GRIT ASSEMBLY SPLIT ON BLAIR.

Motion Endorsing His Appointment Broke Up Meeting.

The Liberal Convention Wouldn't Listen to Words of Commendation for the Old Leader.

The convention of the New Brunswick Liberal Association opened this morning in Berryman's hall. The hall was crowded with delegates from every section of the province, and until before the close of this morning's session apparent unanimity prevailed. But a motion from an adherent of Blair that a resolution should be passed endorsing his appointment to the railway commission, caused at once some little confusion. The motion was never carried, those present showing their hostility to it by getting up and leaving before the adjournment was moved.

Senator King, of Chatham, occupied the chair as being the president of the association, and C. J. Milligan was secretary.

Senator King, in calling the meeting to order, said that in the present convention he expected to have one of the finest gatherings of Liberals ever held in the province. The meetings of the convention were open to the press as the Liberal had nothing to conceal.

A committee was then appointed to secure a list of the names of the delegates and their addresses. When the committee had completed its work, Senator King made a few remarks as to the object of the convention, the main object of the convention, he said, was to revive the Liberal organization in New Brunswick, as a preliminary step to the coming general election. He therefore considered that the convention should be composed of Liberal principles and that every one present should have his say. While he was sure that there were no dissensions in the Liberal ranks, he did not think that the convention would go so far as to dictate to the delegates of the convention should, upon its conclusion, at once put themselves into communication with their respective county organizations and proceed without delay with county organization. He suggested that two committees be appointed, one to draft a resolution endorsing the government policy, and the other to draft a resolution endorsing the appointment of Mr. Emerson to the cabinet position of minister of railways.

The minutes of the last convention of the N. B. Liberal Association, which was held seven years ago in St. John, were then read by the secretary, C. J. Milligan.

Mr. Emerson, the new minister, was then called upon to address the gathering, and upon rising received the acclamation of his followers. He said it was gratifying to him to meet on such an occasion so many prominent Liberals. About five minutes he spent in conferring with a problem in his appointment to a cabinet position.

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JAPS REJECTED.

Fail in Attempt to Land Troops at Port Arthur.

But They Gave Russia a Severe Blow by Blocking Manchurian Railway—Battle of Chemulpo Described.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—A special despatch from Tien Tsin confirms the report that the Manchurian railway had been blocked by the blowing up of a bridge on the line and that thirty Russians were killed in the explosion. It is reported, the despatch adds, that the Russian steamers Neni and Muldon belong to the Chinese Eastern Railway Company have been captured by the Japanese.

WAR DECLARED.

TOKIO, Feb. 11.—The existence of a state of war with Russia was formally announced today by an imperial proclamation.

JAPAN STRIKES AGAIN.

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MORE RUSSIAN SHIPS TAKEN.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Lloyd's agent at Shanghai, cableing under date of yesterday, says it is reported and generally believed that a Japanese warship has destroyed the Russian mail steamer Mongolia, bound for Shanghai, at Dalney. The cablegram adds that the three Russian warships damaged by torpedoes at Port Arthur sank.

THE BATTLE OF CHEMULPO.

TOKIO, Feb. 11.—The destruction of the Russian cruiser Varig and the Russian merchant ship Mongolia, at Chemulpo, on Tuesday is officially confirmed but the details are unknown.

Admiral Uru, commander of the Japanese squadron, sent a cablegram to the navy department, saying that the two Russian vessels weighed anchor at noon, steamed down the bay and anchored in the harbor. The Japanese then rounded the island, nine miles from Chemulpo. The Russian ships withdrew to Mongolia, bound for Shanghai, at Dalney. The cablegram adds that the three Russian warships damaged by torpedoes at Port Arthur sank.

LONG SEARCH FOR DEAD WIFE.

Body of Missing Iroquois Victim Just Found.

It Had Been Stolen for Money the Woman Carried—Montreal Man the Thief.

CHICAGO, Feb. 11.—The long search of Frank B. Greenwald, for the body of his wife, who lost her life in the Iroquois fire, has been rewarded. He has found the body buried at Elmwood as that of another woman.

Mr. Greenwald identified the body by the membrane connecting the first and second toes of the feet and by two rings that were still on the hand. The body was buried beyond recognition of the features. A deliberate attempt to get possession of a body to obtain the money found on it was suspected. Mrs. Greenwald's body was taken to an undertaking establishment where it was No. 24. The number was a duplicate, and on the other body, numbered 24 \$800 was found.

A man who said he came from Montreal claimed the body and said that it would be found \$500. He secured a permit to take away the body. He claimed it as the body of his wife, a woman 30 years of age, when he brought the permit to remove the body, he stated that it already had been identified as that of Mrs. Helen Miller, 28 years of age.

It was then he found that he could not get the body of Mrs. Miller and he took the other one as his permit called for No. 24. This was the body of Mrs. Greenwald. He called an undertaker to care for the body and buried it. He explained his circumstances and upon promise that wealthy relatives would come to Chicago he obtained not only credit for the expense of interment, but also the loan of considerable sum from the undertaker. After both the bodies had been buried the Montreal man continued to trouble the Miller family, seeking the effects that were on the body which they had identified. Although Mrs. Greenwald were several articles of jewelry, the presence of the two rings leads the police to believe that the remaining pieces were taken by someone else, and not by the man who identified the body. No money was found on the body. The police have a good description of the Montreal man and his arrest is expected soon.

Greenwald's son also had been wrongly identified. He had been placed in the list as Vernon Corbin. This mistake was discovered by Mr. Greenwald ten days after the funeral.

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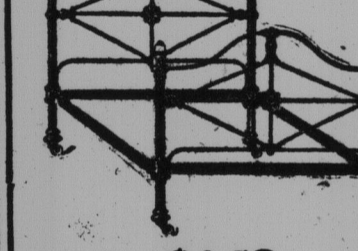

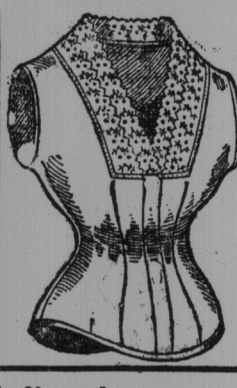
