Berlin, April 19, via London.—A cablegram received from Athens says that unusual activity prevails at the port of Mudros, on Lemnos Island, in the Aegean Sea, off the entrance to the Dardanelles Straits. All the French troops on the Island, with the exception of some few battalions have been sent away on transports.

A total of 35,000 British and French soldiers were landed at Mudros during Wednesday and Thursday of last week.
