Sir Auckland Geddes Tells U. S. Chamber of Commerce That Changes Almost Deserve Name of Revolution - Asks "Will You Wait for Europe's Troubles to Come After

Atlantic City, N.J., April 28 .-Changes have been wrought by the war in Great Britain which "almost deserve the title of revolution," said Sir Auckland Geddes, British ambasador to the United States, in an address tonight before the annual convention of the United States chamber of commerce. Vast new classes have been enfranchised, he said, and the working classes, strongly anti-militaristic, now hold "ultimate political power."

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

### **DERBY FAVORITE** WINS THE GUINEAS

Major McCalmont's Gray Colt, Tetratema, Takes First of English Classics.

London, April 28.—Major R. McCalmont's derby favorite Tetratema, by the Tetrarch-Scotch Gift, won the two thousand guineas, the first of the English three-year-old classics, at the Newmarket races today. W. Raphael's Allenby finished second, and Sir E. Paget's Paragon was third.

For months past heavy wagers have been laid on Tetratema to win this year's derby, which will be run at Epsom Downs on Wednesday, June 2.

The betting on the race was:
Tetratema—2 to 1, even and out.

Allenby—100 to 7.
Paragon—8 to 1.
Seventen horses ran.

Newmarket, headquarters of the Jockey Club, regained today much of its pre-war brilliance on the occasion of the running of the first of the five "Classic" races for 3-year-olds, this being the two thousand guineas. The second of these, the one thousand guineas, confined to fillies, is run on Friday next; the third, the Derby, at Epsom on June 3, with the fourth, the Oaks, for fillies only, on the Friday following. The fifth and ast of the classic races is the St. Leger, at Doncaster, on September 8.

In point of age the St. Leger is 'he oldest fixture, having been founded in 1776, with the Oaks in 1779, and the Derby the year following. The two thousand dates from 1809 and the one thousand from 1814. Notwithstanding great difficulties all these races were run each year of the war, tho under conditions that robbed them of much of their ancient glory and prestige. Many well-known owners were unrepresented and fields were small.

The winner of the two thousand guineas, Major McCalmont's gray colt Tetratema, by The Tetrarch, out of Scotch Gife, was unbeaten as a two-year-old last season, winning in easy fashion the five races he contested and a sum of oven ten thousand pounds in stakes, his last race being over the six furlongs of the Middle Park Plate at Newmarket, when he started an odds-cn favgite at four to one and spreadeagled his field.




