AUXILIARY MEETS

Former Home Bank President Gets Bail

TORONTO, April 7.—Arranged before County Judge Emerson Coatsworth here today on charges laid under the Bank Act in connection with the failure of the Home Bank of Canada in August, 1922, Michael J. Haney, former president of the defunct institution, pleaded not guilty.

Election was reserved and will be submitted to the Crown within a week. Date for the trial was deferred, D. L. McCarthy, special Crown prosecutor, stating that the appeals of the other Home Bank directors would be taken up about April 20.

Haney was admitted to bail in the sum of \$100,000.

THE CASE OF THE MARITIMES

In discussing the case of the Maritime Provinces in the Legislature yesterday, Mr. J. D. McKenna, M. L. A. for Kings, introduced a new, bold and vigorous note. He called a great many spades by their right name, and in the warmth of his feelings he submitted and analyzed the position of these provinces and all believers in their destiny with most valuable material, which will be freely employed hereafter by all those who are determined that the Maritimes shall receive the recognition and reach the position in Confederation which is their due.

The campaign for Maritime betterment receives an immense impetus from this address, and as it is carried on hereafter the material Mr. McKenna has contributed and the arguments he founded upon his facts and figures will be found of the utmost benefit. He gave a most crushing answer to certain elements in other provinces who are disposed to adopt a patronizing tone in speaking of the Maritimes, for he showed that whereas some of these people have been speaking as though the other provinces had kept the Maritimes alive, as if we were a sort of poor relation of the rest of the family, the records show that in the matter of dollars and cents we have contributed far more—millions upon millions more—to the common fund than we have ever received from it. In this respect we have rowed far more than our weight in the Confederation boat, and Mr. McKenna, with conspicuous force, sets us right before the whole country in this regard.

Carrying the case to its logical conclusion he declares with emphasis that if the Maritime Provinces are to remain a part of Confederation, then they must be treated as full partners, and they must derive from their partnership every advantage that is legally and morally theirs. He is not an advocate of secession; but he confronts the Canadian public squarely with the fact that the drift must be in that direction unless a real solution of the problems of the Maritimes is found and applied. People of the Maritime Provinces, as he well said, are not supplicants for benefits at the hands of the rest of Canada, but have contributed more than their share to the building up of the Dominion, while for many years past they have been compelled to watch what he describes as "a most hideous form of annexation," through the working of our young people to live under a foreign flag. He thinks and declares firmly that it is "about time there arose in this country men sufficiently broad in their views to realize that new methods must be devised and new solutions sought for our difficulties," and he says that "unless this is done there must be of necessity, some change in the political life of this country."

Dealing with the argument sometimes heard in the Upper Provinces that certain things cannot be done for the Maritime Provinces because the necessary money is not available, Mr. McKenna declares emphatically that so far as these provinces of ours are concerned their incorporation as a part of the Dominion was far more important and far more important to our sister provinces than their assistance is to us, and he went on to prove by facts and figures that we have contributed far more money to the upbuilding of Canada than the rest of Confederation has ever contributed to the upbuilding of the Maritimes. He did this by presenting in detail the total expenditures on canals, railways, public buildings, harbors and other public works, and contrasting the amounts the Maritimes had contributed as their share with the amount they had received in return from the common treasury, and he showed that if a balance were struck to-day, in case the Maritime Provinces decided to administer their own affairs, the amount due the Maritimes would be very great.

Mr. McKenna made a strong plea for broad-minded thinking here and throughout Canada. He urged that petty policies and jealousies in the Maritimes be subordinated to progressive and constructive policies for the general good, and he said that we must help ourselves and must grapple with our own difficulties, determined to overcome all the obstacles that confront us. After an eloquent reference to the war, he said that "to-day the call is not that men should lay down their lives for Canada and for the Maritime Provinces, but that they should live their lives in their country's behalf. We want, what we require, is that the same sacrifices made by our own young men should be along different lines—the call should be, not that men should die, but that men should live in order that full fruits may be given to the aspirations of the people of this country." He said that the spirit of the men who died at Lundy's Lane, at Passinover and at Vimy is

usually net to the producer something much less than those sold on the home market. In other words, the real paying market, particularly in these days of high transportation costs and embargoes, tariffs, etc., is, and must always be, the home market."

The campaign for Maritime betterment and for Maritime justice will go on, and Mr. McKenna's speech will be widely regarded as a strong and constructive contribution to this great cause upon which public attention is now so thoroughly concentrated.

A GOOD POLICY

The action of the School Board in trying to promote the use of New Brunswick materials in connection with the new Vocational School is a commendable one. In calling for tenders the board invited contractors of the wish "that New Brunswick materials be used as far as possible, all things being equal," and asked each contractor to attach to his tender a schedule of materials other than New Brunswick products which he intended to use.

This policy is the right one, and it should be followed more generally in all expenditures and improvements. We have plenty of building material, stone, brick, concrete, and our varieties of wood will meet all reasonable requirements. Why it would be unreasonable to say that New Brunswick material should be used even if the cost were much greater, there is no reason why it should cost more, and in cases where the difference is but slight the native product should be favored.

In the past we have spent altogether too great a proportion of our money outside of the Maritime Provinces, not only in purchasing material but in backing far-off enterprises. It is recognized from time to time that we do not sufficiently patronize ourselves, and when we export too much of our money we deprive our own province of the very backing it needs in order to provide lucrative employment for our own people, and through this failure we increase the tendency of our native sons to seek homes and employment in other places. That is short-sighted and losing business, and we should steadily correct such tendencies by every reasonable device possible.

Heavy forest fires in New Hampshire yesterday, and less destructive ones in Massachusetts and Rhode Island, should remind New Brunswickers that the danger season in this province is at hand and of the need for constant and effective precautions against forest losses through fire.

At a recent meeting in New York held for the purpose of co-ordinating the work of various charitable and social organizations, it was found that there are 2,000 of these and that they expend yearly \$80,000,000 in works of charity and social betterment in that city.

The International Waterways Commission has fixed May 15 for a meeting in Montreal at which the question of the Grand Falls enterprise will be discussed by representatives of this country and the United States. It is not thought likely that the international body will find any valid objections to New Brunswick's harnessing our greatest waterpower.

The port of Saint John is given first page position as to text and illustration in a recent number of Toronto Saturday Night. The Toronto publication features an extended article on this city and its harbor written by Mr. R. E. Armstrong, Secretary of the Saint John Board of Trade, dealing with the general equipment of the port, but more particularly with the dry dock. There is a fine picture in connection with the article showing two vessels under repair in the great dock.

A timely word on the value of the home market for both the farmer and the manufacturer is spoken by the Maritime Farmer: "We have been hearing a great deal these last few years about our export markets and their requirements, and our columns have carried long and full accounts of experiments in catering to new markets in the Old Country. But, while it is undoubtedly true that we must do all we can to develop these foreign markets as outlets for our surplus produce, we should never forget that in the case of many of our products the port absorbed by the foreign market is comparatively negligible (wheat and cheese being the most outstanding exceptions), and that those who market outside the country

Mr. Short's efforts to stir up bad feeling where only the most friendly relationship has existed for more than a century is an insult to the intelligence of every Canadian member of an international organization, and the time wasted in such an occupation might well be used to better advantage.

Mr. Short correctly states that "Canadians are quite capable of forming their own organizations and controlling them." Not only are they capable of doing this but have been and are doing just that. The constitution and by-laws of our International Alliance are open for the personal of any person interested, and we defy anybody to discover any clause therein which can honestly be construed as proving that we are not self-governing insofar as strikes and the general conduct of our affairs is concerned. As far as I am personally concerned this controversy is ended, as I feel that too much has already been written on the subject. If Mr. Short insists on parading his ignorance, I do not consider the matter of enough importance to warrant further encroachment on the time of a busy editor or the valuable space of a newspaper like The Times-Star.

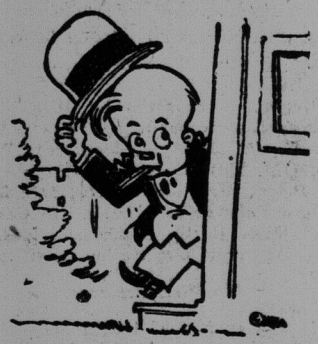

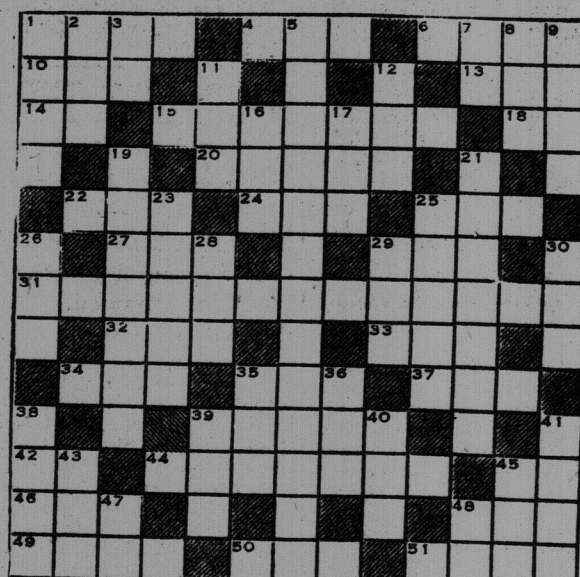

Shea, H. Robert, the president and secretary as a committee to co-operate with the entertainment committee in preparing for a big "get together" of members and ex-service men generally.

The efforts of the provincial president, Rev. F. M. Lockary, to have Earl Haig visit Saint John during his attendance at the B. E. S. L. convocation were approved and if Earl Haig can be brought to Saint John the local branch intend holding a big public meeting at which he will present the aims and objects of the British Empire Service League.

May Add Four Alleys. The sports committee reported the winning of the Inter-Association League championship for the second year by the association bowling team, and that the team had been entered in the Maritime Provinces championship tournament in Moncton next week.

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Halifax Dock Had 45 Ships In Year

MONTREAL, April 7.—During the year 1924 the dry dock at Halifax was occupied 224 1/2 days, which was not quite as much as in the previous year, but 45 ships registering an aggregate of 165,492 tons, were docked says the Bulletin, published by the British Empire Steel Corporation.

The marine railway at Dartmouth showed a decline in numbers, but 228 vessels registering 59,859 tons were hauled out and occupied the slips, an aggregate of 412 days. Although there were fewer vessels than usual their combined tonnage was greater than the tonnage hauled out in the two previous years. The dock and slips are in better condition than they have been for a long time, the Bulletin says.

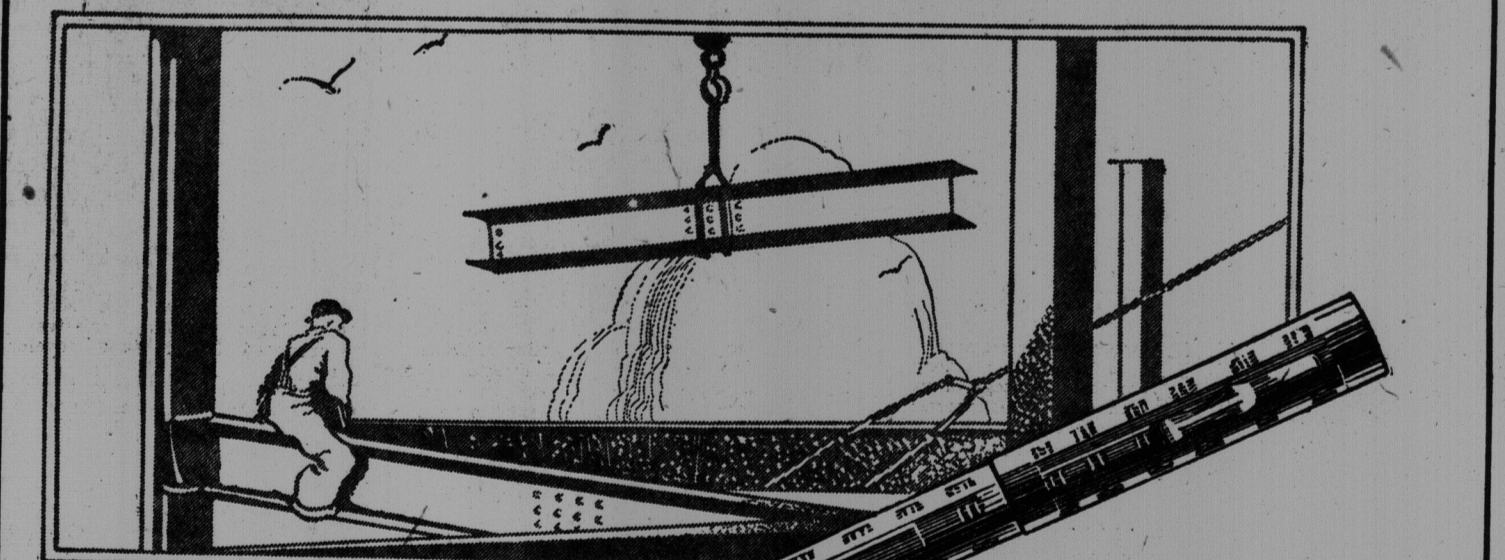

McKENNA URGES MARITIME LOYALTY

MAKES PLEA FOR EARLY SOLVING OF PROBLEMS

Kings M. L. A. Says Young People Leaving Country by Thousands

ASKS THAT WOMEN BE ENLISTED IN CAMPAIGN

Suggests Coast-to-Coast Organization to Treat With Difficulties of Dominion.

FREDERICTON, April 7.—Calling upon the people of New Brunswick to live their lives for the good of Canada in general and the Maritime Provinces in particular, J. D. McKenna, M. L. A. for Kings county, in the Legislature this afternoon, clearly showed that definite action was necessary to place these provinces by the sea in their proper position in respect to the rest of Canada.

Mr. McKenna, speaking in the budget debate, gave the House some startling figures regarding emigration and discussed the problems of the Maritimes in a convincing manner and showed that the effort to keep the people at home must be renewed with greater vigor than ever, if the Maritime Provinces are to go forward to prosperity.

He urged that broad-minded men lend their energy toward the solution of these problems.

MILLIONS CONTRIBUTED

Mr. McKenna quoted from official reports to show that the Maritime Provinces have contributed to the upbuilding of Canada many millions of dollars in excess of what the rest of the Dominion has given to the Maritimes, and declared that the Maritimes, at the time has arrived when, if the Maritime Provinces are to remain a part of full partners and they must derive that partnership every advantage that is legally and morally their right.

PAROCHIALISM RUED

Mr. McKenna approached the discussion of these problems from a broad national viewpoint, deplored parochialism and petty local jealousies, which he declared, must be forgotten, if there is to be a unity in the Maritimes that spirit of national well-being so necessary for their future development. The time has arrived, too, said the speaker, for the people of the Maritimes to decide whether they intend to look after their own affairs and insist upon justice, or become a mere appendage to the rest of Canada.

SECESSION SENTIMENT

That sentiment throughout the Maritime Provinces in favor of secession is growing, Mr. McKenna did not deny and in reply to those who claimed this secession talk is the chatter of young men, the member for Kings made the reply that the young men of today are to be the custodians of the destinies of these provinces within the next 10 years. While he did not advocate secession, except as a last resort, Mr. McKenna pointed out with some force that unless some solution of the Maritimes' problems is found by the Dominion government, the people of the Maritimes cannot be criticized if they seek some means of their own to right these grievances.

HALIFAX MAYOR QUOTED

In this connection he quoted the speech of Mayor Murphy, of Halifax, on the occasion when the recent Maritime delegation visited the federal capital and declared that the Halifax Mayor had voiced the sentiment of a great majority of the delegates on that mission.

FIGURES STARTLE

Mr. McKenna startled the House with some of his figures today. These figures, which are given in detail below, are declared worthy of careful perusal, and the conclusions reached by the member for Kings caused him to remark, amid great applause, that the Maritimes Provinces, instead of being a burden on this country, are one of the greatest assets that Canada possesses.

ARENT SUPPLIANTS

"We are not suppliants for benefits at the hands of the rest of Canada," said Mr. McKenna. "I have shown that our people are leaving us by the thousands and going to the United States. We are passing through a most hideous form of annexation, the annexation of our young people under a foreign flag. I think, therefore, it is about time there arose in this country men sufficiently broad in their views to realize that new methods must be devised and new solutions sought for our difficulties. Unless this is done there must, necessarily, be some change in the political lines of this country."

Mr. McKenna referred to the campaign initiated by The Telegraph-Journal and The Times-Star and the results that had accrued from Mr. McKenna's mission and later discussed the proposal of a coast-to-coast organization of Maritime Provinces men to assist these provinces in solving their difficulties. The members for Kings made an eloquent plea for the

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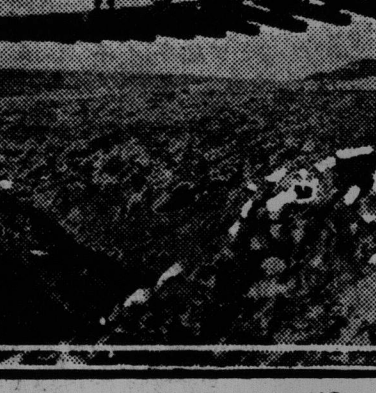

CURREN DEFENDS DEBT INCREASES IN HOUSE SPEECH

Deplores Pessimistic Attitude of Opposition on Financial Matters

HUNTER TAKES FLING AT PROHIBITION ACT

Advocates Three Liquor Vendors in Each City and One in Each Village.

FREDERICTON, April 7.

Four speakers took part in the budget debate in the House this afternoon. S. B. Hunter, of York, speaking from the opposition side, criticized the government on its highways policy, attacked the health act, and also declared that no serious effort was being made to enforce the Prohibitory Act. In his discussion of prohibition Mr. Hunter advocated three vendors for cities and one each in the villages of the province.

Mr. McKenna followed Mr. Hunter and then came Lewis Smith, M. L. A. for Albert, and Opposition whip in the House. Mr. Smith made one of the best speeches delivered from the Opposition benches. He was very critical of the Government policies, attacked the financial record of the administration, and charged that the Government's record was one of unusual extravagance. He made special reference in this connection to the Department of Public Works and the Department of Agriculture, declaring that contracts for roads and bridges were frequently awarded to friends of the Government rather than to the lowest tender.

FAVORS HYDRO MOVE

Mr. Smith said he favored Government ownership and operation of the water powers of this province and declared it was wise and prudent to secure this development so that the people might benefit thereby. He asked that a complete investigation of the Grand Falls project be made before any development work was started there and that the Government should definitely where this power was to be sold and at what price, so that a fair return on the investment might be secured.

FAVORS BIGGER BOARD

He did not believe this development should become a burden on the revenue of the province. Mr. Smith also favored the proposal to increase the membership of the power commission, but questioned the advisability of having the Premier added to that board, charging that Hon. Mr.

Veniot would put political expediency before business considerations. On the question of prohibition Mr. Smith was quite explicit, stating that he always had been a prohibitionist and intended to continue his support of that law.

DEBT INCREASES CAUSE

Dr. L. M. Curran, M.L.A. for Saint John county, defended the government's record and pointed out that the increase in debt during recent years had been the result of extensive investments made by the government. He pointed out that the government had provided sinking funds to date on these investments to well as \$4,500,000 on the debt left by the former administration.

Dr. Curran said he deplored the pessimistic attitude of the opposition on the financial position of the province and said this propaganda was doing a great deal of damage to New Brunswick. He replied to the criticism of Mr. Hunter, who had assailed the expense in connection with the work of the road engineers, pointing out that dangerous curves were being eliminated on New Brunswick roads because of the efficient work being carried on by these officials.

MUSQUASH SUCCESS

Dr. Curran said the Musquash development had proved an unqualified success, and had saved the people being saved by that development \$250,000. Further the member for Saint John said this project had been honestly and efficiently carried out and the people of the province recognizing this fact would have con-

dence in the government's proposal at Grand Falls. He declared that the prudent administration of the government would result in more revenue, more work, more population, and more people staying at home. Dr. Curran said the Grand Falls development would bring more industries to the province and he pictured the future of this province as prosperous and progressive.

URGES MCKENNA POLICY

Regarding the references made to the Saint John school by Mr. Mc-

Kenna, who had congratulated the school board in stipulating that all materials used in the construction be purchased in the Maritime Provinces, Dr. Curran said this was the policy that should be adopted everywhere in the Maritimes. He also

praised the Health Act and spoke of the excellent results that had accrued from the medical inspection in the schools. The opposition, he charged, were playing politics with the question of prohibition and described the report,

made at a recent conference of the dry forces in Saint John, to the effect that the entire opposition was supporting prohibition, as an "insurance policy." These reports, he alleged, were the work of political opponents of the government.

MAKES PLEA FOR EARLY SOLVING OF PROBLEMS

Continued from Page 9. Among us, manufacturers in the Maritime Provinces repeatedly tell me that they are unable to sell consumers living in these parts and doing business there-in. They have failed after many efforts, although they offer commodities equally good, and at prices equally satisfactory, as can be secured elsewhere. There is something even worse to the picture, to my way of thinking, because not only do many of our business men refuse to buy in the Maritime Provinces, but they also refuse to buy Canadian goods, and hundreds of thousands of dollars are going abroad for products which can be produced economically and satisfactorily by ourselves! While this condition exists we cannot complain too much, we should not complain too much of conditions hereabout.

WOULD ENLIST WOMEN

"If a wish of mine might be gratified, it would be, that we might enlist the women of the Maritime Provinces, in assisting us to bring about more desirable economic conditions for our people. I am convinced that, once having interested the women in a campaign designed to build up our own province, we could look forward to the ultimate result with assurance. Were it possible, for instance, to utilize the machinery provided in such organizations as the Daughters of the Empire, or the Women's Institutes of this province, and enlist their sympathies with a greater Maritime production campaign, I believe that we would quickly solve some of our problems, and we could give employment to at least some of the thousands of our young women and young men who are leaving us for foreign lands. After all it is the women who can do things along such lines, and I wish to appeal to them to take a more active interest in such matters, and to ask them that in a small measure at least they have regard for the products of our own section. They can put such a campaign on a basis very different from anything that might be attempted by mere men, and they will achieve something in a practical way that up to the present has been more theoretical than otherwise.

NATIVE BORN IN U. S.

"I have previously referred to the native born of these provinces who are living in other parts of Canada, and more particularly in the United States. I wonder if the members in this House have ever taken the trouble to examine the obituary notices which appear in our papers from time to time. I have been noticing them more or less late, because of the repeated references which have been made as to the depopulation of Eastern Canada for the upbuilding of American cities. Glancing over some newspapers published in the Maritime Provinces, I noticed some striking examples of the great inroads which have been made in Maritime Province families by the call to the United States.

HAD LEFT CANADA

"A Nova Scotia paper, recording the death of a leading Scottish resident of Nova Scotia, referred to the fact that he had left for the United States four years ago. He was survived by three sons and two daughters, all of whom lived in the United States; he had four brothers, three of whom lived in the United States; and three sisters, all of whom are resident there. "Another reference to a former New Brunswick lady sets the fact that all her daughters are residents of the United States, where she herself passed away. Another lady is survived by nine children, 54 grand-children and 25 great grand-children. Of the children, five reside in the United States, three in Canada and one is dead. Without question we might conclude that the grand-children and great grand-children are represented in the United States in proportion to the number of children resident there.

GIRLS GO ABROAD

"A Yarmouth paper records the death of a resident with two daughters living in the United States, there being three in the family. Another lady who died in a Massachusetts city, had five immediate connections residing in the United States. I might continue along this line ad lib., but I think I have cited sufficient instances to support the claim, that there are as many former residents of the Maritime Provinces in the United States today, as there are resident Maritime-born residing in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

BROAD STANDPOINT

"While we speak of such conditions, and we deplore the apparent falling off in our industries, it is one thing to complain, and another thing to suggest something that may result in a betterment of our lot. In discussing the matter I wish to approach it from the broadest possible national viewpoint. I do not want to be sectional, but I do wish to insist that if the Maritime Provinces are a part of the Dominion of Canada we are entitled to that consideration which will relieve the awful depletion of population from which we have suffered; and I am convinced that it is up to the Government of this country to devise some means whereby a change will be brought about. "It can no longer be said that the people of the Dominion of Canada are not interested in our well-being, because I have been in rather close touch with a mission, Dominion-wide in its scope, the object of which was to uncover any possible sympathy with our problems. It was almost startling to find that people residing from coast to coast in this country have expressed themselves as not only willing that we should receive consideration, but they have demanded that some measure of relief be given us. So that there can no longer be the excuse that 'so and so cannot be done' because other sections of Canada are opposed to measures necessary to ensure relief.

POLICIES UP TO MARITIMES

"Having determined that others are willing that we enjoy benefits which were promised us at the time of Confederation, it seems to me that it is up to us to devise—to undertake on our own behalf—the formation of

definite policies which may be helpful to the upbuilding of the Maritime Provinces!

"The first thing necessary, as I see it, is that we forget our little petty difficulties, the jealousies which exist in certain towns and cities and counties of this province. Let us first accept this as an axiom. That anything which will benefit the city of Moncton cannot fail to benefit the rest of this province; nothing that will benefit any other part of the province can fail to influence conditions in Moncton for the better.

MARITIME PORTS

"Taking into consideration the question of transportation, I conceive that we in the Maritime Provinces should insist that our Maritime Province ports be used to forward the freight loaded on Canadian-Government-owned railways. I take it that there can be no question as to the desirability of this from our viewpoint, and I think it is time that we who are complaining because that we are shareholders in the Canadian National Railways, and assume our prerogatives as such shareholders, should demand that we receive any benefits that might follow our suggested ownership in that road.

FAVORS CANADIAN BORN

"It would be far better that Canadian-born workmen be utilized for handling Canadian freight, rather than American-born workmen (or what is even worse, Canadian-born who have become expatriated) be engaged in similar occupations in United States ports, paid for by the money of the people of this country and maintained with the taxes collected, in part at least, in the Maritime Provinces. "That it is in the interests of Canada that this should be done, that Canadians be so employed, goes without question. Our people buy Canadian-made goods, but the man in Portland, Maine or the man in New London, will not purchase a single dollar's worth! Not only will our Canadian factories and our Canadian workmen be benefited by the transfer of this traffic from the United States to Canada, but there is hardly a section of this province which will not derive some advantage.

RESULT OF TRADE CHANGE

"If trade is diverted from United States ports to the Port of Saint John and the Port of Halifax, the City of Fredericton is one of the communities which will quickly notice results. With the cut-off at McElroy Junction—with a heavy-traffic bridge at Moncton across the St. John river, and the use of the Valley Railway for traffic which now passes over the rails to Portland, there will be a very decided and gratifying change in several directions. Fredericton would become a far more important railway centre, with relative increase of business. The Valley Railway would be made to become a paying proposition rather than a source of loss, not only to this province, but to the C. N. R. system itself.

SEES SAINT JOHN AIDED

"The Port of Saint John in turn would benefit. Thus there would be an additional amount of employment given to railway men and instead of there being the present state of men engaged in the railway repair shops at Moncton, additional employees would be required. Who can tell just where the benefits would end!

"The Canadian National Railway System is the property of the people of Canada, and it is for the people, through their duly elected parliamentary representatives and the Board of Railway Commissioners, to determine what the freight and passenger rate policy of the Dominion in its relation to the Canadian National Railway System shall be, but there is no way by which freight and passenger rates can be continually reduced and net earnings at the same time increased; and, moreover, restricted net earnings must inevitably mean additional taxes to provide for annual deficits. The administration of the Canadian National Railway System is the trustee of the people's property. That administration cannot and has no desire to dictate policies, but it would be lacking in the fulfillment of its public duties if it did not make these facts clear to the people of Canada.

WANTS HARMONY IN VIEWS

"It is suggested that it would be in the interests of the people of this province to have railway connection between the C. N. R. system and United States roads by constructing a branch line from Kingsclear. Some opposition to this has manifested in the city of Saint John. I am here to say on my own behalf that I think the line has come in this province when the City of Saint John, in its own interest, must recognize that it cannot hope to derive all the advantages, all the time, from projects which may be suggested for the upbuilding of this province. And that it must take into consideration the fact that other communities are just as jealous and as zealous for the advancement as the people of Saint John may be of and for theirs.

IMPORTANT TO WEST

"Mr. Speaker, let me say that so far as the Maritime Provinces are concerned, their incorporation as a part of the Dominion of Canada, is far more important to our sister provinces than their assistance is to us. I want to make the startling statement, that we have contributed far more money to the upbuilding of the provinces of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia and the Yukon, than these provinces ever contributed

to the upbuilding of the Maritime Provinces!

MUCH GIVEN COUNTRY

"I make this statement after a careful analysis of the public accounts of Canada, more particularly having regard to statements covering the construction of canals, railways and public works and harbors and rivers of this country. I gather, Sir, that while for the millions of dollars we have received in the shape of railways, canals, public buildings and harbor improvements, we have given to the rest of Canada many millions of dollars in excess of the amounts they have given us!

PROPORTION DECLINES

"In order to build up my arguments along these lines, and to be as fair as possible in arriving at the figures on which I base my conclusions, I would point out to you that, prior to the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway, we in the Maritime Provinces constituted about one-fifth of the population of Canada. Today we have about one-eighth of the inhabitants of

this country residing in the Maritime Provinces. I have, therefore, taken what I regard as a fair average fractional figure, and have fixed our contributions from Confederation on down to statements covering the construction of canals, railways and public works in this country.

FIGURES QUOTED

"Assuming this to be a reasonable basis, I wish to direct your attention, first to some figures in connection with the total expenditure since Confederation, I find that:

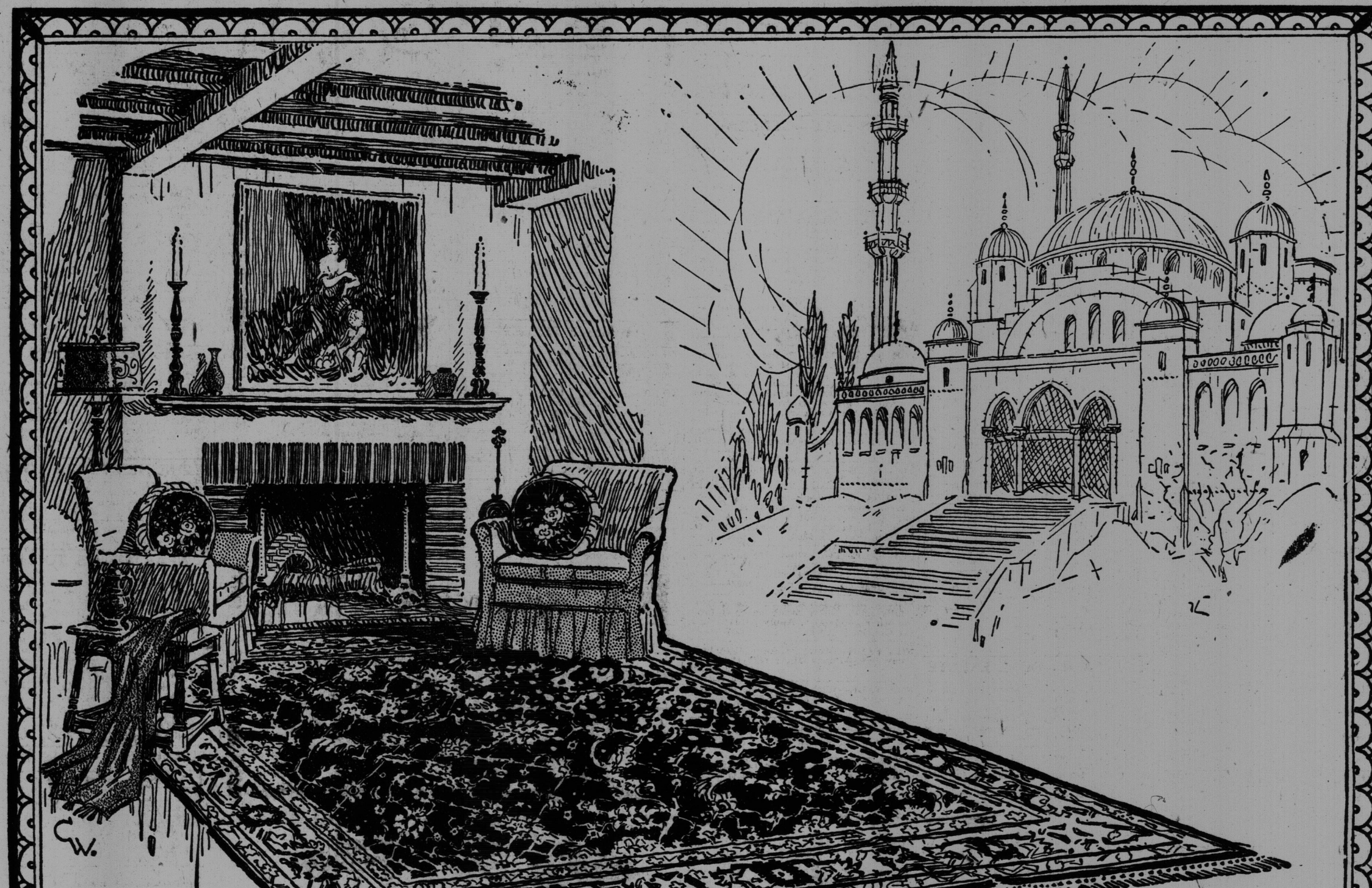

M'KENNA URGES EARLY ACTION ON NATIONAL PROBLEMS

Let us now deal with the amount of money spent by the Dominion in the various provinces in the Maritime Provinces.

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ads should demand full recognition from the Immigration authorities of this country, and at least the share of money which we contribute to this outlay should be utilized for the encouragement of immigration to this province.

"Another item which is rather outstanding in connection with Canadian development in an amount of \$3,763,146, which was expended last year for upkeep of Canadian National Parks, and of this item not one cent is expended in the Maritime Provinces.

"I might continue, Mr. Speaker, and I believe that I have given sufficient data to convince this Legislature, the people of the Maritime Provinces, and (unlike they are utterly dense) the people of the rest of Canada, that, instead of the Maritime Provinces being considered absolutely from the standpoint of the fiscal condition of the Dominion, we should be considered as being maintained to the general advantage of Canada!

"I am endeavoring to show, and I think I have shown, that we are not in any sense applicants for benefits at the hands of the rest of this country, which we have never requested.

"I wish to express this conviction, that, until this is done, there must, of necessity, be some change in the political lines of this country.

"In saying this I believe that Mayor Murphy is expressing the opinion of the far larger number of the delegates who recently proceeded to Ottawa to present our case.

"It is not necessary for me to dwell at length in presenting these arguments, and before taking my seat, I wish to congratulate the ex-Premier of this province in advocating that 'we in the Maritime Provinces help ourselves.'

"The very properly referred to the appropriate approach to the United States whenever international interests are to be considered. I agree with the Premier's statement that we are not so inconsiderate as a

"When we consider, Mr. Speaker, that the Maritime Provinces were imposed upon our potatoes a duty which was prohibitive, I think that it was purely ungratified, not to charge the part to assume the attitude they did in regard to our New Brunswick farmers.

"It might be said, as it has been, that this statement is open to attack on the basis that some of the assets were not liquid, but I submit, Mr. Speaker, that the Maritime Provinces have in any court, would feel fully justified in making the statement which I am now making, and I believe that it might be offered for deductions; and I, therefore, think it reasonable that we should accept the public accounts of Canada at their face value and not as what they should be.

"It was struck by a paragraph in the report of the Department of Railways and Canals, signed by no less a person than Sir Henry W. Thornton, Chairman and President, which says: 'The present work of colonization and development of natural resources in the Maritime Provinces, from Montreal, Winnipeg, Edmonton, London, England, and Paris, France, with branches at St. Paul, Seattle, and Boston in the United States. It embraces advertising of lands and business opportunities, the distribution of information in the public press, and by lectures, folders, pamphlets, maps, etc., the answering of enquiries, etc., advising and assisting incoming settlers in regard to choice of lands and the obtaining of employment. The work in the Western Canada, Quebec and northern Ontario. Up to the present time satisfactory results have been produced in spite of the recent agricultural depression, but the more important part of the work done during the past year was the establishment of a suitable organization which will be able to assist in completing the work expected to result from the intensive immigration policy now being carried on, and which includes the ground settlement arrangements made with the Overseas Settlement Board.'"

"You will notice, Mr. Speaker, that no mention is made of the Maritime Provinces, directly or indirectly, all the efforts of the staff of the Canadian National Railway, focused on a policy which has regard to the up-building of the rest of Canada, while utterly ignoring the Maritime Provinces. 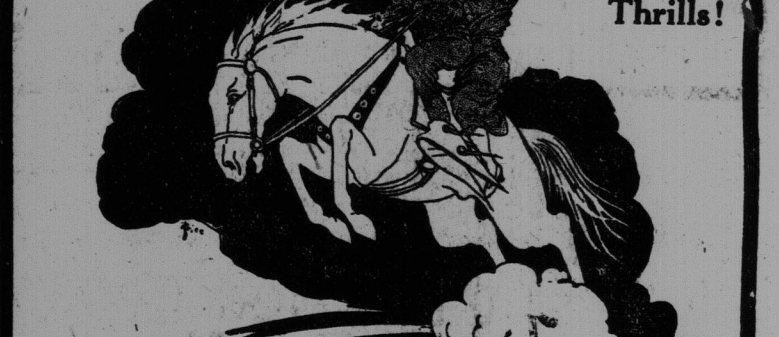
