ELECTION DATE LIKELY SET THIS WEEK

KING TO SEEK RE-ELECTION IN WESTERN SEAT

Meighen Cabinet Forecast Includes Many Former Ministers

MATERIAL PLENTY

Halifax Member Seems Certain Selection for Portfolio of Marine and Fisheries

OTTAWA, July 8.—Announcement of the election date and possibly the names of the members of the new cabinet, is expected by the week-end. The Premier, it is understood, has decided on the men to assume nearly all if not all the portfolios. There is no dearth of material, although the Quebec representation is a matter requiring some careful consideration. Senator Lesperance and Hon. E. L. Patenaude are mentioned as the two most likely selections from Quebec. In the meantime, cabinet meetings are being held daily. Routine business is being transacted, but no important vacancies are being filled or new appointments made.

BITTER CAMPAIGN AHEAD

When the cabinet slate is published and the new ministers sworn in, the majority of them will leave for their constituencies to prepare for an election campaign which promises to be bitter. Mr. Meighen opens his campaign in Ottawa on the 10th of this month.

FORMER MINISTERS

Mr. Meighen's new cabinet will include a number of his former ministers. It seems probable that Sir Henry Drayton will again be Minister of Finance, though the name of Hume Cronin is mentioned as a possibility. Hon. H. E. Stevens may become Minister of Customs; Hon. R. B. Bennett, Minister of Justice; Hon. S. F. Tolson, Minister of Agriculture; Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Defence; and Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and Health.

MUCH SPECULATION

The labor portfolio will likely go to Hon. G. D. Robertson, who formerly administered that department. Hon. W. A. Black is said to be the choice for Minister of Marine. Interest centres round the other portfolios. It is suggested that J. D. Chaplin, member for Lincoln, may get the Trade and Commerce post, and that E. B. Ryckman, of Toronto, may become Solicitor-General. If Sir Henry Drayton should not become Finance Minister, he would take the Railways and Canals, but if he resumes his old portfolio, G. B. Nicholson, of Algoma, may take over this department. George B. Jones, M. P. for Royal, N. B., is also mentioned as a cabinet possibility. It is suggested that the Department of Public Works and the Post Office department may go to Quebec province representative. Immigration is uncertain. The name of Hon. Robert Rogers is mentioned as a possibility for cabinet appointment.

HON. ROBERT MURRAY DEAD AT CHATHAM

Former Provincial Secretary Succumbs During Sleep; Was Active in Militia

Special to The Times-Star. CHATHAM, N. B., July 8.—Hon. Robert Murray, K. C., was found dead in bed at his home here this morning. The late Mr. Murray had been suffering with heart disease, having a severe attack last March. He had been in Chatham 78 years ago, a son of the late Robert Murray. He studied law in the office of the late Andrew H. Johnston, was admitted to the bar in 1883, and since that time he practiced his profession in Chatham. He was prominent in politics, being a member of the Foster Government from 1917-20. He held the office of Provincial Secretary in the militia, the deceased was also very active. After 28 years' service with the 78th Northumberland Regiment, he was awarded the long service medal and retired with the rank of major.

THE Council of the Board of Trade, in session this morning, endorsed the proposition of the Retail Merchants' Association, that three months be allowed for the payment of taxes, and offered to send a delegation to take up the matter with the Common Council. They also unanimously passed a resolution condemning the present steamer service between Canada and the West Indies, and calling on the Canadian Government to implement its undertaking to improve the service between the two places. The meeting was presided over by L. W. Simms, president of the Board.

A communication from the Saint John branch of the Retail Merchants' Association, asking the co-operation of the board in an effort to have the city adopt the policy of allowing tax payments in three monthly instalments, instead of being allowed at the rate of five per cent. on the first payment, four per cent. on the second and three per cent. on the third payment and interest to be charged on all amounts due after three months, was considered by the council.

The members were sympathetic and endorsed the resolution sent in by the Retail Merchants and expressed their willingness to send a delegation to city hall to talk the matter over with the Common Council.

WEST INDIES MATTER

The West Indies committee reported having looked into the matter of steamer service between Canada and the West Indies and presented the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted: Whereas the withdrawal by the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company of two steamers heretofore in service between Saint John and Halifax and the West India Islands of the Canadian Government of two Merchant Marine steamers for the Royal Mail steamers which have been withdrawn is not sufficient compensation, since these steamers provide no suitable mail and passenger service and provide only a monthly freight service to the smaller ports.

WHEREAS the Canadian Government has obligated itself to provide improved steamship services between Canada and the West Indies and the delay in taking action to that effect is resulting in dissatisfaction and unfavorable criticism in Canada, in the West Indies and elsewhere.

PLEA FOR TRAINING OF MORE FARMERS

Canadian Officials in London Would Divert Some of Workless Dole

LONDON, July 8.—Strong pressure is being brought to bear upon the government here by Canadian residents of fields to divert some of the money now being spent on doles towards extending the scheme for training young men at farms in the eastern counties of England as future settlers in Canada. So far the scheme has been an undoubted success and when President Beatty of the Canadian Pacific Railway visited one of the farms he was much impressed by what he saw, and told those in charge that he endorsed it strongly and was of the opinion that it should receive the support of everyone.

AMERY FAVORS IT

The attitude of the government so far has been to proceed slowly, but it is understood that Col. Amery favors the scheme and would like to see support forthcoming from the Canadian Government. Hitherto the British authorities have borne the entire cost. During his trip through Canada, Lord Clarendon will take up the question of enlarging the scheme and will personally visit some of those who have come out under the plan to see how the scheme is working.

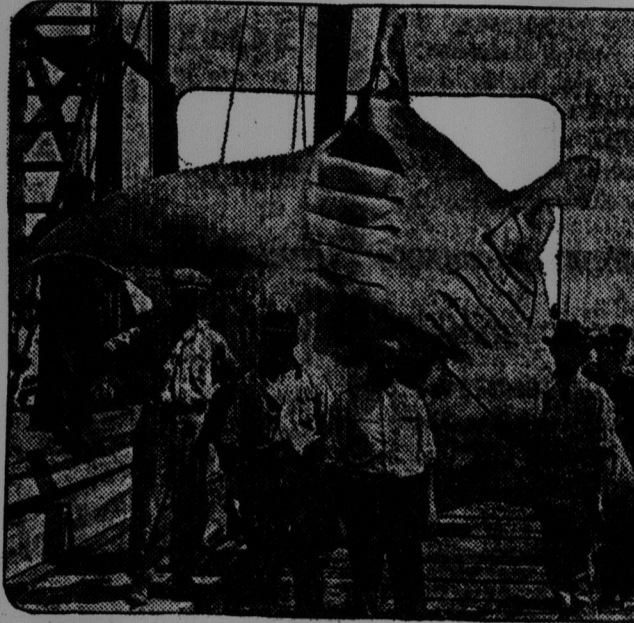

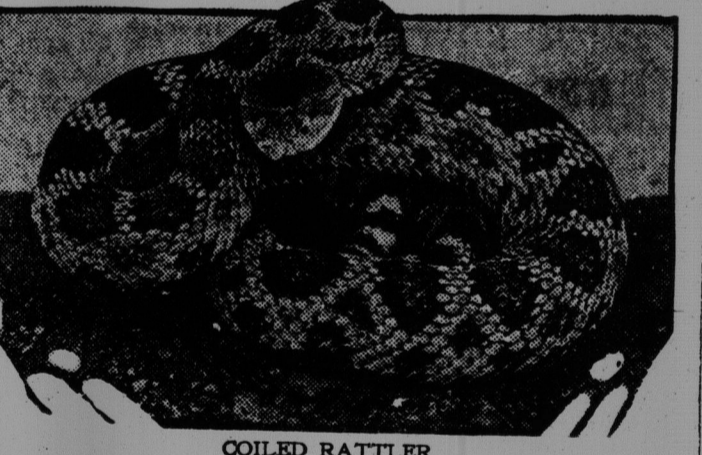

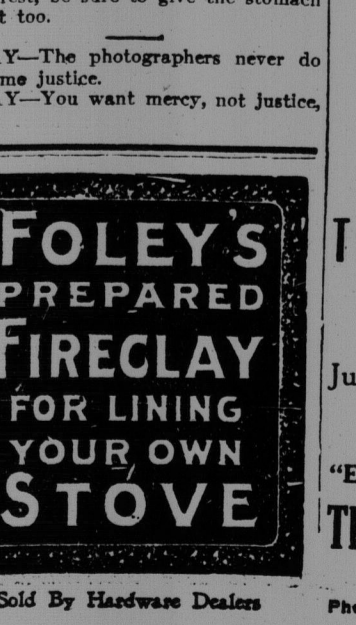

PROGRESSIVES AND LIBERALS DEBATE PACT IN MANITOBA

Arrangement Sought to Avoid Triangular Contests in Campaign

WINNIPEG, Man., July 7.—The Manitoba Free Press evening bulletin carries the following news page story today: Tentative suggestions regarding a possible Liberal-Progressive arrangement throughout the province of Manitoba to avoid three-cornered contests at the forthcoming federal election were the subject of discussion between Robert Forke, late leader of the Progressive Party at Ottawa, and F. C. Hamilton, President of the Manitoba Liberal Association, Tuesday night, it became known today.

"While neither principal would comment on the nature of the proposals mooted at the meeting, it developed this morning that two lines of attack were suggested. Under the first the Liberals waive the right to contest any seat won by a Progressive at the last election; the Progressives in turn waive claims to contest certain seats which returned Conservatives last October. It is understood that Liberal claims were made to oppose Premier Meighen in Portage La Prairie.

"No definite agreement was entered into, it was stated, authoritatively but proposals set forth were discussed with a view to possible action and agreement at a later date."

FIVE LARGE PARCELS SENT TO ESTHONIA

Red Cross Juniors Make Timely Gift to Less Fortunate

For the orphan children in Esthonia, who have no pretty pictures and only two or three toys, the New Brunswick Red Cross Juniors are sending a bountiful supply of toys, scrap books and pictures, and these were packed yesterday in five large parcels.

In her recent European tour Miss Jean E. Brown, director of Junior Red Cross in Canada, visited the Junior Red Cross children in Esthonia, and found there some orphan children whose lack of pretty pictures of all kinds was really pitiable.

The five large parcels that were sent off yesterday contained 66 scrap books, 4 card board toys, six wooden toys and ten large pictures. They will go to Toronto and be forwarded as part of a larger consignment representative of the Juniors of the Dominion.

\$3,000,000 IS VOTED TO BUY ALIEN COAL

Labor Opposition Fails, 245-16, and Lively Scenes Mark British House

LONDON, July 7.—Lively scenes were enacted in the House of Commons today during consideration of the vote on an application of £3,000,000 to pay coal bills abroad for fuel purchased by the government since the miners' dispute began.

BRAZIL IS FACING INDUSTRIAL CRISIS

Deflation of Currency Compels Merchants to Unload Goods at Loss

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 8.—Brazil is faced with an industrial crisis wrought about by the increasing value of its money, due largely to the government's policy of deflation by withdrawing a large amount of paper from circulation. Many wholesalers and retailers have large stocks of manufactured goods on hand which were sight orders before the miltreis had reached its present value.

Some of them are compelled to unload their goods for fewer miltreis than they paid for them. Bankers say they would be apprehensive if the miltreis continued to rise in value, as commodity sales are down off 80 per cent. in the last few months.

President Bernardes, in an effort to increase confidence, has announced that government will not force the miltreis to the pre-war rate.

SARAH GETS A \$5,000 BLANKET

PRESBYTERIAL AT WOODSTOCK OPENS IN 37TH ANNUAL

60 Delegates of Presbyterian Church in Canada Talk Missions

WOODSTOCK, July 7.—The 37th annual meeting of the Saint John Presbyterian of the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, opened here this morning in St. Paul's church, with 60 delegates, representing all sections of the province, in attendance. The President, Mrs. W. Clark Elliott, of Sussex, N.B., presided at the opening session.

Welcome to the visiting delegates was extended by Mrs. H. V. Dalling of the local society, to which a reply was made by Mrs. George Wilson of Moncton.

The forenoon session was largely devoted to the appointment of committees and to the rendering of reports from the county vice-presidents. The closing feature of the session was an address by Miss Ethel Shaw, of Saint John, dealing with the Presbyterian Church as a missionary church.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK. The afternoon session, given over to young people's work, was presided over by Miss Helen Pringle, Woodstock, and confined its deliberations to the activities of mission bands and C. G. I. T. group work in which Miss Carrie Belle of Saint John, Miss Irene Hollis of St. Andrews and Miss Laura Shaw of Woodstock, assumed leadership.

FOREIGN MISSIONS. In the evening, with the local Presbyterian pastor presiding and leading in the devotional services held, addresses were given by Rev. F. G. Mackintosh and Mr. Seaman, of China; the former speaking on home missions, while the latter dealt with foreign missions.

The Presbyterial will close tomorrow when two sessions will be held.

ELECTION TO GIVE CANADA STABILITY

King's Criticism of Lord Byng Not in Good Taste, Says Australian Paper

MELBOURNE, Aus., July 7.—Commenting on the controversy regarding dissolution of the Canadian parliament, "The Australasian," a weekly review, says that clearly a general election is the only possible means of securing political stability in Canada.

Whether the general election will result in any appreciable change in the state of the parties remains to be seen, but the split in the Progressive party should ease the situation, the Australasian continues.

"It. Hon. Mackenzie King's criticism of Lord Byng," the paper goes on, "is not in good taste. Lord Byng was entitled to exhaust the possibilities of the House of Commons, after which he was justified in opening the way for an appeal to the electorate."

The Melbourne Daily Telegraph declares that Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King's failure was not surprising, since his government was "riding for a fall."

Ship Fish Eggs From Canada To Japanese

OTTAWA, July 7.—The fish of Canada are so highly regarded that efforts are frequently made to establish them in foreign countries, and, to assist in such endeavors, limited numbers of eggs of several species have recently been supplied by the Fish Cultural Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

Since the beginning of the present year speckled trout eggs have been shipped from Vancouver to the Tokyo Angling and Country Club, Tokyo, Japan, and seabago, or landlocked salmon eggs have been shipped from Saint John, New Brunswick, to Dublin, Ireland. Arrangements have also been made to ship cutthroat rainbow and Kamloops trout eggs from British Columbia to Japan during the coming spring.

"It came back from the elections last October discredited and bedraggled," the Telegraph says. "Mr. King was able to remain in office only by bargaining for Progressive support."

Lapointe Denies Gift For Party Services

OTTAWA, July 7.—"I have never heard of it and I authorize you to state that if it were true I would ask my friends not to do it," said Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, today in regard to a report that he is to be the recipient of a fund as a recognition of his services to the Liberal party.

Inspector Seizes Liquor In Madawaska

EDMUNDSTON, July 7.—Two liquor seizures were made in this vicinity this afternoon and evening by Chief Inspector MacFarlane, accompanied by E. Saunders, of Fredericton, and E. C. Morgan, of Hartland, local inspectors. The three inspectors were on an investigation trip and located alcohol and Quebec beer in the possession of Edward Savage at Comers, and on the premises of Frank Moran at St. Claire. Information is to be laid against the two men here tomorrow.

YORK CO. COUNCIL INSPECT THE U. N. B.

Chancellor Jones and Committee Show Members About the Property

FREDERICTON, July 7.—This afternoon the municipal council of York county, after a brief session, visited the University of New Brunswick and inspected the buildings and equipment. The councillors displayed particular interest in the memorial hall and the engineering building. Prof. John Stephens demonstrated many pieces of apparatus for the visitors including the hydraulic laboratory. Chancellor Dr. C. C. Jones, J. J. F. Winslow, K.C., and C. McN. Steeves of the endorsement fund committee, accompanied the delegation as guides.

U.S. SHIPPING BODY WILL SELL 2 LINES

Among Vessels is Leviathan and Two Other Ex-German Steamers

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Preliminary steps were today taken by the shipping board toward the sale to private interests of the two largest government-owned steamship lines, the United States Lines and the American Merchant Line, both operating out of New York on trans-Atlantic routes.

The board directed its ship sale committee to prepare recommendations and the sale advertisement covering the proposals for the sale of both lines. The United States Lines operates, among other ships, the giant Leviathan, with a gross tonnage of 59,956, as well as two other former German liners, the George Washington and the Republic. It also has the American-built steamer President Harding and President Roosevelt of about 14,000 tons gross.

The American Merchant Line includes 11 ships of approximately 8,000 tons each, among them five war-time steam transports.

PART OF C. P. TRAIN SWEEPED FROM RAILS

FLOOD LOSS CAUSED NEAR REVELSTOKE

Trouble Arises From Two Snowslides Striking Tracks

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 7.—Carrying hundreds of bundles weighing two and three tons each, a veritable river of water, mud and big timbers is pouring across the Canadian Pacific tracks near Lauretta, about 16 miles east of Revelstoke, B. C.

An engine and four cars of a work train were swept from the tracks to the banks of the Illicilwaet River, while another car is missing and is believed to have been buried under the avalanche. It is believed no one was in the car.

According to reports there were two distinct snow slides, the first striking the railway tracks at 11 o'clock last night and the second early this morning.

Thousands of tons of wet snow moved down the mountain side with a reverberating roar, covering the tracks with six or eight feet of water for a distance of about 700 feet. A portion of the track was washed out, necessitating the re-routing of trains. Telegraphic communication was temporarily discontinued.

Crews have been rushed to the scene to clear the debris from the track. The intense heat of the recent days, together with heavy rainfall, is believed to have been responsible for the slides.

Two Former Ministers To Stand In Election

TORONTO, July 7.—Two former Liberal cabinet ministers from Ontario who were defeated in October, 1925, will be in the running at the approaching federal election. It was stated today, Hon. George N. Gordon, former deputy speaker of the House, and minister of immigration will contest Peterboro, while Hon. Thomas A. Low, former minister of trade and commerce, will contest Renfrew.

Why Sheik and Vamp Home-Wreckers are Only Fifty Per Cent Guilty—Why Indulged Sons are Seldom Worthy of Their Self-Made Fathers—The Difference Between Old Maid and Bachelor Girl.

DEAR MISS DIX—Is there a man-made law to punish "the woman in the case"? We know there is a God-made law that will surely be enforced hereafter, but why can a woman with the subtlety of a serpent and the alertness of youth step in and take the husband from the wife, the father from his little children, the son from his mother, rob the man of his honor and his respectability, and go unpunished?

If there is such a law, why is it never enforced? If there is no such law, why is there not? Why let the woman go free to do over again and again her hellish deeds? Why legislate against a man of his honor and his respectability, and let the most damnable of all go unpunished? T. D. N.

ANSWER: We have a law that permits the aggrieved husband or wife to use the home-wrecker, and demand a monetary consideration for the alienation of the affections of the errant spouse.

You can hardly pick up a paper in which you do not read of some man who is demanding forty or fifty or a hundred thousand dollars as the price of his wife's love, which some other man has stolen away from him, or of some woman who is not suing some other woman for having perjured her husband's affections from her.

It is a grotesque and sordid thing to assess the damage done in breaking up a home in dollars and cents; to try to heal a hurt with a poultice of greenbacks. But so far it seems to be the only method we have been able to devise for punishing those who commit the most dastardly and the most terrible of all crimes.

For the sheik and the vamp are worse than thieves and murderers. Those who rob a woman of her husband and little children of their father have taken from them something infinitely more valuable than gold or jewels. Those who slay a woman's faith and love have done something far worse to her than if they had killed her body.

But there never can be any man-made law that can deal adequately with such criminals, because home-wrecking is always an inside job. The love thief has an accomplice. There is always the husband or wife who was accessory before the crime. They, at least, opened the window and left the door unlocked.

To save his face, every man whose wife is unfaithful to him pretends that he was the helpless victim of some man who captured her and bore her shrieking away from him. Every woman saves her vanity by trying to believe that her husband is the helpless victim of some street whip, by some black magic, or some other means, and that she is the innocent victim of his seduction and that she is the one who is to blame.

But this is never true. The really virtuous woman who loves her husband is as safe from Lotharios as if she were locked up in a steel vault. Every wife who goes astray meets the seducer at least half way, and the fault is no more his than hers.

So also with men. The world is full of adventures seeking for their prey married men with fat pocketbooks; but no man need be captured by one of these pirates unless he desires to.

No man need surrender to them if he is willing to flee from danger or put up a fight against them.

Undoubtedly the woman who uses her youth and beauty to win a man away from his wife and children and who ruthlessly breaks up his home in order to gratify her own desire for what he can give her deserves to be punished. But so does the poor, weak, miserable creature who lets himself be flattered and coaxed into forgetting the vows he made at the altar.

He who turns traitor to his own flesh and blood commits a sin greater than that of the woman, because he had his obligations to his wife and children, and she had none. DOROTHY DIX.

DEAR MISS DIX—What do you think of a man who, when he was a young boy, was very poor and who had to work hard to climb up the ladder to the height he now occupies, but who indulges his own boys in everything they want and who encourages them in idleness? What effect will this have on the children? F. E. L.

ANSWER: It is, perhaps, natural that parents who have had hard lives themselves should wish their children to have everything soft and easy and that those whose youth knew bitter poverty should be overindulgent to their children. But the result is disastrous.

It gives us the "second generation" who are wastrels and spendthrifts, who throw away the money that their hard-working parents have earned, who seem to be without either stamina or morals and who make true the old proverb: that in America it is only three generations from shirt-sleeves to shirt-sleeves.

These fathers and mothers who are so overindulgent to their children forget that, try as they may, they cannot substitute life for their children; that their boys and girls must meet the same sorrows, the same disappointments that every one else does; that they must make the same struggle that others make, and that, if they have not been disciplined at home, if they have not acquired grit and courage, they will go down when they come to grips with existence.

You seldom see a self-made man's son who is worthy of his father or who can fill his father's shoes when the "old man" dies. The reason of this is because his father made things too soft and easy for him. He did not have to struggle as father did. He did not learn self-reliance. He did not have courage and the fighting instinct bred in him, so he failed when the test came.

We do not train prize-fighters by having them roll on silken cushions. DOROTHY DIX.

MY DEAR MISS DIX—What is the difference between a bachelor girl and an old maid? MAE MURRAY.

The term "old maid" is obsolete. It is used now only by ignorant or provincial people. It was formerly used as a term of reproach to designate a woman who lacked attractiveness to men and who, in spite of the most strenuous endeavors, failed to catch a husband.

The women to whom this epithet was applied resented it so much that many of them married men who were absolutely repulsive to them in order to escape it.

The bachelor girl is a woman who has passed forty years of age and who, for reasons of her own, has elected to remain unmarried.

It indicates that the woman so designated had good common sense, courage and a love for freedom and instead of being a term of opprobrium it is one of admiration and honor.

The old maid was pitied by other women. The bachelor girl is generally envied by her sex. The old maid was a woman who couldn't get married. The bachelor girl is one who wouldn't. DOROTHY DIX.

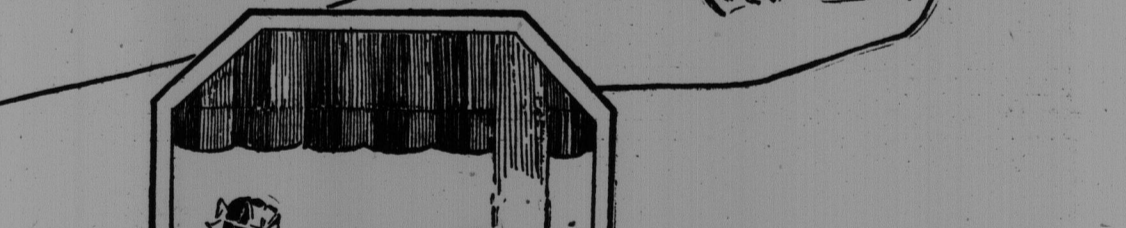

Mishap in 3 Days**

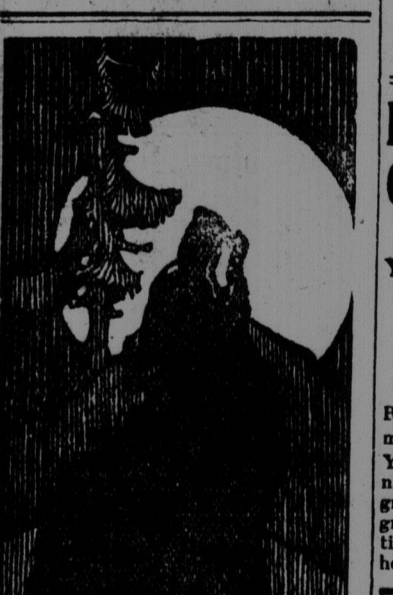

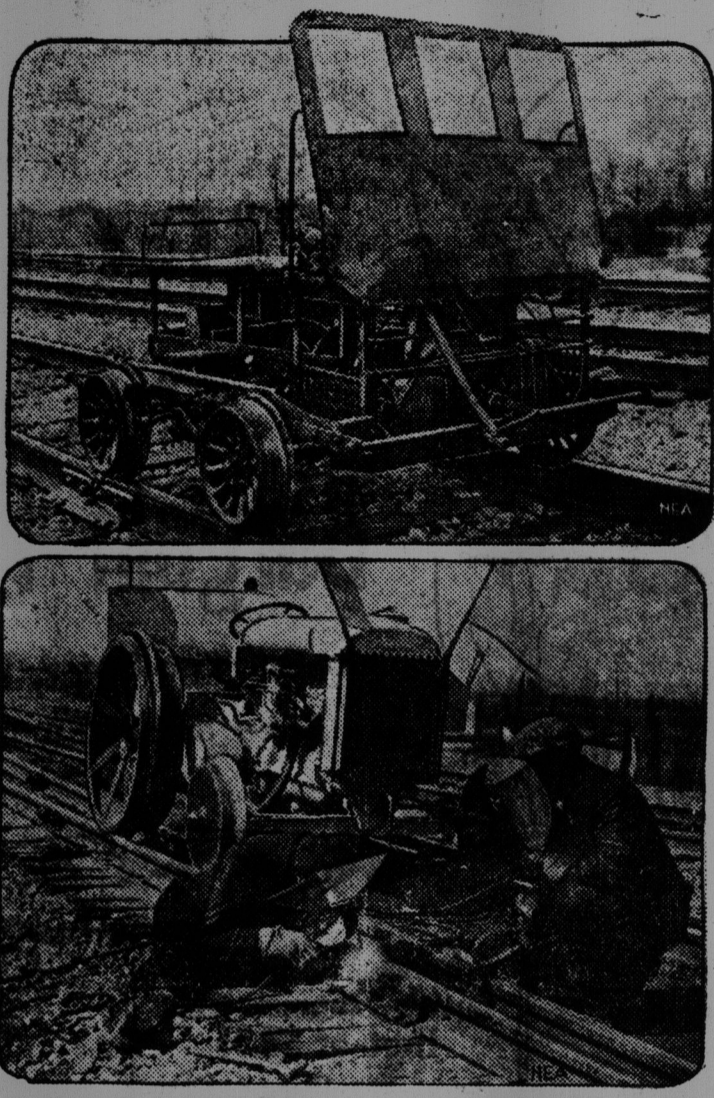

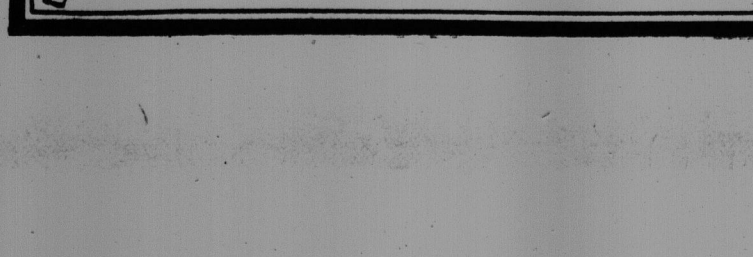

**CONCRETE DAM
WILL BE BUILT
AT MUSQUASH**

New Structure, Costing \$30,000, to Replace Wooden Loch Alva Structure

REPLACEMENT of the present wooden dam at Loch Alva at the Musquash hydro-electric development by a concrete dam, estimated to cost between \$30,000 and \$35,000, has been decided on by the Provincial Government. Premier John B. M. Baxter announced here last evening.

The recommendation for this reconstruction work came from the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, whose members recently made a tour of inspection of the Musquash plant. The commission report, Premier Baxter said, and at one time the main surface water mains and the power plant were in danger. Through prompt action, temporary repairs were made. If left unrepaid, however, it would be certain to produce damaging results. It was therefore the unanimous decision of the commission to erect a new concrete dam.

HIT BY AUTOMOBILE

**James Watson is Injured by Car
Driven by John Sutherland**

A runaway car, No. 8129, owned and driven by John Sutherland, of 55 Pitt street, struck and slightly injured James Watson in North Market street, near Charlotte street, at 2.15 o'clock yesterday afternoon and ran onto the sidewalk alongside the Market building, narrowly missing a second man. Just as Sutherland turned from Charlotte street into North Market street Watson, who is about 67 years of age, stepped from the sidewalk on the northern side of North Market street and was struck before the car could be halted. Watson was stunned and was assisted by Paul Quinn, local barrister, Police Sergeant McLeese and others. The injured man was driven to the General Public Hospital in Mr. Quinn's car. SIR R. BORDEN OFFERED A CABINET POST

Nova Scotia Seat in Senate Proposed; Sought by Meighen as Adviser

MONTREAL, July 7.—Le Devoir, organ of Henri Bourassa, former M. P. for Labelle, this evening gives prominence to the following in part: "According to what can be learned today one of the bombs which the Conservatives are preparing to launch is the re-entry of Sir Robert Borden, former Prime Minister of Canada from 1911 to 1919, into active politics in order to assist Mr. Meighen with his counsel and direction during the forthcoming election campaign. It is recalled that Sir Robert Borden, following the war, quit politics and yielded his place to Mr. Meighen, who took over the direction of the Conservative cabinet, which was re-cast and defeated in the elections at the end of 1921.

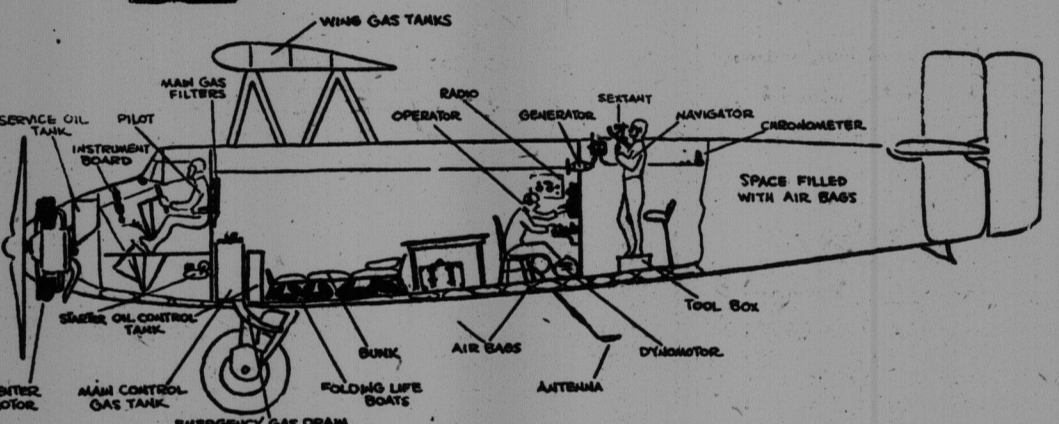
Mr. Meighen within the past few weeks has hastened to secure Sir Robert Borden's advice; the latter received him cordially and inspired certain of his decisions.

SENATE MENTIONED. "It has been said that Mr. Meighen will nominate Sir Robert Borden to the Senate, to represent one of the constituencies of Nova Scotia; and it has even been added that the former prime minister will become Conservative leader in the Senate, thus taking the place of Senator Robertson, former Conservative minister of Labor in the Meighen cabinet prior to the 1921 elections."

Le Devoir reviews Sir Robert's activities during the past six years, drawing attention to his authoritative work on constitutional law and says: "Whatever the former friends of Sir Robert Borden think of it, it is known that he is invited to take part in the eighteen governments with the title of minister without portfolio and as technical advisor on constitutional affairs and that he has not yet refused; it is added that he is even strongly tempted to take the position."

TALKED OF FOR CABINET. OTTAWA, July 7.—Among the cabinet possibilities talked of here is R. McMillan, Conservative candidate for Saskatoon in the last general election. Mr. McMillan was only 189 votes behind his Liberal opponent, Dr. A. M. Young, in a three-cornered fight in which Mr. Kirkpatrick, Progressive, polled 1417 votes. The fact that in the 1921 election the Progressive candidate polled a big majority, while his successor dropped to such a small majority last October, gives rise to the belief in some quarters that Mr. McMillan would have a fair chance

N. S. STEEL AND COAL REPORTS LOSS FOR YEAR

Net Deficit of All Firms in Concern Placed at \$1,488,100

MONTREAL, July 7.—A considerable loss for the year ended December 31, 1925, is indicated in the annual report of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Limited, the first financial statement made public by the company since it became part of the British Empire Steel Corporation in 1920.

The report which will be presented to the shareholders at their annual meeting next Friday, is divided into two parts. One of these shows consolidated profit and loss statement and balance sheet for Nova Scotia Steel and its constituent companies, and the other shows the corresponding statement of N. S. Steel statement alone.

Consolidated profit and loss statement shows a net loss for the year amounting to \$1,488,100, while the Nova Scotia Company report alone shows a loss for the year of \$1,261,495, indicating that \$226,605 of the year's loss is applicable to operations of the constituent companies.

INTEREST ARRANGED. The report of the directors contains the announcement that arrangements were made to meet the bond interest payment on July 1 on the 6 per cent first mortgage bonds of the Eastern Car Company. As the outstanding amount of this issue is \$841,900, the interest requirements for the six months amounted to only \$25,287.

WIDER SCOPE

The work of the N. B. A. A. has taken on a wider scope this year than ever before, according to Mr. Berrie. An excellent new road map of the Maritime Provinces has been published and will be distributed to members of the association. On the opposite side of the map a list of hotels, garages, restaurants, etc., recommended by the association, appears. These road maps will also be mailed to a number of points in Canada and the United States.

Mr. Berrie further remarked that the association was placing a large number of signs, pointing out the proper roads to take, dangerous curves, etc., in prominent places along the provincial roads. Speaking of the roads, Mr. Berrie said that a great deal of logging was being done. Although the result of this logging will, generally, not be known this season, it is expected to be of great use to the association and automobilists next year.

TAKING MOTOR TRIPS

It was further pointed out by Mr. Berrie that a greater number of members of the N. B. A. A. than ever before have gone on motor trips, or have signified their intention of doing so this summer. Several of these motorists have made it a point to bring any information regarding the condition of the roads or other matters to the attention of the association.

Miss Gladys Davis, in charge of the tourist bureau established by the touring and public bureau of the N. B. A. A. at the Royal Hotel, said yesterday that many automobile travelers were calling themselves of the opportunity to obtain information there. The new road maps and road guides, published by the N. B. A. A., are in great demand, she said.

PERMIT CARDS

In continuation of their campaign to make traveling by automobile as convenient as possible for their members and Canadian motorists, as well as American and other motorist parties, the New Brunswick Automobile Association have had printed a large number of permit cards.

These cards are to be filled out and signed by motorists crossing the border into the United States. One part is kept by the owner or driver of the car and the other half is retained by customs officials at the boundary. On their return trip the motorists surrender their half to the officials and they are allowed to enter the Dominion with no further questioning other than as regards additional equipment remaining in their cars while in the United States. Duty will be charged on these additional provisions in the way of the permit according to the directions on the permit.

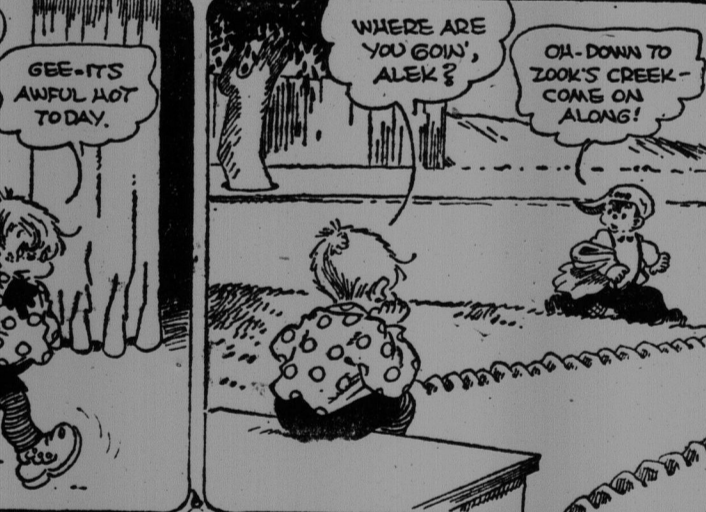

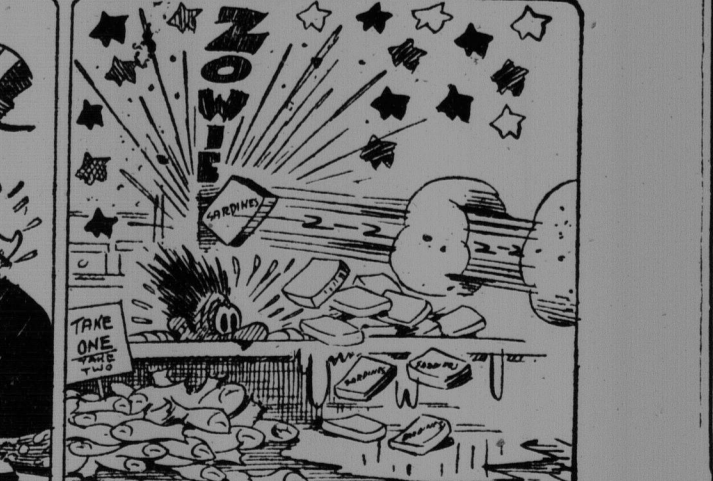
