

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## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

#### UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the 3rd day of August, 1855, and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, 18th day of November, 1887, and 30th day of May, 1895.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operation, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The three clerical and three lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the city, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be ex officio such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper and

Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of

any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society, when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-iaws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alterations has been given to the Board.

## RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday Schools the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements, reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, 18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday Schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

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### RULES

#### RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.

II That the Society be denominated "The BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than ———— other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operation into districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society on sale. Remittances on purchase account to be made from proceeds of sales only.

X1. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

### FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I bequeath the sum of \$\simes \tau to the Upper Canada Bible Society, to be paid for the purposes of said Society, to the Treasurer for the time being thereof, whose receipt shall be a good discharge for the same.

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## FIFTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, 1894-95.

The British and Foreign Bible Society is unquestionably one of the noblest institutions of the present age, for the advancement of Christianity on the earth.

It has promoted the translation of the Scriptures in whole or in part, into three hundred and twenty languages and dialects, and is actively engaged in their circulation, thus shedding the benign influences of the knowledge of Christ in all portions of the world—cheering the sad and solitary, and giving that precious volume which tells perishing sinners how salvation may be obtained through the meritorious sacrifice of the Crucified Redeemer.

It is a great privilege to dwell in a land of Gospel light and liberty, and it is a blessed thing to be in possession of a knowledge of that saving grace of which the Gospel speaks, and which alone can make sinful mankind "meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light." These inestimable privileges lay upon those so happily situated the sacred obligation implied in the commands of our Saviour, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." "Freely ye have received, freely give."

Much interest has been taken in the recent struggle between China and Japan, and it is gratifying to know that the friends of the Bible have not been indifferent to the well-being of their fellow-men in those countries. Only a few months ago, November, 1894, the first copy (so far as known) of the New Testament, in the Chinese language, was received into the Imperial Palace at Peking. This New Testament, which was specially and beautifully prepared, was the gift of ten thousand nine hundred Protestant women, to the Empress Dowager of China, and it was certainly the first time such a gift had been made to one high in authority within the precincts of the "Forbidden City." The Emperor, having seen the gift Testament, immediately sent some of his officials to purchase copies of the books of the Jesus religion.

In Japan the agents of the Bible Societies, having received permission from the Commander in Chief, distributed hundreds of New Testaments and Gospels among

the soldiers at the barracks, hospitals, etc., in the cities of Tokyo and Yokohama, and subsequently arrangements were made to follow up the distribution of the Scriptures by a personal proclamation of the Gospel of Christ. Until recently the Bible was a prohibited book, and the men were in some cases forbidden to attend Christian services. So the doors are opening more and more for the spread of the Gospel. (See April Recorder.) It is to be regretted that so many Christians take little or no interest in the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, but we rejoice in the belief that the zeal of the lovers of the Truth everywhere is on the increase, and will continue until every family and individual of the human race shall be in possession of the Word of God. The cause is so good that nothing should make us indifferent to it. Its object is so noble and world-wide, that no difficulty or trial should discourage or divert us from supporting it. It has so many enemies that all the energies of the people of God should be aroused to engage in the work and come "to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

The adversary whose name is Legion is ever active. Millions of our fellow-men in foreign lands have never heard the glad tidings of salvation by Jesus Christ. Mohammed an ism, Buddhism and superstition prevail; while even in Christian countries and superstition prevail; while even in Christian countries are considered as the contribution of the contribution ofinfidelity is spreading to an alarming extent. It is, therefore, the imperative duty of all Christians to use every means in their power for the advancement and spiritual welfare of their fellow-men, and they cannot be permanently benefited without the

knowledge and blessings revealed in God's Word.

In this Christian work it has been the privilege of the friends and patrons of the Upper Canada Bible Society to participate for the past fifty-five years in cooperation with our illustrious parent, the British and Foreign Bible Society, and while we can review a glorious past, we should be deeply impressed with the fact that the work is unfinished, and although much has been done, much more remains

to be undertaken before the great purpose of the Society is accomplished.

In prosecuting the important trust committed to the Board of Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society, the chief desire is, that the extensive field occupied may be thoroughly and faithfully cultivated, and that they may be enabled at the close of each successive year to show progress as the result of the efforts put forth. It therefore affords your Directors the highest satisfaction to be able to report that the year (1894-5) just closed has been one of gratifying success, for which we desire to acknowledge the goodness of God for His continued guidance and blessing in the conduct of the affairs of the Society, and to Him we humbly ascribe all the praise and glory.

OUR WORK.

In the divine providence, your Directors are pleased to be able to state that no breach has been made in the Directorate by death during the past year. The monthly business meetings of the Board have been well attended, and conducted with much harmony of spirit and action. Ten meetings have been held, with an average attendance of seven clergymen and seventeen laymen, clearly showing the deep interest of the members in the work of the Society.

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the ager eral day to any o anniver dates ar if the o once in co-opera without the loca take an doing s conside The past year has been to the community generally one of continued depression and discouragement. "Hard times" and "scarcity of money" are expressions reiterated again and again by the officers of Branch Societies in all portions of our field. No doubt, under an overruling providence, the moral effect of such experience may be good. It is as difficult for a community, as it is for an individual, to enjoy without injury a long continuance of great prosperity, and the checks which from time to time we receive tend to repress a spirit of wild speculation, and cause people generally to realize the uncertain and unsatisfactory value of all earthly things.

Notwithstanding discouragement in ordinary business, we have no reason to

Notwithstanding discouragement in ordinary business, we have no reason to complain of any falling off in our circulation of the Word of God, nearly thirty-three thousand (33,000) copies of the Scriptures, in whole or in part, having been issued fro.n our Depository in Toronto, in twenty-eight (28) different languages, during the year. This is an increase of 1,316 over the previous year. (For details see page 11).

#### BRANCH SOCIETIES AND THEIR VISITATION BY AGENTS.

A great majority of our Branch Societies are healthy, vigorous and fruitful, under the management of earnest, active officers, assisted by a large army of collectors (male and female), who canvass for subscriptions in aid of the Bible Society, and otherwise help in this important work from year to year.

To those friends special thanks are due and are hereby sincerely tendered, for their valuable services to the glory of God and the advancement of His cause.

We regret, however, to say that there are a number of branches in a languid condition. Special efforts have been made by the Committee on Agency and Colportage in Toronto, and the visiting agents, to revive the interest of the officers and people in those localities, and place the societies on a more efficient basis, and thus strengthen and *stablish* branches in existence, rather than press for the extension and formation of new organizations during the present depression of trade.

In visiting the branches the unusual severity of the past winter was felt by the agents, some of whom had the unpleasant experience of being delayed for several days in snowbound trains, etc., etc.; however, no personal accident occurred to any of the forty-four gentlemen who participated in this work. In several cases, anniversary meetings of branches had to be postponed, and second and even third dates arranged before successful accomplishment. Much expense could be saved if the officers of Branch Societies and the local clergymen would unite, at least once in each year, in advocating the cause and claims of the Bible Society, and co-operate in the management of the work and conduct of the annual meetings, without the assistance of an agent. The meetings are generally well supported by the local ministers of the Gospel, although a few have been found who refuse to take any part themselves, and thus discourage the members of their churches from doing so. The reasons given are generally very trifling. Plans are now under consideration with a view to reduction in the expense of agency visitation.

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Ladies' Auxiliaries, and Juvenile Societies in connection with Sabbath Schools or otherwise, are very desirable and helpful in the interests of the Society, and we trust soon to have a number of them organized.

During the past year ten new branches have been added to our list, viz.:—In Ontario—Elmgrove, Everett, Heathcote, Point Edward, York Road, Valentia and Verona. In Manitoba—Hamiota, Gilbert Plains and Lake Dauphin.

We have now a total of 590 branches and depositories.

#### COLPORTAGE WORK -EXTENDED AND INCREASED.

The work of Bible Colportage has been extended and increased during the past vear. Twelve men (five in Ontario and seven in Manitoba and the North-West) nave been engaged in this important work for longer or shorter periods as health and circumstances permitted. The operations were chiefly confined to the remote and sparsely populated portions of Ontario, where few, if any, Branch Bible Societies or Depositories are established; also in Manitoba and the North-West Territories. The visits of those self-denying laborers were much appreciated, and brought light and gladness to many dwellings, while the reading of portions of Scripture by your Colporteurs has, under God's blessing, been the means of re viving the zeal and hope of many of those hardy pioneers of our Canadian forests and prairies, who, on account of distance, were temporarily deprived of the social and religious advantages they had left behind in the older settlements. Religious services were conducted, Prayer Meetings held, Sabbath Schools addressed, the sick and dying were comforted, factories and workshops, saw-mills and lumbermen's shanties, etc. etc., were visited, and many persons were supplied with copies of the Scriptures at cost price. During the year, one hundred and twelve (112) families or individuals found destitute of the Word of God were supplied direct by the Colporteurs. Thus the "Good Seed" has been scattered-let us pray that God will abundantly bless the use of The Word--to the salvation of many precious souls and to His own glory.

The following extracts from Reports of our Colporteurs will, we believe, be interesting to the friends of Bible circulation:—

#### EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEUR'S REPORTS

In writing this synopsis of my season's work, I desire, first of all, to thank our Heavenly Father for all His kind care and for the degree of success granted to me. On the 24th of April I set out from Toronto. My first stop for work was at the port of Manitowaning (Manitoulin Island, Algoma), where I sold a dozen copies of the Word of God. One young woman, to whom I sold a Bible, was very much interested in her "new book," in which I marked many passages showing "the way of life." My next point was Little Current, where I was requested to preach; the weather was not favourable for my work, so my sales were few. I then visited Gore Bay and Meldrum Bay. When at the latter place, a storm came up and continued for over a week, preventing the steamer from calling, which gave me an opportunity of becoming acquainted with the residents. There was no minister there at that time,

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so I held seven services. I also visited them at their homes, and read to them. It was indeed a blessed week to me. Some of the people professed Christ, some who were Christians were strengthened, and I trust God's blessing will follow. Bruce Mines was next visited. When here I heard of the sickness and death of my little son, and went back to Toronto for a few days. Returning to Bruce Mines, a meeting of friends interested in the Bible Society was held, and the work of the Branch there was revived by the election of new officers, and I made a book case for the Depository. I then moved on to Sault Ste. Marie, where I remained some time, selling about 70 copies of the Scriptures and helping in Christian work.

Rat Portage was next visited. Here a meeting in the interests of the Bible Society was held on Sabbath, which was a success, being attended by all the ministers in the town and a good large audience. As requested, I addressed the meeting, giving some details of my work. I also collected the cash for sales of Scriptures at the Depository.

I then pushed forward to Winnipeg, where I made my headquarters for the remainder of the season. I attended the Manitoba Exhibition, where I sold 45 Bibles and 154 Testaments.

In Winnipeg, I also visited frequently among the Chinese, Germans, Icelanders

and Jews. Of the latter there are about 200 families residing there.

A number of very interesting incidents occurred in meeting all of these people especially the Jews, who received me very cordially. When leaving Winnipeg, expressions of sorrow were freely made by many of my Jewish acquaintances, and one asked, "Who will read to us when you are gone?" I soldeight copies of the Hebrew and English Bible, and by the aid of some friends in Winnipeg secured and distributed 60 copies of the German-Hebrew New Testament among them. During the summer I visited most of the City of Winnipeg, but the poorer class of the people were so scarce of money that my sales were few when compared with the number of visits.

I visited all the people along the *Red River*, both sides, from Winnipeg to the mouth of the river. This took a long time, as I was obliged to go over it twice. I worked day and night in order to meet the people at the times they were expected to be at home, and when they were to have money to buy; but for all that the sales

were few.

My opportunities were very many, and I found plenty of work comforting the old people, who were worried, and showing the younger ones the way of salvation

from God's Word.

I visited some of the day schools. One of the Indian schools gave an entertainment, composed of recitations, dialogues, examinations in geography and other studies. I was much interested and surprised at the intelligence and brightness of these young Indians and half-breeds. I also visited Stonewall and Stony Mountain, and parts of the Prairie; also Emerson, Dominion City, Niverville, Bird's Hill, and the farmers in the surrounding districts. Very many blessed opportunities were given me in those localities. One farmer told me how well he had succeeded since coming to this country—enumerating his cattle, his crops, his acres of land and his cash. I asked him if that was all he had secured? He said, he thought he had done pretty well. I then asked him. What he would have if death came to him? He said, "Nothing at all." Then I pointed him to Jesus, and he told me that no one had ever spoken to him in that way before. He seemed much moved, and I believe the seed of the Kingdom was sown in good ground that afternoon.

A number of similar cases could be given if we had room. God has blessed my work to a number of individuals this year, for which I feel thankful. I preached 37 times, spoke at 3 Bible Society meetings, gave 14 Sunday School addresses, 12 addresses in the interest of the Jews, travelled about 4,000 miles, made 2,610 calls, circulated 1120 Bibles and Testaments, and supplied twenty-five families or indivi-

duals who were destitute of the "Bread of Life."

On my return trip I called at the divisional points of the C. P. Railway, viz., Port Arthur, Schreiber, Chapleau and White River, thus doing that part of the work which is away from the Lake Ports, and where the bulk of the Algoma work is situated.

Praying that God will abundantly bless these efforts to the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom,

REV. JAS. MOSSIP, COLPORTEUR, MANITOBA.

May, 1894.—I find the work a branch of Christian labour and consequently I like it, though there are many things to try the patience and many discouragements, yet I am not discouraged. On the other hand, I feel better equipped for the work, mentally and spiritually, than I was in the start; for my experience has been a help in the work as I proceed from week to week.

August.— During the last month I have travelled all around the town of Neepawa. I have canvassed also in Gladstone, Austin, Sidney, Glendale, Eden, Orange Ridge and Spring Hill. I like the work well, and I would like to give such service as would be satisfactory to the Society I preach at every opportunity and endeavour to do good by dropping a word here and there, as the Bible itself brings up the subject of Salvation.

September —I have been working in Southern Manitoba this last month. I canvassed in Carberry, Chater, Souris, Hartney, Melita and Lander. The longer I continue, the more I see it is the work of the Lord. Sometimes the colporteur will travel all day and sell comparatively nothing. At another time, he will sell in almost every house. The distance is often great between houses, frequently five or six miles without any call possible, and on an unknown road. It is interesting and instructive to sell to all classes and grades of people, and to hear all kinds of opinions and answers. Yet not always the most pleasant reception. The crops are small this year, and the people somewhat discouraged.

October.—I have travelled in Southern Manitoba this last month, and have met with a great many people who needed Bibles. TheBible work is a good work; it gives many an opportunity of putting in a word for Jesus, and sometimes I meet with sick folks, who need a kind word. I thank God for strength for this work. How little after all, can any individual do in comparison with what Christ has done. Many people who purchase Bibles begin to read, who were not previously Bible readers. I have noticed this fact several times in my travels.

November.—Winter has now fairly set in, and I am confining my work to the towns, and contemplate visiting Winnipeg in the coldest season. During the past month I have travelled mostly in country settlements, viz: Pine Creek (near Gladstone), Glenholm, Wellwood, Dempsey and Brookdale. I have met several families destitute of the Scriptures and have given away a number of Bibles. The churches here are mostly school houses, yet many of them have Bibles for worship, and I have sold some of those 6oc. Bibles for church purposes. I preached last Sabbath to ten people in a little school house at Freeland, and in the evening to about fifteen at Lorndale school.

December.—This month I have travelled mostly through Brandon and have met opposition of a peculiar nature. A good many people who have been members of the different churches, have left them, through reading the works of Russell on the "Dawn of the Millennium." They say there is no eternal punishment, and they are very aggressive. They look on all rules and doctrines of the churches as traditions of men. They seem conscientious in their strange belief, but seem to think it their duty to try to turn every one else to their theory, rather than to turn the poor sinner from the error of his ways.

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January, 1895.—This report is far below anything you have ever received from me, although I never worked more earnestly, and the results were never so disheartening. . On my way towards Winnipeg I canvassed in the village of Douglas, and the town of Carberry, which I left about five o'clock in the evening, intending to push eastward six or eight miles farther; there was a stiff breeze blowing, which increased to a gale, almost a blizzard. It was very cold. I passed a farmhouse some six miles east of Carberry, but as there was no light about the place, I did not stop. The storm grew fiercer and colder. I reached a log shanty, lighted up. I asked for lodging, but could not get accommodation there Having watered my poor tired horse, I pushed on towards Melbourne P. Office. On reaching Melbourne there was no light in the house (for there was only one house). I then moved on towards Sidney, seven miles distant I passed a house on the way; there was no light. I did not stop, as I knew that about a mile farther there had lived an old gentleman, a retired minister, so I made for his place. I knocked again and again at the door, but no response; the family had gone back to Ontario. I unhitched my horse as best I could, and put him in the stable, which was empty. I had oats with me in my sleigh, so I fed him, and he picked some of the old hay there. I could not unharness, and tried to warm myself by walking in the stable, but found I was freezing gradually; my feet were both feelingless. My fingers nipped; death stared me in the face. I tried my last resource and made my way back on foot to the house, a mile west; the people there took pity on me, made a fire and got me supper; this was at one o'clock in the morning. My left foot was frozen badly, but was restored with care. The people were Roman Catholics and showed me great kindness, for which I am very grateful. They would not accept a

An interesting circumstance occurred at Winnipeg. A man, who had been converted a few days previously, saw my stock of Bibles and Testaments; he looked longingly at them, remarking that he would buy one from me as soon as he could make a little money. He was out of work and poorly clad, but Saved in fesus, and when I gave him a Bible, the joy which he expressed gave me more pleasure than anything that I had met during the whole month. He was apparently

hungering " for the meat which endureth unto everlasting life."

#### FINANCES.

The total income of the Society for the year amounts to \$35.709.86, which is the fifth highest of all previous years, and under the circumstances is larger than anticipated; because, in addition to the stringency of the money market, the severe winter, with its unusually heavy storms and snow drifts, which blocked the roads in many parts of the country, prevented the ladies from making their collections for the Society at the usual time, consequently, in some districts, the canvass was neglected altogether, while in other cases the returns were not made in time to be included in the year's revenue, which is somewhat less than the previous year.

This vigorous institution has been increasing its staff and extending its work, which is carried on with encouraging success. And we would not forget that the amount set aside for our use this year (\$2,250.00) is largely in advance of that of former years and comes at a time when our wants are most urgent in the sustaining of our present staff of workers.

"We would also sincerely thank the different Branch Bible Societies for their thoughtful and liberal contributions towards the support of the work of French Colportage in the Province of Quebec; and we would pray, and have them pray for us, that we may be forward to do the work which lies at our door and which is so urgently needed."

The Ninety-First Annual Meeting of this venerable Society was held in Exeter-Hall, London, Eng., on Wednesday, 1st May, 1895, and was a great success. The attendance was larger than in the previous year, and the audience was widely representative of the different Churches.

In the absence, through ill health, of the noble President, Lord. Harrowby, the chair was occupied by Lord Kinnaird, and the speeches were full of interest.

All friends of the Society and its great work will be pleased to learn that the deficit in revenue, which caused some discouragement for a few years past, has now been cleared off, and that the Reserve Fund has been restored to its normal condition.

As the "Abstract of Report," as presented to that meeting, is reproduced in this issue, we only note a few statistics, viz: Issues of Scriptures, 3,837,222 copies.

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## BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT, 1894-5.

I .- FINANCIAL AND GENERAL MATTERS.

'I will sing of mercy and of judgment' is a fitting introduction to a retrospect of the past year. The Committee have been sorely exercised by what in their view were adverse events. The death of two Agents and the resignation of two others necessarily created anxieties which are not yet appeased. The war between China and Japan has had a disturbing influence on their plans and upon the labours of their employés in those countries. There have been other causes of disquietude. But while 'judgment' has a place in the song, 'mercy' claims the loudest note.

The Committee refer especially to the relief graciously afforded them by the supply of the funds required for the Society's work. By the generous gifts of the living, and by the hands of the dead, sufficient has been received not only to meet the current expenditure, but also to more than expunge the remainder of the deficit of 1889-92. So that the Society now stands in a better position than in 1889, when what is termed the 'bad years' began. Thus 'mercy rejoices against judgment.'

A brief statement of the financial condition of the Society up to March 31st, is

The General (New Income) and Special Funds amount to £139,810 8s. 7d., which is £1,418 6s. 1d. less than in 1893-4. Sales have realised £93,552 18s. 1d., which is an advance of £1,812 14s. 2d. The total Receipts are therefore £233.363 6s. 3d., which is only £921 12s. 8d. less than in the year preceding.

The expenditure has been £214,970 78. 10d., which is below that of last year by 7.877 48. 9d., leaving a balance in hand on the year's account of £18,392 18s. 10d. This balance, as already intimated, removes the residue of the long-standing deficit,

and leaves a surplus to be carried to the next year's account.

The Committee cannot close this brief review of the Society's finances without an expression of their devout gratitude to the Author of every good gift, Who has, in a year of peculiar trial, so graciously lightened their financial burden. 'He stayeth His rough wind in the day of the east wind.' They would also convey their warm thanks to the friends who, whether by ordinary or by special contributions, have liberated them from the embarrassment arising from past deficiencies, as well as enabled them to meet every current claim. 'The Lord hath been mindful of us: He will bless us.

#### II.—Issues.

The Issues for 1894 are encouraging, although they have not yet fully regained the point they reached in 1892-3. The Home Issues of Bibles, Testaments, and Portions are 1,651,566. Those disseminated abroad are 2,185,656. The total Issues are 3,837,222. The chief point of interest in these figures is that they show the large increase of 68,664,000 in whole Bibles. increase of 28,264 copies in whole Bibles.

#### III.—TRANSLATIONS.

The statistics with regard to translation and revision work are not yet complete; but the Editorial Sub-Committee have had to do in some measure with over one hundred versions during the year. Of these about a dozen will represent new work and new beginnings, but the most important Editorial work of the Society has been the steady of India a with nativ aries to th

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t complete; h over one t new work ty has been the steady, laborious, and protracted revision of the versions in the great languages of India and China, where missionaries of mature scholarship and culture are united with native Christian scholars in bringing up the translations of the older missionaries to the present standard of scholarship.

In China, Corea, and Japan, not only are the missionaries united in the work of translation and revision, but the three great Bible Societies are also united in defray-

ing the necessary expenses entailed.

It is hoped that this year will see the first Pashtu Bible completed for the people of Afghanistan, as 1894 has already witnessed the publication of the complete revised Bible for Persia; and the Malagasi people will receive their first Marginal Reference Bible, which is now passing through the University Press at Oxford.

In Africa, in New Guinea, in Japan, on the slopes of the Himalayas, in Assam, native races are having the Gospel placed within their reach for the first time.

#### IV .- BIBLEWOMEN.

The returns for the Biblewomen who were more or less maintained by the Society's grants in the year ending September 30, 1894, show encouraging progress. Some superintendents by imperfect reports make it impossible to do full justice to their work in a statistical table. But the great majority by the growing accuracy and punctuality of their returns prove how much they value these missionary grants, and how carefully they administer them. Returns have been received for 429 Biblewomen, -27 more than in 1892-3. The number of native women to whom, on an average, the Scriptures were read by them has grown to 4,546 a week more than before, and stands now at 26,560. Out of those who are being taught by the Biblewomen to read, no less than 1,549 native women have attained, within the year, the power of being able to read the Scriptures for themselves. The whole circulation for the year comes to 15,263 Bibles, Testaments, or detached books of Scripture. The 429 Biblewomen were geographically distributed thus: -India 310, Ceylon 76, Syria and Palestine 14, Egypt 18, China 5, Straits 2, Mauritius and the Seychelles 4. The reports continue to bear ample evidence of the high spiritual value of their work.

### VI.—REVIEW OF THE FIELD.

The latest year of the Bible Society's history has been, in some important respects, a peculiarly interesting one: and, in respects even more important, it has proved peculiarly pleasant. In their natural cycle, and for reasons which the meteorologist cannot always explain, some seasons are of a prevalent gloom, and wear out their course under a sky which never quite loses its shadow or fully enjoys its sun. Others are more fortunate. The summer is early, and it is long, and the winter is briefer than usual. There is a sense of pleasure in the air: life seems to forget some at least of its cares; and though there is always enough to remind us both of labour and sorrow, the year, when it is over, is remembered as one of unusual serenity and enjoyment.

To this latter and happier class—to pass from external to spiritual things—the year just over may be said to belong. There have been dark days in its course: and as one reviews it there is not a little to regret. But there has been a distinct, if a hardly definable, brightness in its sky, and a special sense of vitality in its air. From almost every part of the field the reports are, in varying degrees, encouraging. It is not only that the circulation has been very generally advancing, although the advance has been in many instances very notable, and that a large amount of important work has been done. There has indeed been much done; but there is something beyond these details, pleasant as they are. There is a certain vitality in narrative after narrative, a consciousness of progress, a hope of better things not distant-like that peculiar sense of the approach of morning after night, or of spring after a prolonged winter. Prejudices against Christian work, which have lasted for ages, seem in case after case to be relaxing: the very bitterness of opposition explains itself in the direction of encouragement, and as page after page of the record is turned, the sense is correspondingly deepened of the certainty of the progress which is being made, and of the incalculable value of the work which is being

It is one characteristic of a year thus generally pleasant that it has been in a special sense one of deputations—friendly embassies from the home centre to several of the most important parts of the field, and rich in unusually interesting and important results. In the spring Mr. Paull was commissioned to visit Algeria: the significance of his journey lies very much in the fact that it was directed to the great continent so rapidly opening up, not only to a new political but to a new Christian future; and that, in consequence of this visit, from the northern French colony, and directed by a Christian Frenchman, the hands of Bible influence are being stretched, as they have not been before, to meet those extended to them from Later in the year Mr. Finch was deputed to Norway: and the peculiar interest of his journey to the Society's warm-hearted friends in the north consists in the arrangements then made, not for the withdrawal of old and faithful Agencies, but for their attaining the honour of an independent position in their own land, and side by side with the other Reformation countries which are one after another accepting the honour and the responsibilities of separate existence.

The visit of Mr. Sharp and Mr. Victor Buxton to the Turkish Agency, joined as they were by Mr. Weakley and Dr. Thomson, had an even higher importance. A

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further visit to the Georgian and Armenian Churches, not only gained for these ancient Christian communities assurance of a popular Bible, and for the Society's work the goodwill of the ecclesiastical authorities, but imparted to the work in those interesting localities a stimulus it must long feel. Of a different character, but hardly less noteworthy, was the deputation to the Society's Auxiliaries in Australia and New Zealand—the Representatives of Bible work in the great British Colonies of the south; and Mr. De Wolf and Mr. Neave will long remember with pleasure how warmly they were everywhere received, and how heartily the Committee's messages were welcomed; and they will delight to think with what increased hope for the future the prospects of the Society's work may be regarded.

With one or two pleasant reservations, the field of the Bible Society is the whole world. Excepting Ireland and Scotland, where filial societies are at work, and several of the Continental countries which have accepted the responsibilities of independence, it includes the whole of Europe. It includes Africa, and counts within its peaceful annexation the territories of the political Powers represented there. It includes Asia from Siberia to Ceylon, from the Caspian to Japan. It includes the Island Continents of Australasia, and the Polynesian Groups which across the Pacific bridge a way to the new world. And it includes the whole of America—the States and those territories alone excepted in which the American Society has fallen heir to its labours, and is pursuing the work in the spirit and with methods like its own.

To survey in detail such a field is obviously impossible, and mere details, just in proportion as they are copious, often obscure those larger facts in which the summary of the year's work most suitably consists. Let us turn to these wider views and let us begin with the leading races of Europe.

When the Society began its work it found, as might be expected, prompt and cordial sympathy from many friends in the old countries of the R eformation. The history of these early days has been compendiously written—it might be written afresh—so instructive and so full of the genuine missionary spirit it is—written section by section, as the story of each separate country might be told. Such a history would recall many a delightful memory; it would also prove how indispensable the Society's direct work continued to be for many a year. But it would also show—what from the first must be inevitably felt—that the only successful development of that work, both for the Society itself and for the countries in which it was pursued, must be its transference to the hands of Christian Agencies there, and the acceptance by the Reformed Churches themselves of one of their highest and most natural duties. To this truth the more recent chapters of the Bible Society's history of these Reformation—it might be said of the Germanic—peoples has borne a close and significant relation. It has announced year after year the formation of independent National Societies, successively attaining their vigorous majority, and entering on the spiritual heirship which is so evidently their own.

Sweden undertook its own Bible work in 1884—Holland followed in 1892. With Switzerland the Bible Society has for years been related only as a friendly source of assistance and supply, and in Germany its colportage work is practically limited to the Catholic and non-Germanic populations of the Fatherland. To this list the record in 1894 adds another name; it contains the account of the Society's final withdrawal from Norway, and the beginning, with the Agencies there, of an independent career. Nowhere has the Society more faithful friends than those in the north, whose annual letters gave the results of the work of the year, and blending, as they constantly did, the simplicities of singularly attractive narratives with that evangelical warmth and tenderness one is so sure of finding in those northern homes. It adds to the interest of this new chapter of Bible history that its beginning almost synchronises with the death of the venerable Herr Mohn, of Bergen, who just anticipated, but did not enter on, work which he would have so vigorously assisted. Almost at the same time, and with a startling suddenness, died

Colonel Ravn, of the Denmark Agency; and there is little doubt that the story of Norway will be repeated in the southern kingdom, and that it may be unnecessary to appoint any new Agent of the Society there. In the later Christian history of the Germanic peoples, there are few more entirely satisfactory evidences of life than this acceptance of the duty of the supply of a popular Bible at home, while it leaves all the more for its conflict with over-sea heathenism the Society which gave them birth.

To Germany there must be a more detailed reference, were it only because from that great Agency the restlessly active, the intense, the devoted spirit of Mr. James Watt has been so unexpectedly withdrawn. The story of Mr. Watt's life must be read elsewhere—it necessarily forms at the same time one of the most instructive chapters in the Society's own varied story. The report for the year shows a very large increase in the total German circulation; it amounts to 668,495, and is some 54,000 copies in advance of that of 1893-4.1 The Society's own returns are also higher, and especially in Bavaria, Silesia, East Prussia and Posen—provinces which, from their Roman Catholic or non-German populations, are specially and peculiarly its care. It should be added that "in the colportage circulation of 1894 the highest average has been reached during Mr. Watt's tenure of the Agency, and probably the highest in its history; and that such has been the economy practised, without reducing the wages of the men, that the expenditure percopy has been the lowest ever known." Results like these would not only have given the highest satisfaction to Mr. Watt's statistical mind, but they are largely attributable to that incessant watchfulness to which the Agency owes so much.

From the Germanic let us turn to the Latin peoples—the versatile and gifted descendants of the races which, side by side with the Germans themselves, built up a modern Europe on the ruins of the old civilisations. No special reference can be made to Belgium,<sup>2</sup> to Portugal, or to Spain,<sup>3</sup> where there is little specially

distinctive; but no one can overlook Italy and France.

In the little town of Croisic, in the Loire Inférieure—it is the Croisic of Mr. Wedmore's Pastorals, with its homely farms, its salt marshes, its sifting Biscayan gales—there is a burying place, long ago forsaken, with suggestive memories of its

gales—there is a burying place, long ago forsaken, with suggestive memories of its own. In the sixteenth century Croisic had a population of six thousand—there are now little more than two—of whom four thousand were Evangelical Protestants; but the religious persecution of the time, which could not spare even this little remote place, drove them for refuge to England. One may find the graves of these people in the lonely Cimetiére des Huguenots—they have left hardly a living representative—and the Croisic fisher-folk are described by the colporteur as intolerant beyond almost any other, and full of prejudices against the Word of God.

There are moods in which one is ready to think of Croisic, with its Huguenot cemetery, as indicating as an emblem or picture might do the state of modern France. The old Reformation piety seems to have departed, and to have left behind little except the graves of its fathers. But the conclusion, like many other pessimistic ones, would be an exceedingly mistaken one. M. Monod's report for the year is interesting in every page, and it goes very far to prove that if the Huguenots, as a party, have departed, the spirit which inspired them still lives in the country from which with heavy hearts they fled. One of the most suggestive facts in M. Monod's summary is that the people are becoming weary of a life without God—

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that secularism, like so many other seductive fallacies, is being "found out." Mme. Severine, a brilliant and influential writer of the Radical-Socialistic party, has been attacking the materialism of the University of France: "It will be seen some day," she exclaims, "that man by materialism steadily accomplishes his own ruin." "Our greatest Liberals," adds M. Monod, "the leaders of the popular atheistic movement, are stopping in amazement at the results; they are beginning to suspect they have forgotten to put a moral light in the educational lantern." And of these opinions in high places there are many curiously interesting echoes in the journals of the colporteurs. "Do not be discouraged," said a friendly artisan one day to one of the Society's men. as he offered his little Gospels to an unsympathetic crowd, "do not be dismayed; there are more among us who sympathise with you than you know." One remembers as he reads the incident that it was an answer just such as that which suggested the McAll Mission. "I have many proofs," says another colporteur, "that the people, though they are against the popular religion, are not themselves irreligious. 'Tell us of Jesus,' they will say wistfully; 'tell us what He said and did: of Him it is that we want to know!'" There is a strange tenderness in the stories which from time to time recur in these journals of the desire of the people that their children at least should possess the Word of God. One day-and the simple story might be paralleled by others-the colporteur found himself conversing with a man still young and very poor, but surrounded by nine children. "I saw his evident desire to have the New Testament, though he had no money to pay for it. At last a thought occurred to him—'Would I partake of his more than frugal meal in exchange?' I accepted with joy, and in less than an hour I had become the friend and counsellor of these poor people, who promised to read the Book and to ask the Lord's blessing upon it. The people seem promised to read the Book and to ask the Lord's blessing upon it. to begin to understand that to bring up children without the fear of God is as much as leading them into evil; and oftentimes people who have no religion buy a Gospel for the children." Oftentimes, indeed, the young people buy a Gospel for themselves, and there are no more touching stories than those which meet us of the ardour of that first love which is awakened by the Friend Who has been found, as the charming and all novel story won the reader's heart. "Write some of these words on my tombstone when I am gone," said a dying youth the colporteur found, with the Testament clasped in his wasted hands, "someone will perhaps read them there." These little Testaments, bought by one here and there, and read in secret, are the veritable seed of a harvest with which the French fields shall yet be "I have seen nearly all the flourishing evangelical stations of this Department," writes a colporteur on resigning his work in one of the northern provinces-"I have seen them all begin with a single family," and it is frequently possible to add, with a single Gospel. These things, endlessly varied and repeated as they are, have deep significance. They emphasize a wide and sound conclusion which M. Monod thinks not a few in authority are beginning to lay to heart, and which received a very felicitous expression from an honest fonctionnaire in the country of the Loire. 'I have had experience of men. I have no religion myself; but I know there is nothing but this'-and he held up a little Gospel-' will save my brave countrymen.

Much of all this—and herein lies the special significance of the report of the year—repeats itself in ITALY.¹ In Italy, as in France, there are signs of a reaction against atheistic theories of thought and life, and Signor Meille gives some extremely notable i lustrations of the altering mood: 'I remember,' he says, that a commission was once named for choosing the text-books in our elementary schools, and before opening a single volume they laid down the rule that any book, however excellent, in which the name of God was mentioned, would be excluded.'

'Things,' he adds, 'are much changed now. Our leading men seem to think not only that God exists, but that He rules the destinies of nations and individuals." Signor Meille alleges by way of illustration some notable expressions of Signor Sonnini and Signor Crispi, and he follows them by a more detailed quotation from the greatest living poet of Italy,-Carducci, who had already signalised himself as apparently a prophet of rebellion against every form of Theism. His most recent utterances, delivered not long since at San Remo, are very different. 'From God. the Almighty, the All Perfect, we must take our departure in every enterprise, and He alone can bless all we do. Hatred of a pestiferous and tyrannical superstition, and the pride of observers who trusted too much in the victories over external nature, have made the Latin races forget God, but no crimes of the priesthood and no arrogance of scientists can exclude God from history. God is the highest vision to which nations raise their eyes in their youth: He is the Sun of sublime minds and of burning hearts. Where and when the divine idea shines in its power and majesty cities are born and flourish, where and when it oscillates and is obscured cities decay and perish.' It is the emergence of thoughts like these out of the confused darkness of so much of the past-thoughts which in one aspect seem to embody themselves as avenging fates, in another as the angels of Divine Hopewhich mark with peculiar symptoms the latest spiritual phases of the history of the Latin countries of Europe.

There remain the many races of the Austro-Hungarian Empire-races in which the East meets the West, weaving into the network of their many languages a parti-coloured web of human speech; but under every variety of external life revealing from time to time that human nature-everywhere the same-which Mr. Millard so strikingly reveals in the incidents of his attractive report. So attractive indeed is it, so illustrative of the Society's work in its most engaging aspects, that in its narrative sections it might profitably be printed, page for page, line for line, and distributed everywhere. It is the message of these cheerful pages, from first to last, that, for all the sharpness of mistaken opposition here and there, and for all the hardness of the heart, there is to be found, in whatever direction we turn, signs of deepening Christian life, an increasing activity, and of blessings which, like the soft and frequent showers of April, make glad the earth when it stirs at the touch of spring. Nothing can exceed Mr. Millard's sense of pain when he reads of the Gospel despised, except his thankfulness when he knows it has been welcomed; and there is more than enough in the journals of his faithful men to keep him in a spirit of unceasing praise. With his pleasant narratives, ever varying, if always impressively the same, it is impossible to linger; for when one has reached the eastern limits of Europe, he has but placed his foot on the threshold of a new world,-that vast world of the Slavonic, the Mongolian, the Hindu races towards which the West has for millenniums been irresistibly attracted, and

never, perhaps, more seriously than now.

When a Russian peasant receives a Gospel from the colporteur, he uncovers his head, reverently makes the sign of the cross, and prays that he may have the divine blessing in using the sacred book he is so thankful to possess. In that simple gesture and act of prayer one may recognise the most hopeful characteristic of the Slavonic races—their spirituality of nature, their simplicity and receptiveness, their instinctive piety. He may also see, if he will but consider, one of the most hopeful facts in regard to the future—perhaps even the political future—of ages and of kingdoms yet to be. The Russian Empire is still in its youth; no one can easily forecast the strength and influence of its maturity. But if there is any single fact to which the reports of Dr. Nicholson and of Mr. Morrison bear uniform

Of every seven copies of the Scriptures circulated by the Society last year, one passed into the hands of a subject of the Russian Empire. The circulation in the northern1 and the southern2 Agencies amounted to 540,000, and the numbers are steadily increasing year by year. A place of authority and influence much greater than it possesses even now may yet be held by the Russian race. The reports of the Bible Society-and none perhaps more than the last-give hopeful assurance that the influence will be exerted by a Bible-loving and a devout people.

These wider conclusions are illustrated by many pleasant incidents. of Mary Jones has been often told, and it will always have a significance of its own; but it may be paralleled, in the devotion it shows, by not a few from the journals of the Russian colporteurs. Dr. Nicholson mentions the case of a youth who set his heart on a rouble Bible, but without any means of paying the price. He disappeared, and the next day the colporteur found him, the rouble in his hand and a deep light in his eyes. 'How did you get it?' he was asked His reply was given with characteristic simplicity: he had walked twenty five miles to an employer of labour, engaged himself for a rouble's worth of work, and walked twenty-five miles back again. Yet the incident, among many similar, hardly engages the attention. In another instance given by Dr. Nicholson-it is a very rare one-the purchaser objected to the book as provided by our English Society. The answer of the colporteur—himself a Russian—was conclusive and emphatic: 'Every Russian knows how much we owe to the English Society.

The closing during the year of the Society's Depôt at Kiev may seem to some extent inconsistent with views so pleasant, but those who are most intimately acquainted with the Russian mind and methods of government will not attach an unduly discouraging importance to the incident. Mr. Morrison can indeed strike a judicious balance between the weights of opposing scales. 'If the Governor General of Kiev,' he writes, 'wrongly informed of our methods and our action in the district under his charge, thinks it right to prohibit our work as far as he can, we have the highest officials under the government conferring favour after favour upon us. If an Armenian priest in the fine fervour of his zeal tears a New Testament to pieces and vows vengeance against our colporteur for circulating "Freemason" literature, we have the Katholikos of all the Armenians, the famed Mighertich Khrimian, graciously saying the kindest things about the Bible Society, and promising to aid us by every means in his power. If a Georgian priest drives a colporteur out of the village with words of contumely, we have the Exarch of Georgia, the highest ecclesiastic in the land, and an honoured member of the Holy Synod, aiding us to print the Scriptures in the very capital of his country.' It is evident to which side the weight of encouragement turns.

The visit of Mr. Sharp, and of Mr. Morrison, to Tiflis and Etchmiadzin, is in some respects the central incident of the year. A detailed account of it cannot be given in this place. Mr. Morrison's account as he follows the route from Odessa to Batoum, thence through the Mingrelian forests, across the level Georgian plains, and over the delightfully wooded Suram hills to Tiflis, and the valley of the Kura, may be read in the pages of the volume to which this is a summarising preface. some of the results may be stated in a sentence. 'Recognised Georgian scholars,' Mr. Morrison writes, 'have since then been appointed carefully to read and revise the Pentateuch, the Psalms, and the New Testament, with a view to bringing out editions of these books as well as of single Gospels. The revision work has gone on

satisfactorily, and, as I write, the Psalms and the four Gospels are ready for the press, and the remaining books are well advanced towards completion. At Etchmiadzin the result of a singularly pleasant visit was equally satisfactory. Long experience has shown that Armenian scriptures printed in London, in Germany, or even in Constantinople, if admitted to the Russian Empire at all, are received with suspicion, and that much would be gained if these scriptures were issued by the Armenian Synod itself. But as this would require more press power than was to be found in Etchmiadzin, the offer was made to supply a press for this special service. suggestion,' writes Mr. Morrison, 'was laid by Mr. Sharp before the Katholikos, who at once expressed his satisfaction and sense of gratitude for the useful gift. It was my lot to visit Etchmiadzin again in the autumn, to arrange for handing over the press to the monastery. I was received with every expression of kindness, and during the four days I spent there in consultation with the Katholikos, I was treated with the most lavish hospitality. I firmly believe that the Society's relations with the Armenian clergy and people have been vastly improved, and that many of the difficulties experienced are for ever things of the past.'

From the home of the venerable Katholikos, lying as it does within sight, almost within shadow, of Ararat, one may continue the mental journey, which begins in the north, either eastwards, southwards or towards the west. If we pass eastwards by south down the broad valley which leads to the Gulf of Persia, we find that ancient kingdom on the one hand and the almost devoted haunts of the Arabian monarchy on the other. If to the west, we are led into Asia Minor and the provinces that yet remain of European Turkey. If southwards,—guided by once-frequented routes and by the ruins of once-populous cities—we approach the Land of Promise by Damascus, and passing its sacred sites, we enter as the Patriarch once entered Egypt. But whatever route is followed-or though, in succession, the mental voyager follow them all-they will each lead him into the homes of the Muslim races, and among the disciples of Muhammad. They will, at the same time, lead him into three of the nost notable Agencies of the Society's work-the

Persian, the Turkish,1 and the Egyptian.2

In this, as in previous cases, only the widest generalisations can be made; but here, as elsewhere also, they singularly agree in their favourable aspect, It is one of the few shadows on Dr. Thomson's pages, that he alludes to his own resignation and that this copious and encouraging report may be his last. But it contains passages which he must have written with deep gratitude, and with them he may be well content to take farewell of a work so dear to him. For years the printing of the Albanian Scriptures has been interdicted, and the restriction lay like a burden on Dr. Thomson's heart. That burden, like many another, has at length been removed, and 'now,' he writes, 'we look forward with joy to the work yet to be done for a brave and long neglected people.' In other and wider aspects his retrospect of the year is full of hope. 'The Bible,' he writes, 'is respected more than ever, and we trust read more than ever, and as the people become acquainted with it they feel that it, and it alone, is the rule they must follow. This is but one of the sure symptoms of the approach of day after a long night of ignorance and superstition, and we cannot err in ascribing them to the diffusion of the Word of God.' 'That Word,' he writes elsewhere, 'is producing, both in Greece and Turkey, a moral renovation which no study of ancient philosophy or poesy could ever originate.' words, which sum up Dr. Thomson's final impression of the state of spiritual mind on the Turkish Agency, are closely paralleled by those used by Mr. Weakley for that of Egypt. cerned, that the large circulation of Scriptures during past years has awakened a degree of real interest in their contents which might be recognized thankfully and hopefully as the first working of the divine leaven. Among the Muhammadans, especially at Cairo, there is a spirit of earnest inquiry observable, and books which deal with the questions between Christianity and Islam have been eagerly purchased. It may be safely assumed that very much of this inquiring spirit is due to the effect of the reading of the Holy Scriptures, of which so many copies have gone among the people.' A similar feeling, if less distinctly expressed, is felt in Mr. Hodgson's summary: 'The circulation has almost doubled; the vast majority of the books have been passed into the hands of Muhammadan readers.' One of the oldest colporteurs reports a favourable mood he has never equally experienced before; and Mr. Hodgson, in referring to the Depot at Bushire and the supplies to the Arabian Mission, notices that 'the work of Bible distribution is being carried on with increasing results, and that a way is doubtless being prepared for the opening up to the Gospel

of the hitherto inaccessible continent of Arabia.

From these great countries, profoundly interesting as they are, let us pass to one which in many important ways surpasses in interest even them. 'There is a spell in that word India which has always been drawing the West towards the East.' As one sails along the Malabar coast, and the little white churches come into view among the palms and dark green woods that line the shore, he remembers that the legends of the planting of the Syro-Christian community there lead the thoughts back to the time of the earliest missionaries, and even of St. Thomas the Apostle. And since then what Christian nation has not dreamt its dream about India—the dream sometimes of empire, more often of gain, and happily in these latter days of conquest for Christ. Compared with the millenniums of its history the story of Ziegenbalg and Schwartz and Carey, with their indescribable difficulties seems recent; one recalls how, in those days of the wild misconception of all missionary aims, the Bible Society itself was charged with placing our possessions in the East in the most imminent peril; with surpassing the ingenuity of Buonaparte in devising plans for the subversion of the British Empire in India. These times have passed forever; one may well forget them in the absorbing interest of the present and the future; yet the present cannot be fairly understood without such comparisons with the past. For years the successive reports of the Society's Auxiliaries have been singularly inspiring, and those of the year just closed continue the impressions the earlier accounts made. Where everything is interesting it is difficult to choose, and where there is so much encouraging, it is easy to generalise perhaps too favourably. One reads of circulation increasing rapidly, as in the case of Madras and Bangalore, steadily as in Allahabad, or slightly declining as in Bombay; of translations being revised; of the experiences of Colporteurs, of Biblewomen pursuing as only Christian women can their sisterly and noble work. But it is only one who knows intimately, and has long observed the currents of thought and life in India, that can fairly estimate their direction and their force. Perhaps, indeed, those currents are becoming too visible both in their flow and volume for any, even the indifferent observer, to be unconscious of them. 'It is manifest to all who have personal intercourse with educated Hindus,' writes the report from Madras, ' that their views and feeling in regard to religion in particular are undergoing a marked change.' And the Rev. J. Lazarus, who is well qualified to express an opinion, is then quoted: 'Christianity,' he writes, ' is in the air, and India is passing through a serious crisis. Materialism, once so popular, is growing out of fashion and yielding place to a religious sentiment. Though the educated masses are still at some distance from the threshold of Christianity, Christ is seldom out of their sight. He is more than ever in the van of moral and religious progress. In English and vernacular newspapers, the writers often exhibit an intimate acquaintance with the Bible. Even among the masses the Bible is making way. I have come across many villagers who are in the habit of reading the Word of God.' Who cannot but long for the day when such forecasts shall be uncertain and debatable no more, when the visions of Christian hope, visions no longer, shall be embodied, in realities brighter even than themselves; when India shall have passed the threshold to which she is now but approaching, and shall have consecrated the subtle intellect of her thinkers, the tender hearts of her women, the fulness of her resources to the service of Christ.

To forecast the future in CHINA-and with China, we cannot but think of JAPAN may be just as unsafe as to many it may seem assured; but there can be little risk in estimating the value of what has, within the past year, become history. In Japan, as in China, the year opened gloomily, and while the memory was yet recent of the plague in Hong Kong, and of the earthquake in Yezzo, the war-cloud burst over both countries. Now that it has passed, and with such fuller light as comes from a clearing sky we read the pages of the reports, it is with feelings of interest as unusual as the events of the year. But if the chronicles of war have been, as they ever are, deeply written in blood, the records of the work of the Bible Society are singularly peaceful and, it must be added, singularly encouraging. The soldier too often leaves a waste behind his march, and in Korea and Manchuria he has for the time displaced the colporteur; but the circulation of the Scriptures in Japan has risen from 35,000 to 114,000 copies, and in China from 236,000 to 289,000. Of the large total of Japanese Scriptures, some 17,000 were distributed in the hospitals and garrisons, and in the ships of war with the full approval and the thanks of the military and naval authorities. In China full one-half of the increase is due to the patient work of the colporteurs-a work that seems to grow year by year in its value as well as its compass, and which is increasingly accumulating those evidences of the growth of a new (hristian life among the people which in every land, but especially among the vast populations of China, has a limitless interest and significance. During the months of 1884 there have been ceaselessly moving from place to place, not indeed in all the provinces-empires as not a few of them are in population-but in most of the more important ones, 170 colporteurs, six of them Europeans, all the rest, natives of their vast, almost voiceless, inscrutable land. One meets them on river boats, among the mountain villages, in the unlighted, unfreshened alleys of their labyrinthine cities. How patiently enduring many of these men are, how genuinely devout, we must read the journals to know. And though the Chinaman of the West seems too often hopelessly alien from his European or American brother, incidents such as we meet in these reports reveal the same human heart. Assuredly some of his words, as also his needs, may well reach the hearts and consciences of Christians at home. "Why is this news about God and Jesus brought to us only now?" said a fellow-traveller to one of the colporteurs; "has it never been known before?" And though they often seem stolid. the Missionaries who superintend the Bible-men know how impressionable and how receptive many of the rude people are. "Again and again," writes Mr. Joseland, whose district is near Amoy, "the men are asked to read from and explain the books; again and again they are asked to make a longer stay and to teach the truth systematically; and when they leave they are nearly always importuned to return as soon and as often as they can." Another missionary superintendent compares their work to that of the pioneer in the prairie or untravelled forest; they are clearing away the undergrowth of centuries, they are opening up roads along which the settlers of a new time may travel, and bridging the rivers he may cross. The reports of both countries anticipate the best results from the war; that of Japan is almost jubilant in its anticipations; but it is safer to read with gratitude the pages of the accomplished past, and to wait for the turning of the leaf in a volume so full of surprises.

From the Mongolian, let us turn, though for a moment only, to the Malaysian race—that race we meet in Borneo, in Sumatra, and which we find reappearing

How disappointingly dull the Malay often appears many traders know, but how great are his capabilities when once awakened, how responsive he is to kindness and hope, Christian workers far better understand. The report for the Malaysian Agency for the year opens with a joyful expression of thanksgiving, and Mr. Haffenden announces with delight that the circulation has advanced from 36,000 in 1892-3 to over 75,000 in 1893-4. He adds that "the distribution of the Word of God is having a very decided effect all over Malaysia; so much so that all who are engaged in work among the Malay race and Malayspeaking Chinese feel this to be the case, that in spite of the small number of actual conversions yet known the belief is increasing that we are on the very threshold of some great spiritual upheaval."

We are approaching the end of this necessarily brief survey, yet no detailed reference has been made to America, to the Auxiliaries in Canada, to the Agency of the West Indies, to those of Chili, the Argentine, and Brazil. Yet in each of these great fields, did the survey of a world permit a more careful study, there would be found much to interest, and, as in other cases, much to encourage. No one can speak too appreciatively of the work that is done in the Dominion in the North, nor too sympathetically of the difficulties which meet the Colporteurs and the Agents in the Republics and the Islands of the Centre and South. Let us. at the end, recur to Africa. Some reference has been made to Egypt. richest rewards. It may be added in this place that the work, which is largely centred in Cairo and Alexandria, has also extended, though little more than tentatively, to Harrar and the Galla country, that it has entered Abyssinia, that two of the new Versions of the year are for the tribes still further south—one in the C.M.S., the other in the Universities' Mission-field—and that the Ganda Scriptures, so eagerly read in Uganda, are being perfected in form, and supplied as they are needed. Passing southward along the regions of the great lakes, through tribes whose languages have been only recently added, as others are yearly being added to the Society's lists, we cross the Zambesi, and all beyond the Zambesi to the Cape is the adopted field of the vigorous and ever extending Auxiliary of Cape Town with its sister Societies. With "devout thankfulness" Mr. Nuttall reports a circulation of 32,000 copies, of which 7,000 have been circulated by the Colporteurs, and among the latest additions to a long list of Branches and Centres, new Depots at Buluwayo and in Mashonaland. Turning northwards again along the western coasts, on which we may localize one after another, among the various tribes of peoples, the versions printed for them by the Society-one of the most recent for the Bobangi people on the Upper Congo; passing along the Gold Coast and the Sierra Leone shores, the homes of that Wesleyan Mission which has gathered so many into the Kingdom of God-we meet at Casa Blanca one of the Colporteurs of the Morocco Agency; and in the report of that interesting Agency we find the same assurance of deeper interest among the Muslims, of extending work among the natives, of a sensible softening of

the spirit towards Christianity, with which in the earliest report we began.

There is one aspect of the Society's work,—one fact in regard to its activities, to which reference may be made at the close. It is an aspect absolutely true; it is too generally overlooked; it is at the same time of the simplest and most obvious kind.

The reports of the various countries are largely summarized in the statistical tables. Figures are made the symbols of facts. It a work so vast these numerical results are necessarily enormous. We become accustomed to millions. But we are sufficiently conscious that the only way to understand the value of the million is to understand the value of the unit; that the multiplying of many facts of life appeal

in vain to the heart that forgets the meaning of one.

In the autumn of 1893—the story is one of the multitude which Mr. Millard has collected-a colporteur was climbing the woody hills of Galicia He found in one of the huts a young forester whose leg had been crushed by the falling of a tree, and amputated probably with the rude surgery of the nearest village. He was in mental as well as bodily agony—is it an easy thing for youth, in the prime of earliest manhood, in the fulness of strength, in the dawn of ambition and of love, to turn from them all in a moment and enter the shadowy house of pain? The kind stranger spoke to him of the only source of comfort, and read with him some of the words of divine peace. But the sympathy seemed to have come too soon: the wound was too recent: and though at length he consented to have a Bible his bearing was hopeless and defiant. A year passed, and once again the colporteur found himself climbing the wooded path he had climbed before. The scent of the pines, the hush of the forest, the clang at intervals of the distant axe, were all as they had been then. He entered the hut, and at the table, in an invalid chair, but wasted almost beyond recognition, he saw his friend. In that weary year the glory of youth had vanished, the pomps of human life had been hurried from the stage, the last shadow was unfolding itself and about to fall. He was absorbed in reading; and the colporteur noticed, with a strange awe, that he was studying the volume he had sold him a year before. His head at length was slowly lifted; the faded and sunken eve could not at first recognize the stranger, but in a moment there shone in his face a light as if from heaven. "And then," writes the colporteur, "he addressed me in words like these: 'I cannot express my gratitude that you brought me this Bible and thus led me to God. You gave yourself much trouble when you saw me in my misery to induce me to buy the Scriptures. This is my only comfort, and I am happy, though I suffer fearfully. Since you were here my pain has greatly increased, but I am comforted, for I have found my Saviour, Who so tenderly loveth all the heavy laden. I came to feel how miserable I was through my unbelief, but since I have known Jesus I have the load he laid on the land of the laid of the laid of the laid. Christ I bear the load he laid on me. In His Word I find comfort and salvation.' I cannot tell," the colporteur adds, "what I felt. When the poor sufferer mentioned the Saviour's name his care-worn face beamed with joy. A week later I returned, but the Lord had meanwhile taken the afflicted one home. His parents told me that during the last three days he repeatedly said: 'I long to die and be with the Lord.' His last word was 'Lord Jesus!'"

Alberton, Feb. 13th.—The annual meeting in the Methodist Church. If all displayed as much interest as the pastors of both Presbyterian and Methodist Churches, the meeting ought to have been an overflowing one. The meeting was

A satisfactory meeting, at which the agent was well assisted by resident ministers, Revs. Stillwell and Ellison, the former being the retiring president. Mr. John Barclay, an old friend and officer, was elected president, and the earnest sec.-treasurer, Mr. G F. Stewart, was reelected. Arrangements were made for reopening the depository at Mono Centre post office. This branch is over thirty years old, and a former supporter, the late Mr. Bowers, took such an interest and had such confidence in the work, as to

bequeath \$200 to the Society, on his death a few years ago.

\*\*Camilla\*\*—Much interest is manifested in this young branch, and an audience of over eighty gathered in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. Ellison, the pastor, again rendered good service as chairman and by an address. No trouble about officers and collectors. Alton.—This old branch has fluctuations in interest and work, but has many warm and constant friends. The officers of the past do their work so well that they were re-elected this year. Fair attendance at meeting, held in Congregational Church, Mr. D. Macdonald (Presbyterian) in the chair. The pastor, Mr. Bolton, assisted in devotional exercises, and the agent gave a lengthy address. Collectors were appointed this year for territory hitherto uncanvassed, lying toward Orange-ville. The Society's work is well and systematically conducted in this branch.

Horning's Mills .- Here your agent labored under the difficulty of being one of the local ministers, which probably accounted for the smaller attendance than usual. But the meeting was a good one in other respects. The other resident ministers, Revs. Hall and Neilly, gave valuable aid. Meeting went by rotation to the Anglican Church this year. The efficient sec. treasurer, Rev. Wm. Hall, was chosen president and took the chair after his election, your agent being the past president. There is improvement in this branch from year to year, both in sales and collections, and a large and interested committee of laymen look well after the Society's affairs.

Whitfield.-Meeting in Presbyterian Church, well in the centre of the territory covered by this branch, and was one of the largest since organization, five years The fact of its being the regular prayer-meeting night for the church probably furthered the large attendance of about 100. The president, Mr. George Laking, occupied the chair. All the former officers were re-elected. The Rev. Mr Neilly, the pastor, was present and gave a stirring and helpful address. The collections

improved last year, and this branch shows continued promise

Dundalk — The Rev. E. A. Harrison, president of the branch and pastor of the Presbyterian Church, presided at the meeting, which was held in his own church. According to local custom, the Methodist minister, Rev. Dr. Campbell, was chosen president for the coming year and that church appointed for next meeting. The attendance was small for a place as large as Dundalk, but the explanation was given of many meetings the same week. The old officers were reappointed, except that the Rev. Mr. Morrison takes the presidency, Mr. Service expecting to move away. Improvements in the depository were suggested and are being carried

Orangeville — This active branch always has a good meeting, and this year was no exception, though attendance smaller. The president, Mayor Bailey, was in the chair, and made a good opening address, full of spiritual thought. Most of the local ministers were present, but left the speaking to the newest minister in the town, the Rev. Mr. Mackenzie (Presbyterian) and the agent. The former's address was replete with information and inspiration being a model one for the occasion. Your agent followed for about forty minutes, giving further information and urging continued support for the Society. The Baptist Church was the place of meeting. No changes in the officers, except that necessitated by the removal of the earnest and efficient secretary of past years, Mr. J. A. Aikin. This branch is a place of refreshing to an agent.

Mansfield.—This branch was organized last year at a small meeting, but had been dormant. Meeting this year very small, owing partly to stormy and wet evening. Your agent spoke at some length to the few present, explaining the objects and operations of the Society and encouraging perseverance in the establishment of a branch. Officers and collectors were appointed and arrangements made for opening a depository. ### REV. J. H. MOOREHOUSE.

Ancaster.—I am sorry to be unable to report favorably of this branch. The meeting was poorly attended. There does not appear to be much interest in the Bible Society at present in this part of the field. However, we appointed the officers, and I gave a brief address on the Society's work. I also tried to do what I could in personal conversation to induce the officers to revive and strengthen the

Society's work.

Glanford .- Owing to inadequate notice the attendance here was small, but the interest manifested by those present was good. The secretary was away from home and his report was not presented. No resident minister was present. The officers were re-elected. I asked for collectors to be appointed this year, and this was entered into thoroughly. Next day I called on the Rev. S. J. Binbrook.—A pleasant contrast to the two preceding meetings! Some branches make a heavy draught on the agent's energies, while others are of an inspiring nature. The energetic president of Binbrook has his field under thorough supervision, and works hard for the Bible Society. The secretary of this branch also sets an example of faithfulness, having been absent from only two meetings in 27 years. The officers were re-elected, and all the resident ministers are vice-presidents. The meeting was held this year at Blackheath, and the Rev. Mr. Marsh, pastor of the Presbyterian Church there, was kindly present. Unfavorable weather probably lessened the attendance, but the meeting was a warm and satisfactory one.

York.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Circumstances having prevented the resident ministers from attending, your agent conducted the opening exercises. More enthusiasm seemed to be at this branch than any it was my privilege to visit this year. Much good will, no doubt, result from the gathering. A collection of \$17.51 was taken up, which will be greatly augmented by the collectors appointed.

## FIFTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

The fifty fifth annual meeting of this Society was held in Knox Church, Toronto, on the evening of Thursday, May 30th, 1895.

On and surrounding the platform were Senator Allan, President, in the chair; His Worship Mayor Kennedy and Rev. Dr. Thomas, Honorary Secretaries; Hon. S. H. Blake, Q.C., Reverends Dr. Parsons, Principal Caven, Dr. Barrass, Dr. MacLaren, Dr. Gregg, A. B. Chambers, T. R. O'Meara, Charles Duff, J. G. Manly, Wm. Frizzell, D. McNeill, J. G. Potter and Robert Wallace, with Messrs. David Higgins, W. B. Geikie, M.D., J. G. Scott, Q.C., A. T. Crombie, John C. Copp, James McNab, C. R. Cooper, Robert W. Doan, Albert Ogden, W. J. Robertson, John Harvie, Permanent Secretary, etc.

The Choir of Knox Church led the singing.

After singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," Rev. Dr. Parsons read from the 119th Psalm, after which he led in prayer.

THE PRESIDENT mentioned, in opening, that an invitation had been sent to His Excellency the Governor-General, who is the Patron of this Society and one of the Vice-Presidents of the Parent Society, asking him to be present this evening His Excellency had replied in a kind note that a previous engagement prevented his presence, and sending his best wishes for a successful meeting and for the prosperity of the Society.

THE PRESIDENT then proceeded: It is my pleasing duty and my privilege once more to welcome you to the annual meeting of our Bible Society. I only regret that I have not the pleasure of welcoming a larger audience; but still I trust that to all those who have come here to-night, this meeting will be one both of interest and instruction, and that the words we shall hear will send us away more determined than ever to exert ourselves to arouse fresh zeal and interest in the promotion of the Bible cause. As you all know, this has been especially a week of meetings. There have been meetings almost every day for some benevolent or philanthropic purpose. They have been attended by large numbers, and been presided over in some instances by those who occupy the highest official positions in the land. I am sure that we cannot but be thankful to God that there is such a zeal for the promotion of all that is good, not only as regards the material welfare but the spiritual and moral improvement of those around us. At the same time I think that I may say, without fear of contradiction, that it is to the Book, which it is the chief aim and object of our Society to circulate all over the world, that we owe these very

meetings that are being held here now. It is the teachings of that Book, the example there given us of our Lord and Master who went about doing good to both the bodies and souls of men, that have infused the same spirit into Christian men and women here to do what they are now doing for the benefits both moral and spiritual of those among whom they dwell. If this be so, then I am sure you will agree with me that the Bible Society, whose sole object is to circulate this Book which has brought this light and power and furnished all these motives for doing good, which have proved such a blessing to our race, deserves our very best endeavors to support it to the utmost of our power. Again, I do not suppose that at any period the missionary spirit has been more active amongst all our churches than it is now; and I suppose that you will all agree with me that there is no truer sign of spiritual life than the active development of a missionary spirit among Christian bodies. But have you ever reflected how missionary work could be carried on without the aid of the Bible Society? and when I speak of the Bible Society of course I associate ourselves with our great parent, the British and Foreign Bible Society, because it is our great privilege to assist and to bear our share in the world-wide work of the Parent Society. Have you ever reflected how much we owe to the British and Foreign Bible Society in this very work of Missions? What would the Missionary do were it not for the translations of the Scriptures into almost all the languages and dialects of the world, which is the work that has been performed and is now being carried on to such a wonderful extent by the Parent Society? What could the missionary do without those translations of the Word of God by which he is enabled to carry its glad message to all parts of the world to those heathen nations to whom he may have gone to preach the Gospel, bearing in his hand the Word of God in a tongue which they all understand. For that reason we are bound, I think, to do all in our power to support and to help on the work of the Bible Society. Great as has been the missionary work in heathen countries, and there is hardly a part of the heathen world to which the sound of the Gospel has not been carried, yet we should not forget that there is another and most important work, colportage, which is being carried on by the Bible Society, not only in heathen countries but in the different countries of Europe where there are still thousands who do not possess a Bible and know nothing about its blessed teaching. They are out of reach altogether of ministers of the Gospel or missionaries; but the colporteur of the Bible Society, with his pack upon his back, goes through populous cities, visits remote villages, tramps over mountain and valley, and wherever he goes with his pack of books there he brings the sound of the gospel and that Holy Book itself within the reach of those whom he visits. A wonderful work has been carried on in that department. Take for example France and Italy. We all know that in both those countries the revulsion from superstition and oppression has sent the pendulum swinging in another direction, and now while the old religion has been given up, nothing has been taken in its stead, and there is either indifferentism or downright atheism. In both these countries the colporteurs and teachers of the Bible Society has Parent Soc so widely t they say, r sold here bear frui harvest." Italy. 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Society have been doing a wonderful work, and in the very last report of the Parent Society I observe that the effects of this distribution of the Word of God so widely throughout both France and Italy are beginning to be seen; and they say, referring more especially to France, "that these little Testaments sold here and there, purchased secretly in many cases, are beginning to bear fruit which will one day make the fields of France white for the harvest." In the same way a revulsion of feeling has taken place in Italy. They are beginning to feel what a wretched thing this materialism is-no hope for the future, nothing but this world; and they are beginning to feel that without God's Word they cannot hope to bring up their children in virtue and morality; so much so, indeed, that they are beginning to be anxious in many parts of Italy that their children should not only possess the Bible but should read it and be taught it, and that it should form part of their educational training also. I would to God that we in Canada were half as zealous for our children in our public schools to be trained in the same way. (Hear, hear.) I noticed in the last annual report that a great work has been done in the mighty empire of Russia, which I think will surprise many of us. There is no country in Europe where the Bible Society and its agents have received greater assistance or been more warmly welcomed than in many parts of Russia; and this last report states that out of every seven copies of the Scriptures circulated by the Society, one went to the subjects of the Russian Emperor. Now, when we reflect for a moment upon the part that that great empire may still be destined to bear in the history of the world, I think that we may rejoice that this Christianizing influence is being brought so largely to bear upon it through the instrumentality of the Bible Society. Of our own work here the report will give you a very full account; but what I desire and long to see is a warmer and heartier interest taken in the work of the Society generally, and I should hope on another anniversary for a larger attendance than we have this evening. Truly this is an association in which we can all join, no matter to what religious body we belong. It is for the dissemination of God's Word, the Word in which we all believe; and that is truly a work in which all Christian men who love their fellows and who desire to further the coming of that kingdom for which we pray every day, can join heartily and without grudging, and should endeavor to evince their interest in it upon all possible occasions, and so strengthen the hands of those who have to do with the management of the Society here and by their contributions and their prayers help on the glorious work of sending forth the glad tidings of salvation to every quarter of the globe. I shall not detain you further, because we have two gentlemen here to address you this evening who will occupy your time to much greater advantage and profit and pleasure and satisfaction than I could. (Applause.) Before calling upon the speakers there is a matter of business which the rules of the Society require to be taken up at the annual general meeting.

W. B. Geikie, Esq., M.D., then moved: That Clause No. 4 of the Laws and Regulations of the Upper Canada Bible Society be amended, by substituting the

word "three" instead of "five;" also that the word "city" be substituted for "country."

He said: As no change can be made without a month's notice, and the matter having been brought up before the Board and then before the general meeting, this resolution is now introduced. It is found that removing five clergymen and five laymen from the committee weakens us rather much, and we think that three would be better. We find also that an apology for absence from the city should be accepted rather than from the country, because it is just as impossible if a man is in Hamilton to attend the Bible Society Directors' meeting as if he were in Jericho, and the reason of it is perfectly plain,

The resolution was seconded by J. C. COPP, Esq., and carried.

THE PRESIDENT: I now have pleasure in calling upon His Worship Mayor Kennedy to move the first resolution.

MAYOR KENNEDY: The task handed me is a very easy one, and I can discharge it in a very short time. I move:

That the report as printed be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be officers and directors for the ensuing year (1895-6). See list.

C. R. COOPER, Esq. seconded the resolution, which was carried.

After singing the hymn, "Oh Word of God Incarnate,"

THE PRESIDENT said: I now have very great pleasure in calling upon one who needs no introduction to any of you, because his name and his person and his voice are so well known—that voice ever raised in support of all that is good. I have very great pleasure in calling upon the Honourable S. H. Blake, Esq., Q.C.

MR. S. H. BLAKE, who was received with applause, said: I think we owe a very considerable debt to our chairman, Senator Allan, for being busy in Ottawa from 10 to 11 this morning, and then taking a train and suffering all that is suffered on such a day as this, travelling up to our city to be present with us at the annual meeting of the Bible Society. (Hear, hear.) It is an honour, to my mind, to speak on the platform of the Bible Society. I am oldfashioned enough to love to take part in those assemblies where, from any matter of expediency, we need fear to open the meeting with the Word of God and with prayer. One feels safe in standing on such a platform. One eels doubt in standing on other platforms. Now, this evening, I am asked to speak upon the subject: "The work of the Bible Society indispensable to the Missionary Efforts of all Churches throughout the World." The first part of that is the work of the Bible Society, and therefore for a few minutes I desire to present to you somewhat of that work which has been outlined already by our chairman. Some one said: "The Bible Society is taken for granted; there is very little said about it. Why do not people from the platform tell us more about the Bible Society and what it does? We all look upon it simply as a place where you publish so many copies of the Bible, and from which they are sent for distribution." I take the hint that was given by my friend, and I ask you to suffer for a few minutes a short description of this Bible Society. Formed in the year 1804-just over 90 years in existence-it stood virtually the only and first Bible

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Society in the world. It is admitted on all hands to be the handmaid of every missionary effort in the world, because six-sevenths of all Bibles or portions of God's Word that are being used by missionary associations are derived from this Bible Society. The British and Foreign Bible Society occupies a grand position; first, because it was the original Bible Society of the world. Very soon on this continent-in the year 1816-the American Society was formed, one doing a noble and splendid work, a most lusty child of the British and Foreign Bible Society. There were formed also the National Society of Scotland, and the Hibernian Society of Ireland, and from the mother have gone out many children which are responsible, each in its position, for the distribution of God's Word. In 1886 Denmark became a Bible Society of itself; a little later Norway; and in the year 1894, Sweden. These are the later children of the British and Foreign Bible Society; and I am glad to find in the last report, as is usual, there has been a most kindly reference made to this Canadian auxiliary as being one of the great aids of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and one that has stood by it and aided much that Society in its work. Now, you say, is this Bible Society nothing more than a mere institution for having printed and ready for sale a vast number of Bibles? The thought of this Bible Society in 1804 was the old Pentecostal thought, that each one should hear in his own tongue the wonderful words of God. As I was thinking a couple of hours since of what I should speak of to you, there occurred to me the wonderful illustration that is given in the 19th Psalm; and I thought, well, at all events, there is no one who will not feel the force of that, that is the sun-" There is nothing hid from the rays thereof." Which of us could hide from the searching rays of the sun this day? And just as God said, "There is nothing hid from the heat thereof," so he says in the same way this Book is to enter into every place, and there it is to rule the conduct of the world, as the sun directs and rules the day. The wonderful illustration that is given, the wonderful thought that is presented, that which came to us at Pentecost, and that which slowly, how very slowly, has been carried out until the more recent years. We must consider that it was not until the year 1380 that we had from good John Wycliffe's hands the Bible in the English tongue. We must remember that it was not until the year 1520 that we had even the New Testament printed by the good hand of one who followed John Wycliffe in his good work; and we must remember that up to that time, slowly by the hand of the scribe, was written out one copy and then another of this wonderful Word of God. We had it in the Hebrew, we had it in the Greek, we had it in the Latin, we had it by the slow transcription of the scribe, until it came to the 15th century, and then even a long lapse until it was put into the heart of good men, with another outpouring of the Pentecostal Spirit, that more should be done, and this Word should cover the earth as the waters cover the sea; and so they set to work. And let me just ask you, have you thought what is covered by the first work of this Bible Society? Have you thought of the immense difficulties of persons entering into the land of Africa, into India, into China, sitting down endeavoring to master the language, and endeavoring to convey in words the marvellous thought of our

Have you thought of the immense work there is among the Indians of our Northwest, and of the days and weeks that have been necessary to endeavor to get some of these abstract thoughts of our Bible into such shape that the Indian can apprehend it-writing them, listening, revising, re-revising in many cases, you can see, actually forming the language in order to give them in their own tongue the Word of God? Are you aware that to-day there stand over one thousand people that are engaged in the work of revision and in the work of preparing in various parts of the world in these languages the Word of God? You know what a loss we had in Dr. Kellogg, whom we had for some years in our city, and the great knowledge he had of the Indian tongues; and he has gone there for the purpose of revising the edition of the Bible that is coming outspending years there, and bringing his acute knowledge, his intelligence and his grasp of the Bible to bear upon the work of giving to the people of India the Word of God in their own tongue. Do you know that in our own depository here we have for sale the Word of God in 30 languages? Do you know that in the agency in Turkey they have the Word of God in 40 different languages? Do you know that in Russia in the agency there they have it in 60 different languages, covering a portion of Russia? Are you surprised, therefore, when I tell you that this Bible Society has put into 320 different tongues and languages the Word of God; that with the aid of other Bible Societies we now have this Word in over 400 different tongues? Well, you say, had we not better stop? Have not we got to the end of this? Do you really think so? Do you know that in China we want 400 languages or dialects yet? Do you know that the calculation is that in Africa alone there are 600 different dialects into which that Bible is to be translated in order to give to the whole of those in the dark continent the word of God? Why, dear friends, we have only begun; and instead of having a body of a thousand we should have ten thousand people out into all parts of the land to acquire, to learn, to put into the shape of a language the Testament and finally the whole Word of God. It is immense what is yet left to be done in this way. But we have it in the 400 tongues; and you say, what does the Bible Society do with them? Why, lest you should think it is a mere place for selling the Word of God, I am glad to say, notwithstanding the financial depression, the income of the Society last year was over one million, one hundred thousand dollars, and of that about seven hundred thousand dollars went in free distribution of this Word; and that work was done by colporteurs in some 46 different lands, and done by a body of 429 Bible women; and the report is that last year these 429 Bible women read the Bible to 26,100 women. Now, will you not take more interest in this as being, not only what we have called it, a Bible Society, but a most magnificent missionary undertaking? Of these 429 Bible women that are engaged in this work, there are 303 of them in India alone invading the households, teaching the women there in their zenanas and otherwise making an entrance, opening the doors which up to that time had been closed and barred. So give your prayer and your thought on behalf of this glorious work. We might throw our "Trilbys" and other abominable trash into

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the grate if people would only take up the story of the mission work as it actually happens. (Hear, hear.) The lives of our Patons, and McKays, and Duffs, are ten thousand times more interesting and absorbing than any of this trash which is here to-day and gone to-morrow. (Hear, hear.) I should like that I had time to have dwelt somewhat on these instances, where the soul has been touched by God's Word brought home by His Holy Spirit, and where, years after, that life has been a changed life. I should like to have gone into those places where they had said, "You may as well give that Word of God to the cattle in the field as give it to those people;" and after some five or ten years of the pervading power of it, these people by thousands and tens of thousands clothed in their right mind and displaying the truth of that saying, "He hath made of one blood all nations," and that as there is a common disease there is a common cure, and it is found alone in God's Word applied by God's Spirit. (Hear, hear.) I should like if I had the time to go into that, but I only want you to bear with me for this remark, as it closes one of the reports of the colporteurs. These Books have been distributed by the million. Last year it reached very nearly four millions of copies. The chairman has referred to the work that is done here in the winter time amidst the shanties, untouched because untouchable by ministers, where the colporteur with the pack on his back enters in, and the little pack is the entering of the new life. And I think it is a very interesting fact for us to know that most of this work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the first work that it did-and which should give it a warm place in our hearts-in the shape of foreign work, was to publish for our Mohawk Indians a copy of the New Testament in their own tongue. You know that splendid tribe, true and loyal to the Queen, and that they will show you in the little Mohawk Church the little communion service that the Queen sent out, and amongst all that is honored the most honored gift is that of this Bible Society in 1804; then they gave in the Indian tongue, in the Mohawk dialect, this wonderful Word of God. Therefore, you see, there is not merely the translation, there is not merely the immense preceding work of putting it into shape—not as if we were translating a French book or a German book, but, as I say, in many cases completely making the language; and then there is distributing and selling and the work of revision. You know what work Henry Martyn did in Persia, but it is not until last year that they have revised the whole of that Persian Bible, and one of the greatest works of the Society has been to send out there a revised version of the Bible. This year the great task has been finished, of giving to millions of people in Afghanistan the Bible in their own tongue. The translation or revision of one hundred versions was in progress during the past year, as part of the work of the Bible Society. Perhaps you would ask me how many copies of the Bible it is supposed there have been issued in the world? There have been issued 250,000,000 by all the Bible Societies distributed throughout the world. You see how far short we fall of our duty in this, because we have at least 500,000,000 of inhabitants and of the 250,000,000, at least one-half have been distributed amongst those

dwelling among and being Protestants, so that there is only in the heathen lands, possibly, something in the neighborhood of 100,000,000 of copies, and we have about 130,000,000 or 140,000 000 yet to distribute. There has been a great increase in the distribution. In Japan there has been an increase from 39,000 to 114,000. The moment the note of war came, the Bible Society gave to every officer in the Japanese army a copy of the Word. They had great opportunities of distributing in the garrisons, in the hospitals, in the ships. In China the increase has been from 236,000 to 289,000; and in the Malaysian Archipelago it has run up to 75,000 from 36,000; so that there has been a great increase in the work in the past year. Now, having spoken for a little upon the work of the Bible Society, I want to say a word or two upon the second branch—that it is indispensable to the missionary work of all churches throughout the world. Why, one of the very first things that the missionary asks is that there should be the Word. The missionary can go and do a little work in the neighborhood, but if he can leave God's Word to carry the work on, then he may hope not only that it will be permanent, but in each case that it will be a seed which will grow and bear much fruit; and with what care do they distribute these? It is to get into each neighborhood some person that can read and some person that will read, and some person that will undertake when the missionary comes and does his work that he will keep that alive; and he gives them the only means whereby that can be done-a copy of this Book. As I say, six-sevenths of all that work done by these missionary societies is done in and through the Bible Society, that has prepared the Word in these various languages or tongues. Now, is not that true? I read what the Church Missionary Society says: "The work of the Bible Society is indispensable to the missionary efforts of all churches throughout the world." And the great Wesleyan Association says: "The cause of missions throughout the world is under inexpressible obligations to the British and Foreign Bible Society for its services in the past." As I said, there is no fairy tale that I could tell you that would be as pleasing as what is happening in and through the Word used in and through these societies. One person in writing about the benevolent work says: "I landed upon one of the Fiji islands, possibly the hardest place, humanly speaking, next to Patagonia, to do any work. This Word spread. This Word was drunken in. This Word formed Christ in the hearts of these people." The missionary left the Word. He was absent something over a year. They heard that he was coming back, and one of the ways of greeting him was by making a public holiday, and 4,000 children had prepared a little kindergarten display. It was called, "The Song of the Two Books," and the 4,000 children had come to the water, singing to meet the missionary, and the one book which they each had was a club, and they sang two verses talking about this club and about the blood-shed, and about the fighting and about the misery and the wretchedness, and all that was going on in that island; and then they dropped book number one, and each child took up the New Testament as book number two, and they began to sing of the peace, joy, happiness and grace that came from the using of this Book.

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That was their little kindergarten display-one book a club, and that thrown away and replaced by God's Word. (Applause.) Why, it would rejoice anyone's heart to read a letter from the colored elders of the church at Uganda: "Although we are black, we thank you much for the present you have sent us. It is of very much more use to us than a very great deal of gold." I was delighted to see that Ethiopia was stretching out her hands, for the Emperor of Abyssinia and his Queen, to whom was sent a very beautiful Bible, received it with grateful thanks, and sent a handsome present of elephant's tusks to the Society as their return for what had been done; and it is stated that these Bibles are packed up and carefully carried by them wherever they may go. Is it not astonishing to find that that black land of Madagascar has got her own Bible Society? Does not that sound like a miracle? Only the other day such a land, and now we have the Madagascar Bible Society. I tell you, dear friends, unless we are truer to our Bible here these places will leave us in the lurch. (Hear, hear.) They are beginning to love it, while we seem to be cold. Poor, dear C. H. Spurgeon said, "I can write damnation on the dust of the unread Bibles of the people of England." Warm in their affections and in their love, and giving subscriptions to this that would shame the citizens of the city of Toronto. (Applause.) I say, therefore, that it is indispensable, that it is something without which the work cannot be carried on; and when you give your subscription to the Bible Society it is not only as a Bible Society that sells you or others a Bible, but as the grand handmaid of every missionary enterprise that we have. Walk up and down our hospitals, walk up and down our jails, go to the Young Men's Christian Associations, and find there that the gift of the good Bible Society is found wherever you turn. Wherever there is good work done, there you find the mark of this Society. Now, only a word or two more, and that is just to take another view of the Bible, because, although it is a good thing to get the microscope-and I like that when a man uses it honestly-I have no stock in the carping criticism of to-day. If you were to offer me all the wealth of the world I could not give up my oldfashioned thought that this is God's Word from Genesis to Revelation. (Hear, hear, and applause.) I believed in that Word with the first thought that I had, and God knows that He will keep me true to it-(hear, hear)-every word of it. I remember, dear, good W. J. Erdman saying, "Yes, I believe not only in the Book, and not only in the chapter, and not only in the verses, not only in the words, but I believe in the letter; I believe that God said, 'He is like a tree planted by the waters;' I believe He has put that 's' there so that as one river of water dries up, God's people may have other rivers to keep them fresh and to water them with;" and I gladly take my place as a humble disciple of that splendid Bible student, W. J. Erdman, and I believe in every letter of that Word having been inspired by God. My dear friends, if you are going to follow higher criticism, take nothing but the highest criticism-take nothing lower than the criticism of Jesus Christ. You stand true when you stand on the platform with

Him; you stand in a place of uncertainty when you stand without Him; and i there is one thing above another that makes me feel absolutely certain about this. it is that He that is The Great Teacher of the world, when He was giving to His people that which was to be their guide, gave the Bible unqualified. He gave the Bible as a whole; He gave the Bible without a warning as to any part; He gave us Joshua and He gave us Jonah, and He gave us Deuteronomy; He gave us every part of it; and all those parts that that superficial criticism of those who do not want to know what is in the Bible, but who desire to be thought very wise by taking out those parts that they especially attack, are the very parts that the Lord Jesus Christ especially laid stress upon, and especially gave us splendid lessons from. (Hear, hear.) I say, therefore, take, if you please, the higher criticism, but let it be the higher criticism of Him that is the Teacher of the world, and would have been false to Himself if He had given us implicitly the whole of that Bible if there was part of it that was not to be received. It is indeed the impregnable rock; and I want to read a few lines that a friend sent to me from England, because when these very shallow critics are talking here, it is well to see what a master mind says upon this subject. It is no less than Professor Huxley. He thought it would be pleasing to know what he says. Listen to it: "Greatly to the surprise of many of my friends, I have always advocated the reading of the Bible and the diffusion and study of that most remarkable collection of books amongst the people. Its teachings are infinitely superior to those of the sects who are busy now, as the Pharisees were eighteen hundred years ago, in smothering them under the precepts of men. It is so certain in my mind that the Bible contains within itself the refutation of nine-tenths of the sophistical metaphysics and old-world superstition which has been piled up around it by the so-called Christians of later times, -- it is so clear that the only immediate and ready antidote to the poison which has been mixed with Christianity to the intoxication and delusion of mankind, lies in copious draughts from the undefiled spring,-that I exercise the right and duty of free judgment on the part of every man, mainly for the purpose of inducing every layman to follow my example. If the New Testament is translated into Zulu by the Protestant missionaries, it must be assumed that the Zulu convert is competent to draw from its contents all the truth which it is necessary for him to believe. I trust that I may, without immodesty, claim to be put on the same footing as the Zulu." (Applause ) Then just a word more. Possibly one of the most remarkable developments of this age is that God has been locking under his buried cities that which proves irrefutably the truth of our Bible and dispels nine-tenths of what is said; and as good Hugh Miller said: "These men meet and they have their conference, and they have their talk, and they prove that the Bible is all wrong, and that their theories of to-day are all right, and as they go home they cross a field, and one picks up a little bit of a stone or a shell which dispels all their theories and shows that the old Book after all is right." And so it is. And God has taken Moabite stones, and God has taken Sir Henry Rawlinson and Mr. Layard and Mr. Sayce, to prove exactly that whether it is to the

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Hittites or to the Moabites, or as to whether there were two kings in Babylon, or anything else, all these men are utterly wrong and the Bible is absolutely right. How good it was of God to bury all this away in safety until these attacks are made, and then to open and to display to the face of all the world, kept by his power and by his forethought that which has proved to demonstration that our Bible is what we claim it to be. (Applause.) Then, lastly, I would say, see the lands. Where is there anything of good that is in the land which is not of the Bible? Go up and down the nations of the earthand our Roman Catholic friends will find they are making a great mistake in not letting this Bible be open to the whole people. In France a century ago over a million died as a result of casting out God's Word and endeavoring to blot out His teachings, Go up and down in that land of anarchy, and then go to our land and Great Britain and to her dependencies, and then walk up and down the United States of America; take those two great nations which, God knows, are not doing their work, and yet are in the foremost front of it; and take all the world, whether heathen or infidel, or what you like, where is there anything that can be compared with those two great English-speaking nations for honor, for truth, for probity, for kindness, for love, for mercy, for all those, qualities that flow from the Cross and the law of Jesus Christ? For all those, these nations stand as one and all these others are as nothing compared. I am not surprised to read that as a Frenchman took a little copy of the Testament, he said to one of these colporteurs, " My friend, there is naught that will save my brave countrymen but this little book." Shan't we stand true to it? Shan't we love it more? Shan't we study it better? Shan't we love it more truly? Shan't we, having felt all the good that comes from it, also desire to spread it broadcast? Shan't we let it be as the rivers of salvation from one end of the world to the other? I say, friends, let us take a greater interest than we have ever done before. Let us pray for it. Let us be true to it. Let us speak about it; and as Jesus said, "Go into all the world" -and the best means of going is bringing His Word wherever that Word can be brought. Let us see that we do all that in us lies thus to prepare the vineyard of our Lord for the second coming of His dear Son. (Applause.)

The choir sang an anthem, during which the collection was taken up.

THE PRESIDENT then called upon Rev. Dr. Thomas to speak on "What the Bible Society has done and what it is doing."

REV. Dr. THOMAS: My dear friends:—I want to go down to the grave with the reputation of having a little modicum of wisdom. We have had a grand meeting to-night, although it has not been as large as I would have liked to have seen it. There are reasons for that. I don't know that the reasons altogether justify the absence of a great many. These influences cannot be controlled. I don't believe I have listened to addresses in a Bible Society meeting that were more full of information, that ought to enlarge our sympathy and intensify our zeal in this good work. I conscientiously believe that for me to attempt, at twenty-five minutes to ten, a formal address on any branch of this


subject would tend to destroy the excellent feeling that must have been produced by what you have already listened to. And then if you look at the resolution, it is a hard thing to follow a lawyer. The next time I speak in a Bible Society or any other meeting with Mr. Blake, I am going to speak first. (Laughter.) I find that the subject that I was to speak upon to-night has been most thoroughly treated-absolutely exhausted, as Mr. Blake exhausts everything he touches-(laughter and applause); and, with all these reasons before me, I am convinced that under the conditions in which we are met to night-such a warm eveningthat anything after this would be ineffective and not calculated to promote the interest of this Society. I am profoundly in sympathy with all that I have listened to to-night. I am profoundly in sympathy with the utterances of Mr. Blake in regard to that Book. I believe that it is the Book of God, that it is the Word of God; not that it contains it, but that it is the Word of God; and that the world needs it, and that it was God's purpose that this Book should be communicated and circulated to the uttermost ends of the earth. I do not see how the great commission could have been fulfilled in any other way. We cannot be in sympathy with the great heart that yearns for humanity, and that has given us that Book, without being in sympathy with the operations of this Society. May God grant that our enlarged conceptions this evening may have an influence on our relations to the work in which we are engaged, and in which I trust we are all personally interested. (Applause.)

REV. A. B. CHAMBERS moved the following resolution:—That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the Rev. Dr. Parsons and trustees of Knox Church, for the use of the building on this present occasion; also to the organist and choir for their valuable services.

J. G. Scott, Esq., Q.C., seconded the resolution, which was carried amid applause.

The meeting closed by singing the doxology, followed by benediction pronounced by Rev. Dr. Caven.
