SUPPORTERS OF GOVERNMENT MET IN CAUCUS

With Practical Unanimity Decision Was Reached to Stand Together to Maintain Stable Gov't.

NATIONAL LIBERAL-CONSERVATIVE PARTY

Formed, as Result of the Caucus, and All Are Enthusiastic Over the Future.

Ottawa, Ont., July 1.—The following statement was issued by Sir Robert Borden: "The supporters of the government met in caucus this morning at 10.30 o'clock and continued in session until 1.15. They met again this afternoon at half past four and continued in session until seven. From first to last the spirit of the caucus was magnanimous and inspiring. With practical unanimity the decision was reached to stand together, and by united effort to maintain a stable government."

REGRETS LONG ABSENCE

He emphasized the supreme purpose which brought together men who formerly opposed each other in the political arena.

SIR ROBERT IS RETIRING FROM THE LEADERSHIP

Announcement of His Decision to Retire Was Made to Caucus of Gov't Followers.

SUCCESSOR NOT YET SETTLED UPON

Hon. Arthur Meighen, Brilliant Minister of Interior, Appears to be Most Probable One.

Ottawa, July 1.—Sir Robert Borden, for eight years Prime Minister of the Dominion, and for twenty years a leading figure on the Parliamentary stage, retiring from the leadership of the Union Party. Announcement of his decision to retire was made to a caucus of Government followers today, and within the next few days, after his successor has been selected by the party's choice to form a new Ministry.

PLATFORM OF NATIONAL LIB.-CONS. PARTY

Sets Forth the Principles Which Are to Guide the New Party in Carrying on the Gov't.

TARIFF QUESTION FULLY SET FORTH

Revision to be Made Which Will Provide Adequate Revenues and Encourage Industries.

Ottawa, Ont., July 1.—The platform of the National Liberal and Conservative Party, founded at the government caucus today, is as follows: Constitutional. Firm adherence to British connection in full confidence that Canada will find its amplest scope for development, usefulness and influence as a member of the British Commonwealth, with the status of a self-governing nation equal to that of the other members.

CITIZENSHIP

The adoption of such measures as are necessary to maintain and protect the ideals of Canadian citizenship and co-operation with the provinces in their efforts to Canadianize alien enemies.

NATIONAL POLICIES

Practical application of the principle that parliament and government alike should be administered for the benefit of the nation as a whole.

THE TARIFF

A thorough revision of the tariff with a view to the adoption of such reasonable measures as are necessary (a) to assist in providing adequate revenues (b) to stabilize industries (c) to encourage the establishment of new industries essential to the economic development of the country.

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SUGAR BILLED TO WHOLESALE AT 9 CTS.

economic development of the nation (d) to develop to the fullest extent our natural resources (e) to prevent the abuse of the tariff for the exploitation of the consumer and (f) to safeguard the interests of the Canadian people in the existing world struggle for commercial and industrial supremacy.

As a means of raising revenue the tariff should be so adjusted as to place the chief burden upon those best able to bear it. Articles of luxury should be heavily taxed through the imposition of customs and excise rates. Food commodities and other necessities of life, not produced or manufactured in Canada, should be taxed at all, but only such imposts as are necessary for revenue purposes.

While a general revision of the Canadian tariff, based upon the foregoing considerations is due, it must be realized that, owing to the war, economic and commercial conditions of the world round, have been profoundly disturbed and that, as a consequence, it is neither practical nor possible in the national or public interest to undertake such revision until a thorough inquiry is made to ascertain the essential facts upon which tariff proposals must necessarily be based.

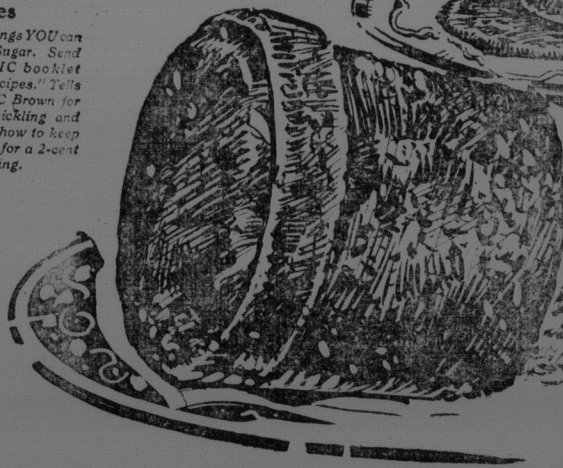

BUILDING PERMITS. Building permits covering construction costing more than a half million dollars have been issued in the city during the six months which ended Wednesday. The cost of the work for which permits have been issued since the first of the year totals \$525,950, as compared with \$390,000 for the same period in 1925.

During June, this year, the total cost of work for which permits have been issued is \$213,000, as compared with \$9,800 for June, last year, and includes the construction of a concrete foundation and floor for the sugar warehouses of the Atlantic Sugar Refineries, which will amount to \$200,000.

As a physician my lips are sealed but were I to unfold my experiences of the past twenty-four years of active practice in this province the hereditary results of even the inebriate would fade into insignificance with the appalling debauchery in all its horrible conditions and upon which these enthusiasts attempt to throw the blame. If a cause is worth fighting, it is worth fighting in the open. But to return to the advertisement which says: "The intelligent voter in the coming election will not vote for the dope fiend, the lemon extract idiot, the confirmed drunkard or the social whelp, but instead the innocent little children such as represented by the accompanying picture, the originals of which had to be placed under institutional care by the local courts."

Why, I ask, should these degrading conditions which have been brought about by the prohibition Act not be considered? It is just such conditions which compel me to vote against the Act July 10th. Dr. Addy's statement before the N. B. Medical Association last summer that he had treated 10 per cent more dope fiends since this Act came into force and that 75 per cent of the drunks were due to lemon extract is a very serious reflection upon it. Did we hear of lemon extract, vanilla, paragon or shoe-polish as beverages before the adoption of the Act? What has brought them into use? They are now the poor man's beverage while the rich continue to draw from an almost inexhaustible supply of the best.

What the public desire and what they will get if this prohibition Act is defeated, is a rigid, and a very rigid liquor Act, which will overcome the many deficiencies of the present one, recognizing the liberty of the subject, putting at bay the unscrupulous bootleggers and the liquor profiteer, now protected by legislation, but protecting the interdict from an evil over which he has now no protection.

I am thoroughly convinced that the great majority in this and other civilized countries are temperance people. Why divide a party with one mind and to an ultimate object? Why the necessity for bogging an honest issue? Would it not have been more in the interests of real temperance to "go together" and make a new Act which was workable and had the moral support of the public behind it than to alienate those of moderate views by legislation all too radical to be respected, the daily, yet surely, violation of which brings the law into ridicule?

It is not a question of temperance vs. intemperance but a question as to the best method of obtaining real temperance. We have had upwards of three years of "prohibition." As a physician I have seen it in all its nakedness. I am fully in accord with Padre Hooper, whose duties have brought him in contact with the very conditions in question and who should be in a position to speak with some knowledge upon this matter through legislation.

To my mind the British character of this Act inures its ultimate collapse, but while the mills are grinding, a poor fallen victim of its viciousness is asked while in a state of intoxication to make a choice of \$200.00 or six months' jail in his option. Might is not right—the duty we owe a fellow comrade in our short journey through life is something more than a "scrap of paper." There is some good in the worst of us and some bad in the best of us. Do not crush the fallow, repair and build up and out of all may yet come a life devoted to the Empire over which we never sets. Let us not forget what we have heard at our mother's knee, faith, hope and charity and the greatest of these she told us was charity. Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for the same I am,

Mary Anderson Does Not Like The Stage

is in London With Her Husband, Assisting Robert Hitchens in Production of The Garden of Allah — Says Stage a Sham.

London, June 22.—Mary Anderson de Navarre, the beloved Mary Anderson, who gave up her public career in the eighties to be married, and has since lived only for her home except for a few appearances during the war for war charities, expects never to appear publicly on a theatre stage again.

She is in London with her husband to assist Robert Hitchens supervise the production of "The Garden of Allah," which opened here June 19. It is the dramatization of Mr. Hitchens' book which broke records with a seven years' run in America.

The years tell that youth is behind Mrs. de Navarre, but nature has been very kind. The masses of her soft, fair hair are still bright, her complexion is clear and glowing, and her face unlined. But above all she is absolutely devoid of pose—a natural, sincere, real woman. Meeting her, it is easy to understand why after all these years of absence from the stage, she is still "Our Mary."

"Do you think you will ever return to the stage?" I asked.

"Never," said Miss Anderson emphatically, "never. For one thing I am too proud of my home and my family. I am a regular home woman, and for another thing, I don't like the stage."

This was an astounding statement from a successful actress, so I promptly demanded the reason.

"It is all sham," said Miss Anderson. "Sham tears, sham business, sham sufferings, sham love, sham happiness. It is a sham life. I like the real thing. I like real houses, and real trees, and real people, and real happiness, and real love. That is why I love my home and will never go back to the stage."

"Do you know what interests me more than any play?" she went on. "My boy! I am so proud of him. He went away from Cambridge to the war, and he is now finishing the work he took up, and is making a success in everything."

"My son, and my daughter, who is fourteen and as tall as her mother, my husband and any home in the beautiful Cotswold Hills, look my nature, and the stage could never draw me from them."

"But you must meet Mr. Hitchens," said Miss Anderson.

In response came the man who has made the Sahara Desert live to millions of people who has never seen it. Mr. Hitchens' eyes are dark and bright and keenly observant. Nature or his beloved Desert has dusky shadowed his face, which though still young, is strangely crowned with snowy hair. White hair with a young face subtly suggests tragedy, but Mr. Hitchens' brisk air of well-being is thoroughly reassuring. He makes one feel that all his tragedies lie within the covers of his books.

One question I promptly put, "What happened to Bella Donna?" Not that I ever loved the lady, but there is a natural human desire for completion which forbids us to accept the interrogation point as final.

To my disappointment the creator of Bella Donna disclaimed all knowledge of her fate. "I finished with her when she walked out into the Desert," he said. "She may have found an Arab or been found by a tiger—or perhaps she is trailing around still." So Bella Donna remains a mystery.

Together Mr. Hitchens and Miss Anderson renewed memories of the United States.

"New York is such a pushing city," said Mr. Hitchens, "that when I am there I rush so I think it is the atmosphere. I feel all the time as if I had been drinking champagne, good champagne without any after effects. It is a case of getting the bubble with."

GERMAN FOOD RIOTERS FIX OWN PRICES

Raid Stores and Compel Merchants to Sell at One-Third Prices Fixed by Gov't.

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were called out with rifles and machine guns to prevent plundering. Municipal authorities throughout Germany, alarmed at the developments of the movement and the possibilities of trouble, are appealing to the central government to take action to prevent further increases and to reduce prices now fixed on meat, bread, potatoes and other victuals under state control. They declared the attempt to enforce a higher price level being instituted for bread and meat was sure to lead to trouble everywhere. Protest was made against higher prices officially fixed for the current year on crops of grain and potatoes to encourage production. It is being urged that under the present favorable crop conditions there was no justification for the increases.


The Wurttemberg government has jailed the editor of an agricultural paper who advised farmers to meet the price-fixing movement by suspending deliveries to cities and has proclaimed martial law throughout Wurttemberg to enforce the order.

The labor unions at Crefeld, where there were food riots, and which district is occupied by Belgian troops, have demanded from the city compensation for the victims of the shooting and guarantees of an adequate supply of food at prices fixed according with consumers' purses. Otherwise the unions will call a general strike throughout the Crefeld district.

Danger of labor troubles arising from the attempt to collect 10 per cent wages paid after today under the new income law is steadily looming higher to add to the perplexities of anxious local authorities. A number of labor organizations have already advised members to strike rather than submit to the deductions. Radical newspapers are openly advising that course, unless employers assume a favorable tax attitude. They have advised the government they consider collections of the tax from farm hands in their present spirit impossible. Any attempt to do so on June wages would paralyze Germany at the critical harvest period.

The authorities have shown themselves unprepared to cope with the difficulties and complications of the new law, adding daily to the uncertainty of the situation by new and variant modifications and interrogations of its provisions.

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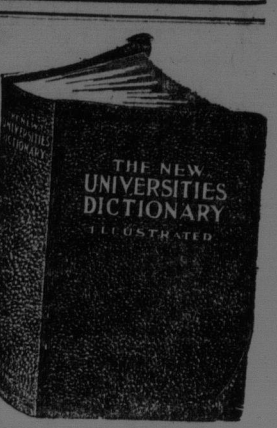

THE MONEY MARKET

Increased discount rates can hardly be expected to do more than check further borrowing, according to the National Bank of Commerce in New York, until the railroad situation improves so as to permit prompt liquidation of commercial and agricultural credits in its money market discussion in the July number of its magazine, Commerce Monthly, the bank declares that the present partial breakdown of transportation, by interfering with the movement of products, has prevented the liquidation of a tremendous volume of credits such as is normally effected at this season of the year.

"During the period from May 18 to June 15, the bank points out, the money market has experienced continued tension which, largely as a consequence of the traffic situation, had become pronounced during the preceding month. The strain on credit facilities has been reflected in a further general advance in money rates. While some improvement of the traffic situation, mainly potential rather than actual, has been accomplished, it has not proceeded sufficiently to release any considerable part of the credit which had been jockeyed up, and traffic conditions can be expected to improve only slowly. Meanwhile, the credit requirements of a new crop movement will become pressing in the not distant future.

"Until the railroad situation improves sufficiently to afford an adequate physical basis for the prompt liquidation of commercial and agricultural credits, the increased discount rates adopted by many of the Federal reserve banks can hardly be expected to do more than check further borrowing, thereafter, the bank should be a strong influence in effecting a curtailment of outstanding credit, in preparation for the heavy autumn requirements."

TRADING ON WALL STREET YESTERDAY

Higher Discount Rates Tended to Conservation of Cash—Stocks Remained Firm as a Rule.

New York, July 1.—Money was the spot around which today's stock market again revolved in indolent fashion. As to the percentage for call loans, higher quotations for commercial borrowings and meagre offerings of time loans testified to the steady contraction of credits. The turn into July was attended by treasury withdrawals aggregating \$70,000,000 at this centre. These operations were augmented by an extension of cash transfers in payment of other heavy mid-year settlements.

An authoritative survey of general conditions here emphasized the further conservation of cash, due, it was thought, to higher discount rates. A significant incident in connection with this tendency was the posting of an eight per cent rate for merchant's paper, equalling the high quotation of the past thirteen years.

Dealings in foreign exchange were circumscribed because of the holiday in London, but interest in gold imports was revived by receipts at San Francisco of some \$6,000,000 from the Far East. This gold, it is understood, will be deposited to the credit of the New York Federal Reserve Bank.

Stocks were steady to firm most of the day, some of the popular issues attaining their maximum prices in the more active trading of the final hour. Shorts evinced a further disposition to cover contracts in steels and equipments.

In general, however, the approaching triple holiday was sufficient to hold dealings, except among several favorites within extremely narrow limits. Total sales amounted to 265,000 shares, an investment and speculative buying of railroad and industrial issues, as well as Liberty and Victory issues, imparted strength to the active bond markets. Sales (par value) aggregated \$15,850,000.

Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

BREWERIES FEATURE MONTREAL MARKET

In Great Demand and Price Steadily Rising—Pulp and Paper Stocks Steady.

Montreal, June 30.—Trading in National Breweries amounted to 787 1/2 shares in the morning session, a total which has seldom been reached by any one stock. Breweries thus contributed the great bulk of the total transactions in all stocks of 25,882.

Atlantic Sugar was moderately active, coming second on the list with a total of 18,000. While the rise in sugar has been tipped off freely enough no sufficient explanation for the advance has yet been heard.

The street, however, seemed to be in a frame of mind to jump in upon the promise of any more of this nature and take a chance of making a quick profit. The belief was expressed not long since in certain quarters thought to be well informed that the stock was high enough, but it would seem that this view is not accepted elsewhere.

Besides being the most active stock on the list, Breweries was the strongest. After opening at 6 1/2, the price made new high records every half hour, and at the close was selling at the top of the morning at 6 5/8 a share.

Sugar made a new high. The stock was strong throughout the session. Spanish River issues attracted some attention by reason of the fact that the preferred began selling ex-stock dividend rights. As the stock dividend amounts to \$42 and the preferred sold

Montreal, July 1.—(By Canadian Press)—Formal notices are now being sent to shareholders of the Dominion Steel Corporation calling the special general meeting at Halifax on July 15, together with the recommendation of the Board of Directors in respect to the British Empire Steel proposals and the amended consolidated balance sheet of the new consolidation.

In the comprehensive survey of the terms on which the securities of the Dominion Company's securities are to be exchangeable for those of British Empire Steel, President Roy M. Wolvin states that the capitalization of the consolidation, as presently planned, will be as follows:

The bond issues of the two companies and those of Canada Steamship Lines, Limited, Mr. Wolvin points out, will not be disturbed in any way.

ENGLAND NOT SEEKING HER OWN INTERESTS

Agreement Between British and Persian Governments Was for Purpose of Developing Latter Country—What It Provides for.

London, June 30.—The agreement between the British and Persian governments was signed at Teheran, August 9, 1919. The preamble states that the agreement is made in virtue of the close ties of friendship which have existed between the two governments in the past, and because it is essential that these ties should be maintained and that the progress and prosperity of Persia should be promoted to the utmost. The agreement contains:

1. The British Government reiterates, in the most categorical manner, the undertakings which they have repeatedly given in the past to respect absolutely the independence and integrity of Persia.

2. The British Government will supply, at the cost of the Persian Government, the services of whatever expert advisers may, after consultation between the two governments, be considered necessary for the several departments of the Persian administration. These advisers shall be engaged on contracts and endowed with adequate powers, the nature of which shall be the matter of agreement between the Persian government and the advisers.

3. The British Government will supply, at the cost of the Persian Government, such officers and such installations and equipment of modern type as may be adjudged necessary by a joint commission of military experts, British and Persian, which shall assemble forthwith for the purpose of estimating the needs of Persia in respect of the formation of a uniform force which the Persian Government proposes to create for the establishment and preservation of order in the country and on its frontiers.

4. For the purpose of financing the reforms indicated in clauses 3 and 4 of this agreement, the British Government offers to provide or arrange a substantial loan for the Persian Government for which adequate security shall be sought by the two governments in consultation in the revenue sources sought by the two governments in of customs or other sources of income at the disposal of the Persian Government. Pending the completion of negotiations for such a loan the British Government will supply on account of such funds as may be necessary for initiating the said reforms.

5. The British Government fully recognizing the urgent need which exists for the improvement of communications in Persia, with a view both to the extension of trade and the creation of a family, are prepared to cooperate with the Persian Government for the encouragement of Anglo-Persian enterprise in this direction both by means of railway construction and other forms of transport, subject always to the examination of her problems by experts and to agreement between the two governments as to the particular projects which may be most necessary, practicable, and profitable.

6. The two governments agree to the appointment forthwith of a joint committee of experts for the examination and revision of the existing customs tariff with a view to its reconstruction on a basis calculated to accord with the legitimate interests of the country and to promote its prosperity.

7. Appended to the agreement was a contract between the two governments regarding the loan. This was for two million pounds sterling to be paid to the Persian Government as the latter indicated after the British financial adviser provided for in the agreement had taken up his duties at Teheran. The interest was named at 7 per cent up to March 20, 1921, and thereafter Persia was to pay monthly instalments with a view to liquidating the debt in twenty years. The Persian Government agreed to assign the revenue from customs receipts, after deducting the cost of administration, as security for repayment of the loan.

REAL PROHIBITION

Buenos Aires, June 30.—(A. P.)—From Punta Arenas, which is at the bottom of the world, where ships call in weathering the Straits of Magellan to leave supplies for the 35,000 inhabitants, comes a despatch saying that the maritime workers of the port have resolved that in the future they will not unload any liquors containing alcohol. The antecedents of this prohibition movement are not disclosed, but the despatch says: "This resolution has caused serious damage on account of having been taken without warning the liquor merchants."

ENGLAND NOT SEEKING HER OWN INTERESTS

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London, June 30.—The agreement between the British and Persian governments was signed at Teheran, August 9, 1919. The preamble states that the agreement is made "in virtue of the close ties of friendship which have existed between the two governments in the past, and because it is essential that these ties should be maintained and that the progress and security of Persia should be promoted to the utmost." The agreement continues:

"1. The British Government reaffirms, in the most categorical manner, the undertakings which have repeatedly been given in the past to respect absolutely the independence and integrity of Persia.

"2. The British Government will supply, at the cost of the Persian Government, the services of whatever expert advisers may, after consultation between the two governments, be considered necessary for the several departments of the Persian administration. These advisers shall be engaged on a temporary basis, and shall be paid the same as would be paid to the corresponding officials of the Persian Government and the advisers.

"3. The British Government will supply, at the cost of the Persian Government, such officers and such munitions and equipment of modern type as may be adjudged necessary by a joint commission of military experts, British and Persian, which shall assemble forthwith for the purpose of estimating the needs of Persia in respect of the formation of a uniform force which the Persian Government proposes to establish for the maintenance and preservation of order in the country and on its frontiers.

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"5. The British Government fully recognizes the urgent need which exists for the improvement of communications in Persia, with a view both to the extension of trade and the prevention of famine, and is prepared to cooperate with the Persian Government in the encouragement of Anglo-Persian enterprise in this direction both by means of railway construction and other forms of transport, subject always to the examination of her proposals by experts and to agreement between the two governments as to the particular projects which may be most necessary, practicable, and profitable.

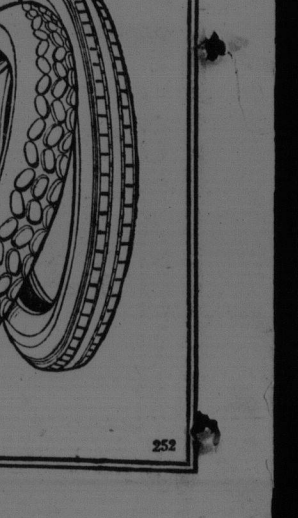
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THE WEATHER.

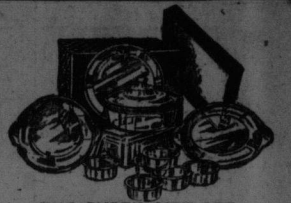

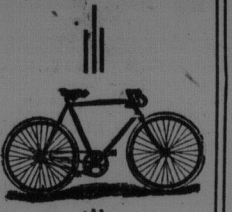
