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### CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT.

To the Vestry and Congregation of St. James's Cathedral.

Among the statements submitted is one exhibiting the Park Lots income as now finally settled; and on the other side a re-arrangement of the debt of the Church also effected during the past year. It will be seen that by this re-arrangement the interest of the debt is reduced to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., and that the principal is receivable in instalments which will pay off the whole within fourteen years from this date. The new Park lots income will provide within \$270.00 of the amount required each half year, to meet the instalments of principal and interest in full. Unless the Congregation very considerably declines in number and liberality from what it is at present there can be no fear but that the ordinary income will be sufficient to supplement the Park Lots income to the amount required.

A clause inserted in the new debentures provides that the Church site shall not be liable to sale for the debt, until the Park Lots have first been resorted to. Memorials and monuments are to be excepted from sale in any event. Practically the Church building may be said to be free from debt.

### THE IMPROVEMENTS.

The plans of improvement approved by the Vestry during the past year have been proceeded with, with the assistance of the Finance Committee. The sum of \$22,200 was subscribed by members of the Congregation; of which \$6,020 has been expended in the work done to the date of closing the financial year. As against the balance subscribed, but not yet called in, contracts have been made to the full amount available. These contracts include the new chancel organ, a specification of which has been settled with great care, and we are promised by the builders (Messrs. Warren, of Toronto,) an instrument of unsurpassed excellence as a church organ.

To carry the scheme contemplated by the Vestry to completion will require further subscriptions, to the extent of the original estimate. It is hoped that the amount to be subscribed will reach not less than \$18,000, to enable the work to be carried out in the best manner.

Promptness is particularly desirable to enable all contracts to be given out at an early date. This will ensure the completion of the whole work within the summer months of July and August of this year.

There being a considerable deficit in the funds of the school, owing to heavy library and other expenses, it was found necessary to devise some other means, whereby this should be removed. An entertainment was therefore given in the schoolhouse, on the 5th of last March, consisting of very interesting and instructive lime-light views of a journey from Hong-Kong, through Canada, to London, by Mr. Armstrong, of Montreal. The building was completely filled, and a handsome sum was realized.

### THE THURSDAY BIBLE CLASS.

This class is designed primarily for Sunday School Teachers, the lesson for the following Sunday always forms the subject of study. All students of the Bible are welcome. The contrast between a great profession of love and regard for the word of God and appreciation of opportunities to study it, is often very noticeable. For any encouragement given to this effort to promote an interest in the Holy Scriptures by the members of the congregation, it might long since have been abandoned; and so indeed it would have been were it not that many faithful and devoted teachers have found it a help and an encouragement in their difficult work. Those who think that they know all that may be known are naturally slow to avail themselves of this or any other means of grace or instruction provided by the Church.

The importance and usefulness of this weekly meeting for the study of the word of God, and prayer on behalf of the Sunday School is once more pressed upon all Sunday School Teachers; and upon all who really love the Bible and Prayer. The attendance this season has been good. It might easily be doubled. The attention and interest of the attendants have been all that could be desired.

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### REPORT OF THE DORCAS AND THE LADIES' AID SOCIETIES.

The first meeting of the season of the Dorcas and Ladies' Aid Societies was held on Tuesday, November 6th.

Dorcas Society—President, Mrs. DuMoulin; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Gilmor, Mrs. Mulholland; Treasurer, Mrs. Strachan.

Ladies' Aid Society—President, Mrs. DuMoulin; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Boyd, Mrs. Merrick; Treasurer, Mrs. F. Le M. Grasett.

The Societies meet for work every Tuesday morning. Those attending are for the most part members of both societies; and the work is more generally Dorcas work until the poor of the parish have been provided with necessary clothing. The Dorcas closes before Christmas.

At a late meeting a resolution was passed granting \$20 of the surplus Dorcas money to the Sewing School.

The work of the Ladies' Aid throughout the season has been devoted to missions.

But few orders for work came in; they were promptly filled.

A Christmas mission box was transmitted through our Secretary of the W. A. P. M. A., to Mrs. Sullivan, Port Carling, Algoma, consisting of warm clothing for the Indians, and many little things for a Christmas tree for the children—to gladden little hearts at that hallowed season. It was contributed to most generously by a few of the members: and by Miss DuMoulin and her Bible Class.

After Christmas indefatigable work, and the large donations kindly sent in by some of the members, enabled bales valued at \$200 of suitable clothing, etc., etc., to be sent the end of January to the Rev. W. T. Bourne, Fort McLeod, N. W. T., for distribution amongst the Indians on the Piegan Reserve.

The bales contained a liberal donation of flannels, etc., from Mrs. Grantham's Women's Association Class.

Through the kindness of Mr. Brock, a man from W. R. Brock's warerooms packed the bales.

That ended the season's work for Domestic Missions. Since then the Ladies' Aid have been engaged preparing a box of clothing, about to be packed and dispatched to a Clergyman's family in our own diocese.

The work of the District Visitors for the year ending Easter, 1889, has met with marked success.

The eighteen ladies of the congregation who have engaged in this important branch of church work paid over 1,100 visits.

Several poor families have been relieved during the winter by giving them clothing, and obtaining work for them to do. The Christmas distributions were very acceptable to those who received them, and several spoke to the visitors, telling how thankful they were for

The people called on were as a rule glad to see the visitors, and some expressed a wish to be visited by the clergy, and though a few were indifferent about attending church, others were glad to be taken an interest in and promised to attend.

The work to be done in the Parish of St. James of this character is so great that the eighteen ladies found it impossible to visit every one who should be visited, and an earnest appeal is made to the ladies of the congregation to come forward and assist in this work.

Our Society was established eight years ago for the purpose of fostering and increasing a missionary spirit in our congregation, and to give each member an opportunity of encouraging and assisting in the work committed to us by our Divine Master when He said "preach the gospel to every creature."

On the formation of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions of the Church, we became a Parochial

Branch of that organization.

Our Society seeks to enlist the interests of its members in our own Diocesan Mission; in Domestic Missions, i. e., Missions in Algoma and the great Northwest, and Foreign Missions throughout the world.

Donations of any amount are received and forwarded to any of the above sorts of Missions as the giver may designate, or if given to the Society without designation, are appropriated as may be deemed best.

The Society has already adopted special missions to which it sends regular support. These will be increased as means are provided.

Monthly meetings are held at St. James' School-house on the 2nd Friday in every month, at 3 o'clock, when missionary news, papers by members, letters from the missionaries assisted by the Society, and other missionary intelligence, are read.

The attendance during the winter has been very good and

encouraging.

In October last, the President, Mrs. Blake, and the Secretary, Miss Wilson, resigned their offices. The resignations were accepted with much regret, and resolutions were passed thanking both ladies for their kind help in past years. In accordance with a public appeal, made by the Bishop of Algoma, for \$100 annually towards Mr. Renison's Mission at Red Rock, this money has been collected by two lady members of the Society.

In June, a bale of clothing valued al \$85, was sent to the Rev. Samuel Kidett, Blood Reserve, Fort Macleod, for distribution amongst the Indians of that place. The bale contained a donation of clothing, valued at \$35 from the Women's Association of St. James'

Cathedral, of which Mrs. Grantham is President.

On December 18th, a box of articles, valued at \$45, for a Christmas tree, was sent to the Bishop of Algoma, for the children at Port Carling. The work was kindly done by the Ladies' Aid Society of St. James' Cathedral.

The donation of Christmas presents, made by Miss DuMoulin's Bible Class and valued at \$6.30, was included in the full amount, and the whole was very warmly appreciated and acknowledged by the

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Moulin's amount, ed by the Bishop, who spent Christmas Day at Port Carling and himself distributed the gifts to the happy receivers thereof.

In December, Miss Joseph's Bible Class sent a box of useful presents for a Christmas tree to the Rev. Mr. Whatham, of North Cheddar, valued at \$50, also a number of Sunday School books.

On January 29th, 1889, two bales of clothing valued at \$200, made by the ladies' aid society of St. James Cathedral, were sent to Rev. H. T. Bourne, Piegan Reserve, Fort Macleod, for distribution amongst the Indians of the Reserve.

Articles valued at \$13.35 were received from Mrs. Grantham, President of the Woman's Association, to be sent to Mr. Bourne. Thanks are due to that Society for their help in mission work.

Our Society continues to pay annually the sum of \$400 towards Mr. Bourne's salary, and \$30 annually towards the salary of Miss Browne, the lady missionary of the Woman's Auxiliary at Glachen,

This year the Woman's Auxiliary have issued members' cards. Those who wish to become members can do so by paying the small sum of ten cents a year. We have already more than fifty members in the St. James Cathedral Branch of the Auxiliary. The Auxiliary has lately determined to publish a small pamphlet called "The Monthly Letter Leaflet," containing missionary items and letters. Price 15 cents a year. All persons interested in the missionary work of the Church and desirous of regular information thereon are recommended to take this publication and also the larger monthly "Canadian Church Magazine and Mission News," published by the Domestic and Foreidn Missionary Society of the Church of England Price one dollar per year. in Canada.

In summing up the result of our years' work we may say, that we have a large membership, have held nine monthly meetings, and have collected and forwarded subscription boxes, clothing, etc., not including sums for Sabrevois Mission and North Cheddar subscribed by the Congregation.

While these results are very encouraging we would seek to increase

our membership and our efforts.

We earnestly appeal to all good Christians in our Congregation to cast in their kindly encouraging influence with us in this great work

which our Lord and Master has given his Church to do.

Finally we cannot close this report without the addition of a word calling attention to the first object in our list, viz.: Dioceasan Missions. Although first in order it is too often last to receive aid. While remembering the Domestic and Foreign fields, let not the Diocese with its urgent and really missionary and forsaken places be forgotten. Let "the Gospel be preached to every creature," beginning at Jerusalem," i. e., at home.

It is true this number is smaller than last year, but it is due in part to the effort made during the latter part of the season to instruct as well as amuse the children. A stricter discipline has also been maintained.

Teachers.—It has been gratifying to see the faithful attendance of

many under the most trying circumstances.

Addresses.—A number of students have addressed the children

on various subjects.

Offerings. — Instead of devoting to defraying current expenses, the offerings have been given to buy fruit, etc., and sent to the "Homes" in the city, thus endeavouring to foster the love of the children through free-will offerings on objects outside of their own interest.

The expenses have been fully met by subscriptions from friends, and a debt of past years partly wiped out.

Smaller gatherings and more definite teaching is recommended.

Before the children are called together for the next season's work, some definite work should be planned.

It should be so arranged that the children would feel it a privilege

received, not given, to be members of the Band of Hope.

In a parish such as this is, a band of carefully selected children might meet and practice songs and recitations. Concerts free could

be given t

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be given to the poor people, and district visitors might be able to

meet their charges oftener.

These Bands might in turn visit the Homes and distribute flowers and fruit bought by their own savings. We are convinced that successful work can only be done when the children are doing some good work, and that some simple work suited to children, care being taken so that they be not filled with self-importance through a work intentended for older people.
