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Expert Points Out Great Necessity Of Holding Enemy Back

London, Aug. 28—The Times military correspondent, in discusing the situation on the French frontier, says:

"The news is that the allies have retired and the line from Lille to Maubeuge has been abandoned, and that these two fortresses have been left temporarily to look after themselves.

"The necessity for holding the interval betwen the Scheldt and Cambrai and the Sambre near Le Cateau is probably due to the need for holding Mezieres. Once this point goes or the Meuse between Mezieres and Verdun is penetrated by the invaders, the whole system of the frontier defence of Eastern France breaks down, and if the field armies are inferior to the enemy, nothing remains but retreat to the Falaises of Champagne. If this line is skilfully defended, it should be most difficult to penetrate Lafere, Laon and Rheims, which are provided with permanent fortifications. But we are not at that point yet.

"The line from Lecateau to Cambrai must expect an enveloping attack on the north but this attempt will probably fail.

"We have every right to expect success today, but if we do not win, a decisive victory, we must abandon our bases on the coast north of the mouth of the Somme and shift further south, either to Havre or Cherbourg.

"If we are unable to resume the offensive and beat back the German attack from the north, one consequence will be that the Germans will establish aircraft stationed along the Straits of Dover, and thereby be able to keep, us under constant observation.

"We must meet this by counter at-guns. Sportsmen should make us tack with searchlights and anti-aircraftpractice parties for airship shooting.

"The Germans will also mount theirheaviest guns at any port they seize and once more there will be an army encamped on the heights of Boulogne.

"Let us, however, be grateful for one mercy. The international financiers, doctrinaries and lunatics who wished to fit us out with a channel tunnel are silence for good and all."

High Tributes To Gallant Conduct of British Troops

Fight Valorously Against Superior Numbers--French Force Advances While Russians Move Steadily Forward -- Germans Attempting To Break Through Barrier of Opposing Armies

London, Aug. 28—1.10 a. m.—The conflict of millions appears at last to be in progress. Even such news as the sinking of the German steamer Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse pales beside the titanic battle evidenced by the tribute of General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief, to the British arms, and the realization that the Allies are fighting to block the road to Paris, with the Germans hardly further away than New York is from Philadelphia.

The new battle is undoubtedly an attempt by the Germans, with the hugest army ever employed for a swift attack, to sledge hammer its way through the Allies' defensive barrier, while trying to outflank them between their left and the seaboard.

The Pall Mall Gazette's critic says that the fighting has been on a front of twenty miles along the line between Cambrai and Lecateau, and between the rivers Scheldt and Sambre, while the Germans have been steadily attempting an outflanking movement by forced marches.

Meanwhile the Russians are drawing nearer to Berlin. Not even during the first great struggle between Europe and Asia, on the far Manchurian plains, was the enormous battle fought in such impenetrable silence as far as concerns the outer world.

BRITISH MET VASTLY SUPERIOR FORCE.


