A NATIONAL TRAGEDY

Here is a tragic situation. To China, through drought and flood 3,750,000 human beings are starving and will perish this spring and summer if relief does not come. In Canada foodstuffs worth millions of dollars are spoiling because the crops were too heavy for the railways to ship to the east. And this is happening while the Chinese nation is in the agonies of a new political birth. Has the world ever beheld such an appealing need as in China, or so urgent a call for "first aid" to the suffering so that which comes to Canada? The facilities for shipping grain westward to the Pacific and on to China are better than for sending it east to the Atlantic. To save this unvaluable surplus from wanton waste and to send it to where it is so sorely wanted in our first and most compelling national duty. In how many ways will it come back to us as individuals and as a nation? The United States, alone among the nations, refunded a large part of the Boxer Rebellion indemnity on condition that the money was spent on the education of Chinese students in United States colleges and universities, and already the American nation is reaping a reward in the confidence and good will of the people of China, who now have a thousand students in the United States who will return as missionaries of international good-will. This generosity has been kept alive by the American people whose churches are now appealing for money and food to send to the relief of the famine victims. The Chinese are a grateful people and no movement of such a humane kind will go unrewarded here and hereafter.

In St. Andrew's church on Sunday Rev. T. P. Drumm spoke on this subject and stated that the sum of \$15 would support one family for a whole year. Next Sunday special collections are to be taken at both services and the Sunday school on behalf of the famine stricken people.

Langley of New Carlisle, Mrs. J. W. Thurston of Lynn Mass., Geo. H. Murray of Nova Scotia; Miss Louise Dobson of New Carlisle; Mrs. E. Gröbler, Deltonia and Mrs. A. Butts of New Carlisle. The funeral which took place in St. Andrew's church at New Carlisle, Friday the 16th was largely attended. Services being conducted by Rev. E. A. Dunn. The pallbearers were Mr. Captain Garrett of New Carlisle; Mr. Richard Major, Shiga; Mr. Frank Flowers and Mr. Ira Flowers of New Carlisle. The heart felt sympathy of the people goes out to Mrs. Thomas Dobson and family in the time of their bereavement.

MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Ways and Means Discussed at Tuesday's Meeting.

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor McDonald, presiding. Councillors present Messrs. Alexander, White, Mowat, Lunan, McKenzie, Miller, Pinault and Moores.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Communication was read from Duncan McKinnon asking reduction of assessments for property on Cedar Street. Referred to assessment and appeals committee.

Communication read from Capt. W. H. Belys B. Co. 73rd Regiment enclosing account of \$35.35 for equipment not returned to him after the fire. This was referred to Capt. McKenzie of the local company of the regiment.

Communication was read from the Council of the Board of Trade as follows:—

Submit plans of proposed wharf adjoining and east of the Town Electric Light wharf, and the estimated cost of the work and advise the use to which this wharf is to be put.

It is proposed to use this location as a dumping ground, and if so for how many years is it estimated the property can be used for this purpose.

If it is to be used as a dumping ground, will it be a general dumping ground, or if not, what disposal will be made of all offensive matter?

It is the intention of the Town Council to erect a concrete dam at Smiths Lake, if so what is the estimated cost of same.

What is the cost of operating the present Electric Light plant under day and night loads respectively?

This communication was laid on the table.

The following reports of standing committees were received and adopted. Councillor Pinault from Public Property and streets accounts totalling \$188.49, Councillor Miller, Finance Committee, \$56.25, Councillor White, Fire Protection, \$44.40, Councillor Lunan, Police and License Committee, \$13.50, Councillor Moores, Public Charities Committee \$104.45, Councillor Alexander, Water and Sewerage Committee, \$124.29.

Councillor Lunan submitted report of Police and License Committee recommending that a license for a Tailoring and Clothes Pressing establishment be granted (George LeTourneau on payment of \$10).

The agreement between the Shives Lumber Company and the town, respecting the wharf property was submitted and approved.

HOCKEY

The Victorias added another to their list of victories when they defeated the Fire Department in a good clean game of hockey. The game was well handled by referee Lavoie, his decisions meeting with universal approval. The final score was 4 to 0 in favor of the Vics.

The success of this team can only be attributed to their team play, not so much to their individual abilities. The other teams comprising the league will need to get more practice together, for most of their work is lost on the ice by each one striving to do too much on his own. Individual play looks fine on the ice but it does not get goals, and until the teams get down to good solid combination work, one can scarcely look for a great deal of improvement.

JUDGE W. B. WALLACE
Halifax

In Judge Wallace of Halifax we have one of the strongest advocates of social movements, and when last year he was elected President of the Halifax Canadian club it spoke volumes for his popularity.

COL. STEELE, C.B., M.V.O.
Winnipeg.

The recent publication by Col. Steele of the military history of the prairie province, brings to mind the leading part the colonel himself played in its history, though he took too great care that he did not figure in the article, so that the reading of it was like "Hamlet" with the principal character left out.

Col. Samuel Benfield Steele was born in County Simcoe in the year 1849 and educated at Orilla School and the British American Commercial School, Toronto. He was granted his first commission in 1866 in the Militia and on the return of the Red River Expedition in which he served gallantly, in 1870 joined the Canadian Permanent Artillery. Mr. Steele joined the N. W. Mounted Police in 1873 rising to superintendence in 1885. For the next four years Col. Steele commanded the Police in most of their expeditions against the Indians and to restore order in the new districts. He was chosen to command the "Strathcona" Horse in the South African War. Col. Steele is now commanding military district No. 11.

As a sportsman Col. Steele is well known as one who takes a keen interest in every exercise that will strengthen a man bodily and mentally.

Though Mr. Surveyer is one of the busiest lawyers in Canada's commercial metropolises he has secured his practice by hard work alone — by no political pull. MANITOBA HOTHEADS TALK OF SEPARATION

Winnipeg, March 1.—A sensation was caused in the Legislature last night by Dr. Molloy, Liberal member from La Verendrye, who advocated the separation of Western Canada from Eastern Canada, because the Eastern Provinces defied reciprocity in defiance of Western sentiment and were dictating the whole policy of the administration. It was his belief that a few years would see a decided sentiment in the West for separation. "No greater blow," the member for La Verendrye, went on to say, "had ever been dealt within Canada than the rejection of reciprocity. Moreover," he continued, "with using emphasis, 'I am prepared to support any man who will introduce a resolution moving the separation of Eastern Canada from Western Canada. If the people of Eastern Canada are going to dictate the policy of Western Canada, then the time for separation has come. The people of Eastern Canada,' Dr. Molloy continued, 'have deliberately set themselves to injure Western Canada, and in the course of ten years there will be such agitation in Western Canada against their binding acts that nothing but separation will suffice.' His remarks were loudly applauded, among Liberal members and many in the galleries.

FARM AND FIELD

HOUSING THE POULTRY

One of the Hardest Problems the Western Farmer Has to Solve During the Winter Months.

The hardest problem Western farmers have to solve is suitable housing during the winter for the poultry. Hens will live through the winter in almost any kind of a house but those that live in such a house fail to turn in their share of eggs or, as it sometimes happens, none at all.

Those who have separate poultry houses will find two factors to meet—either stiffness and dampness, or the house is too cold. The former difficulty must be overcome; of the two it is the most injurious to the health of the poultry. Put in ventilation shafts to draw off the air from both the bottom and top of the house, even go so far as to use cheese cloth in a small portion of the window. Doubtless this will cool the house very materially, but the chances of producing eggs are far greater than if the house is damp.

In the cold house it must be remembered where there is a good supply of chaff and straw in which the hens is thoroughly mixed, the hens will not feel the effects of the cold while working for the scattered and buried grain. No hot or wet washes should be fed during the winter as they tend to inactivate and inactive birds feed the cold to the last degree.

Straw for Feed

In the Canadian West where great heaps of straw are burned every season, the cutting of rough feed is there are many stockmen and dairymen who would not think of trying to winter their stock without running their roughage through a cutter.

Not only is there a saving in feed, but also the manure is in much more desirable condition for spreading on the land. In addition, the cut straw makes it possible to save practically all the liquid manure.

As mixed farming and stock-raising become more general, the number of straw cutters will increase. Most farmers have some kind of power on the farm that can be used during the winter for this purpose. When they have started, they do not as a rule give it up.

Russian Wheat Crop

A telegram from the International Agricultural Institute, Rome, reports 1911 wheat crop in Russia. In Europe to be 554,330,000 bushels. In June, 1911, the total Russian wheat crop for 1910 was finally estimated at 836,240,000 bushels. By a previous official estimate the production for Russia in Asia was placed at 95,789,000 bushels, leaving for Russia in Europe, 740,451,000. This is 136,141,000 in excess of this year's figures. The total production of all the countries reported to the institute to date is 98.7 per cent of the figures finally reported for the same countries last year. Broomhall's report, November, says: "The wheat crop in Russia is poor, both in quality and quantity even in best districts, and arrivals of wheat at ports very small."

Corn on the Prairies.

There must be hundreds of plants useful and ornamental now flourishing all over the Canadian prairie, which were not many years ago asserted to be impossible of growth in these cold latitudes. Indeed, wheat raising is now the leading industry in many parts where the idea of growing it met with ridicule not so very long ago. The cultivation of the land, however, by human hands, raises the average winter temperature several degrees, and much in the way of plant growth can be accomplished now, that was impossible then.

Bearing in mind the fact that similar conditions as to the impossibility of growing corn in many of the northern States have been proved by experience to be without foundation, it may be hoped that before very long corn may be a leading product of the prairie provinces of Canada. This will be a boon indeed for the swine industry, as home-bred hogs that have been raised in the corn belt.

Cut Straw and Salt

Mixed with grain, a little salt and dampened, cut straw is relished very much and eaten up greedily. To make it still more palatable, some and-out hay may be used in the mixture if they are grown on the farm, and if this returns justify this extra food. However much the added value of the feed may be worth, the cost of cutting is fully covered by the even manure, nearly stored, that results from feeding and bedding cattle with cut straw.

NEW TERRITORY FOR PROVINCES

Ontario Manitoba and Quebec to be Greatly Enlarged.

Ottawa Feb. 27.—In introducing the bill to extend the boundaries of Manitoba and Ontario, Premier Borden stated that the boundaries of Manitoba would be extended eastward to the eighty-ninth meridian in Keewatin. This would take in both Nelson and Churchill. However, to give Ontario access to a seaport, it had been decided to grant it the title to a strip of land, five miles in width through what would be Manitoba after the bill passed. This strip would extend to Port Nelson, where Ontario would be given ten miles of water front for the building of docks, elevators, and railway terminals, if Ontario desired the right of way, but only two hundred feet wide would be extended on through Manitoba to Fort Churchill. There is no reference in the bill to separate schools. Manitoba is given an increase in provincial allowance to \$516,000 a year with four years arrearage which will make an immediate grant to the province of \$2,064,000. In the territory added to Manitoba the Dominion retains the crown lands. In the territory added to Ontario the province is given the crown lands with no additional financial grant.

Hon. Mr. White said that with the added territory Manitoba would have an area of 251,000 square miles, practically the same as her sister provinces.

T. Eaton Co's Employees Striking

Toronto's Journeyman Tailors Also Quit Work.

Toronto, March 1.—The 1500 cloak makers of the T. Eaton Co., who have been on strike the last two weeks were joined this morning by 400 sympathizers from the same factory. Low wages is the cause of dispute. The journeyman tailors of the city also decided at noon today to go on strike on Monday next. They number about 1,000.

EDWARD BLAKE
The death of Mr. Blake recalls an important stage in the development of Canada, in which he was a large figure. He was a man of majestic intellectual powers—rather a broad and theoretic academic statesman than a politician. When Mackenzie could no longer lead, there was no one who could stand beside Mr. Blake for the leadership of the Liberal party. He was overwhelming in his eloquence, but had none of his marvellous Sir John Macdonald nor the white plume bonhomie of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He came to a difference with his party not on the principle of free trade, but because he regarded the form in which reciprocity with the United States was proposed as unfair to Great Britain. If he was right in that judgment of the measure, he certainly is to be honored for his attitude towards it. His imperialism in that case should prove that it was with no lack of imperial patriotism, but the reverse, that he espoused the cause of home rule in Ireland. In fact his attitude in that was precisely analogous to the position he took when Premier of Ontario with regard to the relations that should exist between the provinces of Canada and the nation government. His attitude then was one of the strongest provincialism in matters that devolve upon the provinces. Nothing, he held, could do more to weaken the federal bond than any political interference of provincial government in national politics or of national governments in provincial politics. This as will be seen is a counsel of perfection that, from that day to this, has never been lived up to. As a speaker in the British Commons he seemed to the older members of the house like a "rejuvenant" from the oratorical day of Burke, or at least of Macaulay, but it must be confessed that his chance for receiving a hearing other than critical and tolerant, was greatly curtailed by the unpopularity in the House of the cause he represented. He will always be remembered as a great and blameless patriot.

In last week's Tribune there appears what is called a joke on the Graphic. We regret to inform our readers that the point has not yet been discovered. Microscopic examination has failed to reveal even the slightest trace or semblance to a point so we must accept the Tribune's statement that it is a joke, as we accept all their statements and that is with a generous sprinkling of salt. We do not consider it worth while replying to the irresponsible and empty vapors of a chronic sore-head, for, as we stated, already that a newspaperman's first duty is to be sure of his facts, it is clearly seen that in the case of the Editor of the Tribune "truth is found at the bottom of a well," and unfortunately when the editor of the Tribune pulls up the bucket from the well instead of the clear sparkling water of truth, he only manages to bring to the surface all the slime and mud of the bottom.

It would be much better for the Editor of the Tribune to get busy and pay his own debts when he might have some chance to talk of other people, and as this is our last word on the subject we might reiterate the old adage for the Tribune's special benefit—
"Those who live in glass houses should pull down the blinds."

We on our side of the river will do what we can, in fact we have already moved at the last meeting of the Municipal Council of the township of Mann I understand that the Mayor Mr. T. R. Busted had a resolution passed with reference to the matters which along with others will be forwarded to the Minister of Public Works. This action will no doubt be endorsed by the County Council at their next session.

Now, let your Board of Trade take the matter up, let us be in earnest and again, let us work together, if we do this a bridge is assured. It will be a great help to the town, you will get more trade from the County of Bonaventure, we will not then have to pay toll, in ferry and lose time to get to market. We have to know, and if your storekeepers do not want too much profit, I have not a doubt but that they will get the greater part of the money that now goes to Eaton's and elsewhere.

An advertising solicitor, a stranger, without even a recommendation as to his honesty, visited our town last week and induced a number of our merchants many of whom do not use the Graphic, to pay a certain sum for a few lines on an advertising card, of which 1000 were to be issued. Chinese Soldiers Mutiny

The Grand Cities of the North in the Hands of Uncontrollable Mobs.

Peking, March 1—A mutiny of Yuan Shi Kai's soldiers started in Peking at 8 o'clock last night. Many of the natives have been killed or wounded, but foreigners are safe. Many fires were started stretching from the forbidden city to the building of the Chinese foreign board, where Yuan Shi Kai resides, the flames reaching within half a mile of the legations. The mutineers ran through the streets, burning and plundering on all sides. Thousands of shops were looted, principally those of dealers in gold and silver and art curios and pawn brokers. Several of the shop keepers were shot or bayoneted.

Tien Tsin, March 3—Rioting of a serious nature occurred here last night. Between 9 and 10 o'clock in the evening the soldiers mutinied. They set fire to a number of buildings and then began looting from house to house. They were joined by the rabble. The shops and banks on all the important streets were looted and some of them were wrecked. In order to intimidate the populace the soldiers kept up a continual gun fire. The rattle of musketry could be heard throughout the night. Only a few of the police remained loyal and they were greatly outnumbered and powerless to suppress the disorders. No fewer than 14 fires were raging simultaneously in various parts of the city.

Peking, Mar. 3—Martial law, which has been proclaimed in the capital is operating successfully. At one o'clock this morning quiet prevailed in the vicinity of the legations, but continual cannonading was heard in the direction of Fung Tai, with which communication has been temporarily cut off.

Famous Canadian Statesman Dead

Mon. Edward Blake Ex-Member of Canadian and British Parliaments Passes Away at 79.

Toronto, March 1—Hon. Edward Blake, K. C., Premier of Ontario in 1871-72, leader of the Liberal party in the Dominion parliament from 1878 to 1890, and home rule M. P. for South Lancashire, England, in the British common from 1892 to 1902, died this evening at his residence, 457 Jarvis street, after an illness of nearly five years. He was born in Chatham, Ontario, in 1823, and had been in public life in Canada and Great Britain since 1847.

ENGLISH SUFFRAGETTES AGAIN ON WARPATH

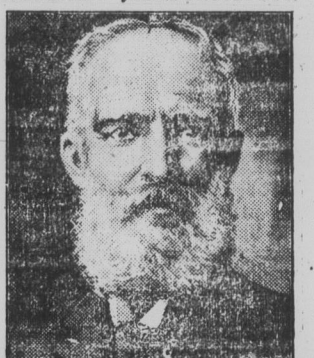
Hundreds of Valuable Plate-Glass Windows Shattered in London Shops.

London, March 1.—Because the coal miners had been able to gain government recognition of their grievances by threatening the business of the country, the suffragettes late to-day also entered on a policy of menace to trade. And they carried it out suddenly and with an order that resulted in heavy financial losses, brought consternation to the merchants of the most prosperous shopping district of the city and paralyzed business at the busiest hour of the day. The police were taken completely unawares by the onslaught of the women and, before they were able to muster, the streets were covered with shattered plate glass that once had been the show-windows of stores. It was a window breaking expedition solely, and a thoroughly organized one. Hundreds of windows in many of the most famous shops of the world and in several of the government offices and clubs were wrecked by the suffragettes. The damage done will aggregate many thousands of pounds. The losses, however, will not all fall upon the shopkeepers as many of the show windows, especially the costly ones, were covered by insurance against breakage. MORE THAN 100 ARRESTS One hundred and fifteen women were dragged to the police stations by police or excited and indignant waiters. Many others, however, escaped. All those arrested were released during the course of the evening on bail, coupled with promises that they would refrain from further activities in window-wrecking. Some of the shopkeepers who saw the storm coming were able to close their shutters and barricade their shop doors against the infuriated suffragettes. The trouble centred about Trafalgar Square, where the big steamship companies have their passenger offices, and the windows of several of which were shattered and ranged along the Strand eastward and westward, and up Regent Street. Precariously and Oxford Street, where are situated the fashionable jewelry and drygoods houses.
