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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF CANADA.

I. That the name of this Association be "The Congregational Union of Canada."

Uanada."

II. That it shall consist of Ministers and Professors, or Tutors in Colleges or Theological Institutes, of approved character, and of Churches of the Congregational or Independent order, duly received at a general meeting. In the admission of new members application shall be made in writing, addressed to the Secretary six weeks prior to the general meeting, in which a statement of doctrinal and ecclesiastical sentiments shall be made, and testimonials, if any, be supplied. Students who have finished their course at the Canadian Congregational Theological Institute, and who are ordained to the Ministry, and persons recommended by Associations of the same Church Order in other countries with which a fraternal correspondence is maintained, shall be eligible for admission without any probation; others shall be received only after having been proposed at the previous meeting.

III. That this Union is founded on a full recognition of the distinctive principle of Congregational Churches, namely the Scriptural right of every separate Church to maintain perfect independence in the government and administration of its own particular affairs; and therefore that the Union shall not, in any case, assume Legislative Authority or become a Court of appeal.

IV. That the following are the objects contemplated in its formation. 1.

To promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational Denomination. 2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated Churches. 3. To establish fraternal correspondence with the several Congregational Unions on this Continent and in Europe. 4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated Churches, accompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary. 5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational Churches throughout the British American Provinces.

V. To promote the accomplishment of these objects and the general interests of the Union, an Annual Meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated Churches being represented by two lay delegates, the meeting to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each Annual Meeting.

VI. That the Officers of the Union be a Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Minute Secretary, and Committee, all to be chosen annually, by ballot with nomination, who shall execute the instructions of the Union, and prepare a docket of business for the Annual Meeting.

I. The Union shall meet annually on the 2nd Wednesday in June, at 4 o'clock, P. M., for organisation; to commence with devotional exercises; the Chairman of the last meeting, (or, fai ing him the Pastor in the place of meeting,) to preside then, and until his successor be appointed.

II. After the above exercises, the Constitution and Standing Rules shall be read, and a Minute Secretary for the Session appointed.

III. The Roll of the Union shall be called, and a Se sional Roll formed.

IV. A Committee of five shall then be chosen, on nomination of the Chair, for Business and Nominations.

V. An Annual Sermon shall be preached, on the Wednesday evening; the preacher being appointed at the previous Annual Meeting.

VI. On Thursday morning, after the Devotional Services, the retiring Chairman shall deliver an address; new members shall be admitted, and the new Chairman, chosen by ballot, without nomination.

VII. The Minutes of the last Meeting shall be read, and the Report of the Union Committee presented.

VIII. The meeting shall be daily opened and closed with prayer; the morning devotional exercises to extend to an hour.

IX. No motion shall be discussed unless seconded; and no member shall speak more than twice to the same motion, without permission from the Chair; and every motion shall be presented in writing by the mover, if required by

X. The Roll shall be called, and the Minutes of the preceding day read at the opening of each day's session; and the minutes of the last day at the close of the session.

XI. The Church in whose local to the Annual Meeting shall be held, shall be requested to celebrate the Lord's support in connection with such meeting; with which Church the members of the Union shall individually seek occasional fellowsh p.

XII. On the Monday evening, during the sittings of the Union, a Public Meeting of the Union shall be held.

XIII. The Pastors, or the Officers of the Churches are expected to send to the Secretary, one month at least before the Annual Meeting, a brief narrative of the State of Religion, with statistics, in their several localities; that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for the Annual Meeting, and for printing, it so ordered.

XIV. That a Collection for the Funds of the Union shall be made annually in each Church on, or near the Lord's day, prior to the meeting. From the Fund so raised the extra travelling expenses of Ministers and Delegates, arising out of the amalgamation of the Unions, shall be paid; as also the expenses of Delegates to Corresponding Bodies.

XV. That Delegates from the Union to Corresponding Bodies, who may fail to fulfil their appointments by personal attendance, shall address those Bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if present at their Annual Convocation.

XVI. In case of disagreement between members of the Union, it shall be regarded as incumbent upon them to seek, without delay, an adjustment of their difficulties and a mutual reconciliation; and the party refusing to give or accept satisfaction according to Christ's rule, may be dealt with by the Union on that account.

XVII. That the travelling affairs of the Ministerial Members of this Union, and of one delegate from each Church, be paid in full, if possible, or otherwise according to an equal rate of per centage, on the understanding that such ministers and delegates remain during the sessional meetings.

XVIII. Should any Ministrial Member of this Union remove from Canada, and not apply for a letter of dismissal for the space of a year after his departure, the Secretary of the Union shall, if he can ascertain his address, forward to him a letter certifying his membership up to the date of his departure; and if his location be unknown, his name be reported in order to erasure from the roll.

Clark be referred to the Missionary Committee—said resolution being "Resolved that in view of the rapid increase of population and of rising villages in our Missionary districts, this Union recommends the Missionary Society to employ one or two Evangelists in each district during the coming year, if suitable brethren can be found—the said Evangelists to be under the direction of the Local Committees, and if desirable, to secure the services of one or more students during their recess to act as Evangelists, or to enable individuals in the Committees to act as such.

Resolved—That the Sons of Temperance have done a good work in Canada; and that we respond most heartily to their memorial in reference to the liquor traffic, believing with them that it is a curse to the worldand the church, and we will never cease to labor and to pray for the securing of a prohibitory liquour law until the world be emancipated from the giant evil of intemperance, an evil whither viewed politically, morally or religiously.

DENOMINATIONAL INFORMATION.

Resolved—That inasmuch as it is of great moment that correct and fresh denominational information be obtained, Ministers, Deacons, Secretaries of Local Missionary Committees, and Secretaries of Associations, be requested to communicate to the Secretary of the Union immediate and particular notice of the formation of churches, the settlement or removal of pastors, vacancies in churches, the names of Ministers desiring settlement or any other items of general interest.

The Finance Committee reported progress.

Resolved-That three-fifths of the expenses of Ministers

and Delegates be paid.

The Revd. F. H. Marling introduced the subject of the "Canadian Independent" Dr. Wilkes read a letter from the Secretary of the Colonial Missionary Society, approving of the "C. I." and remitting a subscription for copies of it to be sent to the Committee of that Society.

FRENCH CANADIAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Resolved—That we have much pleasure in expressing our continued and growing confidence in the French Canadian Missionary Society; that we gratefully see in its operations the marked blessing of the Great Head of the Church, and that we heartily approve of the course it has taken with

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SLAVERY.

Resolved—That the manifest determination of the Congregational Associations with which we are in correspondence in the neighboring states, to bring all their influence to bear on the extermination of American, Slavery, meets our cordial sympathy and hearty approbation, and that we trust the anticipated reformation on the part of the American Tract Society in relation to this iniquity, will leave us no change to wish for in its future history.

MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

The Union resolved itself into a committee of the whole to consider the report on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund The Committee rose and reported the following amended plan:—

Constitution of Fund for the benefit of Widows and Orphans of Congregational Ministers in Canada, presented by the Committee appointed to devise a rlan for said purpose, and as amended by the Union in Committee of the whole, June, 1857.

 It shall be called "The Congregational Ministers', Widows', and Orphans' Fund."

2. The following shall be the sources of Revenue:—Annual Collections in all the Churches; Subscriptions, Donations and Legacies; Interest on investments; and a Subscription of ten dollars per annum from each minister whose family is to participate in the benefits to be awarded from the Fund.

3. Any minister not over forty years of age, shall be permitted to increase his subscription to twenty dollars per annum, at the time of connecting himself with the Fund with the advantage provided for in clause 14.

with the Fund, with the advantage provided for in clause 14.

4. All subscriptions to be payable semi-annually on the 1st of January and July; and if not paid within one month to be subject to a fine of one dollar. If not paid within 12 months after the payment is due, notice having been given by the trustees, the minister so in arrears shall be held to have withdrawn from connection with the Fund.

In all cases where churches pay the amount of their Pastor's subscription, they must have collected and paid to the Treasurer at least an equal amount on account of collections.

6. Any Congregational minister in Canada shall be eligible as a beneficiary of the Fund. Those now members of the Congregational Union of Canada shall be allowed at once to enrol themselves; and after the expiration of twelve months the elegibility of applicants shall be decided upon by the annual meeting of subscribers, a majority of two-thirds of the members present being required in any disputed case.

7. Every church making a contribution to the Fund shall have the right of voting by one delegate at meetings of the Society held during the year subsequent to the payment of each contribution.

8. An annual meeting of subscribers, that is to say, of ministers subscribing, of churches collecting, and of donors of over \$50, shall, until otherwise provided for by themselves, be held at the same time and place as the Congregational Union of Canada; at which the accounts shall be presented, the Board of Trustees elected, and the general business of the Fund transacted.

9. The Fund shall be held and managed by a Board of 14 Trustees, to be elected provisionally by the Union, and their successors at the regular annual meeting as provided for in previous articles, five of whom shall form a quorum for the transaction of business. Ten of the said Trustees to be residents in Montreal, at which place the Fund shall be managed. The Trustees shall have power to fill vacancies.

10. The Trustees shall, from the resident members of the Board, elect a Chairman, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

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11. The Treasurer shall give such security to the Board, as under the circumstances they may require, and shall render to them a half-yearly financial statement, and also a full statement at the annual meeting.

12. The Fund shall be invested only in undoubted securities, and the Treasurer must have the written sanction of nine members of the Board pre-

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vious to investing in any particular security, or transferring from one security to another.

13. Widows of subscribing ministers shall be entitled to receive the sum of \$30 per annum for life or until re-marriage.

14. Widows of ministers who subscribe \$20 per annum, shall be entitled to

the sum of \$120 per annum, as above.

15. Widows with children shall receive an addition of \$20 per annum for

15. Widows with children shall receive an addition of \$20 per annum for each child until the age of 14 years.

16. Guardians of Orphans of subscribing ministers to receive \$40 per annum for the first, and \$30 per annum for each additional one until they attain the above age. The Trustees of the Fund having power to delay payment until they are satisfied that it will be properly applied.

*17. Any minister leaving the country or the denomination, shall thereby cease to be connected with the Fund, unless permitted to retain his connexion by a two-thirds vote at the next annual meeting.

18. The above amounts to be readjusted after five years from the formation of the Fund, should such readjustment be deemed needful.

*Article 17 was left over for discussion till the next meeting of the Union.

Resolved—That the report of the committee of the whole

be considered to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

THE ANNUAL PUBLIC MEETING OF THE UNION.

The E. Ebbs, as Chairman, presided. The Secretary read his summary of Statistics. Narratives of the state of Religion in their Churches, were given by the Revds. E. J. Sherrill, J. Howell, A. Duff, J. Wheeler, J. Boyd, F. H. Marling and Dr Wilkes.

Devotional exercises one hour. Roll called.

Resolved.—That the cordial thanks of the Union be tendered to the friends who have so kindly entertained its Members during the present meeting.

EXTENDED MISSIONARY OPERATIONS.

The Missionary Committee reported the following resolution which was adopted.

Resolved.—That in view of the rapidly increasing population of Canada, and the extensive depletion of the Churches by Western emigration, this Union urgently recommend that the Pastors of our Churches, as far as possible, severally devote at least three Sabbaths in the year to itenerant labour, and that in order to secure from such services the largest results, the Local Missionary Committees be consulted as to the places having special need of such visits; that on the recommendation of the Local Committees, expenses incurred in such service be defrayed from Missionary funds; and further, that the Local Committees be requested and authorized to employ any suitable parties, students or others, in the itenerant Missionary work.

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The minutes of yesterday were read, amended and adopted.

MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

The report of the Committee of the whole on Ministers' Widows and Orphans fund, was received for discussion.

Resolved.—That the Union do now appoint 14 Trustees, who shall take measures to form and distribute, if cases arise, a fund according to the principles of the Report of the Committee of the whole; but that in order to entire, full and final agreement on the entire system to be adopted, the scheme be subject to revision throughout, by the Union at its next meeting, by whom also Trustees shall be appointed for the following year, after which Trustees shall be chosen, in accordance with the provisions there adopted.

The Committee on Nomination reported fourteen Trustees. Their report as amended and adopted was: Montreal—C. Alexander, W. R. Hibbard, J. Baylis, P. Wood, W. Learmond, W. Moodie, G. Morrison, A. Savage, R. Holland, D. Lewis. Brockville—H. Freeland. Kingston—G. Chaffey. Toronto—Patrick Freeland. Hamilton—James McKeand.

CANADIAN INDEPENDANT.

Resolved.—That the position and prospects of the Canadian Independent having been brought before this Union, this Meeting feels that the paper is entitled to increasing confidence and support; that we would thankfully notice the generous provision made for its issue for the ensuing year, and urge upon the Churches the duty of sustaining it, as a matter of permanent importance.

Resolved.—That we express our satisfaction in the Editorial management of the "C. I." tendering our most cordial thanks to the Revd. F. H. Marling, and those who have rendered him assistance for their arduous and self-denying toil.

Resolved.—That this Union acknowledge the courtesy of the Grand Trunk Railroad Company and that of the British and American Steamboat Companies who kindly consented to carry its members to and from this city at reduced fares.

Resolved—That the Report of the Missionary Committee, an abstract of which has been read, be adopted and printed, under the direction of the Committee.

Resolved—That a Committee be appointed to draft and have presented to the Legislature a petition craving a civil registration of Births, Marriages & Deaths in Upper Canada.

ABSTRACT OF SUMMARY OF STATISTICS

CANADIAN CONGREGATIONAL CHURCHES.

Condensed from report presented at the Annual Meeting of the Union, Montreal, 1857.

Returns have been received from 71 churches; 73 appear on the Statistical Table, and there are other five which do not appear.

LENUMBER OF CHURCHES.

Two new churches have been formed during the year; and the church at Guelph has been reorganized. There are now, therefore, 78 Congregational Churches in Canada.

None of our brethren have been removed by death. Five have left Canada, some of them we trust only for a time. Seven have entered the field; five from other countries and two from the Institute.

On the 7th May, 1857, there were 49 settled over Churches; 2 Professors in the Institute; 3 Native Indian Missionaries; 4 Missionaries; 8 without pastoral charge,—in all 66 Congregational Ministers in the Province.

There are 10 vacant charges, 2 of which may not again be occupied.

The 73 Churches on the Statistical Table present an average Sabbath attendance of 10,470—for the other five Churches we have, given 850, which will make the total 11,320.

V.—MEMBERSHIP.

The 71 reported churches on the Table, return a membership of 3,159. Addition during the year by Profession

239; by Letter, 91. Total 330. Removals by Letter, 169;

by Death, 47; by Discipline, 66. Total 282. For the other 7 churches we cannot give an estimate of additions and removals; but we add 270 as members; which would make our total membership on 7th May, 1857, 3,429. Net increase on last year, 164.

VI.—CHURCH PROPERTY.
Sixty-two places of worship have been reported; in value \$147,904, with accommodation for 16,995. There are other 4 places of worship unreported, at least in value

are other 4 places of worship unreported, at least in value \$23,640, with accommodation for 1,490. There are, therefore, 66 places of worship, with accommodation for 18,485; in value \$171,544.

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To this we have to add 8 minister's houses belonging to churches, in value \$4,000; making total value of church property \$175,544.

There is a reported debt of \$22,900, and a reported Insurance of \$43,080.

VII.—SABBATH SCHOOLS AND BIBLE CLASSES.

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there, 485:

71 churches report 407 teachers and 3,081 scholars in their Sabbath Schools; the other 7 churches will not have less than 25 teachers and 270 scholars; making in all 482 teachers and 3,851 scholars. Many of the churches take part in Union Schools, such are not included in the above.

There are 36 Bible Classes reported, with an attendance of 562.

VIII.-FINANCE.

The first column gives the sum raised by the 71 reported churches, which appear on the Table—the second an estimate of the sum raised by the other seven—the third the Total.

In comparing this, with last year's Statistics, we have the following results:—

Four additional *churches* are on the list; and the number of churches without supply, about the same.

In the attendance reported, there is a slight decrease; arising not from an actual decrease however; but from greater care in reporting the average rather than the full attendance.

As to membership the same amount of progress does not exist as on some former years, and yet there is no ground for discouragement. The Additions last year were 483; this, 330; the Removals last year were 205; this, 282. The increase by letter has been unusually small, while the decrease has been unusually large. Shewing clearly, that many members are removing to parts of the country where there are no sister churches. The net increase this year, as shewn by the Statistical Book, is 164.

There is an increase in the Sabbath Schools and Bible Classes.

The *Financial* condition of the Churches is most gratifying. Last year there was a reported increase of £1,346 3s. 2d. over the previous year, and there is an increase this, over last year of £1,975 or \$7,890, in churches reported; but if we add the 7 not reported, we have an increase over last year of \$11,200.

The increase in the reported churches appears thus; on Money raised for Ministers' Stipend, \$5,343; Ordinary Incidentals, \$284; Missions, \$841; Debt, Building or Repairs, \$3,653; Decrease on Money raised for Institute, \$167; for

General Purposes, \$63.
