman-Jackson episode was shown to be bridged and the warring elements brought into the one camp.

Yesterday was indeed laden with surprises for the Methodist Church in Canada. The first came when the faculty of Victoria University had decided unanimously to issue a declaration of independence of thought and freedom of speech and to stand on-parallel with Rev. George Jackson.

The second came when the meeting of the board of regents called by the chairman, Rev. Dr. Carman, last night adopted the faculty's declaration and ordered it published in the official church organ as the declaration of principles, practically a new theological creed, signed by the chairman, "A. Carman" himself.

The meeting yesterday afternoon was an absolutely unanimous. Rev. George Jackson's statement of views both then and as previously published were concurred in by every member of the faculty without the slightest dissent.

The meeting of regents was held at 8 o'clock and continued for nearly three hours. Dr. Carman presided. W. Powell, K.C., acted as secretary. There was a good representation of the Toronto members of the board, including Hon. George A. Cox, Dr. Jas. Mills, C. D. Massey, A. E. Ames, R. A. Reeves, H. H. Fudger, A. E. Kemp, N. W. Rowell, E. J. Small, and others.

The board promptly took up the matter of the Carman-Jackson episode, but the angel of peace hovered over the gathering to such an extent that each side appeared to outvie the other in its desire to extend the olive branch.

The chancellor presented the report of the meeting of the faculty, which endorsed their new colleague, Rev. George Jackson.

When it had been read Rev. Dr. Carman so stirred the hearts of the regents by his declaration that his statements in regard to "Brother Jackson" were not intended to be personal that a member of the board started singing a verse of the hymn, "Blessed be the Tie That Binds," and the verse was sung thru by the other members of the board.

Dr. Carman's declaration of fraternal feeling towards Rev. George Jackson cleared the air and the board cleared the path for the superintendent of his strictures on that minister and it only remained for the findings of the following resolutions, which were signed by Dr. Carman and Chancellor Burwash, and handed to The World by N. W. Rowell, K.C.

# FARTHEST SOUTH BUT MISSED THE POLE

## Lieut. Shackleton's Expedition Got Closest Yet, Tho, and Secured Lots of Valuable Information.

LONDON, March 23.—The polar regions are gradually yielding up their secrets to human perseverance and determination. Lieut. Ernest H. Shackleton of the British navy, who left his permanent quarters last autumn for a dash to the pole, having succeeded, after an arduous sledge journey of 1708 miles, occupying 126 days, in reaching within 111 miles of the south pole, or 50 miles nearer than attained by the Discovery expedition, of which he was an officer.

His expedition, which sailed early in 1908, reached New Zealand to-day.

Profiting by former experiences in the Antarctic regions, when all the dogs succumbed to the strain and rigors of the long march, Lieut. Shackleton made some departures from the usual preparations for a journey across the snow and ice. His cook with him a snow and ice, which could be converted into a sledge, and substituted ponies for dogs, and light woolen clothing for heavy furs.

The main expedition, of which Lieut. Shackleton was in command, reached latitude 88° 33' longitude 162° east, while a second party pushed forward to the southern magnetic pole, reaching latitude 72° 25' longitude 154° east. The British flag was left flying at both points.

The narrative of Lieut. Shackleton's achievements shows that the expedition endured the greatest trials and privations. The motor car, which was useful in the preliminary expeditions, failed on the uneven surface of the barrier ice.

Briefly summarized, the results of the expedition are that a pole was reached within 111 miles of the south pole; the magnetic pole was also reached; mountain chains were discovered, 13,220 feet in altitude, was ascended by the party; a new coast and high mountains were located running along the Victoria Land, and coal measures were discovered in the Antarctic continent.

The theory of the existence of an arch of atmosphere calm around the south pole was disproved.

**The Last Three Days.**  
During Jan. 7, 8 and 9 the wind blew at 70 miles an hour, with 72 degrees of frost. It was impossible to move and the members of the party were frequently frost-bitten in their sleeping bags. On Jan. 9 they reached latitude 88° 33' longitude 162° east, which was the most southerly point ever reached. Here they hoisted the Union Jack, presented by her majesty the queen. No mountains were visible, and they saw only a plain stretching to the south.

# Murdered His Brother And Robbed The Body

## Maurice Ryan Found Guilty by North Bay Jury in Short Order — Another Brother Gives Evidence Against Him.

NORTH BAY, March 23.—(Special.)—Maurice Ryan was this afternoon found guilty of the charge of having murdered his brother, Joseph Ryan in November, 1907. The jury were out less than half an hour. Sentence was deferred until tomorrow.

The defence practically rested its case on the testimony of one witness who swore to meeting Francis Joseph Ryan and conversing with him during the February following his disappearance.

Link by link Provincial Detective Greer presented a chain of evidence implicating the prisoner, who sat in the box, with immovable countenance, betraying no feeling. Justice Latchford's charge to the jury was against the prisoner.

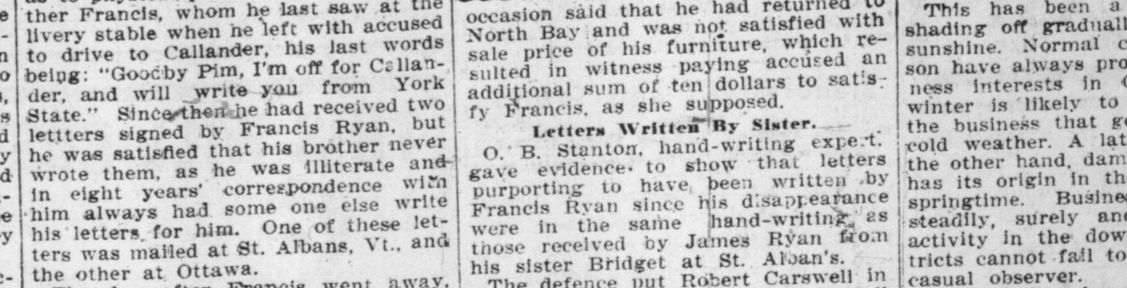

**Recipes For Thursday.**  
Clam Chowder.  
Remove the heads from 4 cups of onions and chop. Parboil 4 cups of potatoes. Cook 1-2 cupful chopped onions with 1-2 cupful salt pork cubes for 10 minutes. Arrange clams, potatoes, onions and salt pork in layers in the kettle. Add 2 cupful boiling water and cook slowly until tender. Add 2 tablespoonful butter, add 2 tablespoonful flour, add 4 cupful milk and boil three minutes; add fish mixture, season with salt and pepper. Serve hot.

**Cocoanut Cakes.**  
Cream 1-4 pound butter with 4 ounces sugar and beat in 3 eggs alternately with 2 ounces flour. Parboil 1/2 cupful gill whipped cream, add 1 teaspoonful vanilla extract. Bake in small buttered tins. When ready and cold dip the tops of cakes in stiffly whipped cream and sprinkle with cocoanut.

The sixth salon and eighteenth annual exhibition of the Toronto Camera Club which opened at the new club-rooms, 2 Gould-street, on Monday, will delight lovers of the artistic all this week.

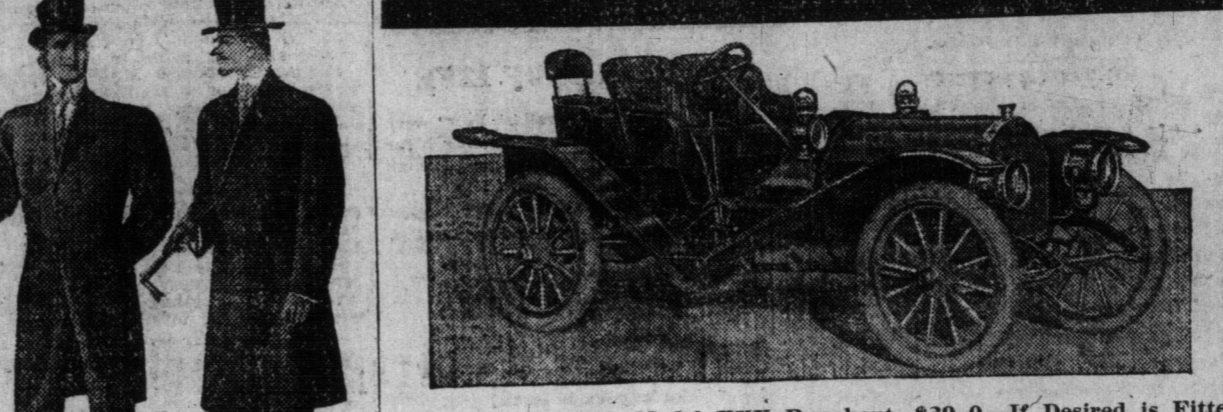

system cannot be condemned merely because it revolutionizes the earlier view of crime and the criminal.

BRITISH POLITICS

Political affairs in the United Kingdom are meantime in a state of suspense pending the uncovering of the budget proposals. Their nature is as yet entirely a matter of speculation, but it is generally accepted that provision will be made for higher license duties and a readjustment of land values.

As regards the general political situation, it is now perfectly clear that the next parliamentary election, apart from the governmental record, will be fought over the question of tariff reform. The fiscal question took a leading place in the by-elections that have occurred and Mr. Balfour has declared in unmistakable terms that it will be the first subject dealt with should the Unionist party be returned to power.

Free traders still profess their conviction that the electors will support the present system, but the call for a more active campaign throughout the country in opposition to fiscal reform activity reveals a measure of uneasiness over its outcome.

Another element of complication is the insistence of the Irish Nationalists upon Home Rule as the price of their continued support of the Liberal Government.

THE BURDEN OF EMPIRE.

No matter what Canada may do, she can never escape from the burden of self-defence, unless indeed she is content to shield herself under the protection of a stronger power.

Under existing conditions the British Empire stands alone in uniting complete local independence with co-operation for common purposes.

Notwithstanding all mistakes that may be laid to the charge of British administration, it is incontrovertible that vast benefits have resulted from it, and that nowhere can be found greater sympathy for local ambitions.

THE PROBATION SYSTEM.

Although still in the experimental stage the new method of dealing with young and occasional wrongdoers commonly called the probation system is steadily extending.

So far as New York State is concerned no increase of crime has followed upon the introduction of the probation system; the indications so far rather point the other way.

Modern notions are steadily inclining to make reform, rather than punishment of the criminal, the main object of the law, and to draw a sharp line between habitual and occasional offenders.

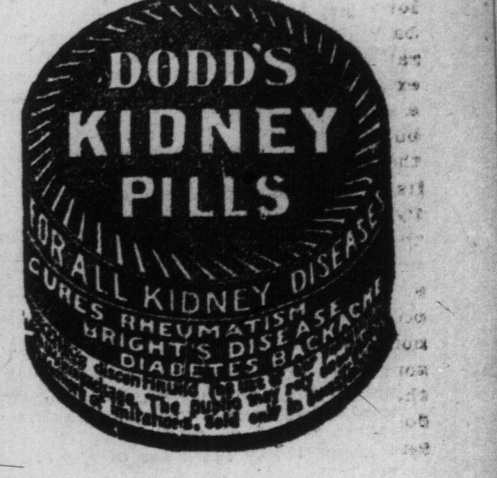
