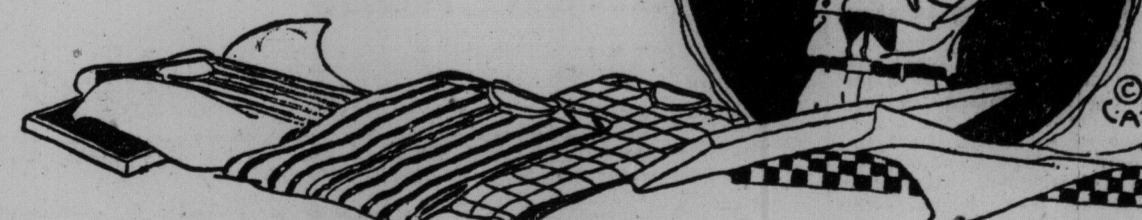

The lesson of the primacy of courage, which the referendum vote teaches, will probably not be forgotten when next a question of the government taking its courage in both hands comes up—on Hydro radicals, for instance.

The Peacock.

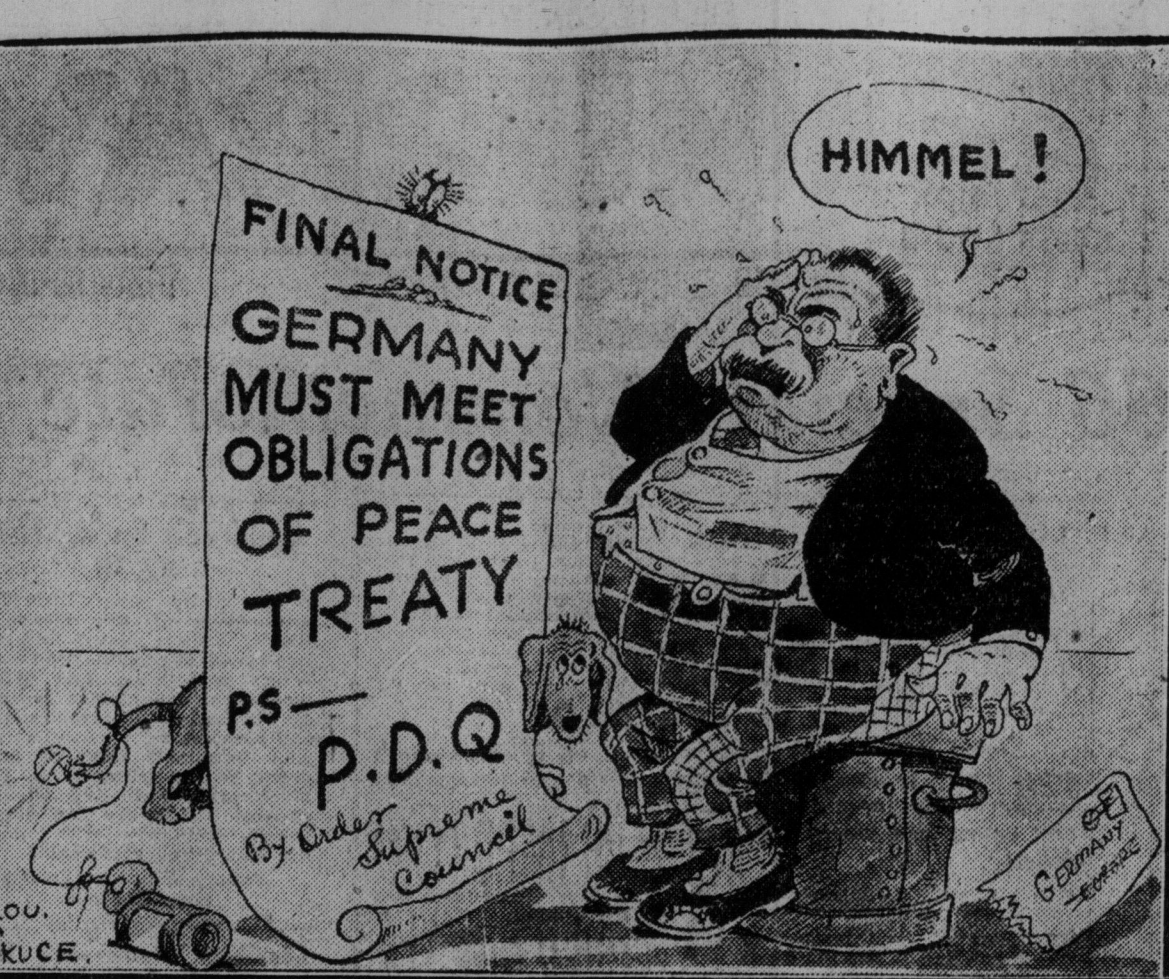

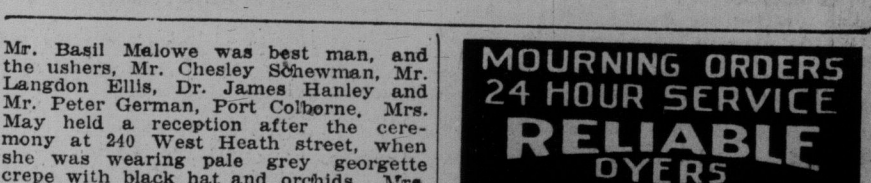

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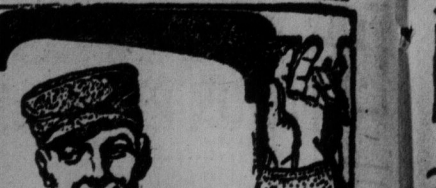

Guards Reported Annihilated and Many Residents Are Massacred. Washington, April 28.—Japanese guards in the district of Nikolaevsk, eastern Siberia are believed to have been annihilated and several hundred Japanese residents, including the Japanese consul there, massacred.

Meantime, however, the Japanese have sent an expedition to Alexandrovsk, accompanied by the warships "Kasai" and "Mishima." The forces reached their destination April 22, and found the Japanese residents in that district safe. Most of them were seen aboard the Mikasa.

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GENERAL ADVANCE BY POLISH FORCES

Offensive Along Hundred and Eighty-Mile Front into Ukraine. Warsaw, April 28.—A general advance by Polish forces along a 180-mile front into the Ukraine was announced today's communique by the Polish general staff.

The Poles covered about 50 miles on the first day of their forward movement, their advanced line taking them within 60 miles of Kiev.

The advance was explained in a proclamation issued in the name of General Filizdski, the head of the Polish state, and posted in the cities and villages thru which the Polish forces marched.

The proclamation, dated April 26, was printed in Warsaw and then rushed to the front. Thousands of copies were taken by the Poles for distribution within the newly occupied territory.

One section of the proclamation reads: "Together with the Poles there are returning to the Ukraine its heroic soldiers, under Simon Petliura, who have found refuge within Poland and help in the darkest days for the Ukrainians."

The document expresses the hope that the Ukrainians will concentrate their forces to aid in attaining their freedom, which also will be of aid to Poland.

The important towns occupied by the Poles on the first day of their march were Jitomir, Jilgorz, Winnits and Zmyernka.

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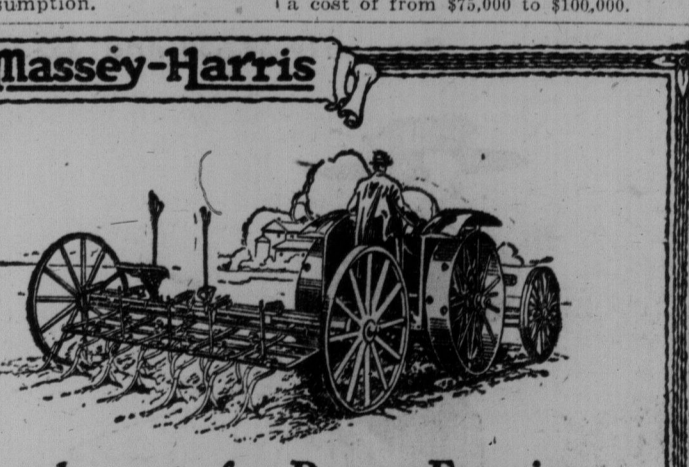
