Over 200 Chinamen have arrived in Toronto in the last three months.

Mr. Wm. O'Brien, who was struck with a stone at Cork, Ireland, on Monday, is in a serious condition.

Hon. Edward Blake arrived at Noville, Ireland on Monday. He was received very cordially by the citizens in general.

Edgar Jones, a negro murderer, was taken from jail at Weston, W. Va., early Wednesday morning, by a large mob and hanged.

A nugget of gold was sent into the mint at San Francisco the other day that weighed 357.3 pounds avoirdupois and was worth \$120,000.

The public debt of the United States has increased \$600,000,000 in the past month, but the interest-bearing debt shows no increase. It is now only \$855,020,330.

A dispatch from Rome says the anarchists who participated in the May day riots of 1891 were sentenced to twenty months solitary confinement. Thirty-eight others were given sentences ranging from 6 to 25 months.

Wm. Kelly's stable on Brown's place, N. Y., was burned early Tuesday morning. Two young men perished in the flames, they are supposed to be Wm. McFadden and Bernard Sinclair, watchmen, who slept in the stables. The bodies were burned to a crisp and cannot be identified.

Emigration matters are booming at Montreal. There arrived yesterday and Monday and Tuesday during the same two months of the present year. The amount of cash possessed by the May and June arrivals of 1891, was \$802,000, while this year it was \$500,000.

Smith Tooley and John L. Adams, alias Scotch, were hanged Wednesday at midnight in the court house yard at Vicksburg, Miss., by a mob of 700 white citizens. The Warren Light Artillery declined to defend the jail and the crowd had no resistance. The victims had murdered Mr. Beason Blake, a merchant, last week.

A despatch from Digby says: As William Longford (colored) and a young lad named Goodwin, son of Walter Goodwin, were working on the Weymouth river Wednesday afternoon with the intention of fishing in St. Mary's Bay their boat was suddenly struck by a heavy wind and upset. The boat overturned and the two occupants were thrown into the water. Young Goodwin succeeded in climbing on top of the upturned boat, but was retained in the water, clinging to the boat. He afterwards relaxed his hold and attempted to swim ashore, but disappeared before assistance arrived. Goodwin was rescued. Langford's body was recovered three hours later, a short distance from the shore.

A FURGE BATTLE.

Between Pinkerton Detectives and Carleton's Mounted Police.

On Wednesday last the firm of Carnegie & Company, of Pittsburgh, Pa., attempted to gain possession of that vessel at Hamilton, Ontario from which they were excluded by their locked out workmen.

Two barges containing 300 Pinkerton detectives were taken up river by a four boat. Thousands of armed strikers had possession of the works, and entrenched themselves behind piles of lumber. The barges were surrounded by the strikers and their firing which they returned, and their firing was so fierce that the tugboat was cut loose from the barges and steamed up river carrying seven wounded detectives. The barges were moved to the bank. Every attempt of the detectives to land was prevented by the fire of the workmen. The cannon produced but little effect. Unsuccessful attempts were made to burn the barges by pouring oil on the water and setting fire to it. Dynamite bombs were thrown against the boats.

About dusk the officers of the amalgamated association prevailed upon the strikers to allow the detectives to surrender.

At 6 o'clock the detectives landed a white flag and the strikers guaranteed the safe conduct of the tugboat and the barges. The strikers and ammunition behind and agreed to leave the place under guard. The detectives accepted these terms.

On the boats were found seven dead detectives and 20 or 30 wounded—some fatally.

As the prisoners were being conducted through the streets the infuriated strikers beat them with clubs and knooked down and trampled upon many. In this way several detectives were fatally injured. The captured detectives were finally lodged in the Opera House where they were kept all night.

The strikers looted the barges and then set fire to them. So far as can be ascertained, 11 workmen and nine detectives were injured in the battle. At least 100 detectives were seriously injured on the way to jail. The Pinkerton men were not sworn in as deputy sheriffs.
